He said the students had had a long day and he had already admitted his resignation in connection with his plans to seek the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate in Connecticut.

"I told them the Democratic nomination in Connecticut is July 14, and that I have a big job to do here and certainly don't expect to leave until July 14," Sviridoff told a reporter. "I told them I may be around here even a little while longer than that."

The secretary met with some 40 students of Williams and Mount Holyoke Colleges, and there were reports he told them he was leaving his cabinet post on July 14.

Anti-Litter Campaign
HARTFORD (AP)—The State Highway Department launched today what Commissioner Howard S. Ives described as a stepped-up anti-litter campaign.

The drive was requested by Gov. John N. Dempsey after Ives reported to him on the seriousness of the situation.

Ives said that even though the state is accepted as a leader in the field of the elimination of litter—and the Highway Department has been cited by Garden Clubs of Connecticut and various national organizations for its efforts—the litter menace grows more serious.

The commissioner also revised the figures on the cost to the taxpayers of removing litter from the Connecticut highways from \$300,000 a year to some \$400,000.

He said the highways "are still in a very unattractive condition and are made dangerous because of this careless observance of our litter laws."

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—A leader in the newspaper advertising field in New England died today.

Donald F. Leonard, 61, of 193 Shovelton Village Dr., died at the advertising manager for the Post Publishing Company 21 years and a past president of the New England Newspaper Advertising Executive Association, according to St. Vincent's Hospital after an illness of several months.

Mr. Leonard was past president of the Advertising Club of Bridgeport and was a member of the American Newspaper Publishers Association and the Connecticut Daily Newspaper Association. He was named to the Governor's Education Advisory Council in 1956 and served as state chairman of the Republican Minute Men in 1964.

Funeral arrangements will be announced.

Mr. Leonard is survived by his wife, Frances, two sons, Donald M. and Neil J. Leonard, of Fairfield, and a daughter, Mrs. Walter Hagen Jr., of Geneva, N. Y.

School Fire Explained
EAST HARTFORD (AP)—Fire officials say a jammed radiator duct caused the \$600,000 fire that destroyed the north wing of East Hartford High School early today.

The investigators said yesterday the fire started in the woodworking shop. It spread upward and through the roof of the two-story brick venter building.

When the radiator duct became jammed, the fire officials said, the motion of an exhaust fan continued working and overhauled.

The last ignited apartment and other debris in the duct, they said.

The local school board met in an emergency session last night and decided to use an old school building as a temporary replacement for the wrecked classroom. The use of the building is subject to the approval of the state fire marshal.

The board also plans to hire a contractor to make emergency repairs on the damaged building.

The fire was discovered about 3 a.m. There was no one in the building.

New Job for Sviridoff
HARTFORD (AP)—Mitchell Sviridoff, who held a top labor post in Connecticut until he went to work recently for the U.S. State Department, is changing jobs again.

At a testimonial dinner last night, it was announced Sviridoff will become a special consultant to the Ford Foundation in the field of urban affairs.

Sviridoff gave up the presidency of the Connecticut State Labor Council last fall to go to Washington as a special assistant to the chief of the Latin American foreign aid branch of the Agency for International Development.

When he switches to the new position with the Ford Foundation, he will continue to perform occa-

asional assignments for the Agency for International Development as a special consultant.

One of his first projects for the Ford Foundation will be a tour of American cities to gather urban renewal information. This will be followed in May by a trip around the world.

He will advise the operations systems research and development division in the VA's Department of Medicine and Surgery at Washington, D.C.

The copyright story in the Daily News said: "The prospect of divorce proved too much for the young singer."

The Daily News said Fisher is in Grace Square Hospital.

The hospital, which has a general division and a psychiatric division, said it has no patient registered as Eddie Fisher.

The News said that in Rome, where Miss Taylor is filming "Cleopatra," her husband, Rudy Frings, told a News reporter that Eddie was in the hospital for a rest and a general checkup.

The story quoted Frings as saying: "There's no need, because she's working on the movie set every day."

Blackstone said Frings telephoned from Rome to check on the report that Fisher was in the care of a psychiatrist.

"I explained that it wasn't so," Blackstone said. "He's in the care of a medical doctor."

Fisher, 33, who arrived in New York from Rome on March 21, appeared on television last Sunday night when he appeared on television here CBS-TV "What's My Line?"

Miss Taylor, 30, recently was linked romantically with Richard Burton, her male lead in "Cleopatra." The Fishers and Burton, who is married, have denied the reports.

The Daily News story, by Robert McCarthy and Sidney Kline, said Fisher was attended Wednesday by two psychiatrists and two nurses and described him as "pale, his eyes glazed, his bushy hair ruffled, in need of a shave. He did not respond to questions by a News reporter."

The institution in which he is confined has guards at all entrances and exit doors," the story said. "Attendants are on duty on all floors, and visitors are not permitted into the locked rooms, leading to the patients' rooms. They are permitted to speak with patients in a day room under the eyes and in the presence of attendants."

