Moslem, Settler Gun Battle Leaves 100 Dead, Wounded

It was the first known outbreak of violence in Algeria since it became formally independent on Tuesday. The streets erupted within minutes as Moslems and Europeans scattered. Three Europeans, dead or wounded, lay in the street outside the Grand Hotel in the heart of the European city, as Moslem police and troops brandishing guns moved into the area. They began rounding up all the European men they could find.

The firing broke out at midday. One Moslem policeman said it started from the buildings of Oran's largest newspaper, and spread to other buildings nearby. One European was shot off his motorcycle, wounded in the leg and managed to climb back on and drive away.

Quarters slanted off Barclay's bank, a block away from the Grand Hotel where newsmen are staying. There was fighting all around the hotel. A European man looking out of an upstairs window was gravely wounded by a bullet.

One of several groups of European prisoners was marched past the hotel with hands in the air. The group included 15 European men ranging from teenagers to old men. Two hours after the fighting started, the city and French riot police were still patrolling the streets.

Other European employees of the hotel panicked when they saw Moslems run up the stairs to help the wounded woman and to verify that no one in the room was armed.

People running in from the hotel panicked when they saw a European woman in a restaurant being held by Moslem men trying to direct traffic. Groups of nationalistic guerrillas, some in uniform and some with armbands on their workers' overalls, rounded through the streets.

12th Circuit Court Cases

Business Mirror

NEW YORK (AP)—Consumer
buying—the biggest thing in the
U.S. economy—is in for closer
than ever scrutiny today. The other
chief forms of spending by
business and by government are
generally accepted as having pre-
viously taken shape for 1962.
Government spending is going to
rise over the long range, stimu-
lating certain industries, assuring
social jobs and maybe creating
some others.
Business spending plans can
change, but most seem to call for
a slight increase this year over
last. And, anyway, business spend-
ing plans over the long range are
tied to ultimate sales to the con-
sumers and the government, or to
prospects for such sales. Any big
jump in business spending prob-
ably will have to wait for ade-
quately increased consumer de-
mands.

So what the consumer is going
to do is the chief concern right
now.
Particularly puzzling the specu-
lators is just how much, if any,
Americans will cut back their buy-
ing of goods and services because
of losses in the stock market, or
because of fear of the future in-
duced by the stock market crash.
The latest pulse taking of con-
sumer psychology finds a much
ly optimistic but not exuberant
state of mind.

The questioning by the Univer-
sity of Michigan Business Research
Center was done while stocks were
sliding, but most consumers were
contacted before the big break of
May 29 and the morning of May 29.

Government statistics also lag.
The Department of Commerce
reports that the economy is
growing at a 4.5 percent rate.
But some economists doubt this.
They concede that those who ha-
bitually spend all they make
usually increase their outlays. If
their tax bills were less, but those
who think they already are spend-
ing as much as prudent dictates
might use the tax windfall to in-
crease their savings.

In either case the non-govern-
ment sector of the economy would
grow. Increased spending would
help consumer good industries and
services. Increased savings would
build up funds for investment in
the future economic growth.

But just now, many economists
say, what the economy needs most
is more consumer spending. They
hope the consumers will stay op-
timistic and they wish the con-
sumers would be a bit more ex-
uberant.

Science At Work

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
A world census of shark attacks,
crimes in another ocean for a
veteran sailing ship, and a hint
that birds can tell time are sub-
jects for science at work.

Dangerous Waters
In the last year, sharks made
at least 30 attacks on humans—
without provocation, six persons,
among the 31 hurt, were injured
fatally. Four attacks on boats by
sharks failed to injure anyone.
So reports the Shark Research
Fund of the American Institute
of Biological Sciences. It makes
an annual census of shark attacks
from U.S. mainland coasts to Hawaii
and other Pacific islands, to Ber-
muda, Australia, Africa, the Med-
iterranean and the Indian Ocean.
Some 27 species of sharks were
involved, from a two-foot sand-
shark to a 2,000-pound white por-
beak. Most of the unprovoked at-
tacks occurred off Africa and Aus-
tralia.

