Area Roads Go To State Control

The State Highway Department has announced assignment of route numbers to roads in Coventry, Andover and Hebron transferred to state maintenance on July 9.

PICK RIGHT TIME TO GIVE UP LOSERS

It's pleasant to think about the tricks you're going to win, but in some hands you must devote your attention to the tricks you're going to lose. The contract may be going to win when you give up the sure losers.

Check the queen of hearts, and you feel sure that East has the ace. West has no reason to know that the king of hearts will appear in the dummy so he has no reason to lead away from any heart combination that includes the ace.

If you want confirmation, you can sneak a look at the East hand. The ace of hearts is there, and you're sure to lose two heart tricks or a low heart from dummy at the first trick?

Try both plays mutually, and see which works better.

Even if West shifts to a club at once, East wins and returns a heart to West's ten. Now West shifts to a club, and you lose a trick, and you will eventually lose a second club finesse. Down one.

But if you suppose you play a low heart from dummy at the first trick, if West leads another heart, you have oceans of time for an eventual end play.

nation's governmental crisis, during which Brazil drifted for 17 days without a Cabinet amid spiraling inflation and violent food riots.

But Brochado da Rocha's announced intention to seek broad powers from Parliament within five days was seen as a major challenge to the new government.

The conservative-dominated Parliament has been reluctant to surrender any of its powers to the executive branch headed by President Joao Goulart, whose Brazilian Labor Party is in the minority.

During the governmental crisis, Parliament rejected one of Goulart's nominations for prime minister and another quit after only 48 hours in office before the stalemate was broken with the approval of Brochado da Rocha, a political unknown, and his predominantly nonpolitical cabinet.

After the endorsement of his cabinet, Brochado da Rocha and his ministers huddled with Goulart until almost midnight, then went to Parliament to thank the deputies.

In an official announcement, the new prime minister, a mid-career university professor and former provincial official, vowed to use all of his energy to meet the nation's troubles.

"With the vote of confidence by the Chamber of Deputies, I do not feel in any doubt of the grave and heavy responsibility which we assume before the nation and our people so punished by suffering," he said.

Brochado da Rocha is taking over the administration of a country plagued by ever increasing inflation, growing discontent over the lack of effective land reform and an unmanageable tax system.

The new prime minister said he will seek "short term solutions" in the problem of inflation and the resultant food shortages caused by merchants holding back staple supplies of such staples as beans, rice, sugar and salt in an effort to break government efforts to control their prices. The shortages sparked rioting during the past two weeks that left at least a dozen persons dead and 1,000 injured.

begin acting as if it had found a new enemy, a new target in the White House. In the circumstances, aside from making a few mild gestures which state clearly enough that his own moderate attitude, purposes and intentions remain, there is nothing in particular for the President to do, except to wait for business to recover its own sense, recover from its momentary fancy that a nice fat recession would serve the young President right, and get about business as usual, which ought to be good.

While doing this, while waiting for other people to come to their senses, the President has to take the taunts of some of his best columnist friends, to the effect that perhaps he himself has lost his nerve, so much finer and better than his own demonstration of qualities fit for executive office—that he knows enough not to act even after he has been abused for not making heroic decisions.

Truth in History
Among the many wonderful things that were going to happen this year, as we all visualized, was that from the vantage point of the closing effort of World War II, there would be the creation of one standard international history book, which would tell the objective truth for the children of all nations to study.

What we do know is that the opportunity for such a textbook is beginning to disappear in the new, over-inflated world which has become of the international history book. We presume it is being written, or has been written, by some international grouping of scholars, and that eventually, perhaps one or two small nations, might themselves in any way involved in any of the history recorded, might give such an international textbook some publication and experimental use.

Quite obviously, if we should attempt to lay down a fixed and final law for public conduct, in which we want to the other extreme, we then would be arbitrary and foolish as others seem when they demand action, action, action, on everything. The truth has to be that there are times for action and times for doing nothing, and that one virtue that is directly and to the point when that is called for, is just as great and as important as the other.

