### Kennedy Victory House Passes New Trade Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy and his legislative leaders have secured a House victory with passage of the trade expansion bill. Now they're mapping Senate strategy to hold the ground gained.

The re-reading bill, dynamic of Kennedy's drive to keep the dollar strong and to help economic partnership with Western Europe, was passed late Thursday by the House 298 to 128.

The hard-pressed Democratic leaders had won a preliminary victory on a 283-171 vote when a Republican-substituted which had been calculated to have maximum appeal.

There was a substantial bipartisan vote on the bill. The trade legislation divides Congress on economic as well as party lines.

If the Senate agrees to it, the bill will replace the present trade law, expiring this midnight. And, for the first time in the 82-year history of the nation, the trade legislation, there would be provision for keeping tariff cuts in effect even when individual business and their employees are hurt by imports. Loans, tax concessions and technical aid would be available to the firms hurt.

### Sweden Pays U.S. Loan in Full, Early

WASHINGTON (AP)—The kingdom of Sweden Thursday paid in full its last remaining debt to the United States government. The payment was made 21 years ahead of schedule.

The Treasury announced that it received from Sweden a payment of \$18,217,908.85, which liquidated the last remaining debt under the post-war Marshall Plan for European reconstruction and recovery.

The payment included \$17,068.85 interest. Under the loan agreement, Sweden did not have to pay off the debt in full until Dec. 31, 1962.

### \$100,000 Bail Forfeited Soblen Enters Hospital, U.S. Seeking His Return

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP)—Fugitive Soviet spy Dr. Robert Soblen was under medical supervision in a hospital in Tel Aviv today, while Israeli authorities searched for his return to New York to begin serving a 10-year prison term.

The 49-year-old Soviet-born doctor was taken to the hospital in Ramat Gan today when he complained he did not feel well. A doctor testified at his trial in June that Soblen was incurably ill with leukemia — cancer of the blood — and had died Monday.

A U.S. District Judge in New York today ordered that Soblen be returned to the United States to serve his 10-year term.

The United States and Israel do not have an extradition treaty, but Soblen's return is being sought for a political crime, rather than a common criminal offense.

### Jurors Oath Legal

NORWALK (AP)—Mrs. Emily F. Austin, 46, of 122 Dry Hill Rd., was fined \$1,000 yesterday after a trial marked by her refusal to take the first juror's oath.

The lawyer, Richard Weinstein, said the oath taken by the jury was null and void because of the refusal to take the oath.

### \$10 Million Gamble First Test of Pay-TV Over Ch-18 Tonight

HARTFORD (AP) — RKO Promotion launches the most ambitious pay-television test yet tonight over WHCT, channel 18.

For RKO and Zenith Radio Corp., its partner in the three-year experiment, pay-TV in Hartford is a \$10 million gamble that will begin telecasting a scrambled signal.

Any television set capable of receiving Channel 18's normal signal will be able to pick up the scrambled picture.

But only the 20 sets equipped with Zenith decoders will be able to receive it.

The Theatre Owner of America, acting through the Connecticut Committee against Pay-TV, fought RKO Promotion in 1960 to get Federal Communications Commission approval for the test.

The National Association of Broadcasters also made its opposition clear during the FCC hearings. The FCC as chairman Newton Minow put it decided to give the test a chance to show whether it can offer a useful service.

Minow said pointedly, "from that time when world started in the 1950s, the test case has been a success."

The test of subscription pay-television is being conducted in the U.S. Court of Appeals, but lost there.

Alcoholic metabolism or utilizes alcohol differently from the normal drinker. But as yet there are no tests or methods of producing who is in danger of becoming an alcoholic.

Knowledge is accumulating. The center for alcohol studies, formerly at Yale University and recently transferred to Rutgers University, for years has sponsored careful scientific studies of all aspects of human use of alcohol and alcoholism. And the federal government through the National Institute of Mental Health, now is spending several million dollars annually on research.

Much of current research is stressing a hunt for outside chemical differences between the alcoholic and the normal. Some authorities are optimistic that clues will be turned up to pinpoint causes and improved treatments.

The Post Office Department announced today that the new edition of the popular publication "Postage Stamps of the United States 1847-1961" will be available Aug. 1.

The new edition, priced at \$1.25, embraces all United States issues from 1847 through the 4-cent Niagara commemorative issue of Dec. 28, 1961.

