NEW YORK (AP) — One more familiar sound of modern living is headed for oblivion.

In place of the chime that sounds when you drop a coin into the pay telephone will be silence on the caller's end of the line, at least.

The disappearance of chimes will take place over a period of several years. A new model of that production will jump from 50 cents this year to 60 cents in 1963. After that they will be able to buy one for 30 cents a year.

At first the new model will be a two-tone gray with chrome linings. Instead of separate slots for nickels, dimes and quarters, there will be only one in the upper left hand corner of the instrument. A lever instead of a push-button will release bent coins.

...factor important in late analysis of the airborne debris drifting across the world.
...nuclear blast decay over varying periods of time, the United States scientists compute the time lapse between the blasts and the pickup of the samples. This helps account for missing elements on the degree of decay of elements found present.
...The U.S. technique of using high-flying aircraft to capture samples from Soviet explosions dates back about 12 years, to a time when the Russians held their first atomic tests. The United States follows this same technique in studying its own test results. Much of the air sampling in the wake of Russian tests is done in the Atlantic areas, which lie in the path of the radioactive debris from the Soviet tests.
...American aircraft fly into these air masses, then open nose ports which trap atomic particles flowing inside. These particles are brought back to laboratories and are subjected to microscopic, chemical and spectrochemical analysis.
...All this tells American scientists what materials went into the bomb, whether or device and how efficient it was.
...The 18th nuclear device of the current U.S. Pacific series was detonated Tuesday following an aerial drop near Christmas Island. The Atomic Energy Commission and the Defense Department said it was in the intermediate range, meaning it had an explosive force of between 20,000 and 1 million tons of TNT.
...A high-altitude shot of more than a million tons force is expected shortly, possibly late this week, near Johnston Island. The first attempt at a high altitude detonation failed on June 4, when a Thor missile carrying the warhead was destroyed after its guidance system went awry.
...A vivid description of the nuclear blast in the U.S. series has come from Charles Grant, of Lancaster, Pa., who is employed at the Christmas Island base.
...In a letter published in the Lancaster New Era, he said of one shot:
... "What looked like a half grape fruit in brilliant orange and green appeared... for a split second we were hit from the heat... shock, ripped and danced from the center of light... the sound shocks began to hit like cannon next to your ear. The ground vibrated and heaved."
...Telling of a second shot, he wrote that a myriad of colors appeared in the mushroom cloud and "there were reds, blues, greens and purples, and the top... of the mushroom... turned a purplish pink like the unfolding of a huge rose, turning a darker and darker red until it was a living, breathing thing of matchless beauty."
...He added, "All of us stood silent. There was nothing to say, but all of us were silent, knowing that this thing of power and beauty would not be used for anything but peace."

Warden Blackwell told the three men escaped the attention of authorities.

At 8 p.m. Monday, as usual, the door banged shut in the three-tiered cell block that housed 200 prisoners, watched over by 155 guards.

At 9:30, all lights out by at least one of the escapes, had to be told to turn out his light.

The alarm was sounded immediately. It was found that the trio, apparently for weeks, had been digging at plaster and cement four inches thick with their spoons.

The 24-by-12 inch openings connected the cells with a service shaft a yard wide.

From there it was 30 feet up a pipe to an air conditioner. This was dismantled, steel bars some how torn aside and access gained to the mess hall roof.

A 30-foot-long drain pipe led to the ground, about 100 yards from the water on the San Francisco side of the island.

From this point, Warden Blackwell said, it was anybody's guess what the three escapees did. If they struck out for San Francisco, they had a mile and a quarter to swim or drift with wind currents against them.

On the northern side of the island it was 15 miles to Angel Island and San Francisco. From there it was another 15 miles to the Marin County shore. To the east from Alcatraz lay the Navy's Treasure Island two miles away.
