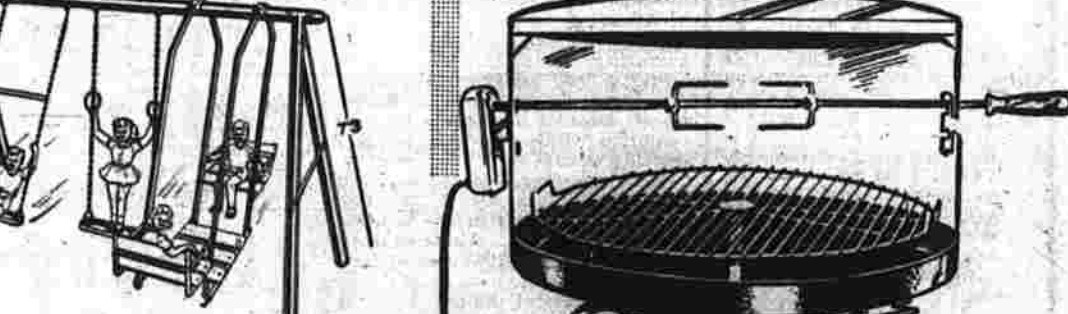

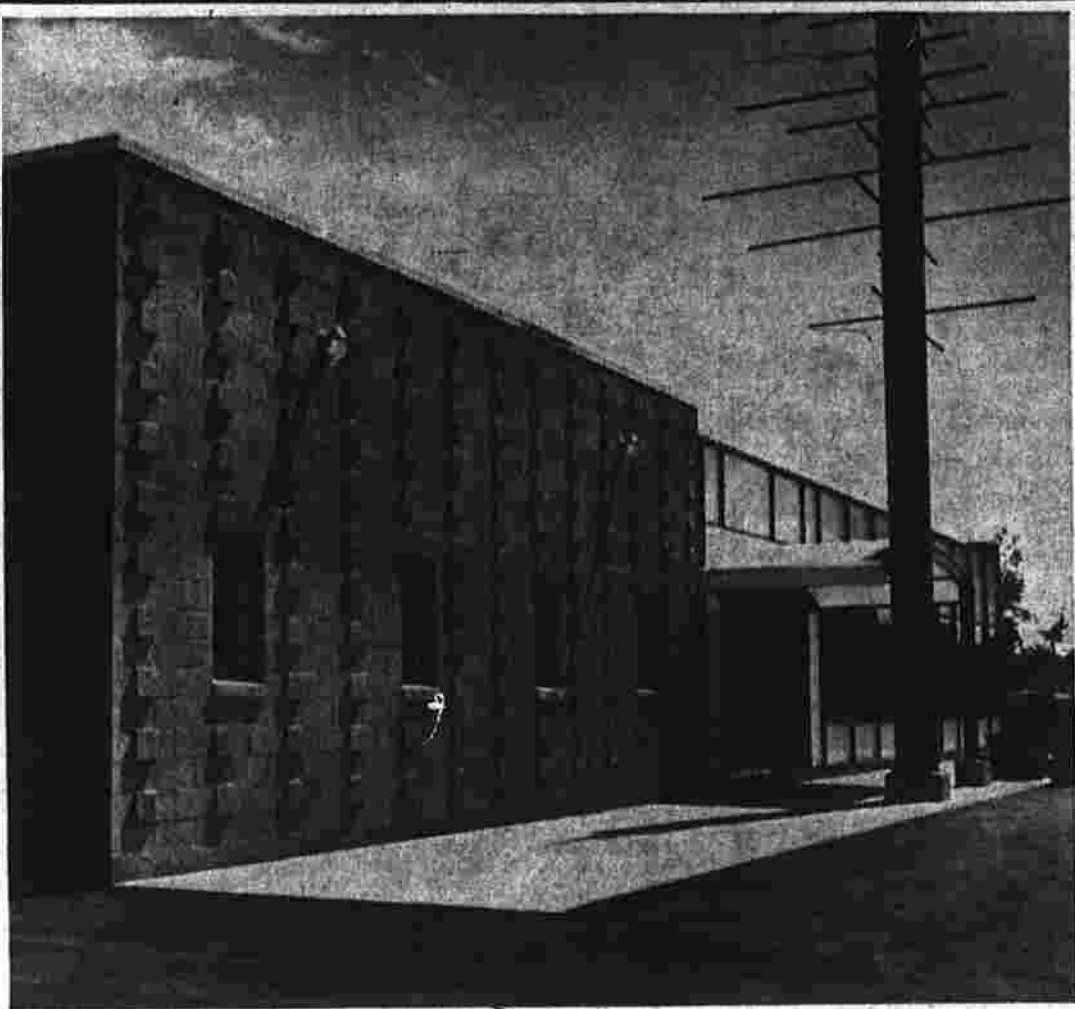

Sam Jaffe and Wife Have 'Ben Casey' Roles

When Sam Jaffe, the scholarly neurosurgeon in ABC-TV's "Ben Casey" came to the studio for costume fittings for his role as Dr. David Zorba in the early days of the series' production, he was accompanied by his charming vivacious wife, Bettye Ackerman.