In addition to the illustrations and description of the stamps, there are tables showing designers, engravers, first day sites and dates, and quantities of stamps sold and covers cancelled on the initial day of issuance since January 1853.

Other features include a comprehensive list of plate numbers printed on the stamps, a complete index for easy reference.

All mail orders for this book should be addressed to the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. and should be accompanied by a money order or check. Postage stamps will not be accepted as payment. If the publication is to be mailed to a foreign country, the cost will be accompanied by a money order, making charges.

For convenience of visitors the book will be sold over-the-counter at the Philatelic Exhibition Room (1313) at the Post Office Department, Mail orders for this publication should not be sent to the Post Office Department.

### Fire Chief Backs Alarm New Horn Not Musical, But It Draws Attention

The town fire department is trying its best to provide adequate protection for the 30,000 lives and millions of dollars of property within its territory, without disturbing residents too much with the new horn, said Chief W. Clifford Mason.

In a report submitted to General Manager Richard and forwarded to the board of directors, Chief Mason explained the use of the horn, which has been questioned recently, presumably by residents in the Spruce St. area where the horn is located. Our Spruce St. station is the only building owned by the Town of Manchester that has the facilities for handling and supervising the equipment used with the air horn," said the chief.

"The sound produced, while not a musical note, does draw attention. There has been improvement in the horn since it was installed. In very few people realize that the town fire department is considered to be in the volunteer class with a minimum of P.A.I. personnel. The paid personnel, assigned to shifts of day and night duty, include an on-duty force of 10 men providing all services.

These men are assigned so there are but two men on duty in each of three stations for a total of six (men); the balance work out of Spruce St.

All firemen do not respond to the same alarms. About six to eight (men) of the 10 may be available.

"Proper procedure calls for at least 18 men to respond to an alarm with six men in reserve. In order to get the required response it is necessary to use an audible signal to call in the off-duty paid men and also the volunteers.

"The signal must be heard."

Chief Mason said the horn has been blown only once since it was installed on March 1, 1962. The horn is turned off, except Sundays, as a test. Each night, sometime between 9 and 10 o'clock, the horn is turned off, the next morning between 7 and 8 a.m.

Since the installation of the horn, it has been sounded four times in February, three times in March, five times in April and twice in May for a total of 18 calls in 150 days.

Chief Mason said the horn has

### South Windsor Pero Farm Purchase Voted for \$150,000

At a Town Council meeting for No. 4 of their differential Wednesday evening, it was voted to purchase the Pero property on Avery St. for a school and recreation site. An amount of \$150,000 was appropriated for the purchase to be paid as follows: \$20,000 on or before Aug. 15; \$30,000 on or before Jan. 15, 1969; \$100,000 on or before Jan. 15, 1971.

At a special town meeting called before the Council meeting, a referendum vote of about 20 people attending showed unanimous approval of the Pero property purchase.

Robert Mack and Herbert Duffley of the State Personnel Department appeared before the meeting to discuss the proposed job classification and salary schedule program. This program would not include elected officials, unpaid employees of the town or employees of the board of education (non-professionals). The state board would issue questionnaires to the employees for a statement of their duties. After study, jobs would be defined and classified and salary schedules would be suggested. It is hoped that this study would be completed by December.

The Council passed a resolution suggesting that the board of education consider including its classified personnel in this study. It was believed that if these people were included now, it would reduce friction among the town employees and the cost of a study for the board of education's personnel would be less if included in the larger study.

A personnel appeals board was appointed consisting of Donald Holland for a term of three years; John Kearty for one year; and Richard Delphin, a one-year term.

The appointment of special constables was tabled pending further consideration and investigation by the town manager, constable and resident state policeman.

Preliminary appropriation was given on the proposed budget of \$300,000, submitted by the public building commission for the construction of Ellsworth Memorial High School. Contracts for fuel oil were given to the Kaseen Oil Co. for No. 2 oil (its differential in bids was .0080c below other bidders); and to the Tennesco Oil Co.

### Policy Changes For Night School On Enrollments

A new enrollment policy will be put into effect in the Manchester adult evening school in the fall. The policy was approved by the board of education Wednesday as suggested by Lewis Piper, adult school director.

With the exception of Americanization classes for the foreign born, no classes will be started without an enrollment of at least 15 students. When attendance drops below 10 for two successive sessions, the course may be dropped or combined with another class on the same subject to keep enrollment up.

Registration may be reopened in classes which have dropped membership severely because of sickness. If classes are dropped, other classes may be expanded and the teachers whose classes have been eliminated may be assigned to others.

