SAFETY PLAY PROVES CONTRACT

By Alford Sheinwold

Safety plays are seldom extra tricks in tournaments. The extra trick is so important that the contract is usually good.

When this hand was played in the recent national tournament, only 14 of 36 North-South pairs reached the small slam in spades.

An experienced declarer would know on looking at the dummy that most pairs would fail to bid the slam. Therefore making the slam would be good enough there was no need to try for an over-trick.

With the club opening lead, South should do what he can to safeguard the contract. The one trick play is to win the first trick with the ace of clubs and then lead a spade to the ace.

When only small spades drop and the ace of spades is held by South, get back to dummy with a heart ace leads another trump. This happens to give East a trump trick, but South has no further trumps.

Advantages of taking the ace of spades first is that West may have a singleton king of spades and he will get to dummy and raise the spade. If he declares later leads out the queen of spades he will lose a second trump trick to the jack of spades.

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What the world probably can do, in the aviation field, said Lundberg, is to develop supersonic aircraft which will make commercial flights possible at a speed faster than sound.

His reasons for suggesting that the world rather deliberately hold back on this technological advance were, he said, his belief that the world would be unable to handle the waves of an ocean liner would cause "severe disturbance" to people on the ground, and his fear of the possible effect of cosmic radiation on crew and passengers.

"The saving of merely a few hours by flying supersonic cannot possibly justify even rare future cases of malformation or disease such as leukemia," he said.

The Swedish research official realized he was making something of an off-beat recommendation. But he said not only aviation, but the whole of mankind, now face something of a crossroads.

"Someone has said," he explained, "that if a difficult problem can be solved at all, someone will solve it."

"That is possible, but I think we should ask: 'Should it be solved?' It might be greater to refrain than to achieve."

"The crossroad mankind has reached implies that we make more and more often will have to make a choice between achieving spectacular technical progress or refraining from it on ethical grounds."

In short, should we do everything we find we can do? Must we do everything we can do? Or do we have a choice?

The answer, we suspect, is that sooner or later, as the human beings we are, we must and will try to do everything conceivably within our technical power to do.

If that much has to be conceded, it leaves us with the problem of the next stage. Are we ever going to be able to stop doing something we can do, because, weighing in the balance, we find the net result harmful and uninvited? To that there is not yet any clear suggestion of an answer, but merely a belief that some day, man, who keeps on conquering everything else, must some day risk himself as well.

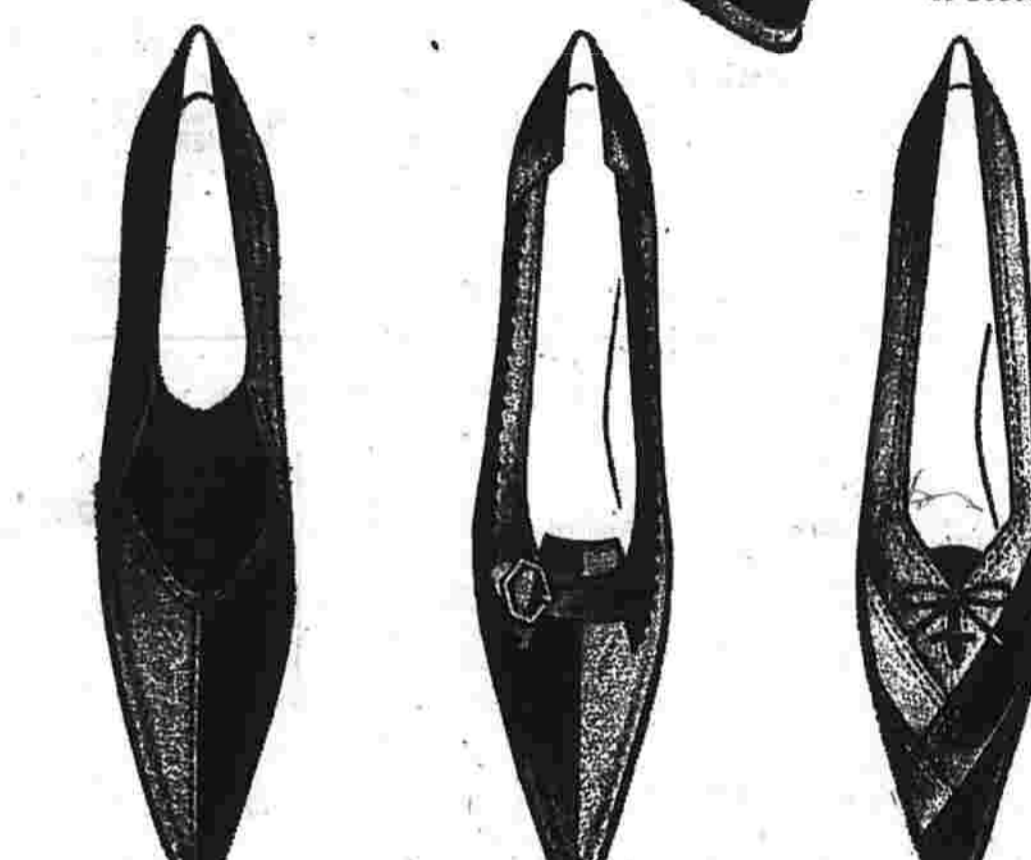
