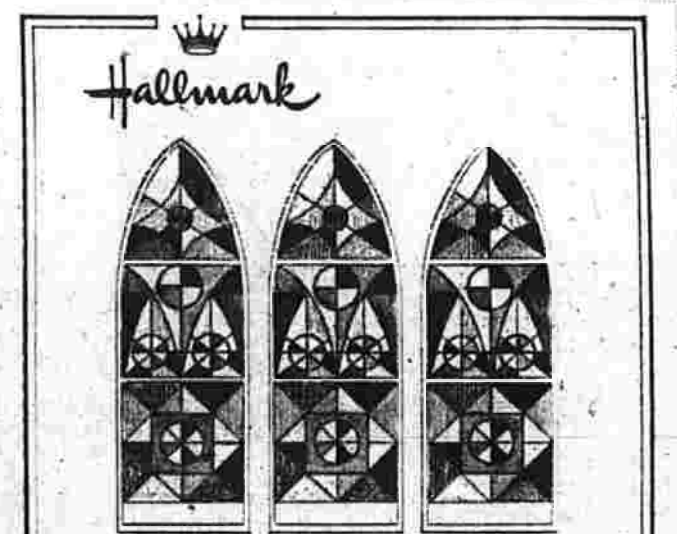

conference, he not only exhibited the maudlin depths of the demagoguery when he compared the price rise of the steel companies to the death of American soldiers in South Viet Nam. He went on to beseech the steel industry to pledge the whole resources of the government to a vendetta fight to make the steel industry regret and retract, or at least matter, for its policy.

So one fully begs another, and then we get at least one, one and other and we have, full-blown, a domestic war which could dwarf anything we think we may be waging against the communists.

We believe in peace. We believe that coexistence is not an option, but a necessity, between industry and labor and government. We believe it must be achieved, and can be achieved, only through mutual respect and tolerance for all by all, not through mastery for anybody. We believe real statehood and leadership avoid seeking or looking for itself into this kind of showdown. We believe the conduct on both sides on the way into this showdown, has been deplorable, even though we also think we can understand how emotions did get charged up to the point where they flared into such conduct.

There should be a truce, before, not after, this war has been fought out. There is a real question of bigness at stake. It is the question of who is big enough to make the first gesture, now, toward a mutual retreat from a ghastly folly.

Closing The Seas
 We and Russia and Britain never seem to concern ourselves very seriously with the ethical or legal problem which might be involved in our preempting of various portions of the world map for our own particular nuclear age purposes. Russia is lucky enough to have enough territory of her own for her last explosion purpose, and so far, has needed to preempt the open seas only for some long range missile tests out in the Pacific.

Britain and the United States, however, are invariably forced to preempt a certain area of the world's free seas in order to create a zone for nuclear testing. Nervous nations like Japan, which for some strange reason don't like atomic bombs, protest, regularly, that such action on our part violates the freedom of the seas, and is not legal, but we never let this bother us. No one, that we know, has ever tried to take us into any world court on the issue. We make our own law, when we have to, and nobody really dares challenge it. This is the way it works, for the giants, like the United States, Britain, and Russia. We, the upstart nation, like Cyprus, or Panama, or Israel, should suddenly start telling us to keep our ships and planes away from a certain few thousand square miles of ocean somewhere until further notice—that might provide an interesting exercise for the imagination.

In such a case, we might discover international law. We might discover that no small nation had the right to create such a potential nuclear nuisance for everybody else. Just big nations.

Good Gossip, Bad Law
 All of us have feelings in varying degrees, about whether or not people who take the town's payroll dollar should be residents of the town itself. And most of us would certainly feel, as an off-hand, general conviction, that it would be appropriate to have our own employees and town officials make their own homes in Manchester.

But whatever we may feel, let us hope we do not become foolish enough to try to make a law about it.

