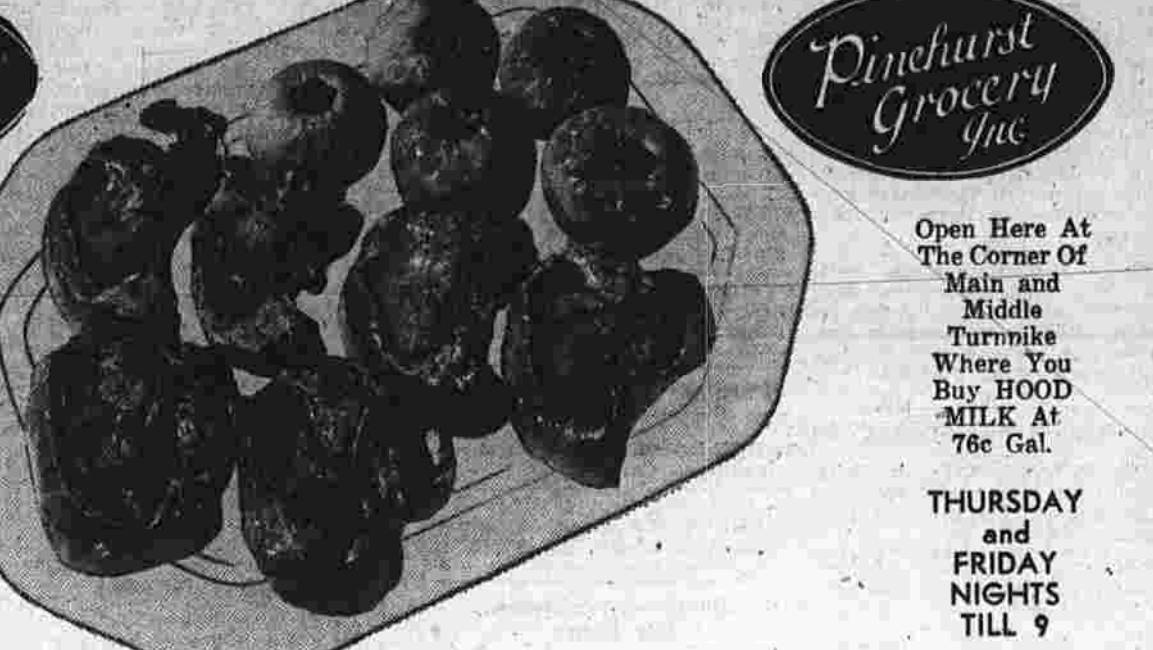

Barnett Ignores Summons To Contempt Case Hearing

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—Gov. Ross Barnett of Mississippi failed to appear as the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals started contempt hearings for him today.

Previously court sources had said since the charge was civil contempt, Barnett could be tried in absentia.

Barnett has three times defied federal court orders directing that Negro James H. Meredith be enrolled at the 11-year-old all-white state university.

Chief Justice Elbert P. Tuttle of Atlanta, Ga., presided. Washington (AP)—The Justice Department, denying reports of a weekend truce between Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy and Gov. Ross Barnett, declared today it will "proceed" with its plans in the University of Mississippi desegregation crisis.

Edwin Guthman, information officer, stated the department's position after receiving reports from Mississippi that a truce had resulted from telephone conversations between Kennedy and Barnett.

