

Nikita Lauds Flight by U.S.

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev, opening an Italian industrial fair, today praised American astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter and said the Soviet Union now is not alone in the cosmos. His remarks came as the Soviets shot another unmanned satellite into orbit.

Scores of Italians and Soviets, clustered around the speaker's stand, heard the Soviet leader praise Italian industry, but spend most of the half-hour talk on Carpenter's orbital flight. Khrushchev said Carpenter displayed great courage and fortitude.

"Now we are not alone in the cosmos," he said. "Now the Americans have put two men in space." Khrushchev was understood by an Associated Press correspondent to say that the Soviet Union no longer has priority in space, now that the United States put two men in orbit, just as has the Soviet Union.

A check with unofficial Soviet interpreters indicated that the word "priority" was not used. The Soviet premier, however, however, congratulated American astronauts John H. Glenn Jr. and Carpenter, adding: "I especially congratulate the second one on his courage and fortitude in a situation when he could have turned up if something went wrong, or drowned in the sea."

He scoffed at the scientists who directed the latest flight for the incident when Carpenter's space suit heated up. "They couldn't give him any better advice than 'drink as much water as possible,'" he said.

Orbiting of the new unmanned satellite—Cosmos 2—was announced by Tass, the Soviet news agency. Tass said it is a routine device and functioning normally, the fifth in the Cosmos series which the Soviet Union started March 16.

Cosmos 5 is circling the earth in 102.75 minutes, the highest point of its orbit is 94 miles above the earth and the lowest is 139 miles, Tass said.

Stock Market Continues to Drop Sharply

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market declined sharply in early trading today, adding to last week's sell-off which was the sharpest in more than 30 years.

Heavy selling that caused the ticker tape to run 11 minutes late marked the first hour and even some of the most durable of blue chips were hit.

At 11 a.m., the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials had dropped 7.26 to 404.62. American Telephone & Telegraph dropped \$3.57 to \$108.25 to lead a tally of declines in belated reaction to reports that the Federal Reserve Commission may crack down on utilities.

Reynolds Tobacco lost \$2 to \$20.25 as tobacco experienced weakness following reports that the Federal Trade Commission was considering label rules related to cancer possibilities.

Most selling, however, was laid to a continued erosion in confidence in the market's direction with investors trying to preserve long-term gains or pure losses.

A few stocks resisted the early decline. Boeing gained 37 cents to \$40.25, General Motors up 12 cents to \$20.63 and Xerox up 7 cents to \$114.50.

One of the largest drops again was taken by International Business Machines, off \$11.50 to \$387.

Red China Said Quiet By Downey

HONG KONG (AP)—Two Americans arrived from Red China today and reported complete quiet on the Communist side of the border across which thousands of Chinese refugees have swarmed in recent weeks.

Mary Downey and her son William of New Britain, Conn., came from Peiping where they had visited Mrs. Downey's other son, John. He has spent 10 years in a Red Chinese jail serving a life sentence on spy charges.

William Downey said they saw no sign of any refugees during the 95-mile train ride from Canton to Hong Kong. Thousands of refugees rode the train to the frontier between the two countries when Communist guards tightened border control.

"Everything looked normal to me," William said. He added that the train they rode was not crowded.

Downey said during his 1,200-mile, 13-day trip he saw no evidence of starvation or political unrest that might have touched off the refugee exodus.

He said Peiping's residents appeared adequately fed and housed. The refugee flight caused no political disturbance that he could discern.

"No one looked shabby in Peiping," he said. "They are not dressed as stylish as in a large Western city but no one is in rags and tatters."

3,000 Strike Olin Factory In New Haven

NEW HAVEN, May 28 (AP)—Three thousand production workers struck the Winchester-Western division of the Olin Matheson Chemical Corporation today and pickets paraded before the company's 14 gates.

The strike was called by Victory Lodge 609, International Association of Machinists after federal and state mediators, working past midnight, were unable to head it off.

The factory employs about 5,000 workers in the manufacture of weapons, ammunition, fastening tools and fabricated brass and related products. It is New Haven's largest employer.

The old contract expired at midnight last Friday. A factory spokesman said he expected the company's salaried employees who are not union members to report for work as usual. Members of other unions representing workers at the plant refused to cross the picket lines.

Major issues which led to the strike have not been disclosed but the major factor is believed to be the union demand for a wage increase.

He Was Preoccupied Carpenter Denies Tiredness in Orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter says he did not become confused or tired during his third orbit of the earth—but was preoccupied with many tasks.

The personal account contradicted a report from an official of the Air Force that Carpenter seemed tired, perhaps confused.

