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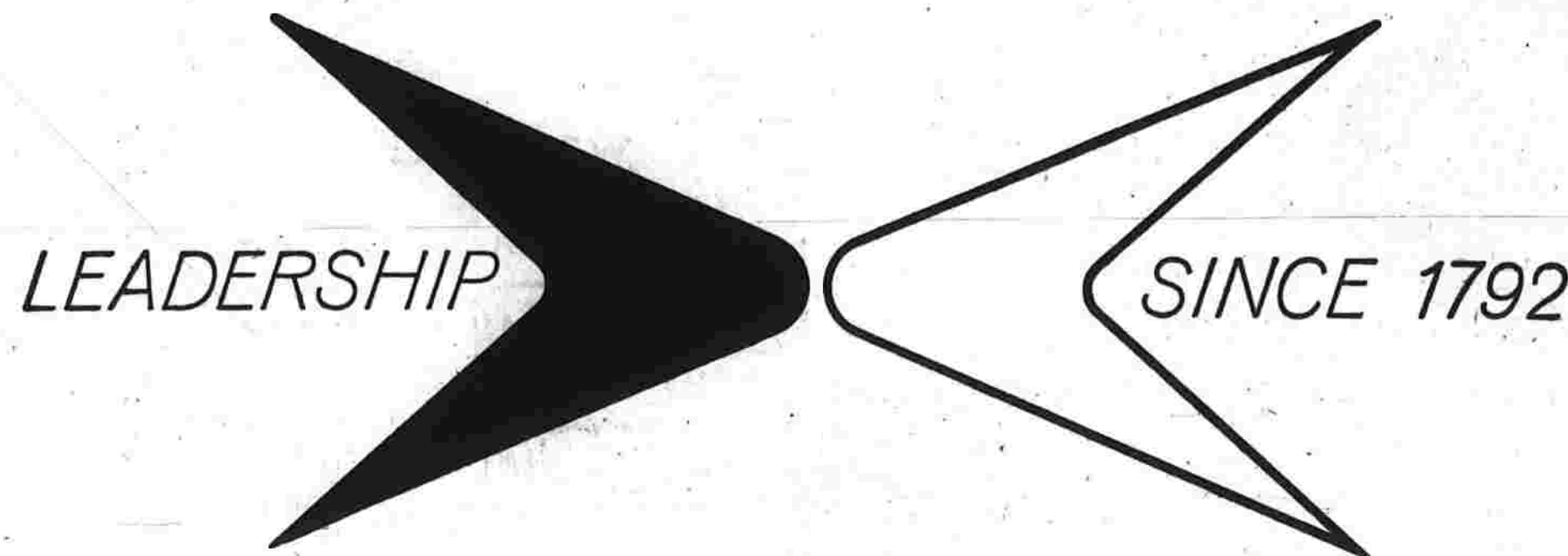

## Even More Than Ribicoff Celebrezze Picture Of Supreme Caution

WASHINGTON (AP)—Anthony J. Celebrezze sounds even more cautious than Abraham Ribicoff, the man he succeeded as secretary of health, education and welfare.

Ribicoff, a politician and now running for the Senate in Connecticut, never built any fire here that would make people mad at him.

Man of Compromise  
He was a very mild member of President Kennedy's Cabinet. And he was quite a man for compromise. For example, the way he was willing to compromise with the conservatives in Congress on Kennedy's plan of medical care for the aged.

So far the most distinguishing mark of Celebrezze, five-time mayor of Cleveland, has been a great unwillingness since getting his new assignment to tick his neck out even a little bit on anything.

After the President had picked him, but before the Senate approved his nomination, Celebrezze declined to say where he stood on the big national issues.

This was understandable since he still didn't have the job and the Senate could be unpredictable. But he's here now, with the job, and Tuesday at his first Washington news conference he had his first chance to say where he stood on the two biggest issues involving his department.

These were federal aid to public elementary schools (but not parochial schools) and medical care for the aged.

When the conference was over, Celebrezze still hadn't said anything to make anybody mad at him or really to indicate exactly where he stood on those two touchy problems.

One of Kennedy's earliest acts as president was to propose federal aid to education, leaving out parochial schools. This got Catholic leaders angry.