There was a time, in the history of the normal town or city, when getting on a public payroll required not only a local residence, but also a local enrollment in the right political party. These two qualifications were sometimes quite enough. What most towns and cities try to hire, now, is not residence or political loyalty, but ability. They do not always get it. There is no guarantee that somebody hired out of town as an expert will prove a good public servant, just as there has never been any guarantee that somebody hired at the behest of a local political machine will not turn out to be a mediocre or worse. Both things can and do happen, and have happened.

There is no best and fast rule about individuals, either. Some like to live in a certain kind of neighborhood, others in another. And some would carry a sense of responsibility in their public job home with them even if they lived outside the town's borders, while others would never give more than a certain number of hours per week.

As for officials of policy-making position, we should say that it would normally be natural for such to want to feel in every conceivable way part and parcel of the community whose destinies they help guide. And if they did not feel that way that would, in most cases,

Both Sides To Folly

Bad tactics, bad policy, bad blood are all now mixed in the steel price situation, and the situation has consequently resolved itself into the ludicrous and intolerable prospect of a battle to the death between a giant American industry and the President of this country. Each side has delivered mortal insult and injury to the other; each side has now committed itself too recklessly for the good of itself or the nation; each side has committed a sin not skilfully forgiven by the other, or by the nation.

The sin of the steel industry consisted in following a course of action which enticed unions into a signing of a non-wage increase contract, which invited congratulations from government and public on the statehood and restraint of that new contract, and which then, once the contracts with the unions were signed and sealed, announced the increase in the price of steel which, if it had been made a factor during the negotiations, would have altered the union's bargaining and the government's pleasure.

Why did the steel industry commit this "double-cross"? The argument made for it will follow dollars and cents lines, and contend that the price increase was needed without reference to the terms of the new contract. But the real motivation for the steel industry, one must judge, was its feeling that if it did not assert, now, its right to fix its own prices, it might never again own itself.

There had been, implicit in the government's supervision of the bargaining for the new contract, in the government's pleasure in the result, in the government's promotion of the idea that government itself, assisted, it was true, by statehood on the part of both management and labor, had managed to hold the line and had been implicit in all this—the idea that the government, representing its version of the national interest, was acquiring the right to set the price of steel. This implicit action set steel executives to wondering who owned their companies, themselves and the stockholders they represented, or the government. When they asked themselves this question, they felt themselves driven to some spectacular way of asserting their own rights of ownership and management; they felt themselves entitled to double-cross the unions and the President in order to make their point.

If they themselves could perhaps recognize and sense that this would be a nasty piece of action, they could still find the emotional willingness to commit it. All they needed to do to reach that emotional state was to dwell, in their own minds, on the way government had pushed its own long, meddling nose into their negotiations. Sooner or later, they must have felt some symbolic blow had to be struck. Why not make it really wicked and ugly and tough?

The blow, as it was delivered, had all the startling effects its shapers might have imagined. It caught President Kennedy still preening himself on the success of his domestic economic leadership. It nobly snatched a victory out of his record and transformed it not only into a defeat in substance, but into a raw personal insult. The President himself had congratulated the steel companies on negotiating a new contract which would not involve a price increase; they had let him prate on while they had their price increase announcements headed for the mimeograph machines.

This was enough to make the President as reckless and desperate as his response to the steel companies had been in their own desperate declaration of independence and freedom of private ownership. In his public response, at his press

