### 26 Students Graduate At New Tech School

Twenty-six students were graduated last night from Howell Cheney Regional Technical School in the first commencement exercises in the new \$2 million school building at Hill-Hart St. and W. Middle Turnpike.

Twelve of the graduates had completed the electric course, six the machine course, five the drafting course and three, the carpentry course. John F. Sullivan, manager of Overhaul and Repair at Hamilton Standard division of United Aircraft Corp. in Windsor Locks, addressed the class.

Diplomas were awarded by Lawrence W. Eddy, chief of the Bureau of Vocational-Technical Schools for the State Department of Education.

Greeting the assembly of graduates, parents and relatives, Dr. Fred D. Manganello, the school's director, said, "You have achieved a significant goal . . . which will give you confidence and security."

He added, however, "Sometime years ago coined the word 'commencement.' Commencement means the beginning . . . the beginning of your life of work." The students' future success, he said, depend on your willingness to work for what you will achieve."

Dwaine Ervin Glidden, 1961 class president, presented "Reflections" upon the four years the students had attended Howell Cheney Tech. "Our best years lie ahead, meeting the biggest challenge yet facing us," he said. "We must prove to our city and our state and our country that we are worthy to be citizens of such a great nation."

Glidden, chosen the outstanding graduate of Howell Tech, was presented a \$100 scholarship award by Dr. Manganello. The class gift to the school, presented to the director by Francisco Enos, was a combination wall barometer-temperature indicator.

Sullivan's talk centered around the industrial problems of today, understanding of the meaning of competition and job opportunities awaiting the graduates. He also gave tips about applying for jobs.

"Companies in the United States are today feeling the pressure of foreign competition," he said. "He said countries outside this country are meeting U.S. competition with products of as good a quality and at lower prices on goods."

"If we are to stay ahead of the parade, we must improve machine tools, techniques, manufacturing procedures and give excellent training to our personnel."

Of competition, he said, "I am sure you have heard the saying, 'The business world today is cut-throat and competitive operation.' This is correct. From the development of the United States to the operation of every business firm today, a cardinal principle that the best will be successful and the rest will be a poor second."

"And, so it is true with you, as you enter business, the best will be rewarded with financial gain, prestige and pride of accomplishment," he said.

Job chances better.

Job opportunities awaiting the graduates are better today than they were last June, said Sullivan, quoting from a recent issue of the Connecticut Labor Department's monthly bulletin. He emphasized that many jobs are available in small companies.

The baccalaureate graduates assembled in the school's auditorium-gymnasium while the Manchester Salvation Army Band played Ledzsen's "Joyful Duty."

The Rev. Charles E. Shaw, principal of East Catholic High School, delivered the invocation and benediction.

The band also played a medley of American folk songs, "Dixie Street" and "The Star Spangled Banner," directed by C. Peter Carlson, bandmaster.

The graduates were among about 150 tech school pupils who moved last month into the new building, replacing the 38-year-old tech school on 30 School St. About 225 students will be enrolled at Cheney Tech next fall.



### Science At Work

**BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS**  
An astronomer tells of the latest known star and engineers speak of cutting costs from water evaporation, and in space travel:

**Littlest Star**  
Perhaps the smallest star ever detected has been reported by William J. Layton, University of Minnesota astronomer.

It is apparently about half the diameter of our moon, and one-seventh the size of the earth, but has a density about 200 million times that of water; in other words, it is probably 25,000 times heavier than the earth and seems to be about 100 million light years distant.

**Reservoir Savings**  
The sun and evaporation steal precious water from reservoirs. But the loss can be cut as much as 80 per cent by placing a thin film of wax-like material only one-millionth of an inch thick, over the water, says Curtis S. Smith, Molecular Technology, Inc., describing tests in Australia and the United States.

The film does not change the taste, color or odor of the water, nor interfere with using the reservoir for recreation, and costs a few cents per thousand gallons of water saved, he adds.

**Bear Facts**  
This summer a team of scientists and photographers visited King Karl's Land, a group of uninhabited arctic islands in the Spitzbergen group. For studies of polar bears, plus other studies of animal life, vegetation and micro-organisms.

The area is one of the few places where polar bears live in colonies, says Dr. John R. Olive, executive director of the American Institute of Biological Sciences.

The scientists will look into the animals' food habits, parasitic infections, their keenness of hearing and sense of smell, their communications with each other, and whether a colony of polar bears ever functions as a unit, as wolf packs do.

**Space Price Tags**  
At present it costs about \$10 million to put one man into orbit around the earth and bring him back.

But there are hopes of improving space vehicles to the point where a roundtrip ticket to orbit would be reduced to \$20,000 by 1975, report H. H. Soelle and H. O. Ruppe of the Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Ala.

Early roundtrips to the moon would cost about \$50 million per man in 1970, but might be cut to \$3 million per man in 1980. Going to Mars will cost about \$60 million per man around 1975, but hopefully could be reduced to a million dollars 10 years later.

It all depends to a great extent, they say, upon development of launch vehicles which can be recovered and used again, and nuclear propulsion systems for shuttling around in space or going to the moon or planets.

**The Big Boys**  
Coming are super-heavy space rockets, far too big and heavy to move by ordinary transportation. Engineers at Rocketdyne General Corp. propose a swimming platform to move rockets. The platform would be floated by building up water pressure under it. Water, pumped from hoses would float or swim the platform along the coast.

By altering pressure at the four corners of the platform, pumps would hold the platform level under shifting loads or keep it from tipping in rough weather.

# Near-Perfect Timing, Smooth Cut Aids Aaron

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Aaron doesn't look like a slugger until he starts hitting. There's nothing about his physical appearance to suggest the long ball hitter. He's a willowy young man whose make-up suggests speed instead of power.

He's of about average height for a ball player at 5'10" and a little on the slim side.

But in the last five years the Milwaukee outfielder has had more home runs than anyone else in the National League.

His secret is near-perfect timing, a smooth swift swing and perhaps the best wrist action in baseball.

In the past three days he played four games against the New York Mets, and nine hits in 14 times at bat, including a double and three home runs, and driven in 11 runs.

The performance bonused his season totals to a 338 average in 16 home runs and 88 runs batted in with five hits, including two home runs, and six runs batted in at the end of six innings because of rain.
