The Goodys' Story: A Real Experience

NEW YORK (AP)—Everybody in our building feels sorry for Jack and Betty Goody.

They meet every day in this young couple. It's a shame what happened to them.

Maybe if I tell their sad tale it might prevent some other young couple from meeting a similar fate.

Here goes:

When Jack and Betty moved into our building five years ago they were seawards. Jack was junior executive in a wholesale plumbing firm. Betty worked as a secretary.

They knew nobody in the building, and as first found it hard to get acquainted. Then an older woman asked Betty to help her sell tickets for a church raffle.

Together they went through our building, knocking on every door. Betty did so well she was asked to sell tickets for a different church raffle.

Then she began to collect for philanthropies—the Red Cross, the American Cancer Society, the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundations.

Soon she was the best known girl in the building. But hardly anyone knew Jack, her husband.

"I'm getting sick and tired of this," he told her one night. "I come home to an empty apartment. You're always collecting money for something or another, and it's 10 p.m. before we sit down to eat."

"Why don't you make the rounds with me?" suggested Betty.

So he did. They were such a gay, charming, chatty couple it was a pleasure to find Jack and Betty Goody in for a drink—and often, to stay on for dinner—then they never were a minute apart.

Not their home—your home. But you didn't have a dollar handy for whatever good cause they were collecting for, they never minded. They would just as soon have a drink.

Before long the Goodys were paid with every tenant in our building. At least once a month they would knock on each of the 135 apartments, and rarely indeed were they turned away.

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Smoked Ham Butt Is Economy Buy

One of the most economical cuts of meat is the smoked ham butt, according to Betty Gasanti, home agent with the Hartford County Extension Service.

A 16-pound ham can be cut into three parts to be used separately by small families, she adds.

First, make sure you buy a butt that's not a butt portion, which has the center slices already removed. The center slices are removed to cut the butt into four center slices, a boneless roast, and a 5-pound roast.



Police Chief James M. Reardon has been designated to represent the International Association of Chiefs of Police, Inc. (IACP) at future meetings of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), which are usually held in New York City during the year.

A letter Reardon received from Quinn Tamm, acting executive director of the IACP office in Washington, D.C., informed him that he will serve on the Safety to Life Committee of the NFPA.

The duties of the committee relate to improving building codes dealing with safety to life in all buildings, with particular emphasis on safety in hospitals, schools and hotel buildings.

The Safety to Life Committee was organized in 1918 and only recently have police officials become members. Other police and fire officials in Connecticut include: Major Carroll Shaw, deputy state fire marshal, also serve on the committee.

Starfish in Long Island Sound alone cause damage estimated at more than \$15,000,000 a year to the shellfish industry.

'Pop', Bowling at 92, Likes to Keep Active

Hot on the trail of a strike, Winfield Chase, 92, of 28 Main St., has no time to spare when his favorite sport of bowling is in progress.

"Pop" Chase, as he is known to his many friends, is proud of the distinction of being one of the oldest bowlers in this section of the country. He bows every Tuesday afternoon in the six-team Senior Citizens' League at the Parkside Lanes. He helped organize the league last season and laughs when someone mentions that he is too old to start anything new.

Before he began bowling, "Pop" had a rheumatic condition in his fingers. His ten-pin exercise has limbered up his fingers so that he doesn't bother him at all anymore. He would like to bowl more often, but can't always find transportation to the lanes.

Chase was born Dec. 19, 1869, in Bristol, N. J., the only son and eldest of four children. He loves to reminisce about the pranks he played as a schoolboy, and chuckles when he tells of the red "popper" in the hot air that got him into the school. A severe case of pneumonia during childhood left him with impaired health, but his strong will and love of life keeps him active and doing more than many half his age.

On Nov. 20, 1886, he married the late Augusta Neuman Chase. They had eight children, four of whom are still living.

After living in various parts of the country, the family came to Manchester in 1911. "Pop" got a job with the Adams Express Co., which later consolidated with the American Express and became the American Railway Express Co.