Piper asked the new policy in an effort to keep expenses down for the adult school. Small classes cannot be maintained, he said.

### Rusk's Crowded Day

On Wednesday in England, Secretary of State Dean Rusk walked to an honorary degree in the company of one Carolyn Spencer Chaplin, who happened to be a hidden entrance to Secretary Rusk's United States because an attorney general, in the end, of the Truman administration, stepped back in 1952, ruled him an untrustworthy and undesirable person. The trouble with Charlie Chaplin, then, and perhaps still, was that he made sounds and performed gestures which seemed like those of a Communist, even though he himself, then and now, presumes, today, would characterize himself primarily as a "personality." At any rate, there on Wednesday was the American Secretary of State and this great comic actor, who is forbidden to enter the United States, being honored together by the same free academic institution in the nation of Britain.

Later the same day Secretary of State Rusk landed in another country from which Charlie Chaplin would also apparently be forbidden to enter the United States, although dictators of the extreme right often get along better with people who seem to believe in dictatorship of any kind than they do with believers in pure democracy. Shortly after he landed in Portugal, Secretary Rusk, himself was established as not "too welcome a visitor." He was given a non-Orfordian citation of some over-ripe fruit as he approached the American Embassy, and the official diplomatic greeting was more polite, but not much more cordial.

In Portugal, it was the duty and function of Secretary Rusk to consort with totalitarians as much to the right as Charlie Chaplin may be to the left. His business concerned primarily a renewal of our leases on air base facilities in the Azores, and his difficulty came from the fact that the United States has, in recent months, been guilty of what the Portuguese dictatorship considers unfriendly acts. Back in 1961, when the liner "Santa Maria" was hijacked at sea by an abortive revolution, an army plot, our U.S. Navy had an uneasy hard time locating the vessel. Subsequently, we have been siding in the United Nations with critics of Portugal's administration of its colony of Angola while, on the other hand, we didn't sympathize with Portugal when that great aggressor, Nehru of India, marched against the colony of Goa and conquered it. In order to persuade the Portuguese dictatorship to remain faithful to at least some of the spirit implicit in NATO, that organization of "democracies," and extend our air base leases a few more years, Secretary Rusk will need all his growing diplomatic skill.

The important skill, apparently, is that of being able not to take things too seriously, as if every choice one makes has to be an all-or-nothing affair. Behind the citadel of our liberties, can you hold Charlie Chaplin on one hand, and continue cozy with Dictator Salazar on the other, and think nothing of it?

The only trouble is that we can't decide whether this is the way to run the world or the precise reason the world gets itself into so much trouble.

Back To The Congo

So far the only thing clear and indisputable about the return of the Belgians to the Congo is that it is taking place, and that it is proving a success.

This contrasts with the time, earlier in the Congo crisis, when the same was one of getting the Belgians out. It seemed urgent to get them out because they were apparently refusing to take their hands off the territory they had

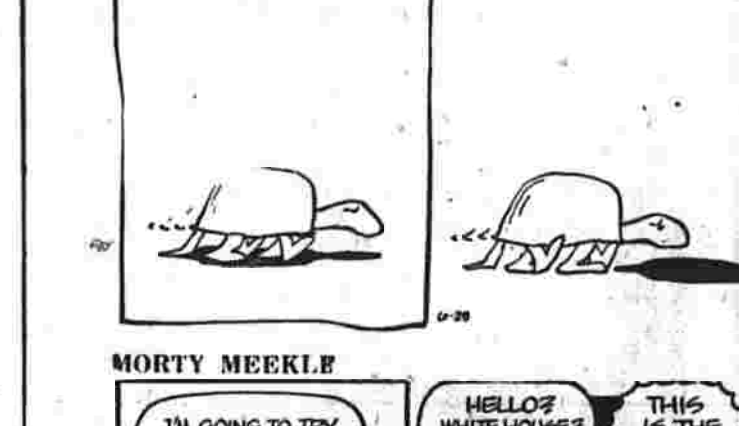
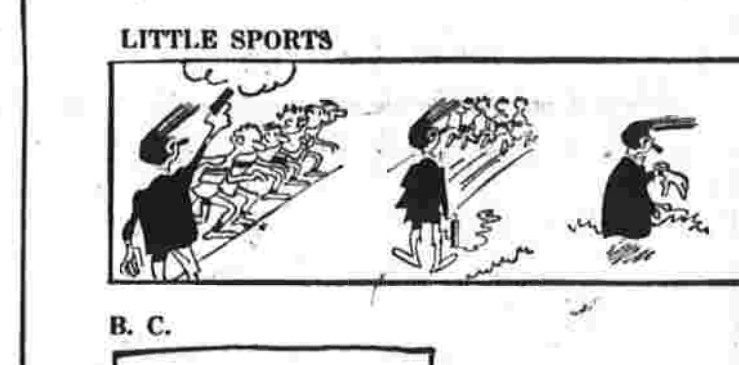