It would seem that between then and now Celebrezze, particularly since he was mayor of Cleveland and had school problems, could have had time to study the aid-to-education plan backward and forward.

Study Not Completed  
But he told his news conference he hasn't completed a study of the problem.

He praised the Kennedy medical care plan on the grounds that its cost would be financed through Social Security taxes on workers covered by Social Security rather than at the expense of the general taxpayer.

This was a little hard to follow since the Social Security system now covers nine out of 10 working Americans, most of whom pay income taxes and Social Security taxes.

Celebrezze said he thinks there will always be a need for the Kerr-Mills program of medical aid through the public assistance program. But he said his full effectiveness is being delayed by lack of action by the legislatures to bring their states into it.

The Kennedy administration explanation for proposing its program was that the Kerr-Mills arrangement was much too inadequate to meet the needs of people over 60.

But the Kennedy program got another in Congress, along with Ribicoff's proposed compromise.

Nevertheless, Celebrezze said "something must be done" and "I am sure the next session of Congress will come out with some program."

At this point it seems fair to conclude: Celebrezze would like to avoid

### Board Enthusiastic About College Plans

The board of directors indicated last night not only its willingness to help establish two college programs in the town, but its enthusiasm for the projects. In an extended session of the regular meeting, the directors voted approval of recommendations made by a special committee, to allow the University of Connecticut to set up a four-year college in the town, and to establish a two-year community college under the sponsorship of the board of education.

The directors urged the board of education to take whatever action is necessary at the board's Aug. 10 meeting, to present the idea of a community college to the town's voters at the Nov. 6 election.

Voters will be asked to approve the expenditure of some \$28,500 for the community college. Preparations for the referendum must be completed 60 days in advance, or by Sept. 6.

Approval of the UConn branch by the voters is not needed, though the board of directors will have to approve an appropriation of about \$10,000 for janitorial service, light and heat, at the high school during the afternoon and evening of the college in session.

The directors gave hearty approval to the prospect of the \$10,000 appropriation.

Republican Director of Thomas Bailey said the community college is "the beginning of larger things" and pledged the directed support of the financial responsibilities.

Mayor Harold A. Turkington said he would call a special meeting of the directors to give formal approval to the community college. In the event the board of education decides this is necessary, Republican Director Donald Conn added his praise to the committee.

The services, the caquet will be held and carried a few yards away to a crypt, where Marilyn will be entombed.

The three principals in charge of the arrangements yesterday night explained that the rites were made private "so that she can go to her final resting place in the quiet she has always sought."

The statement was issued by ex-husband Joe DiMaggio, brother of Marilyn's three husbands: Dennis Mitchell, her half-brother, and Ines Melson, her former business manager. They said "we could not in conscience ask a personality to attend without perhaps offending many others. And for this reason alone we have kept the number of persons to a minimum."

"Please, all of you, remember the day, sweet Marilyn and say a prayer of farewell within the confines of your hearts," she said.

A flurry of reports about the dead actress' funeral and personal affairs circulated through Hollywood and elsewhere.

There was a published report in Mexico City that Marilyn killed herself because of unrequited love for a 30-year-old Mexican screen writer, Jose Bolanos. This was denied emphatically by Miss Monroe's personal representatives.

They said she dated the Mexican casually for a few weeks.

Another report said the actress died with less than \$100 in her savings account and only \$4,000 in her personal checking account.

Her attorney, Milton Rudin, said that the actress kept in her checking account only enough for current expenses, but was to have received a half-million dollars over the last two years alone as part of her percentage from the highly successful movie, "Some Like It Hot." She also had firm offers for at least another million.

However, despite the fact that Marilyn's movies had grossed more than \$200 million over 12 years (and returns are still coming in), she did not make what "the industry" calls "big money" until recent years.

She did not ask for alimony from DiMaggio or her third husband, playwright Arthur Miller, who has since remarried. Her first husband, James Dougherty, whom she married when she was 16, and divorced soon after, is a policeman in North Hollywood.

Although she nearly always played the role of a blonde and light-headed sexy blonde, Marilyn was known to intimates as a brooding, delicate woman who viewed the world with the uncase of a self-conscious teen-ager.