In 1915, he became the local agent for the Express Co. and, remembering many of his experiences during that time, "Pop" admits that he had a quick temper and said that once the office telephoned he bothered him so much that he pulled out all the connections so he could work in peace. The repairman came the next day, he added.

During World War I, an influenza epidemic struck Manchester. Cheney Hall was converted into an emergency hospital and Pop aided in transporting the sick by offering horse-drawn express wagons for use as temporary ambulances.

He left the Express Co. in 1918 and joined the contracting firm of Stone and Webster. After working on building and maintenance for 27 years, "Pop" retired at 61 with a pension and lifetime pass on the railroad.

Always active and a "joiner," he was a volunteer fireman, a member of the Knights of Pythias for more than 50 years, the Jun-

Time And Tide

A week ago, while we in Connecticut were adjusting cheerfully to the fact that our weathermen and their warnings of heavy snow for us had been way off base, just about everybody south of us on the Atlantic seaboard was looking for one of the worst natural disasters in the history of the region.

It has taken all the following weeks to begin to catalogue the damage, the thousands of homes lost, the millions of dollars of damage done, and we doubt that the full story has yet been told. The trouble was that the disaster, big and rough and devastating as it was, didn't really act like a disaster anywhere until it had arrived. After the first snow which opened the storm sequence, there wasn't very much that was notable. The snow faded or yielded to rain; the rain was not heavy enough to make any part of a disaster itself; the wind was strong but not strong enough to do much damage by itself.

But, well off shore, after the storm system had left the mainland, the age of 19 by the end of the year, or where the child is a full-time student, he may still be claimed as a dependent, no matter what his income might be.

When a dependent child has earned \$600 or more, he must file federal income tax returns, regardless of whether he is being claimed as a dependent.

If a person is a member of the taxpayer's household and lives with him for a year, he can be claimed as a dependent. His relevant in determining dependency. The taxpayer can claim cer-

tain people as dependents, whether or not the individual is a member of the household. These people include children and grandchildren, stepchildren, brothers and sisters, parents and grandparents, stepfather and stepmother, brothers and sisters of parents, children of brothers and sisters, and in-laws.

The fourth qualification in determining dependency is the test of citizenship. The dependent must be a citizen or resident of the United States, Canada, Mexico, the Canal Zone, or the Republic of Panama during the tax year.

Finally, the dependent cannot file a joint income tax return with a spouse. However, if a taxpayer's daughter, whom he claims as a dependent, files a separate return from her husband, the taxpayer may claim her as a dependent.

the LAW in your life

DEPENDENCY EXEMPTIONS
If a taxpayer wants to claim dependency exemptions on his federal income tax—that is, to exclude persons to whom his support he contributes—he must meet certain specifications.

First, the claimer must be a dependent. The taxpayer must contribute more than 50 per cent of the support. When several people contribute to the support of a dependent, any one of the individuals may claim the exemption, if he contributes at least 10 per cent of the support, and if each of them is a dependent as an exempt person.

Second, the dependent cannot file a joint income tax return with a spouse. However, if a taxpayer's daughter, whom he claims as a dependent, files a separate return from her husband, the taxpayer may claim her as a dependent.

These are the five tests of determining dependency. Whether or not you can claim a person as a dependent is decided by these qualifications. Be sure that you can pass these tests before claiming dependency in your federal income tax.

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Try Herb Accent in Meat Cookery

Dare to venture on your own with meat dishes and experiment with those herbs and spices too often left sitting on the kitchen shelf. They can enhance the flavor of ordinary foods, taking them from the ordinary to the gourmet class.

Ruba Stagg's home economist, gives a few tips on using spices and herbs in meat cookery. Use them fresh and use them sparingly.

Use about 1/2 teaspoon per pound of meat, or less for stringy meats. Never make them overpowering. Spices should enhance the flavor of the meat, not disguise it.

A number of spices and herbs go well with beef steaks and roasts: Basil, bay leaf, celery seed, cloves, garlic, ginger, marjoram, oregano, rosemary or thyme. For veal, try poultry seasoning, tarragon, onion salt or celery salt.

Cloves and mustard are natural with cured pork. Add caraway seed, cloves, oregano or sage to fresh pork or ribs cooked on a pork roast.