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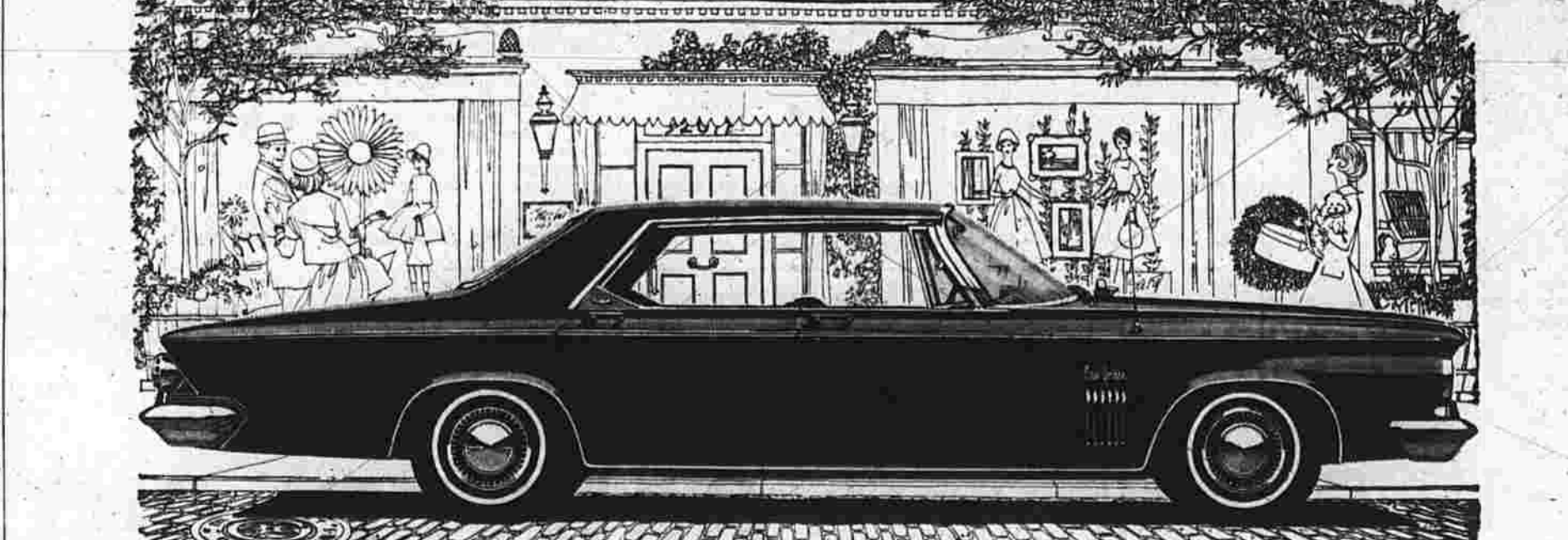

