Shortly before going into that meeting with his top military and diplomatic advisers, Kennedy told a news conference on Monday.

Mrs. Alden T. Grant, 508 N. Main St., lives in a neighborhood of good cooks who like to exchange recipes. Frozen Dessert, or Salad, and Lady Finger Dessert, are two favorites of hers that can be made a day ahead and frozen or refrigerated until served. Mrs. Grant included a recipe for Coconut Bars which pack well and are ideal for picnics.

Frozen Dessert or Salad
 2 small packages cream cheese
 1 small bottle marshmallow cherries
 1 pint heavy cream, whipped
 1 cup crushed pineapple
 1/2 cup of one lemon
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup cold water
 1 package unflavored gelatin
 Drain pineapple. Mix pineapple juice, sugar and lemon juice, and beat to boiling point. Dissolve gelatin in cold water and add to hot mixture. Cool. While mixture is cooling, mix cream cheese with juice from cherries. Cut cherries in small pieces and add to cream cheese. Add pineapple. Add to hot mixture and fold in whipped cream. Put in double ice cube tray and freeze. This recipe serves eight.

Mrs. Grant puts squares of salad on crisp lettuce, and serves it with hot rolls or pecan buns and coffee for bridge club refreshments.

Lady Finger Dessert
 1 package lady fingers
 2 tablespoons butter
 2 eggs
 1 package German style chocolate
 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
 1/2 cup hot water
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sugar, salt and water. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Add beaten egg yolks and butter. Cook, stirring intermittently. Cook Add beaten egg whites and vanilla. Put one half of split lady fingers on bottom of dish, approximately 10 x 6, and pour half of chocolate mixture over them. Put remaining lady fingers in dish, and top with remaining chocolate mixture. Refrigerate. Serve with whipped cream. This recipe serves six.

Coconut Bars
 1 cup all-purpose flour
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 Mix and bake in brownie pan for ten minutes at 350 degrees.

Topping
 2 eggs, beaten
 1 cup brown sugar
 3 tablespoons flour
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 cup coconut
 Beat eggs. Add sugar, flour and vanilla. Mix and spread on first mixture and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool and cut in bars.

particularly if it proves impossible to interest Khrushchev in negotiations on inspection of underground explosions.

Ambassador Arthur Dean, the top U.S. negotiator at the Geneva Disarmament Conference, returned to Washington last weekend for the final round of policy making conferences. He was due to start his trip back to Geneva today, traveling by way of New York.

At the conference Kennedy is understood to have ruled that Dean should give the Soviet Union, and the other Geneva powers, full information on scientific findings about the improvements in detection technique. These Kennedy made clear at his news conference, which will permit reductions in the amount of inspection necessary to police a test ban.

But Dean's instructions are not to indicate the amount of reduction unless the Soviets accept the principle of inspection, which would require a reversal in the position they have held for more than a year.

The President and his advisers also decided Wednesday that the United States would be prepared to accept a Soviet proposal to inspect—on a radical new line respecting the

In sentencing Judge Keogh and Kahana, Weinfeld said they had brought into disrepute their high public trusts. He said the crime for which they were convicted "struck at" and "cast a shadow" on the administration of justice.

Before sentence was imposed, Keogh rose to his feet and dramatically told the court: "In the presence of the ever-living God, I swear, maintain and proclaim to this honorable court my innocence of the charge."