"Since the fittings would not take too long, Bettye decided to pass the time with me. She was dressed in a work shirt and dungarees and had no thought of the amazing interlude that would transpire while waiting for me," Sam said.

Fleider Cook, the director, saw her and asked her to audition for the role of Dr. Maggie Graham. Bettye was agghast, but, after a little persuasion, read the lines and was immediately hired for the part.

"Thus this idea of togetherness really paid off for us," Sam smiled.

Together they began for Sam and Bettye about six years ago when they met in 1956. Bettye, an ambitious young actress from South Carolina was cast in an off Broadway production of Moliere's "Tartuffe" starring Sam. They were married six months later and spent their honeymoon as members of the National Company of the "Lark" touring with Julie Harris.

If fate played a part in Bettye's acquiring her role in "Ben Casey," it played a more profound part in the life of Sam Jaffe. Known as "the brain" among his Hollywood intimates for his extensive intellectual ability, Sam was graduated as a mathematician major from City College of New York, and became dean of mathematics at the Bronx Cultural Institute. Even today he reads calculus texts as others read newspapers. Strangely enough it was during his tenure as a math teacher that fate stepped in and changed his entire future.

Edward Goodman of the Washington Square Players saw Sam play six characters in an amateur production staged by the school's teachers and induced Jaffe to join a Players company on tour. Sam never returned to teaching.

His first noteworthy job on Broadway was in "The Jazz Singer," starring George Jessel. In 1930 he got star billing in the Broadway production of "Grand Hotel," playing Kringerlein, the role Lionel Barrymore did in the movie version.

Persuaded to go to Hollywood, he appeared first in "The Scarlet Empress," starring Marlene Dietrich, then "Lost Horizon" and "Gunga Din" followed.

In 1950, for the role of "Mastermind" in "Asphalt Jungle" Jaffe won The Venice International Award for "best male performance of the year," The Edgar Allen Poe Award, and an "Oscar" nomination.

Jaffe declares that he is intensely proud of the fact that, together with George Fredly, curator of the theater section of the New York Public Library, he founded (in 1948) Equity Library Theater in New York City. This theater gives many young actors their first chance.

Although he has performed in many television dramas, "Ben Casey" offered Sam his first continuing, co-starring role in a series. Sam Jaffe's great accomplishments in the theater are all the more amazing for in addition to being a math scholar, he speaks six different languages fluently, went through college on money earned as a professional boxer and composed musical scores of such quality that one of his works, "Rondo," was once performed in Carnegie Hall.

Another husband and wife team voiced the opinion of the general public in our estimator when last fall while filming "I Remember A Lemon Tree" for the "Ben Casey" series, they said.

Hollywood on TV

Hollywood — (NEA) — No one ever laughs when Gene Austin sits down at the piano. But they did when he sat down at a desk in Carson City the other day and filed his papers as a candidate for governor of Nevada.

Old Gene, 61, and a living legend of the recording business, predicted the reactions to his hat in the ring on the Democratic ticket.

"A lot of people," he said, "are going to laugh at first. But I've got the support of many good friends and some very influential persons in politics. After all, campaigning is just like show business."

If you're not old enough to remember husky, ruddy-faced Gene Austin you will at least know him by his songwriting career. He's the author of such hits as "My Blue Heaven," "The Lonesome Road," "How Come You Do Me Like You Do?" and "When My Sugar Walks Down the Street."

Singing "My Blue Heaven" — "when whippoorwills call, and evening is nigh" — made him famous as a crooner-composer who sold 86 million records between 1924 and 1930.

Winner of the first gold record for million-plus sales ever presented, Austin presented it to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

In 1960, I found Gene living in a plush 50-foot trailer in Las Vegas, a man with a song in his heart "and no financial worries."

He lives on the desert for his health while he goes on composing recording albums, and occasionally playing a night club.

The trailer was equipped with a fancy electronic organ, \$10,000 worth of stereo and hi-fi equipment, a pretty wife named Lou—and memories. His proudest are of his biggest record hit, "My Blue Heaven."

"It sold," Gene recalled, "over eight million. I got four cents a record. My first royalty check was for almost \$100,000."

But some memories are unpleasant.

Gene went into an eclipse nationally when radio replaced the phonograph and the depression played havoc with the record business.

Gene remembers being one of the first entertainers to work in Las Vegas. "It was 1942," he grins, "and I sang for tips in a downtown hotel."

During the WW II years he also sang in a Hollywood night club, on stage with Ken Murray's "Blackouts," and later he became the first composer to put sheet music on newstands and in drug stores.