Fisher himself said the Daily News "tripped apart the curtain of concealment" and called an associate in Rome, Robert Abrams, on Sunday to come immediately to New York.

"Abrams disclosed that Eddie, haggard, red-eyed and in deep distress, told him that his marriage with Liz was over and that there would be a divorce," the News said.

Fisher and Miss Taylor were married May 12, 1956, in Las Vegas, after he and actress Debbie Reynolds were divorced. Miss Taylor, the widow of Broadway producer Mike Todd, previously was divorced from hotel heir Nicky Hilton and actor Michael Wilding.

Fisher and Miss Taylor recently adopted an orphaned Italian baby. Fisher has a son and daughter by Miss Reynolds. Miss Taylor has two sons by Wilding and a daughter by Todd.

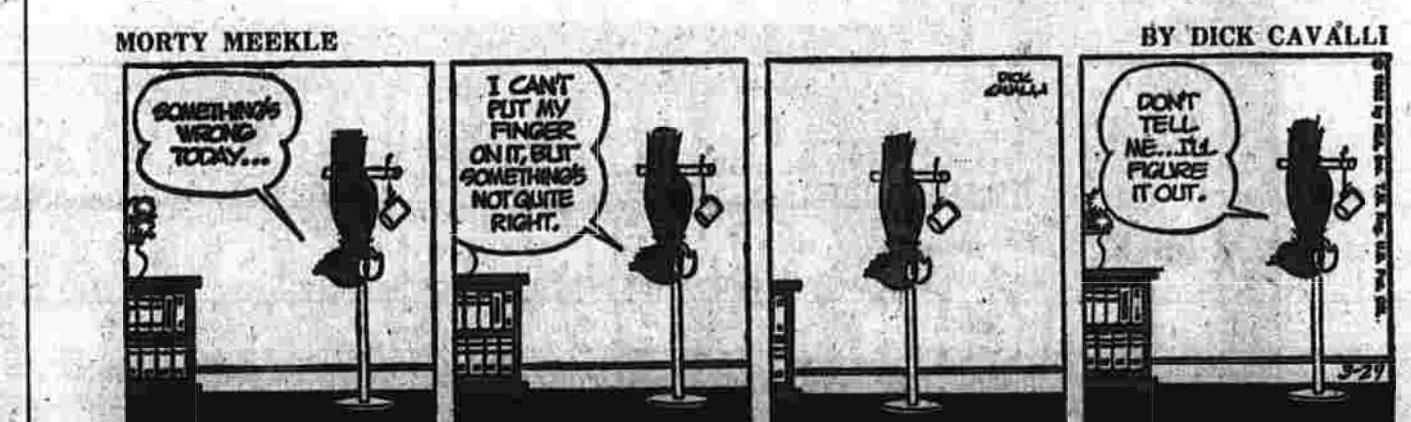

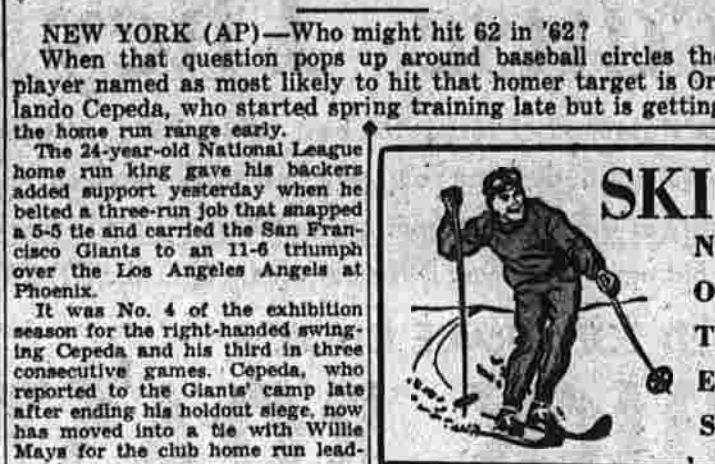

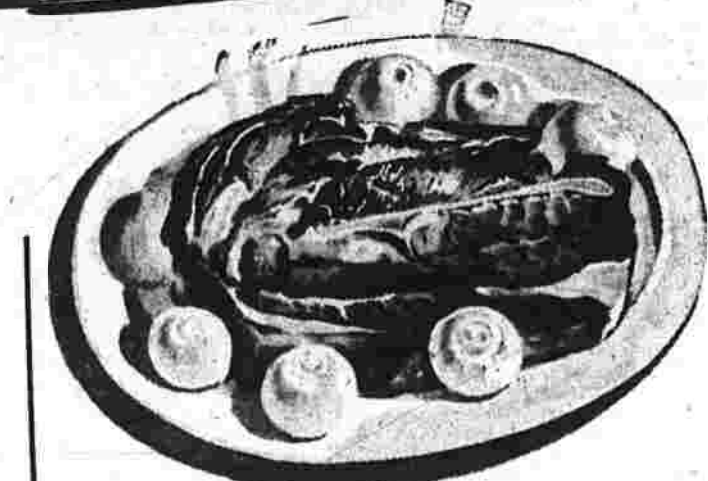