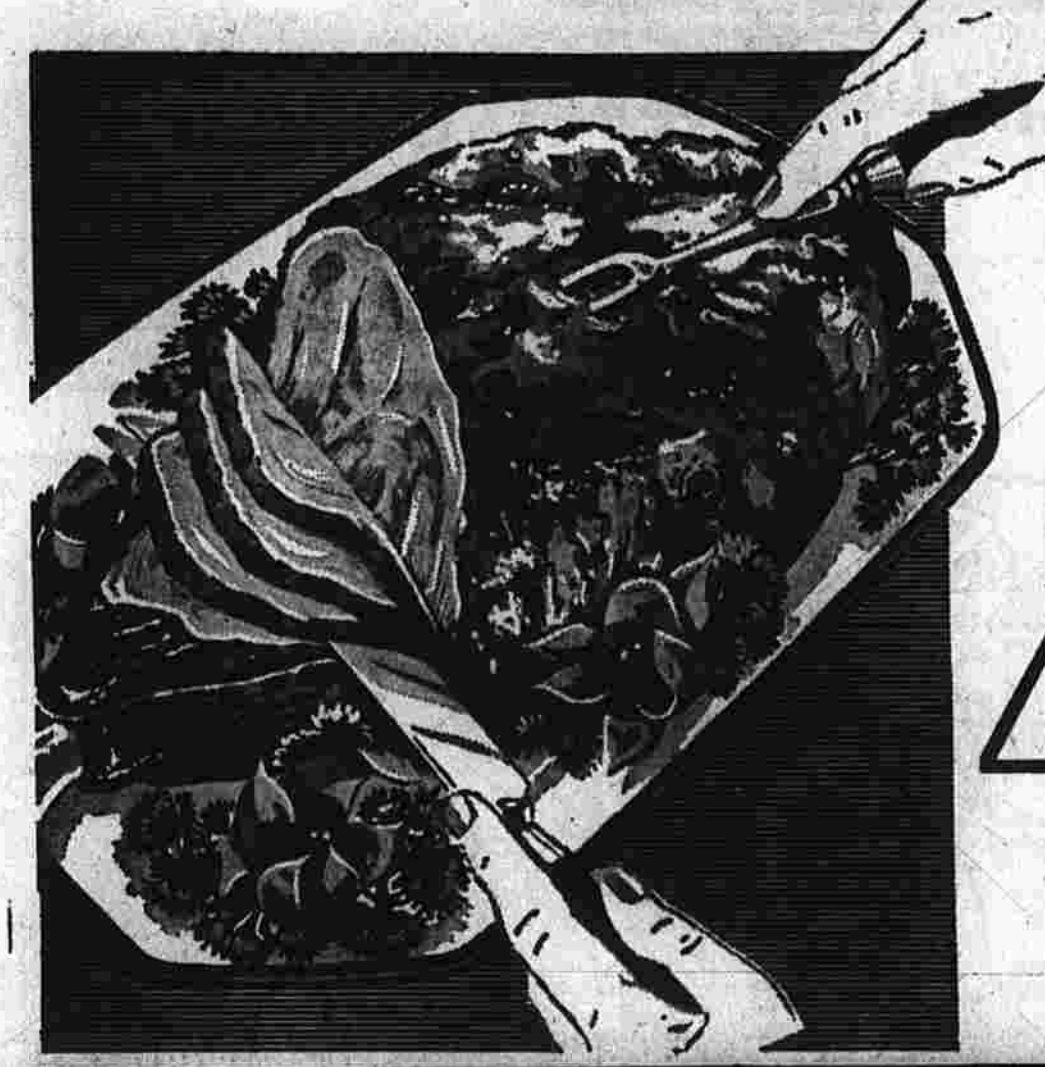

Religion In the News

The word excommunication has an ominous ring. To some, it may conjure up pictures of purple-robed ecclesiastics pointing accusing fingers at a cowering infidel and banishing him to eternal perdition—a sort of verbal stoning of a public sinner, in cinematic scope.

Because the word is back in the news, in connection with the New Orleans dispute over integration of Catholic schools, it's worth examining in some detail. The Catholic Church, like any other organization, has certain rules for its members. Should a member deliberately and openly violate a rule, he forfeits some of the benefits of membership—provided he is fully aware of both the rule and the penalty.

That, broadly, is what excommunication is.

It is the most severe form of church censure, used only as a last resort after persuasion has failed.

Acts which carry the penalty are defined in Catholic canon law. They range from forcing a person to become a priest or nun to selling indulgences and marrying before a non-Catholic minister. Key provisions, however, are that the offender knows that what he is about to do would result in excommunication but does it deliberately anyway.