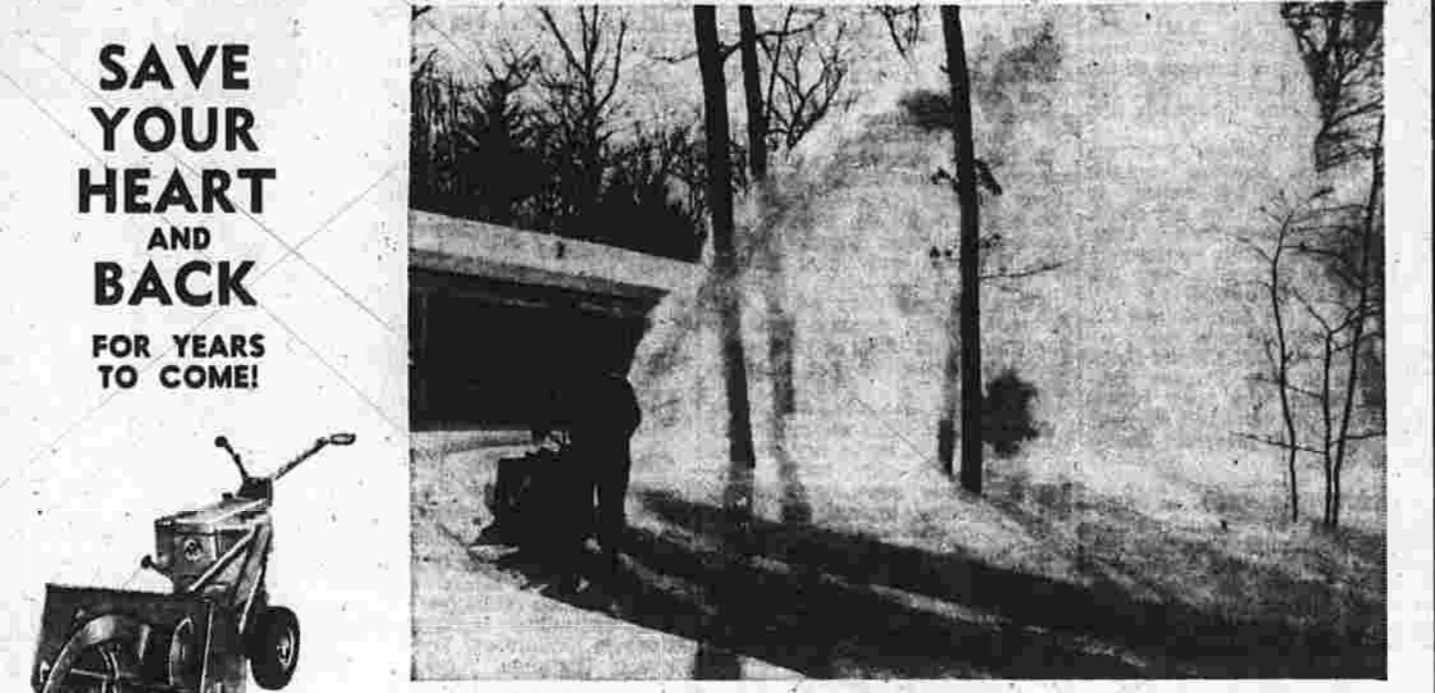

The Rev. Myron R. French, 88, retired minister, died last night at the Manchester Memorial Hospital. The Rev. Mr. French was born Jan. 1, 1873, in Barkhamsted, and lived in Manchester for 2 1/2 years. He held pastorates in Connecticut, and in northern New York, Nebraska, Iowa and Vermont confederates.

Tax List Filing Due by Nov. 1

A reminder of the need for filing personal property tax lists next month has been issued by Montague White, Vermont assessor.

Real estate and registered motor vehicles do not have to be declared.

School Board Hopefuls Guided by Party Lines

Republican and Democratic candidates for the board of education have to party lines last night in voicing their convictions on education, despite weakening protests from the Republicans that political considerations have no place in education.
In a quasi-candidates session sponsored by the Manchester League of Women Voters at Manchester High School, political remarks were made on bonding, milk, and budget cuts.
After Democratic candidate William Collins said that \$500,000 might be needed to build a school in the Highland Park area, \$100,000 to prepare plans for a new school in the Spring St. area, Republican candidate John R. G. Rottner said that Republicans refrain from bonding for such projects as storm drains in order to reduce the price of milk from five cents to three cents per half-gallon.
Candidate Collins snapped back that the Republicans support current storm drains at the expense of current education needs.
Republican candidate Edward Rottner said that Republicans support the quality of service the town has been enjoying, he said, and not to fix the milk price.
Democratic candidate Mrs. Katherine Bourn had asked for removal of the restriction which resulted in a reduction of the price of milk to 3 cents per half-gallon. She said she was responsible for the town's application for a higher federal subsidy, thereby reducing the price another penny.
Candidate Glensay said the Republican favor placing the question of a community college, financed by town taxes, before the electorate. He and Republican candidate Mrs. Jean Stueck agreed that the community college appropriation should be separate from the appropriation for elementary and secondary education.
Democratic candidate Belmont Schaffer said the electorate should have a great deal more information before deciding the college question in a referendum Nov. 6.
Candidate Rottner said a citizen advisory council had been appointed to enlist town support.

