The Soviet Union has supported the Viet Cong in Laos, and a political settlement in Laos, but Moscow Radio warned Thursday night that the Viet Cong could cause much more serious consequences.

The Soviet Radio said the South-east Asia Treaty organization powers are "embarking on a dangerous adventure."

Members of the assembly in Laos there was no report of new activity by the Viet Cong. The fact that Laos forces were out of the Vietnamese government's hands in the northwest Laos last week prompted President Kennedy to order U.S. combat forces to Thailand.

The fun-loving Laotians of Vietnam ignored the Communist threat and began a three-day "Rocket Festival" or fertility feast on annual appeal to the gods for abundant rain during the rainy season, beginning next month.

Chanting bands of Laotians faces painted black and red, covered on the Mekong banks as Vietnams to await the ceremonial firing of long lines of rockets, supposed to accelerate the rainfall.

On the political front meanwhile, Prince Souvanna Phouma, the neutralist Laotian leader whom both the Western and Communist blocs are backing to take the mountainous jungle kingdom out of the cold war, prepared to fly home from Paris tonight.

Souvanna got a message Thursday from the Vietnamese government offering to pay the way for a resumption of the three-way negotiations for setting up a coalition regime to include the Communist Viet Pathet Lao led by Prince Sihanouk.

President Kennedy told a news conference in Washington Thursday he had indicated the three rival parties will engage in conversations to await the time they would produce a government of national union.

No Prediction

Kennedy said he couldn't predict how long the American troops would be in Thailand, that their departure "would depend on good deal on what conditions are in Thailand and in the neighboring countries."

He said the United States wanted the Pathet Lao to withdraw back to the original cease-fire line but added, "I would think, however,

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### Religion In The News

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—There's a move afoot to reunite church congregations that their minister's wife is human, even if the car's expected to be as fancy-free as sisters outside the parsonage.

A national survey is under way to publish a manual to guide the wives in their behavior and the congregations in their demands.

Mrs. Hugh F. Miller, a parson's wife is a member of a 12-woman team that seeks to correct any conception of the clergyman's wife as a barred, drab woman with a smile etched on her face.

The women are members of the interdenominational advisory committee on research program on the minister's wife, a grant conducted by the Boston University School of Theology under a grant from the Lilly Foundation, Inc. Their man-interview project will take three years.

"What we want to establish is a factual rather than a high form ideal," said Mrs. Miller, the wife of the pastor of the Eastwood Baptist Church.

"As things stand, what most people think a minister's wife should be is enough to render a girl stiff," Mrs. Miller said.

Manuals given wives of seminary students are just awful, she said.

While the factual ideal will help guide seminary students, she hopes it also will ease the task of parsonage women by remodeling the thinking of the country's congregations.

"It's what the church people expect that shapes the life of the pastor's wife," said Mrs. Miller, who has spent nearly 20 years in various congregations.

But certain restrictions make it difficult for the elegantly dressed women to be as high form as they would like to be.

"I'd like to be a high form ideal," said Mrs. Miller, the wife of the pastor of the Eastwood Baptist Church.

He produces stock and bond issues, often selling these to the public as well as to securities investors. **Free, Gratis!**

It was good to hear in court Wednesday the oft maligned group upheld as an accurate reporter of events. The acknowledgment came in backhanded fashion through the spellbinding evidence involving Bolton Democrats who haven't been recent months.

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**Fiercer Than Dulles?**  
 There is, of course, another possible version of the current American play in Southeast Asia. United States and all the rest of the world toward the possible last brink, our policy may, instead, be merely the very last word in how to lose a country militarily.

The wily John Foster Dulles, and the good Dwight Eisenhower between them, became pretty expert at the business of sounding and looking very fierce while they kept some quiet retreat.

Their best example of this came when they were unleashing China Katochik by persuading him to withdraw from the Tachen Islands, this easing, in some small degree, the danger of an invasion of the Communist China.

But the Dulles-Eisenhower combination never achieved such a theatrical show and deployment of great force as that with which the Kennedy administration may, at this moment, be conceding Laos to the Communists.

All this movement of Marines, all this despatch of planes and guns and equipment, all this alerting of units has, so far, one may have noticed, stopped short of sending anything into the country of Laos itself.

We are treating that country as if it were in some state of neutrality, immune to the actual armed force intervention.

And what we say, at least, that we are doing with our armed force is to see that, if the Communists get going again inside Laos, they don't molest any of their peaceful, free neighbors like Thailand.

So, on one side of our mouth, we are calling on the Communists to reestablish cease fire and negotiate coalition neutrality inside Laos, and from the other, more powerful side of the same mouth, we are warning them that we had better not invade Thailand.

At the same time, we seem to be saying something to our own erstwhile friends inside Laos. The General Neouvan faction we once helped copy its own way into control of the central government when it was still a central government. We seem to be saying to them that unless they agree speedily to take part in a coalition neutral government for Laos, as everybody else has already agreed they should, then they must expect no help from us if the Communists complete their conquest of Laos.

Since anybody's foreign policy is likely to prove capable of almost anything, no one can be quite sure this analysis of the big military noise the Kennedy administration is making while it writes off Laos, if necessary, is a true and valid analysis. It could well be, of course, that as soon as we have mobilized enough troops inside friendly Thailand, along the border, we ourselves will invade Laos and reconquer it for General Neouvan.

But the odds for the moment seem to be that this Kennedy administration moment is like one of those Eisenhower administration moments, when we were talking and acting especially tough because that seemed the only respectable accomplishment for quiet abandonment of some position we had decided wasn't worth trying to hold.

### Historic Decision Due Supreme Court Weighs Public School Prayer

By GEORGE W. COINTELLE

An appeal to the Supreme Court on Bible reading is under way from Pennsylvania, and another case is expected to be heard on the issue in the near future.

An estimated 10 to 15 per cent of the schools in the state, not including the big New York City school system, use the prayer. Children may be excused from taking part.

In the test case, 19 other states have filed briefs, supporting one side or the other. The case is being argued in the Supreme Court on June 10.

"Amplify God, we acknowledge our dependence upon Thee, and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers, and our country."

If such a prayer, designed to be completely nonsectarian, is ruled unlawful, it could open the way for eliminating all prayers from the public schools.

It is the first time the high tribunal has undertaken a ruling on the question.

Students have indicated that prayers of some kind are used regularly in public schools in about 35 per cent of the nation's communities, and occasionally in another 17 per cent.

In other words, prayers are evidently used somewhere in about half of the country's 117,850 public schools — or about 68,927 of them. Twenty-four states expressly prohibit it. It is widespread elsewhere, at least in some schools, at least in some states.
