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### Merged Cafeteria Program Fails to Produce Economies

The economies expected when public school cafeterias were combined last fall "obviously have not materialized" in the last fiscal year, says an accounting firm which recently audited the cafeteria accounts.

While income increased from \$279,019.85 to \$283,376.71 in a year, expenses rose from \$281,051.50 to \$295,367.45 in the same period, says the firm of Carey and Rhoades.

The money money left at the June 30 closing of the 1962 fiscal year totaled \$34,472.81.

With the merged cafeteria program, Manchester High School's lost money program dropped in income from \$117,240.93 in 1961 to \$115,850.13 in 1962. Its total expenses rose by \$2,991.29 to \$118,339.39, and its reserve dropped by \$2,524.26 to \$10,837.31.

At Daniel Junior High School, income increased from \$38,117.71 in 1961 to \$47,384.08 in 1962, but an audit expense of \$49,318.07, compared with \$49,419.69 that left a reserve of \$6,440.49 in 1962, a drop of \$1,253.39 from the previous year.

Thimling Junior High wound up without a reserve in the red by \$2,664.06. Before consolidation, the 1961 reserve was \$2,023.20. Income dropped in 1962 to \$26,537.70 from \$20,349.49 in 1961. Expenses were \$28,548.39 in 1962, compared with \$20,987.69 in 1961.

The combined elementary schools ended the 1962 fiscal year in the red by \$1,206.80, while they left a reserve of \$5,900.42 in 1961. The total income dropped to \$92,479.29 in 1962 from \$94,147.32 in 1961, and expenses were \$98,221.90, compared with \$87,553.53.

Last fall, the board of education approved the merged cafeteria program, but the board of education should be consolidated under the direction of the cafeteria director in an effort to save money. 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### Without Private Ownership Free Enterprise Fails In Yugoslavia's Trial

**BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)**—Yugoslavia's experiment in free enterprise without private ownership is not going well—apparently due to too much enterprise.

Yugoslav exports failed to reach expectations. Imports went beyond. Foreign debt approached the billion-dollar mark.

In May, Tito stepped in to put a finger on the party executive.

The economic momentum of his Communist country has slowed and his government has taken drastic measures to set things right again. The drive is beginning to show initial signs of success.

Yugoslav Communists are determined to prove that their kind of decentralized socialism can work better than the Kremlin's tightly controlled and centralized system.

"Social Property"

Following Tito's break with Moscow in 1948, Yugoslavia dropped rigid central controls on its economy, shops and industries became the "social property" of municipalities where they are located.

Workers' councils took control of the individual companies—called "enterprises" for the sake of distinction from capitalist firms—and named directors to undertake executive duties.

Many enterprises began going concern. Others struggled along, kept alive by municipalities still willing to lose a few pennies.

Some enterprises developed life holding companies, setting up subsidiaries to market products.

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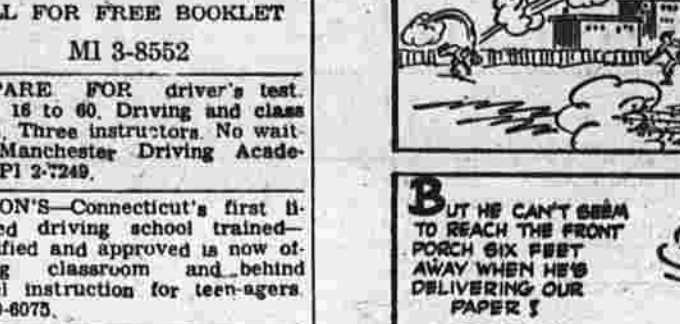

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600 Dead, Missing As Storms Smash Barcelona Region

BARCELONA, Spain (AP)—Flash floods and hurricane winds ripped overhanging a hilly region near Barcelona and a government spokesman said more than 600 persons are dead or missing.

The spokesman said 248 bodies have been recovered and 265 persons are unaccounted for, he said. Fresh thunderstorms continued across the area, where several hours of rain and high winds smashed many homes and other buildings.

Officials said the death toll might rise. A band of 30 Gypsies was caught under a bridge in Llobregat, 10 miles from Barcelona. Sixteen were washed away. Barcelona, situated on the Mediterranean coast, is 100 miles east of Madrid, Spain's largest seaport and chief industrial and commercial center. It is the largest city in the Spanish government television station said at 2 p.m. that the death toll was "somewhat more than 100."

Officials have compared the disaster to one near Zamora in 1959, when a dam burst and washed out an entire village with a loss of more than 200 lives.

The floods struck a few hours after the windup of a Barcelona festival, named Nuestra Señora de la Merced—Our Lady of Mercy—which runs for a week each fall. The event had included a song festival with entrants from all over the city.

The victims included families who were sleeping. Their houses were under a bridge in Llobregat, 10 miles from Barcelona. Sixteen were washed away.

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
