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Goldwater Leads Opposition U.S. Plan on Dismantling Spurs Congress Dispute

WASHINGTON (AP)—The new executive order on dismantling nuclear weapons is running into opposition from some members of Congress, but others view it as enhancing this country's status in the international community.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., in a statement has described the proposal as a dangerous exercise in futility which could trap the United States in a web of our own making.

But Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., said the treaty proposal is a bold step in the peace process.

Sen. Humphrey, chairman of the Senate Disarmament subcommittee, called it a plan with built-in safeguards that puts up to the Soviet Union the responsibility for accepting or rejecting a nuclear arms race.

"It ought to have a real appeal to the people of the United States," Humphrey told a reporter.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., said the program must conform with the respect of the world and is an indication the United States is treating the initiative as Geneva.

However, Javits said in an interview that the suggestion to accept the U.S. proposal is a good idea but that the question to be asked is "but there is no genuine disarmament without a satisfactory inspection system and such a plan still remains to be worked out."

Rep. Bob Wilson, R-Calif., chairman of the Republican Congressional Disarmament Committee, said in a statement that the proposal would render the United States vulnerable to a fatal Soviet double-cross.

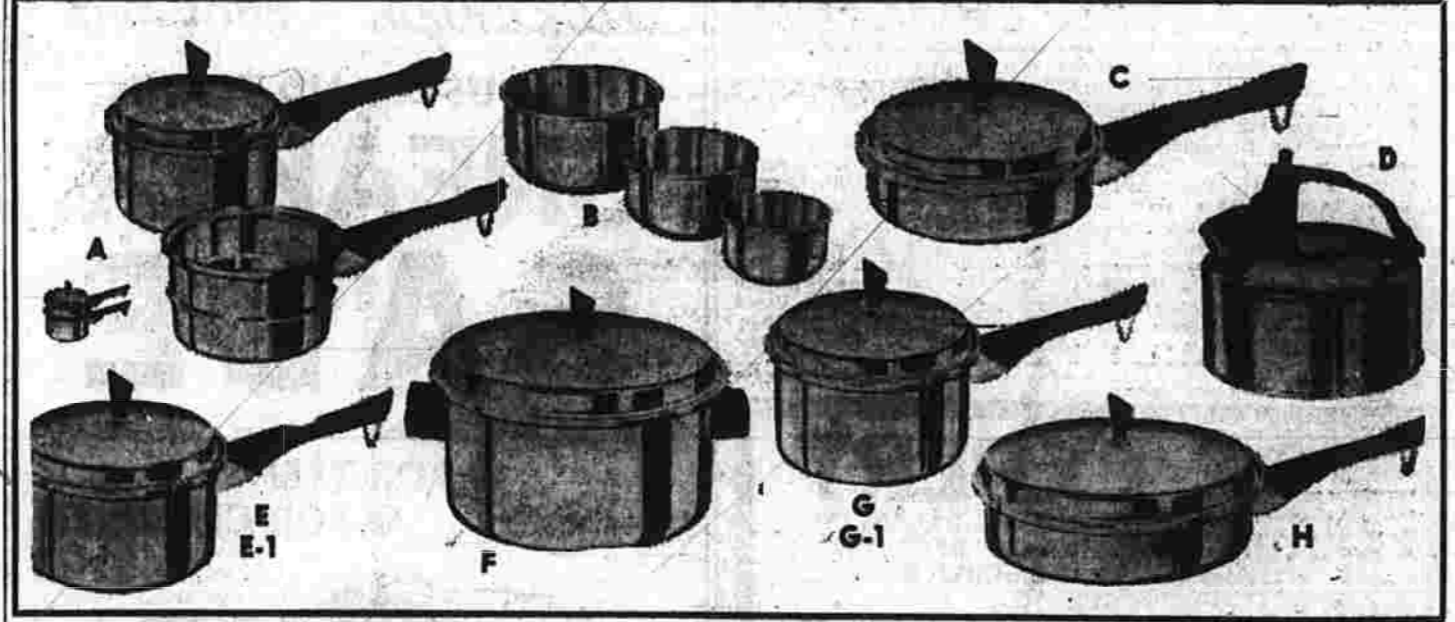

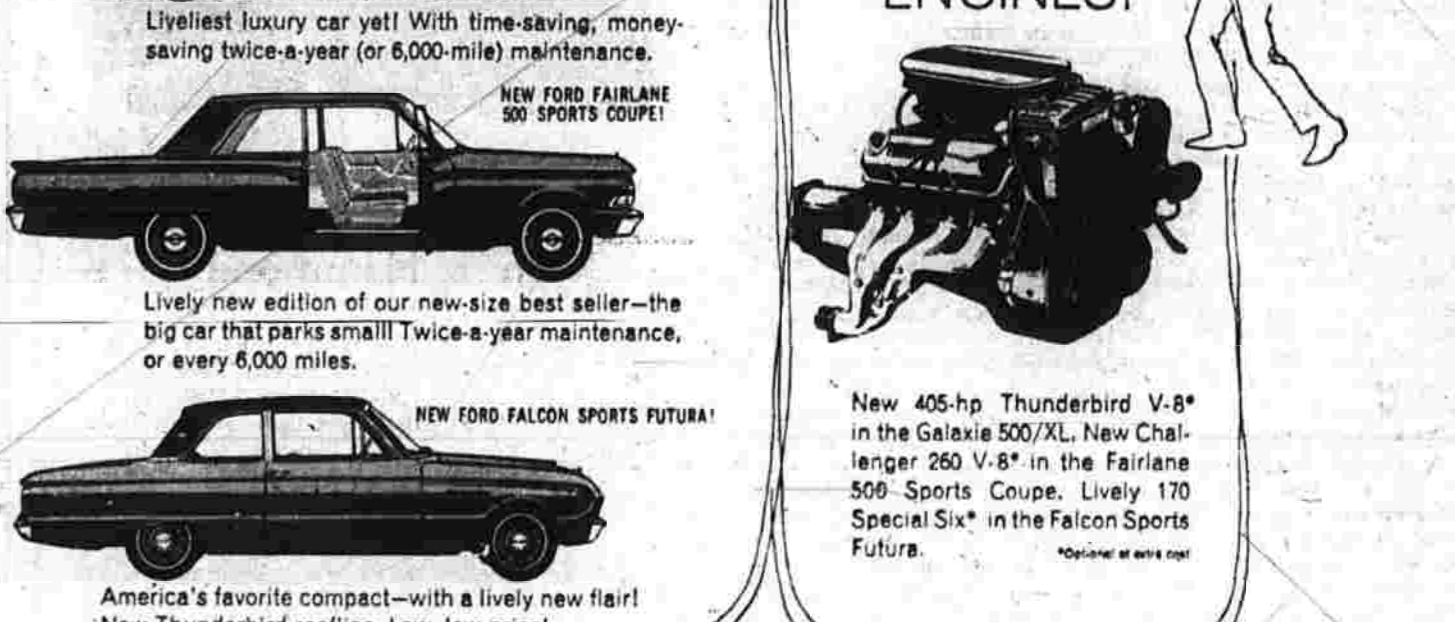

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Why Not Bury Some Labels?
Premier Khrushchev made a speech the other day, and we, for our part, want to do two things about it.

First, we want to rescue him, in advance, from all the eventual distortion Western propaganda interpretation will put into his language.

Second, we want to rescue him, if such a feat is humanly possible, from the pitiful ignorance of realities in which he himself seems to be floundering.

In what seemed to Western reporters a variation of that "we will bury you" remark which they have ever since taken out of its economic context and converted into a physical, violent significance, Khrushchev waxed categorical, the other day, as follows:

"The liberation struggle of the working people of the whole world, the mighty spring waters are washing from our planet the dirt and mold of the old capitalist world."

Later on—it is virtually impossible to keep this sort of thing from happening in a cold war propaganda battle—the remark will become one in which Khrushchev, tired of burying us, has begun to amuse himself by promising to drown us.

