reached over the weekend with Dr. Cheikh Mostefa, representative of the Muslim National Liberation Front (FLN) on the Algerian provisional executive.

"It thus goes by without results, Algeria will again be reduced to chaos," Saidi warned in a private radio broadcast.

The nationalist regime in Tunis has shown no inclination to endorse Mostefa's vaguely worded promise to exile Europeans in local security forces and his pledge of amnesty for European terrorists "as soon as conditions of security permit."

The Saidi-Mostefa agreement also has won only limited support from secret army elements. Terrorist ceased in the Algeria area but secret army commanders else-

where in Algeria discovered the secret army will not be responsible for the continuing exodus of Europeans and the creation of European defensive strong points in west Algeria.

Nationalist Premier Youcef Ben Khedda indicated he felt the provisional executive and Mostefa had exceeded their authority by negotiating with the secret army.

Ben Khedda also indicated doubts that the Saidi-Mostefa agreement could effectively halt European terrorism.

The two days of quiet in Algeria did little to halt the exodus of Europeans. Europeans continued to regroup in five west Algerian towns around Oran for a last ditch stand against the Muslim takeover after the July 1 independence referendum.

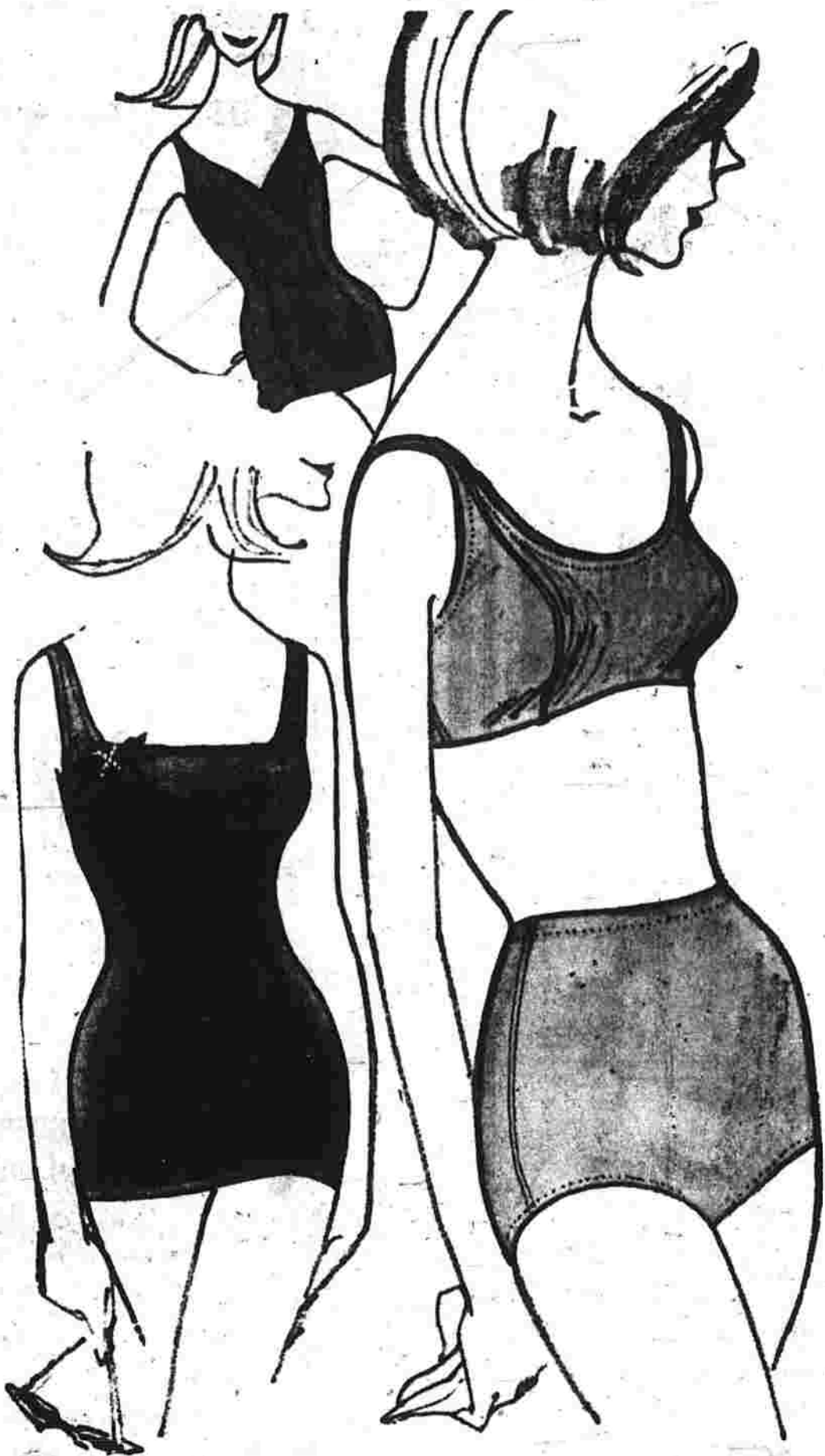
Despite the renewed terrorism in western Algeria, Saidi asserted in his radio broadcast that the secret army had kept its pledge to halt the fight. He demanded that the Muslims within the next two days live up to Mostefa's promise to incorporate Europeans in the local police force the provisional executive has been raising.

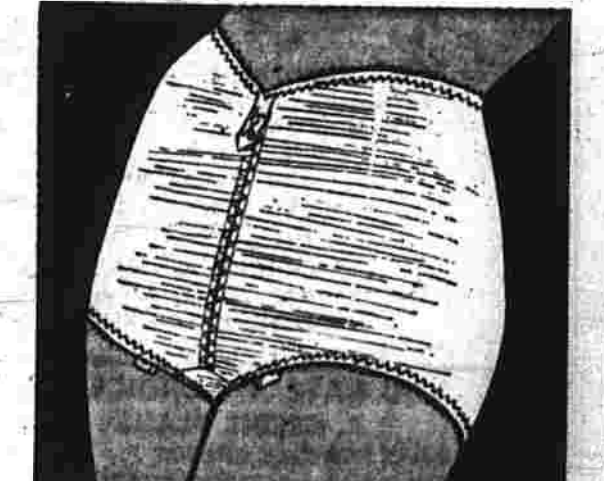

State Help Urged In Coordinating Hospital Growth

HARTFORD (AP)—The state has been urged to play an active role in coordinating the growth of public and private hospitals in Connecticut.

Without such official state participation, Connecticut may find itself without adequate health care facilities to meet the population growth, a special state committee warned yesterday.

Reporting on a two-year study, the panel headed by Dr. Albert W. Snook, professor of hospital administration at Yale, said there was "little effective implementation of integrated planning among voluntary hospitals" in the past.

It also said "there is room for improvement" in coordinated planning between these hospitals and government agencies.

Calling a statewide program to coordinate both public and private hospital development an "immediate necessity," the committee warned that the failure to act would bring "wasted efforts and resources."

The committee said planning for the future should be handled by a voluntary agency with the active and official participation of the state government.

The present capital investment of voluntary and private hospitals in Connecticut exceeds \$250 million with an annual operating expense over \$125 million, the committee said.

Noting the necessity of providing adequate hospital care for Connecticut's expanding population, the committee said:

"The people of this state are faced with the problem of providing this health care in a manner that assures adequate quality, that makes it easily available to all individuals, that provides the care economically and efficiently, and that preserves the high standards and advantages that have developed over the years through the association of the many organizations, agencies and individuals rendering this care."

Gov. John N. Dempsey said he would discuss the report with interested parties before making a decision.
