Myrna Fahey, the beautiful young actress who plays his daughter and the altar-bound heroine, never lost her zest for the role or the affection of thousands of fans who write to her. But it seemed that Ames, as lawyer "Stanley Banks," was a more sympathetic character, one who most people — especially other fathers — could identify themselves with and share his problems, mostly financial, as he prepares his daughter for her big day.

As a result of this, the role of "father" will gain impetus in succeeding episodes of the show.

Ames, who has starred in legitimate plays, movies and television for three decades, feels that the reason polls showed the public was more interested in him than in his "daughter" was because "every-one loves the underdog — and that's the father of any bride."

Ames said he thought the series picked up greater speed after the wedding, Feb. 2, and will become even more delightful after Kay's baby is born. "We'll really go to town then as a comedy-dramatic show," he states.

Miss Fahey, a black-haired, green-eyed beauty from Maine, agrees with Ames. "A bride-to-be isn't a fully developed person as a woman," she adds. "It's after marriage—even if it's on television—that you get a better sense of the role and can really play it for all it's worth."

Burt Metcalfe, the Canadian-born actor who plays Miss Fahey's husband-to-be "Buckley Dunstan," shares the same views as the actress and Ames. "The tendency is that when you are an engaged couple you act—well, frankly—kind of silly. After the wedding, 'Kay' and I mature. We come responsible people—just like in real life—and when the baby is born, which is still a long way off in the show, well, we're devoted parents. Not much I can say after that."

Also featured in the Friday night series is Laurene Tuttle as the bridegroom's mother and Ransom Sherman as his father. Ruth Warrick plays the mother of the bride, and from critical reaction, plays it right up to the hilt.

"I must admit that although I've been an actress for many years, I still get emotional when I'm doing sentimental roles," the lovely red-haired Miss Warrick said.

"When we filmed the wedding scene, I was supposed to cry a little. We did the scene, and I cried on cue. After it was over, the director told me I was fine and that I didn't have to keep crying, that the scene was over. 'I can't help it,' I wailed. 'It's so beautiful.' Everybody on the set started laughing like mad, and the next day everyone sent me boxes and boxes of handkerchiefs."

Executive Producer Robert Maxwell said that even though the father role would be developed more in future episodes, the series would continue on its original format. It will follow "Kay" and "Buckley" through marriage right up to parenthood, with all the complications that come with married life.

"But now we think the audience wants to see how 'Stanley' (Leon Ames) and 'Ellie' (Ruth Warrick) get along after the wedding," he added. "It seems that their adventures are just as interesting as

those of the newlyweds in the show."

Leon Ames is no newcomer to family comedy or marrying off beautiful daughters. He starred in "Life With Father" on television for several years, and had played "father" to some of the most beautiful girls in show business—June Allyson, Elizabeth Taylor, Judy Garland and Margaret O'Brien.

In real life, he has yet to play a father of the bride. His only daughter, Shelley, 20, who infrequently appears in the series also, is unmarried. His son, Leon, 17, attends college in the San Fernando Valley near Los Angeles.

That the show will run a long

time was indicated by Leon Ames when he laughed: "Next year we'll change the title to 'Grandfather of the Bride's Child,' and by the time the youngster is grown—if it's a girl—it will become 'Grandfather of the Bride.'"

Hollywood on TV

HOLLYWOOD (NEA)—Mark Wilson, a sort of Walt Disney of Magic Land, is happy to report that he has never received a letter from an outraged parent suggesting that he make himself disappear, with the postscript:

"And while you're at it, we would be delighted if you took television with you."

Mark is the personable, 32-year-old Texan who caters to the kiddies as the now-you-see-it-now-you-don't magician of CBS-TV's popular Saturday morning "The Magic Land of Allakazam."

With no trouble at all, Mark could saw a person in half, stick a dozen assorted knives into a box containing his mother-in-law or burn his announcer at the stake and then make him reappear with an ice cube in his mouth.

"And you can imagine what would happen," he grins.

We could indeed. But no one is going to haul Mark in front of the FCC on charges of contributing to the delinquency of somebody's junior who sawed Grandma's leg off just before setting her room afire, using her knitting yarn as a fuse.

So how do you keep from boeing youngsters bred in the violence of guys, gals and guns in all the men vs. crime TV shows? Mark's happy solution to TV's "you can't do that" campaign is sleight of hand and illusions—"big tricks," he calls them—which lack violence but which are presented with his Disney-like flair.

But he would like you to know that he doesn't consider "The Magic Land of Allakazam" as a show strictly for the kiddies.

"It's like the circus," he says about magic. "The parents get as much kick out of a circus as their children do. The same is true of our show."

But sleight of hand and illusions for an audience of kids—there are 350 of them every Saturday morning—are no simple chores, says Mark who spent seven years doing magic tricks on a Dallas TV station. It took him that long before he could convince network bosses that magic had national appeal.

"It is easier," claims Mark, "to fool an adult than a child. The adult looks for a complicated solution to the trick. The child reaches a simple solution, which the trick usually has."

Mark's seven years on local TV, after graduating from SMU where he studied advertising (that's an illusion, too), proved it was possible to sustain a weekly magic show. But today he keeps a staff of 17 people—nine of them magicians like himself—dreaming up illusions or variations on sleight of hand tricks.

"I guess," he says, "I have the largest collection of illusions in the world." His "big tricks," all built for the TV shows, now total more than 100 which fill an entire warehouse.

He figures he could give 20 two-hour "big trick" shows without repeating himself. There's no worry about "What do we do next week?"

"Like a musician who writes with eight notes," Mark explains.

Pauline Frederick once found herself the lone woman attending a state dinner given by the UN Secretary General and attended by 75 men.

She has learned to take such situations in her stride as NBC News' United Nations correspondent and as the first woman ever to be elected president of the UN's Correspondents Association.

She has also grown accustomed to crises. In her calm, authoritative voice, she has covered (for the NBC Television and Radio Networks) the Korean, Suez, Hungarian, Middle East, Laotian and Congo crises and the troubled months following the death of Secretary-General Hammarskjold.

Other big stories she has handled were the Nuremberg trials of German war criminals, conferences of the Big Four foreign ministers, and the national political conventions and elections. In 1956 she was "anchorman" for the Republican and Democratic conventions for NBC Radio.

Born in Gallitzin, Pa., and raised in Harrisburg, she has been working at her news trade since she started interviewing wives of diplomats and selling the stories to the Washington Star. Later she wrote for the North American Newspaper Alliance and then covered assignments in Europe, India and China. She made her first overseas broadcast from Chungking in 1945.

As UN correspondent for NBC-TV and Radio, she appears on such programs as "Huntley-Brinkley Report," "Meet the Press" and news specials. She has a daily radio news program and appears three times a week on "Emphasis" as well as being available for UN reports on other radio and TV news programs.

Some of the honors Miss Frederick has won in her distinguished career are: the George Foster Peabody Award for her contribution to international understanding in covering the UN, Theta Sigma Phi National Headliner Award as the outstanding woman in radio, McCall's Golden Mike award twice as the outstanding woman in radio and television, Radio Daily's All American Award as the "Outstanding Woman of 1956," and a special citation for her UN coverage from the General Federation of Women's Clubs. She has received honorary degrees from Mount Holyoke, Gettysburg College, American University and Lycoming College.