Quite obviously, he doesn't mean to drown us any more than he ever meant to bury us. At the worst, he has to have us alive in order to admit the triumph of his life, or he has no triumph.

So when, in a week or two, Western propaganda begins trying to give you nightmares by asking you to imagine that Khrushchev has you by the throat pushing you down for the fourth time, just remember that you are already in process of being buried.

Now that our readers have been rescued from future nightmares, we wish to rescue Khrushchev himself from what has to be either sheer ignorance or a pretense so bold and far-fetched it is getting to be a little bit ridiculous.

It is about time Khrushchev, if he wishes to pose as a leader in mankind's deliberations of system and direction, stopped living by label slogans and began talking about realities. What does he mean by Communism—a system in which workers are chained to a piece work rate of pay while their managers roll in bonuses? What does he mean by capitalism—a system in which the government decides what price management can charge for its product? Where, in reality, is there Communism, and where, in reality, is there capitalism? Are both masquerading as fake imitations of whatever original intentions might have been?

And, for that matter, which is really closer to burying the other, in the sense that the one will sooner or later, adopt the methods of the other in order to survive? Isn't it our eras capitalism which, for the moment, is fairly strong? And isn't his fake Communism which is, under pressure of failure, borrowing more and more tricks from capitalism, including, indeed, certain incentive stimulants capitalism doesn't dare use any more because they are a little hard on the worker?

Some day we must all, not merely Khrushchev alone, abandon our label terms, forget the label slogans, and then start analyzing, in the facts themselves, what kind of life and system do exist in various sections of the world, and which is really having more influence on the other.

Timing, At Least, Is Sharp
Even if one doesn't suspect the science of the latest report from the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, one must marvel at its timing. And this much one can almost guarantee: that if the science of the report had somehow happened to come out differently, the report would never have been the light of day at this particular moment.

The report is to the effect that in the years of experimentation our government scientists have not been able to come up with any "material progress" toward the sure-fire detection of underground nuclear tests.

It is possible to be skeptical of the science involved in this report. Scientists working for our Committee on Atomic Energy or for our Defense Department have never seemed very anxious in reaching scientific conclusions which might support the Russian position on nuclear test ban inspections.

Some very low-yield nuclear underground explosions have been recorded, and distinguished from earthquakes at rather amazing distances. And Prime Minister Macmillan of Britain told his Parliament just the other day that there had recently been a great improvement in the technique for monitoring underground nuclear tests.

Nevertheless, the gist of this report, that underground nuclear tests cannot be monitored accurately, may be scientifically sound.