In New Orleans, one of the segregationist leaders disclosed that confidential letter she received from the archbishop said: "We deem it our duty to admonish you that any further attempt by you through word or deed to hinder our orders or provoke our devoted people to disobedience or rebellion against the church will subject you to excommunication."

The archbishop had refused to reveal the contents of the letter, which serves to point out that, as one authority put it, excommunication is medicinal rather than punitive. Its aim is to protect the church and correct the offender; punishment is only a secondary purpose.

Nor is it intended to sever a person from God, only from the church. A person under the usual form of excommunication doesn't even lose membership in the church. He may attend all its services but may not take an active part in some of them, and may not receive any of the sacraments except penance (confession).

A more severe form of excommunication is rarely invoked and it is only for particularly grave crimes such as laying violent hands on the Pope. It usually requires that the person be named publicly, thereafter he may not even enter the church.

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There have been a number of cases of excommunication in the United States, one of them in Louisiana.

In 1960 Bishop Jules B. Jeanmar of Lafayette, La., excommunicated some parishioners who beat up a Catholic teacher during an integration dispute. The bishop said anyone who dares to interfere with the ministry of the priest also would be excommunicated automatically.

The Rev. Leonard J. Feeney, R.C., of Boston was excommunicated several years ago for teaching there was no salvation outside the Catholic Church, and back in 1947 a New York priest, the Rev. Edward McClynn, was excommunicated for denying his archbishop on certain parochial matters.

Publishers Group To Note 75th Year

NEW YORK (AP)—At noon on Feb. 10, 1887, at Powers Hotel in Rochester, N.Y., William H. Brewster of the Detroit Evening News opened a meeting of 40 other daily newspaper publishers and managers with these words: "We have a little plan to suggest."

That was the beginning of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, the influential daily newspaper trade association that holds its 75th anniversary convention here April 23-28.

485 Members

From its modest start, the ANPA has grown until today it has more than 485 daily newspaper members in the United States and Canada. Its membership represents more than 50 per cent of the total U.S. daily newspaper circulation, and 75 per cent of total Sunday circulation.

The association's by laws say: "The objects of this association are the protection of the members from irresponsible customs; the gathering and disseminating among its members of news of value to them; and the rendering to each other of such other assistance as may be within their power."

Propos of the simile "as up-to-date as today's newspaper" highlight of the convention was a demonstration of how the newspaper business may use the communications satellites in the future.

1,000 Words a Minute

A news story will be transmitted at 1,000 words a minute from a sending station to a full-size model of the communications satellite "Telstar" suspended over the stage. The copy then will be transmitted to a receiving station, all located in the hotel's grand ballroom.

The demonstration will accompany a speech by E. J. McNeely, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co., on "New developments in communication."

Telstar is the experimental communications satellite developed by AT&T. Scheduled to be launched in late spring from Cape Canaveral, it is 3 1/2 inches in diameter and is designed to provide 800 voice channels or the equivalent for worldwide communications.

Also on the program is an address by Edward W. Barrett, dean of the Columbian University Graduate School of Journalism. His subject, "The Next Generation in Journalism."

The ANPA serves as a clearing house of information for answers to publishing problems. It maintains a research department devoted to improving daily newspaper production and guiding manufacturers toward more efficient methods and equipment for producing the daily newspaper of tomorrow.

Stanford Smith is general manager of the association, a position he has held since Aug. 1, 1960. Previously he was secretary-manager of the Georgia Press Association.

It was the need of an organization to look after the business interests of daily newspaper publishers and business becoming more complicated.

Science At Work

Biological sabotage of insects pests, a search for X rays from space, and a question of gravity are topics of science at work.

Sabotage

Screen-worm flies, a costly livestock pest, are being sabotaged by the atomic age.

Radiation is used to sterilize males which then are released. Since these flies mate only once, any female taking up with a sterile male doesn't produce any offspring.