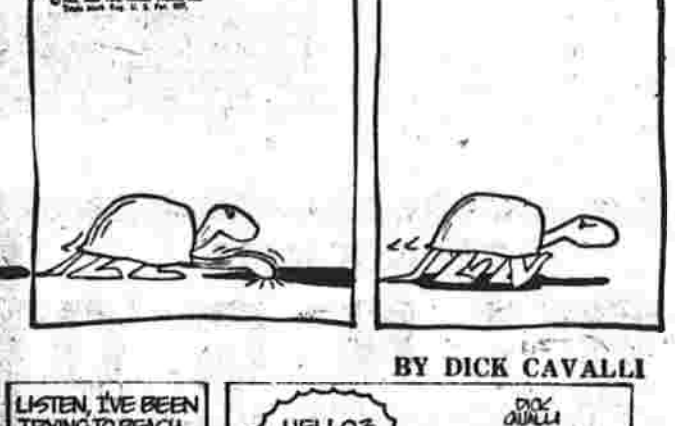

Vernon Fire District Commissioners will hold a public hearing Monday at 8 p.m. at Co. 1 firehouse on an \$51,000 budget proposed for the next fiscal year.

The budget proposal represents a decrease from this year's budget of \$46,000.

The commissioners will adopt the final budget after Monday's public hearing. It will come up for approval at the next meeting on July 10.

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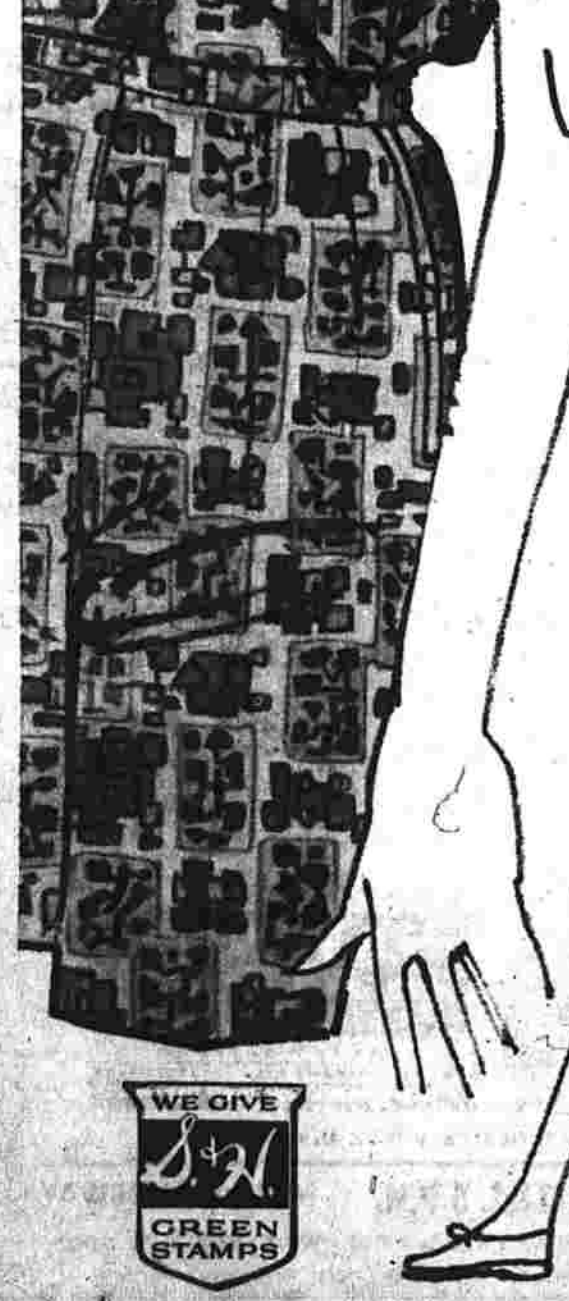