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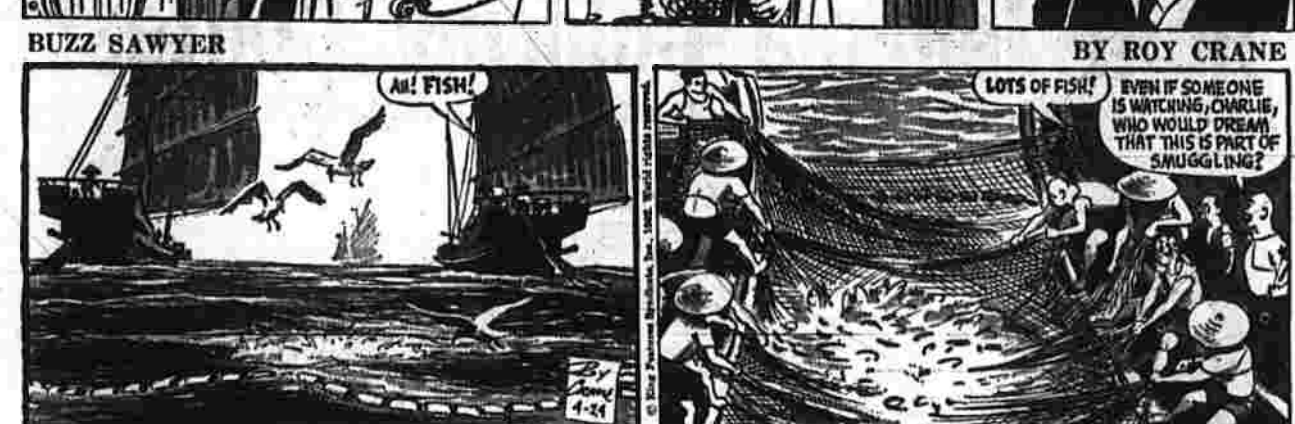
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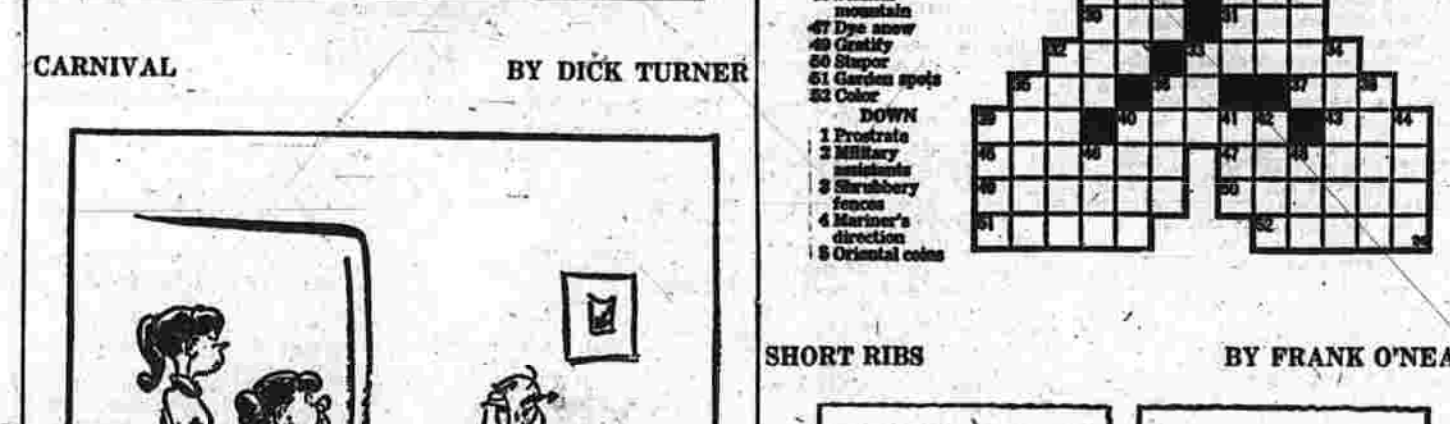
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Mets Look Casey at His Word and Broke Steak

Down Pirates To Get First Loop Victory

NEW YORK (AP)—"Some day soon we're gonna beat someone pretty bad," Casey Stengel said a few hours later, the New York Mets did it and its fulfillment occurred at Pittsburgh Monday night. Manager Stengel surveyed the results of the Mets first nine games in the National League and all losses—except his opinion before sending his cast of hands down to meet the Pirates.

The result was a 9-1 victory for the Mets, their first in the National League and the honor of defeating the Pirates, who had won 10 of their last 11 games. Mets went to Jay Hook, a 25-year-old right-hander who equaled his career victory output for Cincinnati last season by beating the Pirates in a five-inning effort while ending Pittsburgh's victory streak at five.

Stengel kept the Mets from setting a major league mark for consecutive victories by losing the season. He halted the Pirates' streak by establishing an all-time high for consecutive wins at the start of a season.

In other news Monday night, San Francisco defeated Cincinnati 3-0. Billie Pierce's seventh-inning home run was the key to the victory. The Los Angeles Dodgers whipped Milwaukee 5-2. Philadelphia and New York tied, 1-1. Chicago and St. Louis were idle. The American League had a day off.

METS-Pirates—Felix Mantilla opened the big game for the Mets with a home run in the first inning and the New Yorkers never let up until Pittsburgh's Roberto Clement hit into a double play in the second.