But it's been difficult to distinguish between treated and wild ones, to know how well the sterile ones were being distributed. Now Dr. Robert B. Dixon of the U.S. Department of Agriculture at Kerrville, Tex., proposes a solution. He suggests sterilizing only males which have a distinguishing genetic trait, such as wing spots for example, so they can be followed more easily.

Star X Rays

Next summer, scientists plan to search for soft X rays coming from stars. It will be done with special instruments carried aloft in rockets launched by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The sun is known to emit soft X rays from its superhot corona, and presumably other stars do, also. These X rays don't harm anyone on earth, for they are easily blocked out by the earth's atmosphere. They are far less penetrating than the X rays used medically.

Weakened Gravitation?

Scientists are beginning to question whether gravitation is growing weaker with time.

Most physicists think it is quite constant, but a few disagree. Including Dr. Robert H. Dicke of Princeton University, the universe expands with time, the strength of gravitational interaction may decrease steadily, says Dr. Dicke. The strength of gravitation may be reduced, various experiments with satellites could check this out within the next five years, he adds.

Fine Scales

New superaccurate quartz springs can measure the weight gain of bacteria from what they eat—that is, weight changes as fine as a millionth of a gram.

The cooled springs are made from quartz, or fused sand, by Wolf Goodman and Don Caster, engineers of the Lockheed Missiles & Space Co. They pull fibers from fused quartz, then coil them into springs half the diameter of a human hair, but stronger than steel.

They foresee potential uses including measuring earth tremors, electrostatic charges, electrical pulses and pressures.

When the Bowdoin College Glee Club takes the Rockville High School auditorium stage Saturday, its introductory song will be one written in 1794 for the first glee club organized in London.

It was written by a man named Samuel Webbe. It is called "Glorious Apollo" and has been the introductory number of the Bowdoin singers since 1808. When Webbe wrote it, he gave no instant popularity with his glee club which sang it as an introductory number.

The Bowdoin singers will give their concert at Rockville High at 8:30 p.m. It will be their only concert in Connecticut this year. It is sponsored by the Rockville Rotary Club. Some tickets are still available from members.

The program includes what is called "Moods and Contrasts," will include religious music by the Bowdoin College Chapel Choir, barbershop harmony by the Medisobsequence, classical music, Broadway hits and college tunes.

Century Delayed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The Century high-energy space rocket, already grounded nearly a year by a variety of problems, must wait at least eight more days for its maiden test flight.

The 105-foot rocket, the first utilizing powerful liquid hydrogen as fuel, came within 50 seconds of launching Wednesday. But at that point a low pressure reading was received from a gauge in the liquid oxygen fuel tank in the Atlas first stage.

Officials called off the launching until at least April 20 in order to correct the trouble.

Troops—He has asked Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara to cut \$1 billion from the present \$1 billion annual cost of supporting troops and bases abroad. He said this would help balance the flow of dollars in and out of the country, and would not bear the expense of keeping armed forces overseas must come from a surplus of exports, over imports, and from the sale of surplus property. He said the administration is analyzing the importance of the saving realized by curbing travel of dependents.
Alert—Kennedy said a false alarm that prompted a Strategic Air Command alert last fall had not put the country on the brink of war. It would have taken several hours to get planes on their way, he said, "and we were all ways in control."
Berlin—The return of Gen. Lucius D. Clay from a tour as Kennedy's personal representative in Berlin was not as a newswoman put it, the Berlin crisis now is negotiable. Clay will continue as a consultant. "So his service continues and the problem of Berlin continues."
Viet Nam—He is extremely concerned by the killing of U.S. soldiers in Viet Nam, but the U.S. cannot desert in efforts to keep South Viet Nam out of Communist hands.
Fidel Castro—The Cuban prime minister, Kennedy said, we know the United States cannot negotiate on his offer to ransom prisoners captured in last year's attempted invasion nor can their families raise the demanded millions. The offer, he said, demonstrates why Mr. Castro is increasingly isolated from the company of free men."

