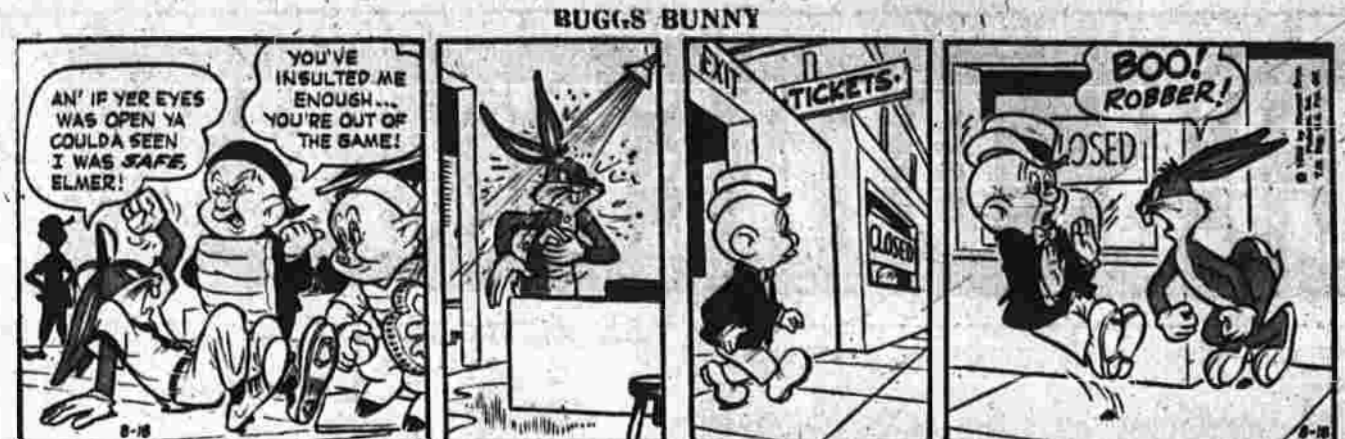

Salazar's Sister Once Movie Star in Cuba

A red-haired and statuesque former Cuban movie star and international entertainer, her husband and sons, visited in Manchester this week at the home of her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Jose Salazar, 54 Tracy Dr.

Mrs. Laila Salazar McIntire, born in Cuba of French and Spanish ancestry, has a history almost as exciting as the roles she portrayed in movies and on stage. She left her island home at the age of 12 to attend Eden Hall School of the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Philadelphia, Pa. After graduation at age 16 she began to cultivate a serious interest in music.

At the insistence of her family she returned home, and studied at the International Conservatory and with private teachers in Cuba. She sang with the Philharmonic Choir and the Choral Society in Havana. When she was 19 she returned to the United States and attended the Duchesne Finishing School in New York City and studied voice with George Ferguson, former chairman of the Metropolitan Opera Co. In addition to singing in light opera in New York she performed on goodwill broadcasts to South America for the Inter-American Affairs organization.

The lure of Hollywood and its opportunities appealed to Mrs. McIntire, and, after spending two years in New York, she left for Los Angeles where she studied voice with Herbert Wall, eminent teacher of movie stars. The young mezzo soprano was given a role in the world premiere of "Song of Norway" in San Francisco with Metropolitan singers Ira Petina and Walter Cassell, and played with the show when it returned to Los Angeles. Mrs. McIntire was offered the post of understudy to Miss Petina when the show moved east to Broadway but was called home to Cuba because of illness in the family.

Before leaving the United States she had taken a screen test with Walt Disney studios. The results of the test were sent to her in Cuba, along with an offer to appear under contract with Walt Disney. Deciding against returning to the States, Mrs. McIntire took up her career in Havana and sang under contract with CMQ, Cuba's largest radio and, in 1950, its first television station. She also recorded traditional folk music for Panart, accompanying herself on a guitar, and starred in "Cuba Canta y Bolla," a movie.

She later accepted singing engagements abroad and appeared at the Casa Blanca in Rio de Janeiro, in the Super Club in Paris and at Ciro's, a favorite haunt of Princess Margaret, in London. While in France she sang in Spanish, French and English on a radio program for Radio Nationale. After a tour of South America and Europe she returned home and in 1952 married Robert L. McIntire, then a Sears, Roebuck executive in Havana.

