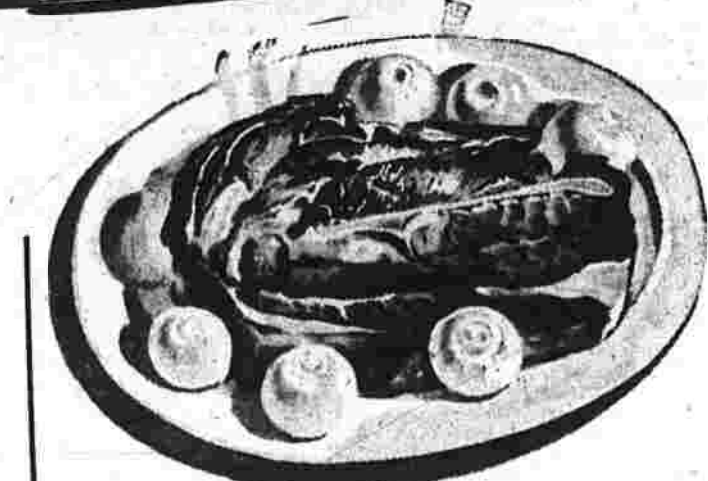

NEW YORK (AP)—Homesickness for the past can bring many a nostalgic cry.

But don't you think we've all got on something of an nostalgic kick in remembering the so-called "Roaring 20s" with such nostalgic affection?

The decade between 1920 and 1929 certainly had its memorable moments. But was it really as wild and frolicsome as it has been pictured recently in books, movies, and on the television screen?

Every man under 20 was in college. He wore a coonskin coat, wore a hip flask in one hand and a college banner in the other. There were only two colleges there—Yale and Princeton.

Every girl went to college, too. She was called a flapper, rode her horse below her knees, and did all her courting in a rumble seat.

The few who got married were wed by a judge with Mayor Jimmy Walker acting as best man. Everybody else joined what was known as "free love" or "trial marriages."

Bobby Jones sank a 90-foot putt every morning. Babe Ruth knocked a home run every afternoon. Jack Dempsey knocked out a handsome but underweight foreigner named Cassius every evening. Ernie Saturday Red Grange laid aside his tomahawk and scored two touchdowns to win the game in the last minute of play.

In Manhattan everyone lived in Greenwich Village. Nobody bothered to make a reservation or a bon mot except while having lunch at the round table at the Algonquin.

Anyone else who's got it?

Who ever took a bath? How could you? The bathtub was always full of gin.

Nobody ever went to a museum.

Religion
In The News

NEW YORK (AP) — "Are the Protestant churches today more concerned with the healthy, the wealthy and the successful than with the sick, the poor and the needy?"
A University of Michigan sociologist asked himself this question after a 10-year study of the religious and social attitudes of Americans.
His research seems to indicate, he says, that the answer is yes. Dr. Gerhard Lenski Jr., son of a Lutheran clergyman and grandson of a theology professor, focused on members of his own church in a two-part article which appears this week and next in "The Lutheran," a journal of the United Lutheran Church in America.
Lenski last year wrote a book titled "The Religious Factor," in which he analyzed the extent to which religion influences Protestants, Catholics and Jews in nearly every area from political affiliation to installment buying. He based his conclusions on a scientifically selected group in the Detroit area which, he said, represented a true cross section of the nation.
The author cautioned in a preface to the book that his findings likely would be "disturbing to men of every faith."

The same could be said of his current article which projects Lutheranism against the background of the larger work he discovered. For example, that:
Nearly one-third of the Lutherans questioned seldom, if ever, attend church; and another 15 per cent attend only once a month. Forty per cent never read the Bible and only 10 per cent read it frequently or every day.
Churchgoing Lutherans were as unfamiliar with Biblical characters as those who stay home. Forty per cent of both categories couldn't identify Peter. "A sad commentary," said Lenski, "on either the content or techniques of present-day Lutheran teaching."

But Lenski said the churchgoing habits of Lutherans compared favorably with other Protestant denominations. Lutherans, he said, "are less likely to attend every Sunday but they also are less likely never to attend at all."
He also said that Protestant churches in general, including the Lutheran church, "have a much stronger appeal to the more prosperous and successful members of the community than to members of the working class."