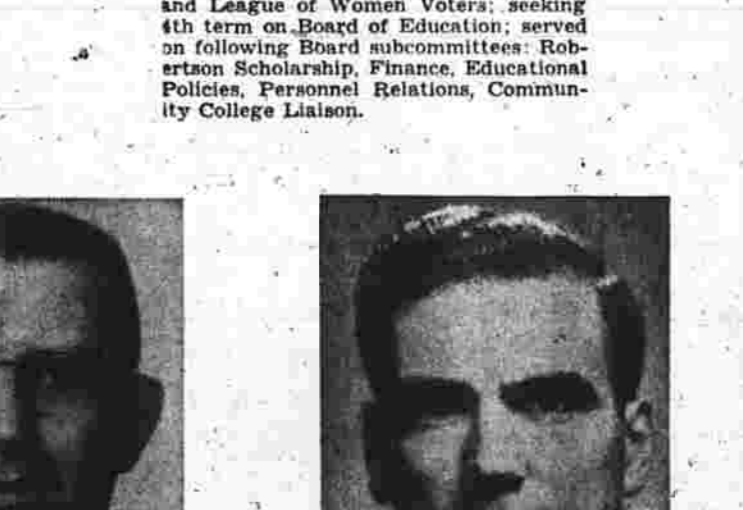

Charter Questions For Monday Vote

Town voters will be asked to Monday or no Monday elections in the town's best interests.

Here, in the same order as they will appear on the voting machines, are the proposed questions.

Question 1 would make the board of directors responsible for establishing rules and regulations governing personnel policy and give the board power to name the general manager as town personnel manager.

Question 2 would clarify the town's authority to issue bonds to include both water and sewer installations and for additional pumping stations.

Question 3 would make clear that the town can assess benefit property owners for lateral sewer piping to property lines, for trench sewers and for additional pumping stations.

Question 4 would give the welfare department authority to enter into and file welfare reimbursement agreements and liens.

Question 5 would give the general manager authority to release welfare reimbursements and liens.

Question 6 would require the immediate removal from office of any officer appointed by either the directors or the town manager, convicted of a felony.

Question 7 would allow the directors to permit a town official of employe to do business with the town upon written certification.

UofC Schedules Lecture Series On Cold War

The University of Connecticut next week launches an unusual lecture series of special interest to Hartford area adults who have been baffled and frustrated by the intrigue and complexities of the Cold War.

Entitled, "The Fabric of Cold War Diplomacy," the lecture series goes under way Tuesday at 8:30 at the Wadsworth Armsroom. Five UofC specialists will deliver six lectures on alternating Tuesdays through Dec. 4.

The non-credit program will focus on the Cold War in terms of history, economics and political science. Opening the series this Tuesday will be Dr. Louis Gerzon, UofC associate professor of political science and an expert on ethnic groups in America. Dr. Gerzon will discuss "The Foreign Policy of the New Frontier."

Two weeks later, Dr. Norman Kogan, also an associate professor of political science and author of several books on Italian government, will explore "Western Hopes vs. Militant Communism."

Dr. Curt F. Beck, an assistant professor of political science and speaker in the series, will evaluate "Divided Germany: The Problem of Eastern Europe."

The fourth lecture will be delivered by Dr. Ford Singler, an assistant professor of economics and presently a Ford Foundation Fellow. Dr. Singler will discuss "America's Stake in the Developing Areas."

He will be followed on Nov. 27 by Dr. Joseph M. Chambliss, UofC professor of history and secretary-treasurer of the American Historical Association. History, Dr. Chambliss will explore, "China, Central America and South America: The Alliance for Progress."

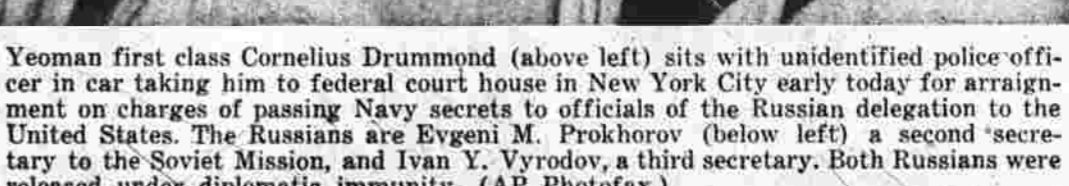
