Seabees Note 20th Birthday

GREAT LAKES, Ill. (AP) — The Seabees, those muscular men who wield either a sword or a plowshare, observed their 20th anniversary today.

The U.S. Navy construction battalions were established in 1942 to build and repair overseas bases — and, if necessary, to defend their handiwork against the enemy.

They have worked in war and peace from the tropics to the polar regions. They are still at it as a permanent part of the nation's naval arm.

They are building missile tracking stations in the Pacific, bases in the antarctic and housing units in places as far apart as Greenland and Guam.

Since this is the official birthday of the Seabees, the drum beat was at the naval station best the drums for them.

Perhaps the classic World War II story involved a group of U.S. Marines who stormed ashore at New Georgia Island in the Pacific expecting stiff Japanese resistance. Instead, a Seabee officer walked out of the jungle and greeted their surprised commanding officer.

Wisconsin Marines
"Colonel," he said, "the Navy Seabees are always happy to welcome Marines to camp-hold territory."

Another Pacific Island, the Seabees built a 3,500 foot airstrip in a dense jungle in less than 15 days. They apologized for not finishing the job sooner. They were slowed down by 14 inches of rain.

Another Seabee outfit built a camp for 4,000 men, complete with housing units, mess hall, utilities and roads, in 17 days.

On Funan, an island in the Marianas, the Seabees laid 8 million square yards of asphalt, enough to have a road from Chicago to Milwaukee and back again in 6 months.

Highest Prizes from Top
The Seabees have been decorated with hundreds of medals. But probably the highest prize came from a captured Japanese major who had been hiding in a cave on two islands for several weeks.

Led from his hiding place, the major looked in awe at how the Seabees had rebuilt the demolished island and said: "Impossible!"

Town Firemen Answer 26 Calls

Town firemen were called out 26 times in February — almost twice as many as in January. The breakdown for actual fire calls for rescue and emergency, two accidental alarms and one false alarm.

The breakdown fires included 10 in buildings, two brush fires, grass fires, five in motor vehicles, and two non-building fires, according to Fire Chief W. Clifford Mason.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Dr. J. Curran, 89, a pioneer in the surgical treatment of glaucoma, died Sunday after a long illness. Dr. Curran founded the department of ophthalmology at the University of Kansas Medical Center and was head of the department from 1944. He was born near Bathurst, New South Wales, Australia, and had lived in Kansas City 20 years.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Neilson Stuebker Hiley, 79, retired automotive industry executive and lawyer, died Sunday after a long illness. He was a grandson of Peter R. Stuebker, a founder of the former Stuebker Brothers Manufacturing Co., now the Stuebker-Packard Corp. Hiley, who has held executive positions with the company, was born in St. Joseph, Mo.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Adolph Toppertwein, 87, for many years one of the nation's top machinists, died Sunday after a month's illness. Toppertwein, who set many exhibition shooting records, was employed by Winchester Arms Co. for more than 50 years. He was born in Boonville, Tex., but had lived most of his life in San Antonio.

BOSTON (AP)—John G. Alden, 76, nationally prominent yacht designer, died Saturday at his winter home in Orlando, Fla. Alden was one of two men to win the Bermuda race three times and had competed in 14 of them. He was born in Troy, N.Y.

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—Boyd R. Hargis, 85, professor of plans at the University of Tulsa since 1924, died Saturday in a hospital where he had undergone surgery Feb. 13 for an aortic aneurysm.

SAINT JEAN DE LUZ, France (AP)—Pierre Benoit, 75, noted French novelist, died Saturday after a long illness. Benoit was best known for his "L'Abbatiale," a story of the mysterious lost continent Atlantis.

TRENTON, N. J. (AP)—The Very Rev. Regis Stafford 47, first principal bishop of East High School in Levittown, Pa., died Sunday. Father Stafford, who helped found the College of St. Elizabeth, Ohio in 1942 and was the first treasurer and executive vice-president, was born in Pittsburgh.

5 Perish in Fire
BROWNSVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Four small children and their grandmother died in a winter-wrapped fire which destroyed their home in the Sunny Hill Community yesterday.

Fire Chief Battle Shaw identified the dead as Mrs. Hannah Bond Chaslin, 65; Linda Fay Jones, 6; Claudette Jones, 4; Brenda Jakes, 3; and Denise Jones, 2. All were Negroes.

Shaw said four other Jones children escaped from the burning home. The cause of the fire was not determined.

Harrison Jones, 11, one of the children who escaped, said Mrs. Chaslin came out of the house but ran back in just as it collapsed when she realized the other children were inside.

The children's mother was away at the time.

contains the extremely important flight recorder without causing additional damage.

Civil Aeronautics Board investigators are hopeful the cockpit instruments and recorder might shed some light on why the \$34-million Boeing 707 jetliner crashed today into the bay moments after it had taken off from Idlewild airport bound for Los Angeles.

The recorder, a small steel sphere designed to withstand the terrible forces unleashed in such a crash, should include a taped record of the jet's second-by-second performance on its short hop to disaster. The recorder was situated in one of the wheel wells.

When work started today, salvage crews had recovered the bodies of 11 victims, and 13 had been identified.

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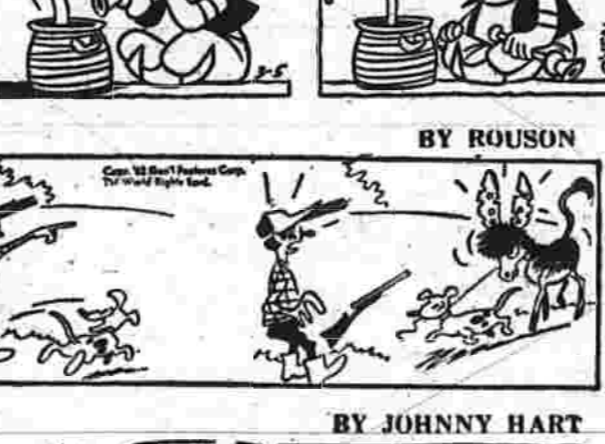