This was reflected in his finding that regular churchgoers are strongly Republican and those who stay at home tend to be Democrats. This contrasts with the Catholic pattern where crises, at least those related to sickness and death, are linked with increased church attendance.
There were, however, some bright spots for Lutherans in Lenski's report.
Lutheran men, for example, attend church more regularly than most Protestant men, convert to Lutheranism are nearly twice as numerous as those who reported abandoning the Lutheran church for some other, and Lutherans appear to be a good deal more tolerant than others regarding race.

Freeze the Tax Rate

As the town's business has grown larger and more extensive, it has also grown more complicated and mysterious. Add to this the fact that Manchester has every reason to feel sure of the competence and the fine intentions of its officials, both elective and appointive, and you have a situation in which the annual budget making, which is also inevitably the annual setting of the tax rate, becomes a sort of routine process. The normal behavior for the taxpayer is to react, sometimes with sullen silence, sometimes with excited howls, to the grand totals which appear in prospect.

The development which might evoke his cheers—a reduction in something, a recommendation not to spend for something—never seems to come. This would seem to us to be a year for taxpayers to do some howling. Otherwise, we are afraid, our fine, competent, well-intentioned town officials will go ahead and appropriate all the money that really ought to be spent, for all the expenses that really cannot be cut, for all the projects that really cannot be delayed.

This is what town fathers normally do if they think the taxpayer is being reasonable and realistic and willing to face up to the necessary burdens of being the community they are. But when the town fathers do this, budgeting all the money that really ought to be budgeted, they can, as prospective calculations for the next fiscal year indicate, run beyond the capacity of taxpayers as individuals and that of the community as a whole.

It is up to the taxpayers, therefore, to prove that they are not reasonable and compliant and content. This is a year for the kind of howling which proves that taxpayers are unreasonable, unreasoning people, who, just because they can't afford them, refuse to look at the realities of the town's needs.

If the town fathers think we are unreasonable enough, they may decide not to spend the money they really should spend. They may decide to try to get along with less than the various departments and projects really need. They may decide that some projects may have to be postponed, for a year, or perhaps much longer. If the taxpayers make enough noise, they may even persuade the town fathers that these are drastic years for the town's taxpayers, and demand drastic sacrifices at the Municipal Building.

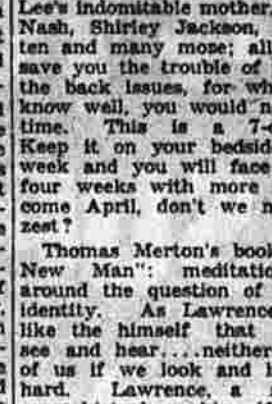

...nedy made selections on the basis of ability, not politics. The capital is watching to see how the forthcoming appointment affects the so-called conservative liberal division of the Supreme Court. Individual members at times shift from one bloc to another. But so far as any such division can be figured out in loose designations, Whitaker tended to vote with the more conservative bloc—often composed also of Justice Frankfurter, Tom C. Clark, John M. Harlan and Potter Stewart.

Generally identified in most cases with the more liberal bloc are four of the nine justices—Chief Justice Earl Warren, William O. Douglas, Hugo L. Black and William J. Brennan Jr.

Whitaker's object in the school segregation case was to get the case out of the Supreme Court as quickly as possible. He was reported to have told friends he does not expect to get a Supreme Court appointment at this time. Anyway, he is an all but declared candidate for the Democratic nomination from Connecticut, and might find it difficult to change peace now.