Carpenter is leaving today for a welcome ceremony at his hometown, Boulder, Colo. He made a mistake at the Cape when he said he was preoccupied with many tasks.

Hartford Church Buys FM Station

HARTFORD (AP)—South Congregational Church of Hartford today signed an agreement to purchase radio station WFHQ (FM) in West Hartford from its parent, the General Broadcasting Corp.

Purchase price for station assets and equipment is set at \$25,000. The sale will be subject to the approval of the FCC (Federal Communications Commission).

The Rev. John R. Elmoro, associate pastor of the church, said today that under church ownership the station will be set up as a non-profit, educational outlet devoted largely to good music and other educational materials.

Salan's Death May Be Sought In New Trial

PARIS (AP)—The French government may seek a death penalty that might help convince European terrorists their drive to block independence of Algeria is futile.

The special high tribunal that tried Salan on treason charges and gave him a life sentence Wednesday was abolished Sunday in a move that may clear the way for a new trial.

French officials said there is evidence that Salan, who wore France's highest military decorations, smuggled instructions to his followers while in prison. The government could try him in a regular criminal court on such charges.

Salan was found guilty of treason because of his leadership of the terrorist secret army and for being involved in an attempted 1961 military revolt in Algeria. The military tribunal, which earlier had sentenced Gen. Edmund Jouhaux to death on similar charges, gave Salan a life sentence after it ruled there were extenuating circumstances in Salan's case.

Sure He'll Win Primary Nixon Urges GOP Turn Out in Force

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, hailing confidently along the comeback trail, is urging California Republicans to turn out in force in next week's primary.

It isn't just a routine "get-out-and-vote" appeal. "He told a weekend GOP rally...the size of the Republican vote in the primary will be our way of saying, 'We are strong, we are on the move, we will win in November,'" Nixon says.

Nixon says he is confident of winning the GOP gubernatorial nomination over his chief rival, California Republican Assemblyman J. P. Roche. It isn't just a routine "get-out-and-vote" appeal.

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Probers Find Point of Blast In Jet Liner

CONVENTVILLE, Iowa (AP)—A spokesman for government investigators said Sunday night they have pinpointed the place of an explosion in a Continental Airlines jet that sent 45 persons to their deaths.

A high energy blast occurred in the right rear lavatory of the plane before it was torn apart in flight, said Edward E. Slattery, public information officer for the Civil Aeronautics Board.

Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation also were active in a probe of the tragedy, in which the tail section of the airliner separated and the main fuselage landed in a farm yard in nearby Missouri.

Experts of the CAB have been reconstructing wreckage of the Boeing 707 at the Appanoose County fairgrounds.

Boun Oum Leaves Laos Despite Rebel Threat

VIENTIANE (AP)—Pro-Western Prime Minister Boun Oum left today on a three-day goodwill visit to the Philippines despite a major rebel army thrust threatening government-held Houei Sai near the Thailand border.

The dominant member of Boun Oum's Cabinet, Gen. Phoumi Nosavan, accompanied the prime minister. He dismissed the new rebel attack as of little importance.

The government leader left Laos in spite of a June 15 deadline set by neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma for agreement on a coalition government in Laos.

The United States and the Soviet Union back Souvanna's bid to form a government including Communists, neutralists and Boun Oum's rightists. Previous attempts at forming a coalition have repeatedly failed.

Fire Moves Mass Into Night Club

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—Because of a \$3-million fire and the death of a Jew, Masses in downtown St. Michael's Roman Catholic parish are being celebrated in a night club.

The club, where some of the nation's top stars have performed, is a few yards away from the fire-blackened ruins of St. Michael's church.

A bolt of lightning struck the 64-year-old church last Wednesday night, touching off a fire that left only the walls standing.

Harry Altman, owner of the club, said he had been told that the church was being razed.

Elevators On Route To Ports

WASHINGTON (AP)—A federal official said today virtually all of the grain storage payments received by Billie Sol Estes were for grain stored before the Kennedy administration took office.

Roland Ballou, assistant deputy administrator for commodity operations of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said, all except \$328,000 of the \$7,648,474 paid Estes for grain storage is chargeable to the previous administration for grain stored during the previous administration.

Ballou, in testimony prepared for the House Government Operations subcommittee, denied the department had shown Estes any favoritism.

He was the first witness as the subcommittee began hearings on activities of the 37-year-old West Texas financier, now under indictment for fraud.

The great expansion of storage capacity that has taken place in West Texas was for the most part to take care of the grain sorghum which was being produced before 1961, in ever increasing quantities, Ballou said.

This expansion was so great that in each of the years 1957, 1958 and 1959, production of grain sorghum was between four and five times the average annual production in the period 1951-53.