Another Ocean
The Columbia University re-
search vessel Vema is sailing into
another ocean for a new kind of
research craft peering into the
unknown depths of the Indian
Ocean.

On an earlier voyage, the Vema
discovered that the earth's core
connected south of Africa with a
60-mile crack in the earth's sur-
face, a crack that follows an
earthquake zone extending the en-
tire length of the Atlantic Ocean.

Bird Watching by Radar
English scientists are using ra-
dar to watch the flight patterns
of birds under various conditions.
The hope is that the films of the
birds' screens can answer some of
the questions about animal be-
havior.

Immediately the study finds
new questions. The radar watch-
ing, for instance, observed one
flock of 800,000 starlings take off
from its roost in 18 waves—each
wave 100,000 birds high. Question:
How does the starting take off
when the third wave is up?

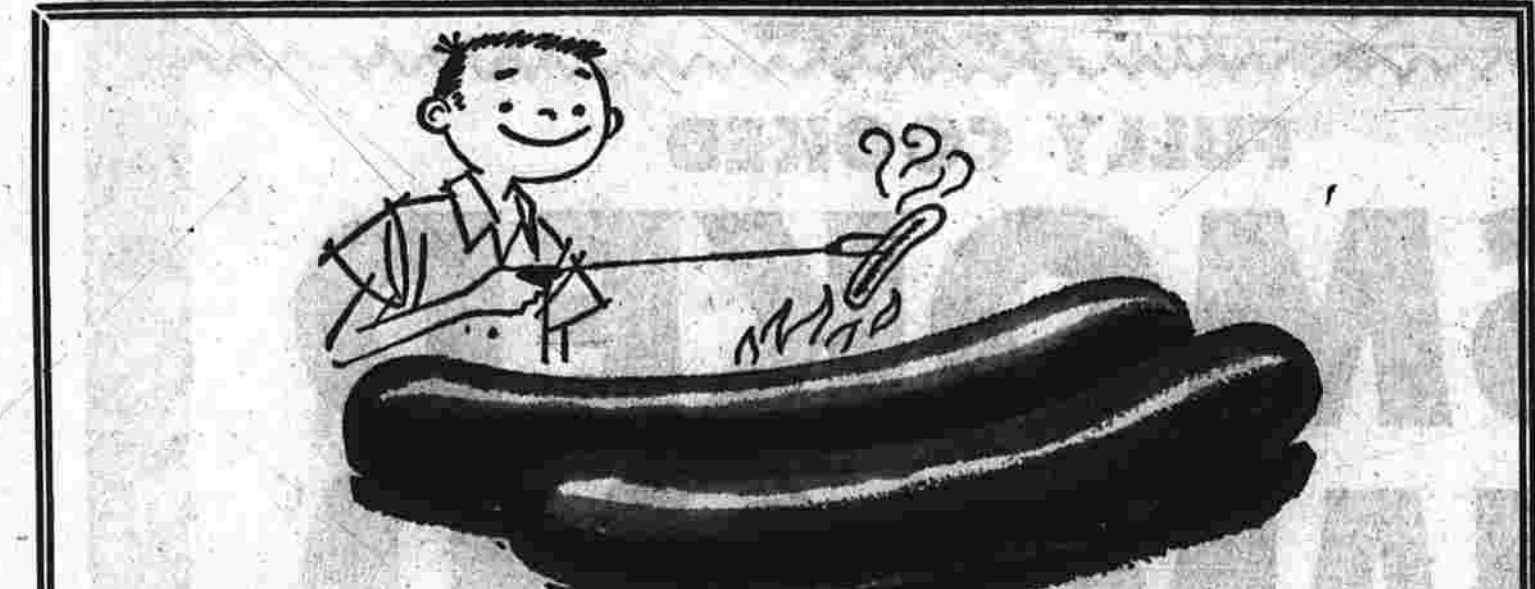