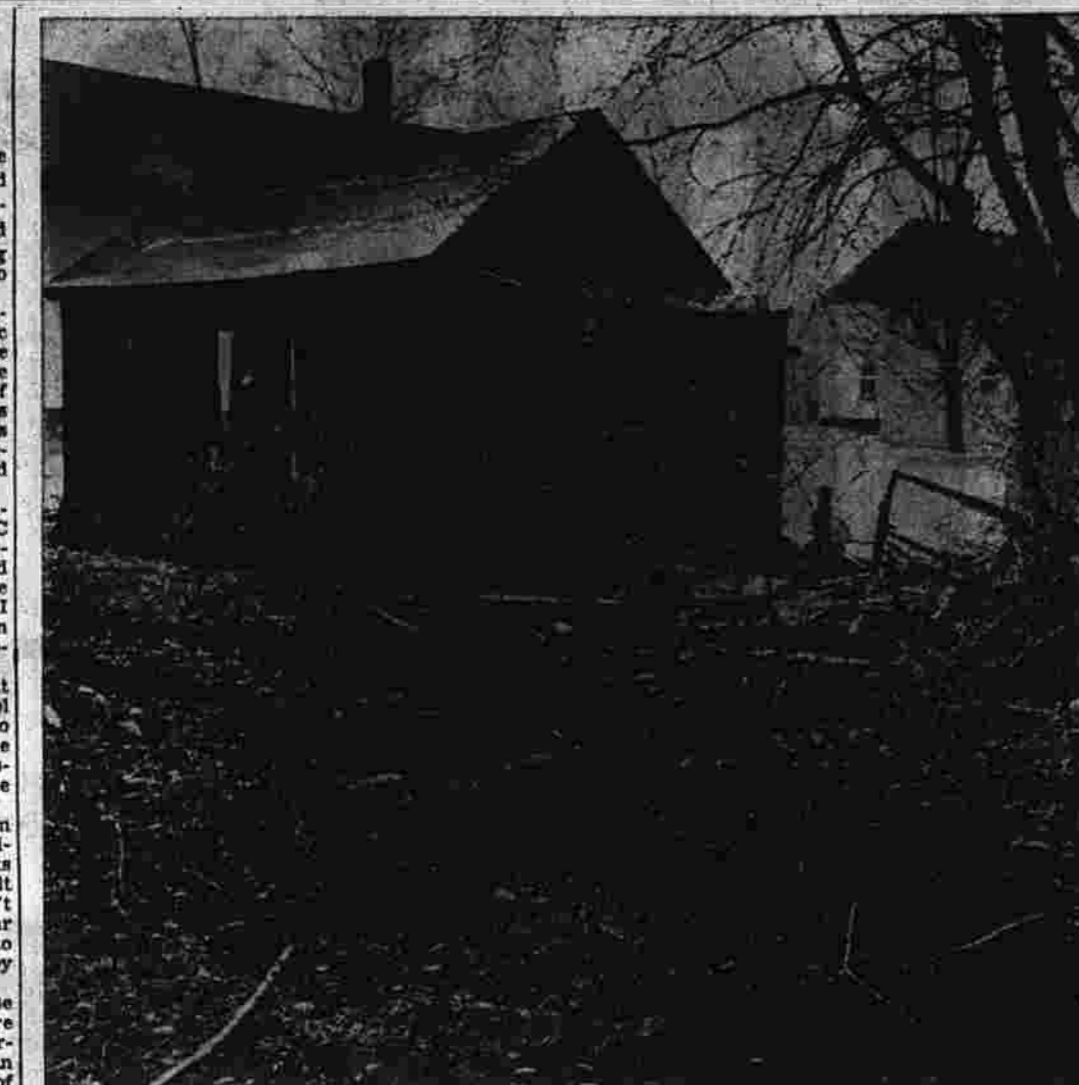

Andover Democrats Raise Question Of Officials' Neglect of Duty

At its meeting Wednesday the Andover Democratic Town Committee instructed Chairman Edward Schwabe to consult legal counsel for advice on two matters which the committee feels amount to neglect of duty on the part of two town officers.

One matter concerns the failure of First Selectman F. C. Wright to honor a petition to call a special town meeting within the requisite time. On Oct. 19, 1961, Wright was presented with a petition signed by some 25 voters and taxpayers of the town, the Democrats said.

The petition requested a special town meeting to determine whether the town meeting should be held to extend and renew dumping privileges at the Andover disposal area to other municipalities. State statutes require a town meeting be called within 21 days after a petition is filed. Wright has called no such meeting to date, they said.

In the meantime, a renewal contract has been executed extending Bolton residents dumping rights in Andover until the end of the year. The town committee said it questions the good faith of such action, in view of the fact that the petition specifically had reference to the renewal of dumping contracts.

The other matter on which the committee will seek legal advice involves the appointment of Feb.

will present its proposed budget for the coming fiscal year. Finance Board Chairman John Treman announced March 21 that the board had voted not to call such a hearing.

The committee also voted to support the hiring of a professional appraisal company to perform the mandatory reassessment, which is scheduled for 1962, to support the adoption of a suitable town ordinance to match the proper use and maintenance of the disposal area.

At its meeting Wednesday the town committee advised that Town Clerk Eileen L. Covell had not, as of March 22, notified the Secretary of the State of any vacancy in the position of collector in Andover, although the statute requires him to do so within five days after a vacancy occurs, they said.