The New York Post reported she tried to commit suicide at least four times—two before she was 19, once five years ago and again four years ago.

Police have ended their investigation into her death, concluding merely that there was no evidence of foul play. It may be weeks before the coroner's office makes an official finding, the final page in the story of a character who did not die happily ever after.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The complete list of persons invited to funeral services for Marilyn Monroe has been kept secret. Spokesmen said "lightly more than 15" were invited.

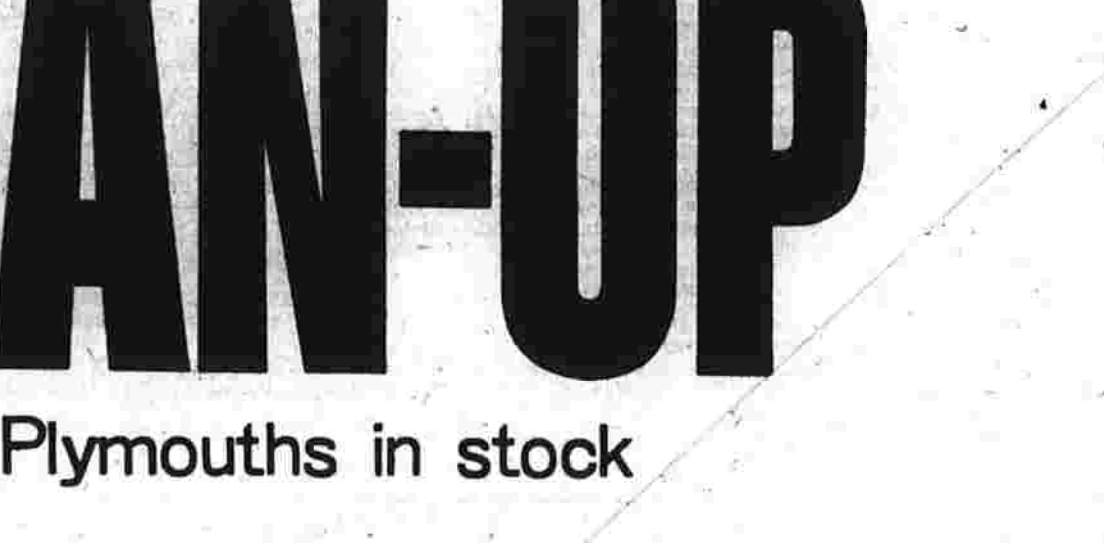

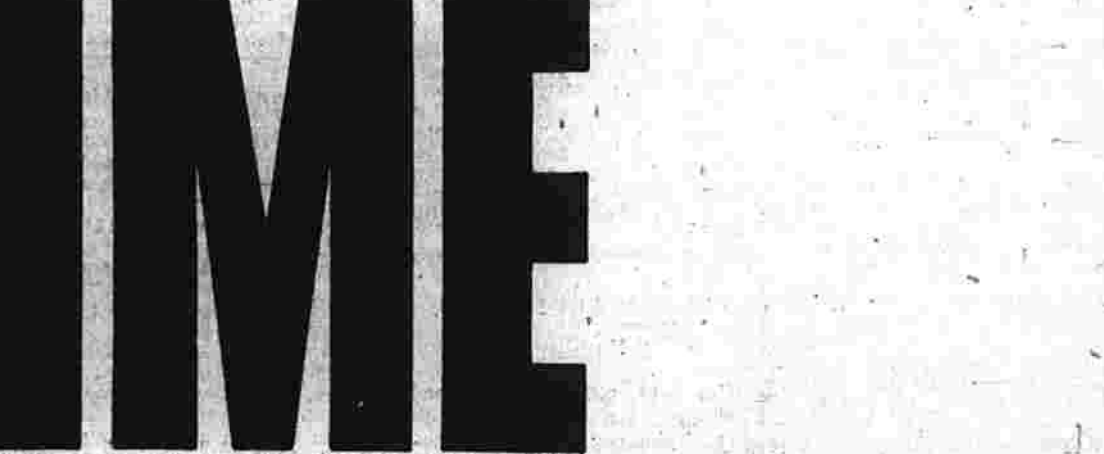
