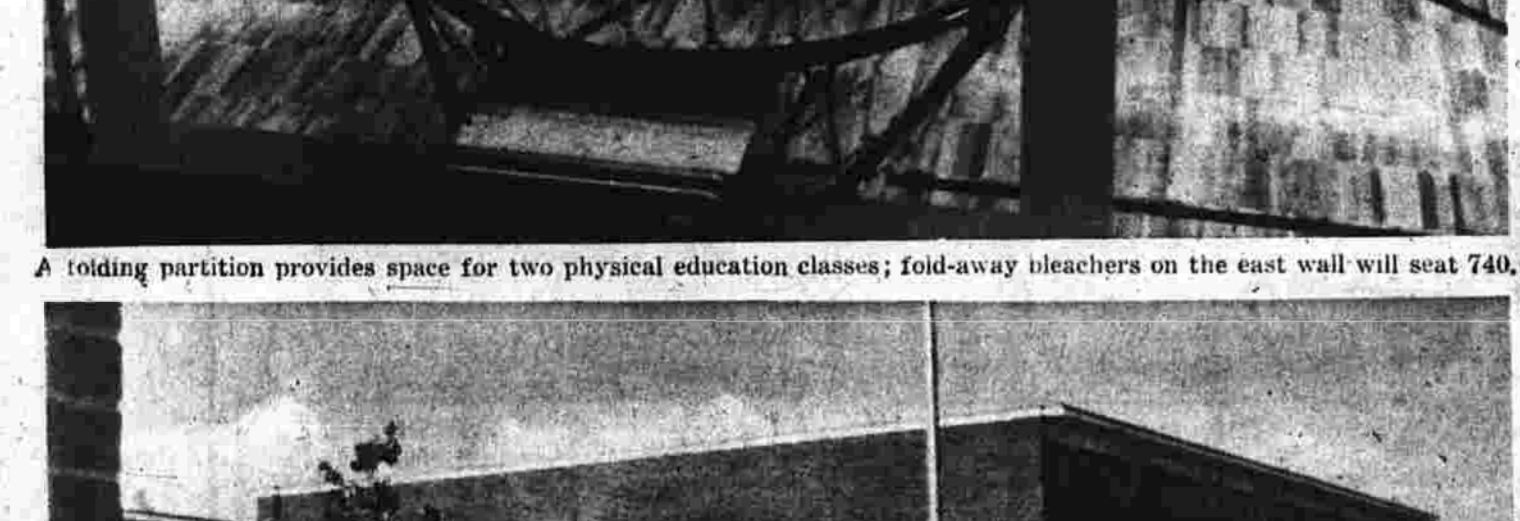

Under the arrangements agreed on, he said, shorter and simpler questionnaires had been prepared and the data was to be compiled by the General Accounting Office in a way designed to prevent disclosure of production costs of the individual companies.

Kefauver said this procedure had been worked out as a matter of protection and accommodation to the steel companies and that he thought it would be satisfactory to them.

But he said the four companies declining to respond to the subcommittee's subpoenas had shown an obstinate refusal throughout to cooperate.

Kefauver maintained he has taken the position that, despite the safeguards referred to by Kefauver, disclosure of their unit production costs would be damaging competitively both at home and abroad.

Kefauver said that after he received word Thursday that executives of the companies would not appear today, he had telegraphed them a warning that he would regard this as contempt.

Kefauver said the subpoenas demanded data was pertinent to the subcommittee's jurisdiction over antitrust legislation.

Subpoenas were issued last April after major steel producers announced a short-lived "freeze" on production cost figures and prices.

The freeze was rescinded after President Kennedy threw the full weight of the government against it.

"Kefauver said at the time that production cost figures were essential to an intelligent evaluation of the need for price increases."

Ten days ago the subcommittee voted 5-3, with the Democratic majority overriding Republican members, to serve "second subpoenas" to the four companies refusing to comply with the original demand for unit production costs.

The new subpoenas named the principal executive officers of the companies as well as the companies, and directed them to appear personally.

The steel companies contend disclosure of their unit costs would damage them competitively, both at home and abroad.

They also have challenged the subcommittee's jurisdiction, arguing in effect that the information is none of its business and would serve no legislative purposes.

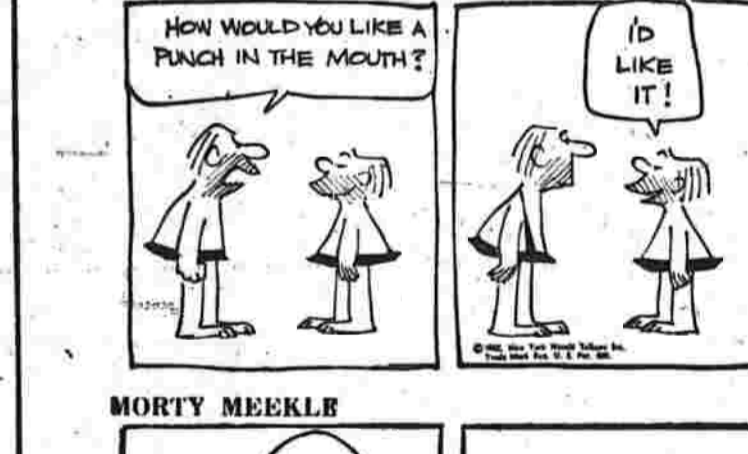

397 Fire Alarms Answered in Year

Town firemen responded to 397 calls during the 1962-63 fiscal year, an increase of 91 over the previous year.

The annual report of Chief W. Clifford Mason indicates that the value of property at risk in all fires was \$2,162,525, and damage estimates are \$173,830.

Two men joined the department and four men attended the Fire Fighting School at New Haven. The new audible alarm was installed during the year.

When the council-manager form of government was adopted by the town in 1947, the charter provided for a Town Fire Department. It was merely a "paper" department, however, until Feb. 1, 1957, when the South Manchester Fire Department consolidated with the town. The SMFD voted 193-143 at its Nov. 15, 1956 meeting to turn over to the town its assets, liabilities and obligations.

Today the department includes 25 officers and firemen. In 1947, the SMFD manpower was 15.

Project Approval Tops TRC's Year

The activities of the Town Redevelopment Commission resulted in federal approval for the North End Redevelopment project on Aug. 3.