He says he might even compose a special song for his political campaign, but just singing "My Blue Heaven" will be an introduction any candidate might envy.

What does the record pioneer think of today's popular music?

When I asked him the question in 1960, he replied:

Wynne Miller has had more varied experience in her short career to date than many performing artists have had in a lifetime.
The blonde actress, who is seen in the NBC-TV daytime dramatic serial "Our Five Daughters," started her career with the idea of becoming a concert singer. She comes from a musical family in Greeley, Colo. Her father, Dr. Dean Miller, is an amateur clarinetist and directs a church choir, and her mother Velma is a church organist. Wynne is a niece of the late Glenn Miller.
Wynne took lessons in clarinet from her father, and studied for professional singing, too. She sang in a number of concerts and appeared with the San Francisco Symphony as a soloist in Bach's "Magnificat" under the direction of Pierre Monteux, and in Honnegger's "King David" conducted by the late Dimitri Mitropoulos. She came to New York seven years ago with the idea of continuing her concert work. But a series of engagements in popular singing soon turned her ideas in another direction. She received a Theatre World Award for her performance in this show.
Last season she was featured with Maurice Evans in the musical play "Tenderloin," and before that she was a lead in "Thurber Carnival" on Broadway. In the last named show she did not sing a note and was singled out by critics for her comedy acting ability.
Wynne does not regret having made a change in her career plans, nor does she feel that the time spent on her concert career was wasted. "All experience before an audience is valuable to a performer," says the attractive young actress. "In my current assignment in a daytime serial I have learned a great deal, too. In a show of this kind you can develop a part over a period of months, and it teaches you to delve deep into the character."
On NBC-TV, she has been a guest on "Perry Como" series and was "Girl of the Week" for three weeks on "Today."
Miss Miller is still single, but takes note, she's an avid home decorator and can really sew. She also learned to knit from the uhohers during the run of "Li'l Abner."

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Barbra Streisand admits that she used to be "a character." Whether or not she still is—well, that's for you to say.
Miss Streisand, at 19, knocked them dead this season in "I Can Get It For You Wholesale" on Broadway. Her triumph led to things like The Garry Moore Show and most people say she's off and running to a smash career.
She says, however, that the belief that an actor who gets rave reviews is automatically flooded with tremendous offers in—"a great big lie."
"There was no great flood of offers," she says. "Why do they always print that I've gotten so many offers? They print such rotten things—like they wrote that I was smooching at the Harwyn Club. It was 21.
"Actually, that Garry Moore Show I did. That wasn't because of the reviews. That was because my agent dragged Garry's producer in to the theater to see me, and he liked me."
Barbra, a Brooklyn girl, doesn't consider herself a success—yet.
"I'm not a success," she says, "because I'm not famous. Yesterday I went shopping at Bergdorf Goodman. And I couldn't get anybody to wait on me. If I was famous, they would have waited on me. But I looked too young, I guess, and too—I don't know, like I couldn't afford to shop there. I'll be a success when I'm famous enough to get waited on at Bergdorf Goodman."
Barbra Streisand's real name is Barbara Streisand. She refused to change her last name, but did drop one "A" out of Barbara because she hates the name Barbara.
"In school," she says, "I was a character. I was the wise guy. I always got good marks, so I was never in what you'd call real trouble, but everybody looked on me as the odd one. I used to dye my hair platinum blonde and wear strange color lipstick and eyeshadow.
"I once won a prize in Spanish class and the teacher said, 'Well, now you won't have to wear blue eyeshadow anymore.'"
Her big success in "I Can Get It For You Wholesale" is as a comedienne, but comedy is not what she went in for originally. In fact, she was never particularly interested in anything except singing.
"Comedy," she says, "is just another form of acting. I happen to have a good sense of comedy timing, that's all. But I never knew it."
"They used to say that I couldn't retain things," she says. "I'd do something funny and they'd say, 'That's good, keep it in.' But I'd forget what I had done, so they figured I couldn't retain things and almost fired me. Even nowadays, I do the part differently every time."
"Does it matter if I don't stand in exactly the same spot?" she asks. "They say I'm undisciplined as an actress—nonsense, it's just that I believe in being a person."
Miss Streisand grew up, she says, with a compulsion to be the best. She had this craving to excel at whatever she did—school work, singing, dancing, acting—and it is still there. It has given her some troubled times, but basically she has survived because frequently she was the best.
She says that her aim in life isn't merely to be happy, because that's a passing thing.
"I'm happy from day to day," she says, "and I have new goals from day to day. Just now my goal is to learn some new songs for a club act. If I do that, I'll be happy. Little things make me happy—if I get a good meal, I'm happy, if my boy friend brings me flowers, I'm happy."
Are all these the ingredients of a character?