We do not have too much faith in the computer way of doing business. We have seen it booming in unbalanced compensation for some of its supposed miracles. We have seen it produce errors so ridiculous and glaring no mere human brain could possibly commit them.

INSURANCE BENEFITS

Insurance companies of Connecticut poured almost one-third of a billion dollars into the economic life stream of the state last year.

These figures were contained in an annual report by the Insurance Office of Connecticut, which said that benefits paid by the companies, exclusive of state taxes, represented a gain of four per cent over 1960.

The dollar benefits of the insurance companies to the state amounted to \$298,259,103, according to the report by Francis T. Ahearn, manager of the Information Office. "Reducing this figure to more easily understood terms, this means that in each business day more than \$1,153,000 flowed out to Connecticut citizens from the insurance companies, an average of \$2,402 each minute of the business day."

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than enough that Dick, Morey and Rose Marie produce more laughs for themselves than they do for their invisible boss.

"It's a funny thing," Morey was saying over lunch, "but I've been talking to people who have made it a deliberate point to see the show a second time around to catch up on the laughs they missed the first time because they were laughing so hard."

Morey quickly adds that he is one of these time-tested faithful viewers.

"I watch it to see Rose and Dick," he adds. "Me? I can see any time in the bathroom mirror."

Morey's descriptive eyebrows fly up at this point. "And it's a good thing I watch that pair. They've stolen so many laughs from me that I think it's a case for Bobby Kennedy."

But ask Morey who is the funniest comedian and comedienne and he gives full marks to the scene stealers mentioned above.

"We all have a good arrangement," the effervescent Mr. Amsterdam claims. "We've got a great deal of respect for each other as entertainers and people. On some comedy shows the people, who give the public the impression they are buddy buddy, are about as friendly towards each other as Joe Louis and Max Schmelling. But not on our show. We get along."

Morey's eyebrows flashed again. "Actually, we get such a kick out of working together we'd probably do it for nothing but the laughs. If the sponsor reads this, remember I'm under psychiatric care—sir."

A native of Chicago, Morey grew up in San Francisco. "But I stopped growing when I reached three feet," he adds, "because I liked the view from here."

The elder Amsterdam was first violinist with the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra and thought young Morey should get a classical musical education. Morey took up the cello and today is so proficient on it he plays to relax and also uses it as a comedy gimmick on occasion.

Morey recalls that he was always interested in show business. "I started my vaudeville career at 16 in Chicago and ended at 16 in that same city," he states. But he was determined to stay in show business.

"I got a job as an usher," he adds. "It was sort of show business. Besides, the uniform matched the color of my eyes, which were yellow at the time."

A few far sighted vaudeville house owners saw the comedy potential in young Morey and the years that followed saw him steadily employed in clubs and cabarets.

About this time other comedians discovered the nimble-witted Amsterdam and he was soon writing special material for them. The illustrious list of clients included Fanny Brice, Milton Berle, Jack Benny, Joe E. Brown, Eddie Cantor and Frank Morgan.

Ike, Hoover Talk On Wilson, Lincoln

Former Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower and Herbert Hoover will appraise two of their White House predecessors — Abraham Lincoln and Woodrow Wilson, respectively—in separate NBC Special Projects television programs next season.

The Union Central Life Insurance Company will sponsor the two half-hour shows, both of them produced by James Nelson, Donald B. Hyatt, Director of NBC Special Projects, was executive producer.

Hoover prepared his personal memoir, "The Ordeal of Woodrow Wilson," in New York last year at the age of 87. "It is a poignant study of Wilson, a Democrat, by a Republican who knew him intimately," Mr. Nelson said. It will be broadcast Tuesday, Sept. 25, from 10:30 to 11 p.m. EDT.

Talked to Cotton
Eisenhower's military memoir, "Eisenhower on Lincoln," was filmed in his study in Gettysburg, Pa., three weeks ago. There he spoke with historian Bruce Catton of Lincoln's role as commander-in-chief of the Union's armed forces.

Catton, author of many books on the Civil War, won the 1964 Pulitzer Prize for history with his "Stillness at Appomattox." The program will be broadcast early in 1963 in anticipation of Lincoln's Birthday (Feb. 12).