Since the records of the Secretary of the State indicate that Helen Parks is tax collector in Andover, the town committee believes that the apparent lapse on the part of the town clerk may cast some question on the validity of the selection of an appointment of Mrs. Peterson.

Covell, reached this morning, was unaware of the Democratic town committee action. He said he did not care to comment at this time.

Cheney Library to Celebrate Library Week by Reopening

National Library Week, April 14 to 21, will probably be a bigger showpiece in Manchester than ever before.

If plans go as scheduled, late in the week in which the American Library Association spotlights the work of the nation's libraries, the Cheney Library will reopen with the 330,000 volume collection of the town.

Miss Anna French, head librarian at Mary Cheney Library, said today that while she is certain the library won't reopen on April 9, she is "hoping" it will end its 24-month shutdown sometime during National Library Week.

The closing, which began Jan. 16, has been extended for the originally expected three to four weeks because of innumerable delays. A decision early this month to return to the manufacturer equipment which library officials thought was poorly finished resulted in a three-week delay.

However, Miss French said today that "most of the furniture is back with a very beautiful finish." She said the installation of electrical fixtures for a library card charging machine is being held until part of a charging desk arrives. Other work remaining on the addition involves the moving from the basement of reference, children's and art books to their new shelves, she said.

The new \$111,000 construction Co. has been continuing the moving from the basement to the new addition, designed by Alfred Reinhardt, Manchester architect.

Miss French said a new list of rules for library use will be announced as soon as the library opens.

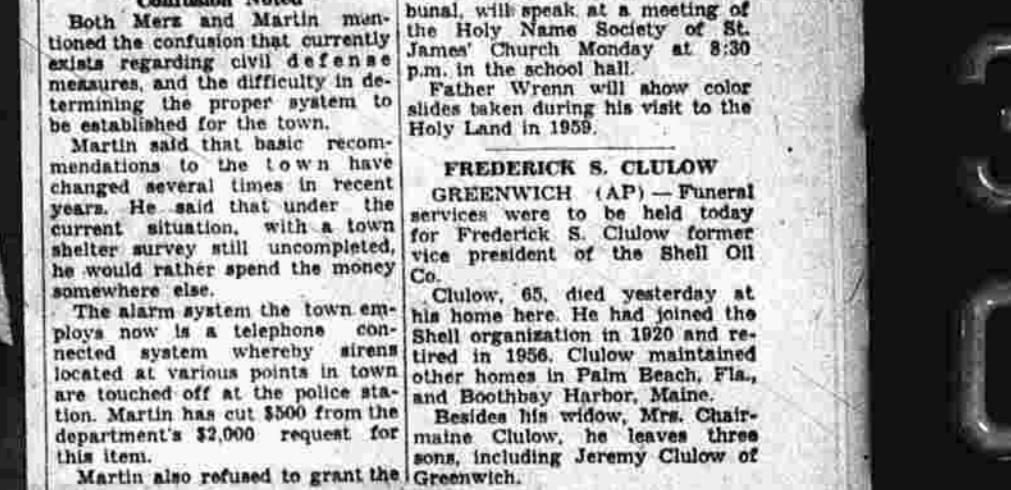

The Portsmouth project was listed yesterday among 26 new construction funds totaling \$178.4 million after June 30, 1962. Included was a border patrol sector headquarters at Swanton, Vt., estimated to cost \$368,500.

