



Test Ban, Dismaying Russia Rejects Talks Merger

Geneva, Jan. 26 (AP)—The Soviet Union today rejected the reluctant U.S.-British offer to merge the nuclear test ban talks with the coming disarmament negotiations. The Russians insisted that the 3-nation talks continue on their demand for an unqualified test moratorium.

U.S. Delegate Charles C. Stille and British Ambassador Michael Wright refused to consider the Soviet declaration as a reply to their offer on Jan. 18 to merge the two arms talks, which were demanded by the Russians since last summer.

The Soviet about-face was communicated in a government statement today in the 352nd session of the test ban talks by Soviet Delegate Semiyon M. Tshapkin. It repeated virtually all previous Soviet accusations against the western nuclear powers.

Tshapkin told newsmen after the hour-long meeting that the Soviet Union is determined to achieve agreement on the basis of our proposal for national control authority being used for the detection of clandestine testing, rather than the international network worked out in the Geneva talks before Moscow withdrew from all earlier agreements on a basis of inspection last year.

The Russian statement said that detection methods are so far advanced that the nuclear powers can detect violations of a test ban, and that the West is only a device to put western spies on equal footing.

In agreeing 30 days ago to the proposal of a test ban treaty as a matter of the highest priority, the United States said it and Britain "continue to view the Russian demand for a test ban as a matter of the highest priority. But the United States said the Russians had made further progress impossible by rejecting 'arbitrary negotiations' in the 3-power talks.

The United States and Britain said they would continue to work for a completely acceptable Soviet test ban, and that the network of international observation posts demanded by the West is only a device to put western spies on equal footing.

Punta del Este, Uruguay, Jan. 26 (AP)—The United States tonight lost a vote in the Organization of American States against Castro communism, but hopes against sharply under the pressure of mounting opposition among its hemisphere partners.

Uruguay joined the ranks of the so-called soft seven favoring kid glove treatment of the Havana regime.

The eight nations evidently intended to nullify the United States proposal to quarantine Castroism, set up ambassadors against it, sever trade links and drum Cayman out of deliberations of the Organization of American States.

Taxable Grand List Hits \$10 Million Mark

Bolton's net taxable list for 1962, according to the abstract completed by the assessors, is \$10,000,000 higher than last year's figure.

It is also a slightly greater increase than that reported last year when the net taxable figure rose \$3,700,000.

The grand list is subject to revision by the board of tax review next month when it will hear appeals from current assessments.

The increase in the list exceeds by \$50,000 the figure estimated by the board of finance in preparing the budget for the current year. At that time, the tax rate for this period was estimated at 22 mills.

A tax of 33 mills on the newly announced grand list would produce \$33,000,000 in property taxes. Last September, the board of finance estimated a sum of \$31,200,000 would have to be raised in property taxes to cover the budget.

Completion of the list shows that property owners failed to file their property lists by Nov. 7, thereby incurring a 10 per cent penalty. This penalty assessment boosted the total by \$20,000.

Exemptions to 365 veterans lowered the net taxable list by \$300,000.

Other data included in the abstract shows:

The 472 houses in town, up 10 from last year, are assessed for \$6,332,070. The 404 outbuildings are listed at \$1,280,000, a 12 per cent increase over last year, are assessed at \$1,781,500.

Commercial buildings remained about the same as last year at \$1,112,000. The 688 stores are slightly less than last year at \$1,112,000.

Building Officials Complete Course

Three Manchester and two South Windsor building officials have completed a 15-week course on building problems faced by towns with growing pains, according to the University of Connecticut.

After the plane left Montana's capital city 20 miles south of Wolf Creek.

"The plane was demolished," reported rancher Nick Wirth after the crash scene which occurred in a wooded area. "I saw two mangled bodies he couldn't identify, including one man in a flight suit."

There was no official public confirmation of any of the deaths, but families of the victims said they were given confirmation by National Guard officials.

Lewis and Clark County Sheriff, Coroner David Middleman said, "My deputies say the plane and its contents were scattered over a wide area."

The state force announced it would investigate the crash which occurred on a pine-studded mountain ridge. Wreckage was spread over a 2-mile area. Two loggers found the wreckage.

Maj. Gen. Perry E. Griffith of the Montana National Guard said the investigation. He is deputy inspector general for safety for the Air Force, which has jurisdiction over National Guard planes.

The first clue to the location of the wreckage came in a report from Lawrence Gove of Grapton, who saw a plane crash on the northern side of Keosauqua about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday. The plane was down about an hour after the plane took off.

Half an hour after Gove's report, Griffith and Bunker spotted the wreckage.

The buried plane was about three miles from the location of the National Stores, a food chain, near the town of Grapton. The wreckage was not found until the following Nov. 4.

Cloud Layer Blocks Tracking Facilities

By HOWARD BENDER

Cape Canaveral, Fla., Jan. 27 (AP)—The long-awaited, round-the-world space flight of Astronaut John H. Glenn Jr. was postponed again today—this time because of weather.

The weather outlook for the next two days was reported unfavorable, indicating the flight may be delayed until early next week.

Probably no one was more unhappy than the sturdy, 168-pound Glenn.

But he flashed a big grin as he was helped out of the capsule at 10:25 a.m., and another when, still in his space suit, he stepped out of the transfer van and walked into his Hangar 3 quarters at 10:45 a.m.

"Well, there'll be another day," he told Col. John A. Powers, astronaut's spokesman.

During hours of waiting in the cramped confinement of his space capsule, waiting for the roar of Atlas rocket engines that would hurl him into space, Glenn reported in good spirits and anxious only to get on with his historic mission.

A heavy cloud cover over the launching area—which would have made it impossible to track the rocket visually in critical early stages of the flight—forced officials to call a postponement at 9:10 a.m. (EST) for at least 24 hours.

Ten minutes before the "scrub" decision was announced, O. B. Lloyd, information officer for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, telephoned White House press secretary Pierre Salinger at Palm Beach, Fla.

Glenn immediately called his family in Cleveland, who had been watching preparations for the firing on television. He said Kennedy expressed his disappointment.

Also "disappointed but looking forward" to the next attempt was Glenn's wife, who was in the control room at Cape Canaveral.