In 1950, when circumstances resulting from the Castro regime forced the family to come to the United States, Mrs. McIntire played the role of the countess in the Miami Beach Opera Guild production of "Andrea Chenier," with Renata Tebaldi as guest star. Recalls Castro Take-over Her husband accepted a position with Sears Roebuck, in Fort Worth, Tex., and Mrs. McIntire appeared with the Little Theatre—Cavalcadea's production of "The King and I" playing the part of the

female lead, "Mrs. Anna." She and her husband now appear in little theater productions in Orange, Tex. Robert McIntire was born in Philadelphia, Pa., was a Navy pilot in World War II, and was manager of the Sears store in Havana in October 1950 when it was confiscated by followers of Castro. He recalls the incident. "On the morning of Oct. 26, 1950, about three-quarters of my employees reported for work in military dress, a delegation approached me and announced that I was to leave the safe open and depart as the store now belonged to the people and the people's government. No free enterprise was welcome in Cuba at this time, he said.

Both in Dramatics McIntire, whose wife and sons had left Cuba shortly before, was finally allowed to leave in November 1950 with five dollars, American money, in his possession. All of the family's possessions, including paintings, one of which was a portrait of their son, heirloom silver, and crystal, was confiscated by the people's government. He is now manager of Sears, Roebuck in Orange, and shares his wife's love of dramatics. He has appeared in leading roles with the Little Theater of Orange in "Sell, Book and Candle," and "Pajama Game." While in Manchester, McIntire was interviewed by his brother-in-law, who presents a program, "See Challenge," Sundays at 10 p.m. on radio station WINF. The tape will be heard Sunday, Aug. 26.

Nelson Family Starts 11th TV Year in Fall

"The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet" begins its second decade of telecasting with its fall bow Sept. 27 on ABC-TV.

Including its long run on radio, the weekly half-hour family situation comedy series is actually starting its 19th consecutive year on the air. It thus re-establishes itself as one of the most durable and popular programs in the history of the broadcasting industry.

Ozzie and Harriet Nelson, with their progeny David and Rick, are synonymous with the American family image both on and off television.

There is a unique history. The Nelson boys—with their parents much in evidence—are perhaps the only people who have literally grown up before the eyes of millions of weekly viewers.

The boys joined their parents on the radio show in 1948 when David was 11 and Rick 5 years old. Ozzie has portrayed himself on the show, produced and directed it, and also been its chief writer from the beginning. And Harriet has played herself on the series since the outset.

Today, David, 25, and Rick, 22, in addition to their TV series, are a fraternal couple of burgeoning show biz talent. Bobby-sox idol Rick is a movie actor and a rock 'n' roll singer with eight "gold records" to his credit. Married brother Dave, who is also known to movie audiences, is an accomplished trapeze artist.

Ozzie and Harriet don't take "Ozzie and I both feel," says Harriet, "that parents should think twice before taking boys for their children. Just as parents shouldn't always get the blame when offspring turn out badly, they shouldn't automatically take credit for their success."

"We believe a child is born with a capacity for success or failure. Perhaps parents' principal responsibility is to help mold character."

Harriet is amused when she receives letters asking advice on "how to handle teen-agers."

"When our boys were little, I was told, 'Wait until they become teen-agers... that's when the trouble starts!'" she laughed. "I'm still waiting because so far nothing alarming has happened."

It is obvious that Ozzie and Harriet haven't forgotten their own youth.

"Ozzie and I wonder sometimes if perhaps a lot of folks have awfully short memories. I'm sure some who are so disturbed over rock 'n' roll were knocking themselves out 30 years or so ago with the Charleston. But do you think our generation would ever admit

we turned out wrong? Not on your life!"

Sons and daughters often become uncommunicative during their teens. Dave and Rick were no exception.

"Ozzie and I learned that the less we asked about our sons' private affairs the more they told us... when they were ready," Harriet recalls.

