300,000 in State Now Considered Problem Drivers

Hartford, Jan. 25 (AP)—A committee of doctors has been formed to advise the state on the "Problem Drivers."

The doctors are to be organized in a committee to advise the state health commissioner, Dr. Clement C. Clarke of New Haven was chosen to head the committee.

Motor Vehicles Commissioner John J. Tynan told the doctors 300,000 of Connecticut's 1,600,000 motor vehicles operators are considered problem drivers.

Some, but not most, have physical impairments, Tynan said. Officers and some have "over attitude" problems.

Dr. Tynan said the committee will advise the Motor Vehicles Department on what policies it should follow with regard to drivers, such as epileptics, who take drugs for medical reasons.

Drugs suspected of playing a role in the recently fatal crash of a motor vehicle under Greek government are pills for treating sickness, anti-histamines, tranquilizers, nerve stimulants, barbiturates and sedatives.

Kennedy Asks Help On Free Trade Plan

Washington, Jan. 25 (AP)—President Kennedy today proposed a \$1 trillion partnership with Europe.

We will prove to the world that we are not afraid of a free trade policy which has been the policy of the United States since the early days of the republic.

Repeating requests made in his State of the Union message two weeks ago, Kennedy will ask authority to negotiate tariff cuts up to 50 percent on some groups of products and complete elimination of tariffs on other items.

His special message on trade was studied with assurance that "Trade Expansion Act of 1962," as he called it, would be passed by Congress.

Businessmen and farm leaders, along with federal "readjustment allowances" for up to a full year at 60 percent of their weekly pay, plus an additional 10 weeks for those over 65. Unemployment compensation, when renewed, will be paid for 15 weeks.

For business firms and farmers, technical guidance and loan guarantees "to help companies modernize plants and diversify products."

Both the president and his cabinet members are expected to meet in the White House on Thursday to discuss the trade plan.

Rockville-Vernon

County's Ten-Year Growth Reported Highest in State

Tolland County leads all Connecticut counties in population, housing and motor vehicle registration increases in the past decade. And Ellington, Tolland and Vernon are three of the fastest growing towns in the county.

The information has been culled by the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce from the 1962 Connecticut Market Data report of the Connecticut Development Commission.

The chamber selected the statistics dealing with the three towns, plus the city of Rockville in Vernon, because those communities make up its service area.

In population, Tolland County showed an increase from 1950 to 1960 of 53.7 per cent. Hartford County, in comparison, showed a 27.8 per cent increase for the same period. The statewide increase was 26.3 per cent.

Tolland County also led in population increase between 1950 and 1960 with 64 per cent.

In the four chamber communities, the population rise in the last decade was: Ellington, 80.1 per cent; Rockville, 18.2 per cent; Tolland, 77.8 per cent; and Vernon (including Rockville) 67.7 per cent.

Other categories are:

Housing—Tolland County increases, 47.9 per cent; Ellington, 50.2 per cent; Tolland, 71.4 per cent; and Vernon, 65.7 per cent.

Taxable motor vehicle increase—Tolland County, 81.8 per cent; Ellington, 90.5 per cent; Tolland and Vernon, 88.6 per cent.

Passenger car registration increase—Tolland County, 94.6 per cent; Ellington, 94.6 per cent; and Vernon, 77.9 per cent.

The market report also listed population density, and retail sales statistics for the towns.


Vernon leads in population density with 82.2 people per square mile in the 18.2 square mile town. Ellington (24.4 square miles) is second with 152.2 people per square mile and Tolland (104 square miles) is third with 78 people per square mile.

Retail sales in the three towns rose in 1959 and 1960, the report states. On a per capita basis, Ellington's sales climbed from \$201 to \$289, Tolland's from \$14 to \$24, and Vernon's \$173 to \$132.

The chamber ended its commentary of the market report with the observation: "Scanning this data, it is evident that this area is growing rapidly."

"I can cook," said Lady Taylor, but she declined to tell how she prepares her time between prison and her home.

Panelists in General Accord On School, Social Life Issues

Parents, students and teachers were in general accord on school and social life problems and standards in a panel discussion presented for 300 seniors at a PFSO meeting at Bennett Junior High School last night.

Homework at the junior high school age is primarily the students' responsibility, it was concluded. However, it is the parents' role to provide the proper atmosphere and materials at home for study and to provide time and interest in homework, it was pointed out.

Parents can best help students, by a spirit of cooperation with the school if it becomes necessary to discuss about student progress or problems and to provide time and materials for out-of-school experiences that will broaden their cultural horizons, George Bradiau, principal, pointed out.

Teachers explained that Grade 7 students have often had little preparation for homework and require a period of adjustment to develop study habits.

Student panelists agreed that dating should be confined to group activities such as sponsored dances. The age spread between boy and girl should not be more than a couple of years, it was pointed out by opposing children who will have similar interests.

Parents get "all shook up" at the mention of "going steady," a panelist commented. "Going steady" doesn't mean the same thing to students as to parents, it was pointed out.

Students, teachers and parents agreed that some parental control of social life at this age level is necessary.

Mrs. Charles Baxter, a parent on the panel, asserted "its not that parents don't trust their children; they question their judgment in some things."

Student panelists also explained the function of the Student Council as a means of communication between the entire student body aimed at better participation in school activities.