In evaluating Lincoln's military role, Eisenhower offers judgments on Union Generals George C. Meade, George B. McClellan, Ulysses S. Grant, W. T. Sherman and Philip H. Sheridan, as well as on Confederate President Jefferson Davis and Confederate Generals Robert E. Lee and Thomas J. (Stonewall) Jackson.

Seeking modern-day parallels, Eisenhower speaks of experiences as Commander of the Allied Forces in Europe during the Second World War. His reminiscences concern President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Generals George Marshall and George Patton, and Great Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

In a program differing sharply in technique from Eisenhower's, Hoover tells the story of what he terms the "ordeal and tragedy" of Woodrow Wilson.

As narrator, Hoover is sometimes on camera, sometimes off.

Archive motion picture film and historic still photographs supplement on-camera commentary by Hoover, who has drawn upon resources of the vast Hoover Library of War, Revolution and Peace at Stanford University for pictures and other documentary material used on screen.

His "tale of a President by a President" concentrates on the

years 1917-1921, ranging from the high hopes President Wilson had for a better world to the utter disillusion of those hopes.

It deals with the First World War, in which President Wilson led America to victory; the Treaty of Versailles and its consequences, and President Wilson's fight, against bitter opposition at home and abroad, for a League of Nations. It deals, too, with the great war waged against famine and pestilence in Europe. In that crusade against hunger and disease, President Wilson's commander was Hoover, who also was high in the councils that set the conduct of the First World War.

Robert K. Sharpe directed "The Ordeal of Woodrow Wilson—A Personal Memoir by Herbert Hoover," and Lynwood King directed "Eisenhower on Lincoln—A Military Memoir." Robert L. Garthwaite was associate producer and Silvio D'Alisera was film editor for both programs.

Morey felt that the greatest thing to happen to him in show business was his friendship with the late Will Rogers. The cowboy humorist took Morey under his wing and gave him some pointers the comedian has never forgotten—never be cruel to anyone even in jest.

"Mr. Rogers used to write to me a lot," Morey adds. "Mostly post-cards. I've got about a hundred of them in my home. I was the only guy in show business lucky enough to get a million dollars worth of comic material by mail."

The year 1930 found Morey in radio. Since then, he has been in and out of that medium. Morey was in the service during the war. He appeared on so many radio and TV programs as guest star that Fred Allen quipped: "The only thing we can turn on in our house without getting Morey Amsterdam is the water tap."

A few years ago, Leonard movie hard guy Sheldon Leonard and comedian Carl Reiner had an idea for a show about a trio of gag writers. They both thought Dick Van Dyke, who was then appearing on Broadway in "Bye, Bye Birdie," would be a natural for the part of "Rob Petrie," the safe and sane head comedy writer. Room Marie, they agreed, would be excellent in the role of "Sally," the wise-cracking female of the trio. But who was to be the other party?

Both Leonard and Reiner concluded that they would need a man who could act, dance, sing, charm viewers out of their chairs and, above all, rattle off funny jokes like a Gatling gun.

"Sally, couldn't dance," Morey slips, "so they wound up with me." "The Dick Van Dyke Show" was the comic hit of last season—one of the few shows to be renewed this year.

While not working 30 hours a day, Morey spends some time with his wife, Kay, and son Gregory, 18, and daughter, Cathy, 10. He plays golf and takes pictures, and he adds, "at least at myself in the mirror and wonder how lucky can a guy be."

Robert Ridgley plays Lt. Frank Corbin, who sometimes lets his concern for his men override Army regulations. Roland LaStarza, who once fought Rocky Marciano for the world's heavyweight title and is now an actor, portrays Pvt. Lucavich, big, brave and sentimental. Eddie Fontaine, night club and recording singer playing a straight dramatic role, is Pfc. D'Angelo, card-sharp, hustler and hero.

They're all there, the fighting men of World War II and some of their women, when chance affords. To anyone who lived through the war or read about it after it was over, "The Gallant Men" will bring nostalgia, smiles and tears. It's all there, except the Spam.