The Nelsons are together much more than most families, and Mrs. Nelson observes: "I'm sure our sons have a greater understanding of and respect for their father because for the past 14 years they've watched him work day after day. They see first-hand the many problems he must solve as producer, director, chief writer and actor of our family show. If at the end of a day Ozzie is tired, they know why."

"Ozzie and I are careful about respecting the boys' privacy. We're always around if they need our advice, but we never 'pry' into their personal affairs."

Although the Nelsons are a closely knit family in their personal life, just as they are on the air, Ozzie and Harriet have gone along with their sons in their desire to have living and/or rehearsal quarters of their own.

For instance, before Dave married June Blair, who is also his TV wife, he had his own house in the Hollywood Hills. Rick divides his time between the family home and a place of his own—a small rehearsal cottage located behind the family home.

"Harriet and I had the cottage built several years ago when Rick's recordings first started to catch the public fancy, and music began to take up more and more of his time," Ozzie explains.

"It's really no more than a music studio—a place where he can keep his instruments, rehearse new songs and to work out musical arrangements."

"It was partly self-defense," Harriet adds. "We had to get some sleep."

Typically, Ozzie and Harriet have allowed their brood to carry a major share of responsibility. As much as they could handle, in fact, Ozzie figured that if the kids weren't permitted to make decisions when they were young, they might not be able to make them when they were adults.

"Actually, Mom and Dad haven't

treated us as children many years," alleges Dave. "Maybe that's because Rick and I have been earning our own way for more than 14 years."

Says bread-winner Rick who has picked up a wealth of experience as well as a bundle of cash

from his long-run radio and TV work, "Actually I seldom think of money. Other things are more important to me. Like doing a good job in front of the camera or on a record. Anyway Dad always said that if you do the very best you can, then make that little extra

of fort, money in the long run will take care of itself."

Harriet summed by saying, "Our working together has worked out wonderfully. If I had the last 35 years as Mrs. Ozzie Nelson to live over again, I wouldn't change a thing."

"Each age the boys reach is the most fascinating. The best is yet to come. Someday they'll have families of their own, and I'll be a grandmother. I can't wait."

Hollywood on TV

By KARL MALDEN (Sitting in today for Erskine Johnson) HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — A lot has been written about "second bananas" in comedy shows. The term, as I guess most everyone knows, derives from the supporting comedian in burlesque or variety, a number of whom, like Art Carney, have gone on to greater heights.

Little has been said, however, about second bananas in the area of "serious" drama. I include myself in this category and for good reason.

I've played second banana so many times I refer to them, if I may be permitted a pun, as "fruitful" assignments because they have added wonders to my bank account.

I've played "second banana" to Marlon Brando, Gary Cooper, Burt Lancaster and Tony Curtis.

I recently completed what amounts to a real second banana role in the old vaudeville sense as Rosalind Russell's costar in the film version of the Broadway musical hit, "Gypsy."

This position in the industry has also led to my first visit to Europe. I'll be tolling about the continent filming "Champagne Flight" for MGM.

I'm happy about it all because I faced the fact early in my career that I was no leading man. Nature had taken care of that but had compensated for it by giving me just enough talent or lack of it or a combination of both to get me early and very solid recognition in the theater.

In films especially I've discovered a second banana has a lot of advantages that some of my more

handsome associates in this business of acting do not enjoy.

I do not have to worry, among other things, about a receding hairline or whether or not old Father Time is taking his inevitable toll on my physiognomy. I just try to keep in trim and I don't neglect my diet.

I am aware of the fact that what I have to sell to producers and the paying customers is a certain kind of skill at my trade I've picked up over the years, not a profile or bobby sox appeal.

I don't have to concern myself as top name stars do with whether or not I will be able to convince a producer that my name and box office appeal can carry a two or three million dollar picture.

A star's ability to do this is judged by his drawing power in his last film, which places an even greater burden on the actor—because he can hardly afford to make a mistake in choosing a role.

There are, of course, certain disadvantages. I'm usually the heavy, or the best friend, and even if Marilyn Monroe did show up I'd never be cast as her lover. I'm never heroic in swashbuckling style and the fan magazines never invent trick headlines about me.

Still, as far as I'm concerned, second banana is the best spot in the bunch.