Lamb dishes are deliciously flavored with dill, garlic salt, marjoram, oregano, onion salt, celery salt, caraway seed, cloves, garlic or thyme. Use sparingly.

Round beef and most lamb take well to a variety of herbs and spices, such as basil, marjoram, oregano, onion salt, celery salt and onion salt.

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Nations Don't Frighten
Only once, we believe, in the whole history of negotiations between East and West over the problem of disarmament, has either side come even close to offering something it expected the other side might take.

This general characterization of all the plans and propositions offered by West to East or East to West goes back as far as the original Baruch plan for the international control of atomic energy. We have always told ourselves that was a fine plan, but it was that, that if the positions had been reversed, and it had been Russia, with the bomb, offering the Baruch plan to us, we would have rejected it just as Russia did.

Ever since, in many conferences and papers, Russia and the United States have specialized in offering each other propositions neither would itself accept, were the positions reversed.

There has been only one time when either side came close to offering something it expected the other side might really take. That was when the Kennedy administration first came into office and, to its credit, decided to try to make a real policy meeting with the policy concessions the Russians had made at Geneva in the talks on a nuclear test ban.

The experience was enlightening, and discouraging. Russia obviously saw our good intentions, offered a real, immediate, effective action, withdrawing its previous objections the moment the Geneva talks reopened, and then going on, in future months, to renounce and violate its own voluntary ban on nuclear explosions.

After this experience, there is no evidence that either side is going to this current disarmament conference at Geneva with any kind of tangible proposition it expects the opposition to be able to accept.

It would seem that, on our side, on the particular issue of nuclear test banning, Britain would like to have us scale down our prescription for inspection to something Russia might accept. But there is no indication that the United States plans to accede to this British idea.

On the opposite side, there is certainly visible no influence suggesting to Khrushchev that he send to Geneva any significant offering of any Russian position toward something the United States might accept. To the contrary, the air is full of wild Russian suggestions which may look glamorous in the headlines, but which are pure propaganda to the experts.

So far, one can guess at only one real reason why the United States and Russia are both at Geneva, attending this disarmament conference. They don't quite dare not be there. They are afraid of what the world would say, of what their own people would think, if they proclaimed this meeting a mere waste of their time. And they are scared enough of each other to want to keep some line of conversation—even conversation which never gets anywhere—open between themselves. Each knows it will be a terrible moment when either one of them doesn't show up for such occasions. But they are not yet frightened enough, individually or collectively, to do more than just keep the channels open.

How can they do more, because of what? They are nations, and nations are forbidden to be frightened, ever. The more terrible the fate, no matter how amenable, the more readily they must face it.

That means the underlying competition at Geneva, as it has been the dominant psychological factor in every East-West meeting in the past 15 years. There ought to be a different kind of international code to live by, but nobody seems able to invent or sell it.

Catholic Birth Control Hits All Psychiatric Methods

NEW YORK (AP) — A Roman Catholic psychiatrist says any form of birth control, including the Church-approved, 2 1/2-inch method, is psychologically bad.

And the newly developed oral tablets to prevent conception might be the worst method yet from the psychological standpoint, adds Dr. John R. Cavanaugh, who says women have become fearful because of warnings that prolonged use of such tablets may have adverse physical effects in later years.

Cavanaugh is a private practitioner and special lecturer in pastoral psychiatry at Catholic University in Washington, D. C. He gave his views in a speech before the Catholic Guild of Psychiatrists Tuesday during a session here on fertility control.

Cavanaugh maintained that any form of birth control frustrates a natural need and is likely to become a source of internal discord.



Andover School Board Budget Draft Rises \$3,530

An elementary school budget of \$123,860 for the year 1962-63 was approved by the board of education at last night's meeting. This is an increase of \$3,530 over the current budget. The board will explain the budget to the town at a public hearing scheduled March 21. A definite date for discussion of the budget with the board of finance has not yet been set.

The board also voted to accept a plan, submitted by Supt. Aram Dananjian, for special classes for mentally retarded children. The plan, under consideration for several months, proposes a joint agreement with Hebron and Marlborough.