Coast Guard cutters were en route to the area, not spotted by either service. The Cargomaster took off Sunday morning from the Dover Air Force Base en route to the Azores.

LAUNCH SITE URGED GENEVA (AP)—The United States today proposed establishment of an international launching site for space research near the equator. The proposal was made by U.S. Delegate Homer Newell, director of space sciences of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, at the first meeting of a subcommittee of a new United Nations committee on the peaceful uses of outer space.

TWO INVITED TO RUSSIA BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Tito has been invited by the Soviet government to spend his vacation in the Soviet Union but no decision has been made, a government spokesman said today. Wide-spread speculation in diplomatic circles here is that Leonid Brezhnev, president of the Presidium of the Soviet Union will visit Yugoslavia this fall. Yugoslav-Soviet relations have greatly improved lately, Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko made favorable remarks about Yugoslavia recently.

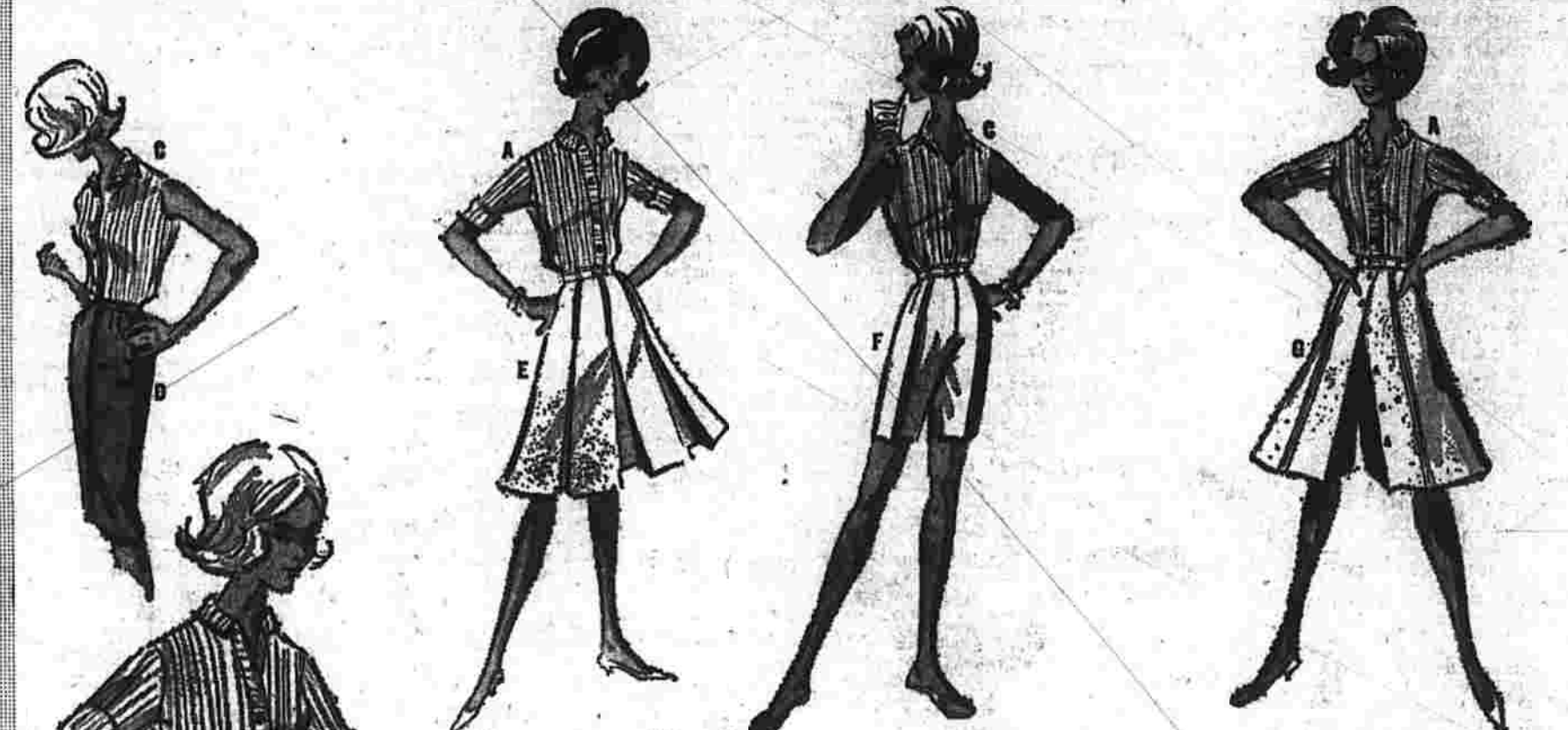

The tests are being conducted as part of a program to demonstrate the power of nuclear weapons.