Another way to look at the independent field is in terms of affiliation with voluntary and cooperative wholesale grocers. Independents belonging to these groups showed excellent gains in 1961 and emerged with 81% of total independent sales and 49% of total U. S. grocery store sales to make them the dominant factor in U. S. food retailing.
A curious trend in the role of independents and chains in pricing policy was again revealed in 1961 through this survey and others made by Progressive Grocer during the past year. It concerns retail pricing and low-price reputation. In the earlier years of chain store development, their management relied heavily and sometimes almost entirely on low price to create their image and win retail trade. Over the years, however, this image has been steadily eroded as they adopted promotion techniques of a relatively expensive nature that influence retail price levels.
Independents, on the other hand, have not employed these relatively costly promotion techniques to the same degree as the chains and in many areas of the country independents are beginning to claim the low-price reputation and image that some chains have tended to abdicate. Very little is heard among independents today about the "price disadvantage" that presented such a major problem to them only a few years ago.
Independents, especially those supported by strong, efficient wholesale grocers, entered 1962 with considerable confidence and enthusiasm.

Lodge Pleads for Unity In GOP--and NATO

Ex-Gov. John Davis Lodge made a plea for unity—which he distinguished from unanimity—in a speech to 200 Tolland County Republican Associates at Flano's Restaurant last night. "Time and again the Republicans have snatched defeat from the jaws of victory," through factionalism, he said. "The people should get behind the party's candidate. . . . We should minimize our own differences of views to achieve the desired result."

He said unity is needed not only in the Republican party but on the international scene, and went on to say that it is "most urgent that the Spanish government and people should be accepted as full and equal partners in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)."

The former ambassador to Spain said the inclusion of that country in NATO would be "in the best interest of us and our friends and allies" and that Spain's exclusion from NATO is an anachronism.

He contended that we "solidify the Spanish people behind Franco when we exclude Spain from NATO in 1946."

Having earlier said in part that politics is the art of inclusion, not exclusion, he suggested "it is better to unite, rather than reform, understand, rather than judge."