The plan provides that administrative arrangements for the classes, including budget and finance, will be handled by the elementary board of education in the town in which the class is conducted; that the same board shall contract for teachers and that the class shall be supervised by the principal of the school where it is located. Provision is also made for taking tuition pupils from other towns if space is available.

Each town, according to the plan, would pay its pro-rated per pupil share of the cost, determined on the basis of its average daily membership in the district. A town with no students would pay a reasonable amount for rent of classroom facilities, if this charge is made by the town operating a class.

The board also accepted Ralph Lawrence's resignation as chairman of the study committee for future educational needs and plans. Lawrence Scianian was appointed a member of the committee. The new chairman will be elected at the next meeting of that committee.

The transportation committee announced that all school buses in Andover will be replaced by the State Motor Vehicle Department on Monday.

The University of Massachusetts Dance Band will present a jazz concert tonight at RHAM High School at 8:30. The organization is the "grandchild" of a dance band formed by Hebron's Robert Clowes, while he was an undergraduate at the University.

Proceeds from the concert will go toward the purchase of robes for the RHAM Chorus. The dance band plays for regional variety of Massachusetts campus functions such as open house and big social weekends, as well as off-campus engagements at Western Air Force Base, Fitchburg Teachers College, and the like. A classical and semi-classical program was presented at RHAM in January by the University of Massachusetts Concert Band.

Tomorrow at 8 p.m. a meeting will be held in the RHAM Auditorium for eighth graders and their parents. The guidance director will speak briefly on overall considerations in planning a high school program. Science Research Achievement Test scores will also be discussed. Time will be allotted for questions and answers. The meeting is not meant to take the place of individual conferences, school officials said. Appointments can be set up during the day or on any Monday evening.

The Doctor Says

If a recital of unpleasant facts causes you to shiver, your heart, the skin, catch-flashes, better slip this column. But if you are an intelligent teen-ager or a parent or teacher of teen-agers, you might devote a few minutes to the following shocking statistics:
There are, in the United States, approximately 1,200,000 patients with syphilis in various stages, all in need of treatment.
Each year, approximately 1,000,000 fresh gonorrheal infections are known to occur. Undoubtedly, many more are unreported.
The rate of infection is rising rapidly in middle and upper income brackets. And this rising incidence is more apparent in teenagers and, especially, girls. Incidentally, what is being reported in America is also being reported in England, continental Europe, Asia and in the U.S.S.R.
Nearly one out of every five cases of infectious syphilis (primary and secondary stages) occur in patients younger than 10 years of age. In general, the infections occur at an earlier age in girls. And finally, combine this "chamber of horrors" at the moment, there were more girls infected with both gonorrhea and syphilis at age 15 than at any other age group.

What makes these revelations more shocking is the fact that we have in our possession simple and safe drugs that can both prevent and cure these venereal diseases. Now I am not competent to discuss any but the medical aspects of this alarming problem. Nor can I enter into a discussion of the problem as a whole. But I would like to make the following special suggestions to parents and teachers of teen-agers, and especially to those responsible for the health and welfare of 18-year-old girls whose incidence of infection is highest at the age of graduation from high school.

By means of lectures with lantern slide demonstrations inform all high school students of the risks of venereal diseases. And include in this course of instruction facts about biological mechanisms which indicate how the disease may be spread by kissing or by use of common eating and drinking utensils.

Warn these youngsters that much of the "red-hot dope" they will see another about venereal prophylaxis and contraception is just not true. They cannot rely on prophylactic pills, douches, and sulfu pills or bootlegged devices to keep them "out of trouble."
Emphasize to them that the risks they run far exceed the fleeting pleasures they may obtain. Particularly emphasize to girls that the road to the altar is not through promiscuity. Indeed, it is rather the contrary.

And stress the fact that the risks they run are at the expense of persons other than themselves. Members of the household, their future spouses, their children. And, in the case of infectious syphilis, contacts other than those made during intercourse. For if the infection were to be in the mouth, the disease may be spread by kissing or by use of common eating and drinking utensils.