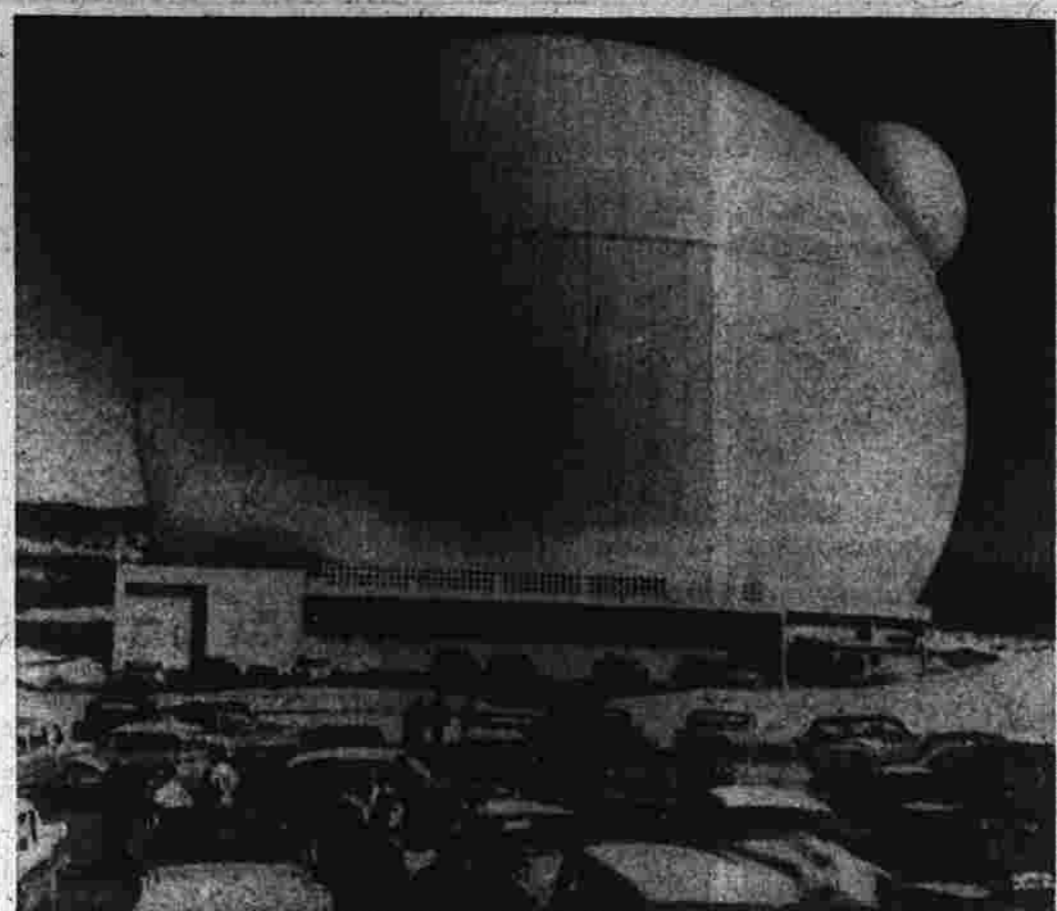

Eyes on Space, Feet in Mud Cape Canaveral of the North

ANDOVER, Maine (AP)—With eyes on space and feet in the mud of a New England spring, this tiny village claims to be the Cape Canaveral of the north.

Upward of 1,500 visitors each Sunday have been flocking to see the Bell Telephone Laboratories satellite communication station now nearing completion. Folks are just curious to see what is under the great white dome that dominates the countryside for miles around.

The big bubble, high as a 16-story building, is considered the biggest inflated structure of its type in the world. It houses a 300-ton "ear" designed to pick up faint signals from orbiting satellites. Man's first big step toward worldwide satellite communication will begin when an active "planet" moonlet is launched from Cape Canaveral, probably in late May.

Bell Telephone is paying for the launching. The tab will be \$3,000,000 per shot, success or failure. Powered by solar batteries, the satellite is designed to pick up a short wave message from Andover, amplify the faint signal several billion times and send it back to Earth again. In the first tests, the

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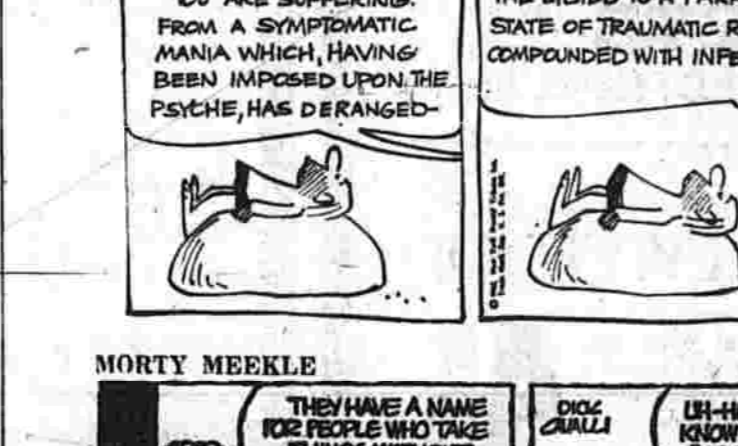