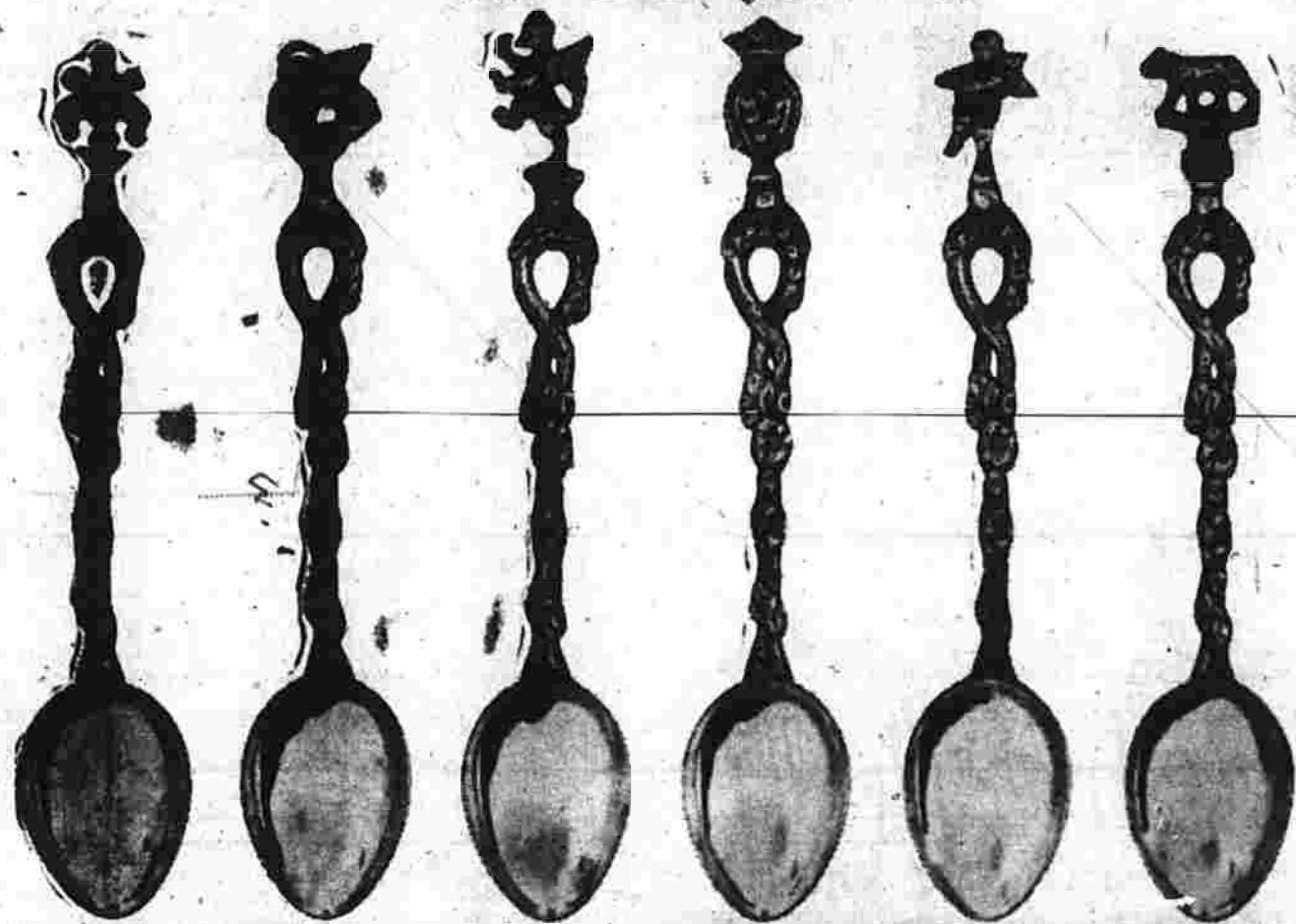
He said "Spain has been most cooperative with us in connection with our military bases—bases of great value to the security of all members of NATO—and that the Spanish people have not hesitated, in spite of all the threats from the Soviet, to assume responsibility in connection with these bases. He said the country needs 'men of courage' in politics. Courage, he said, consists of "doing the right thing even when you lose votes; doing the right thing even when it is unpopular." He commented "It is easy to do the thing that is popular" and quoted from

Mrs. Michael W. French, 31 Goslee Dr., is a "do-it-yourself" girl who believes that homemade gifts are best. With Easter approaching, Mrs. French discovered an old-fashioned recipe for Pressed Sugar Easter Eggs which she is making for her daughter and the children of friends and neighbors.

Press Sugar Easter Eggs
Fragrant mixture: 3 teaspoons of water to every 3 cups granulated sugar. Mix well. Vegetable coloring may be added.

Press damp sugar mixture firmly into both halves of plastic egg molds. Molds can be purchased in a variety store. Turn out on a tray and set dry for three to four hours. With a spoon, carefully scoop out damp sugar from center of egg immediately. Allow to dry. With cake decorator and colored royal icing, pipe fancy borders around cemented seam. Decorate top of egg as desired. Initials, flowers, satin bows, tiny bunnies or jelly beans may be used.

1 egg whites
1/2 box confectioner's sugar
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
Beat egg whites (not stiff). Add sugar and cream of tartar. Beat with electric beater until mixture is the consistency of stiff whipped cream. Keep in bowl, covered with damp cloth, until used.

Mrs. French mentioned that the eggs are decorative but pure enough to be eaten. For special gifts she fills the halves with small candies and jelly beans before cementing the halves together.

Mrs. French was born in Canton, N.Y., and attended the University for Teachers at Buffalo, N.Y., as an art major. She did volunteer work with cerebral palsy children in Buffalo.
