

The Doctor Says

Q — Our 13-year-old son keeps complaining that he can't catch his breath. He's been examined by a doctor and we've been assured there's nothing wrong with his heart or lungs. I've watched him play basketball in the school gym and he is perfectly in his right mind. But when he gets home and just sits around he gasps for breath like a fish out of water. Can something be done to help him?

A — One of the most common causes of this condition is an adolescent's nervous system that's overgrown sooner or later. On a few occasions, I've examined youngsters by fluoroscopy during a attack. I've seen that happen in a passing disturbance of the diaphragm which is a fluttering of the eyelid. In general, as you may know, the rate of respiration is governed by the brain. The act of breathing in (inspiration) is signaled along nerve cables to the diaphragm which is a sheet of muscle that separates chest and belly cavities. Inspiration is begun when the diaphragm contracts. Normally this contraction is uniform, both halves of the diaphragm acting in a 1 to 1 ratio. When, for whatever reason, the "rhythm" is off temporarily, one is perfectly healthy person registers this "catch" — your son speaks of and that you observe.

Q — Can anything be done to keep nails from splitting? I've taken calcium, vitamins and calcium injections but they continue to split. I know it's not of medical importance but it's a awful nuisance when I have threads and other things get run in stockings.

A — There's no doubt of the soothing influence of a pause for a smoke in the day's occupations or aggravations. But it's the pause that refreshes, not the smoke that relieves as it is an excuse for taking a break. Like calling time during a football game. Or taking time to knock the dirt out of spurs and admit the uniform when the bases are full and the count is 3 and 2. 

Federal Funds Sought For North End Study

Indicating that the gross cost of a 29-acre urban renewal project in the North End business area would be between \$1.4 and \$2 million, the Town Redevelopment Agency today authorized its director to apply for \$96,000 in federal funds for a more detailed study of the area.

The new estimate of the project's cost also must show that the town will contribute its share of the project's cost.

If the REHA approves the town's application, survey and planning could start around August, Rybczyk said, adding that the earliest start date for the town could buy properties in the area for development are two years away.

Currently, the town has hired the firm of Raymond & May to help in preparing the application to the REHA. Rybczyk has indicated the redevelopment agency is not obligated to retain the firm for the detailed studies, but that if the REHA approves the town's application, the firm will be used to conduct the detailed studies.

The board of directors approved the application for federal funds for the survey and planning work, and the town will be obligated to contribute its share of the project's cost.

Bids to Ask Two Plans for Hearing Room

Alternates for possible air conditioning and possible structural work will be included in the specifications now being prepared for renovating the Municipal Building hearing room.

This work was indicated today by Building Inspector Thomas Monahan who said he was working on the specifications with a view of advertising bids on the renovating job next week.

Monahan said he was working on two basic plans, one of which would leave the wall of the hearing room where it is, while the other plan would move the present location of the present balcony railing.

The first plan would include installation of overhead structural wall tile, the repair of defective plaster walls, a repainting job, installation of emergency lighting, possible new flooring material and a change of the apron (with a consequent lowering of the ceiling).

In the second plan, the materials called for would be the same as in the first plan, with the added expense of removing the wall and the necessary new flooring material.

Monahan pointed out that the acoustical treatment would take care of noise in the room when the doors and windows are closed. However, these renovations will not handle noise coming from the outside when the windows are open. To eliminate outside noise, the windows must remain closed, and air conditioning must be provided during the summer.

The Navy's share was \$1,081,000,000, a reduction of \$18,330,000. Included was financing for 21 new ships, one of which will be a conventional type attack carrier estimated to cost \$280 million.

Lee Thomas' peg on the fly to catcher Bob Rodgers snuffed Aparicio's Minnesota-belted Kansas City 2-3 in the only other game played. Detroit and Washington were rained out for the second straight day and the other clubs were not scheduled.

The Tigers were to try to get a game in today, opening at home against the New York Yankees, but the Twins already have been moved out of today's scheduled curtain-raiser at home against the Angels. Other home openers have Boston at Baltimore and Washington at Cleveland.

ANGELS-WHITE SOX—While McBride was keeping the White Sox scoreless, Horlen, 24, was equally as effective against the Angels. The right-hander ended up with a five-hitter and five runs, including three homers. Horlen's first home run was a virtually uncatchable after that.


