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'A Dishonor, Disgrace' Meredith Assails Army For Troop Segregation

OXFORD, Miss. (AP)—James Meredith denied this after the report of Henry's statement.

"I have good reason to believe that this and similar accusations have resulted in stronger opposition to me by the students at the university," Meredith said.

"If it were true, I must admit that I would think their opposition would be in some ways justified," he said.

Meredith said, "I consider it of utmost importance that the persons who claim to be the Negro leaders would be individuals of unquestioned integrity and not individuals who will make irresponsible statements to gain personal ends."

As for the military, Meredith said that during his first two days on the campus, "the military units looked like American units."

"Since that time the units have been segregated. Negroes have been purged from their positions in the ranks," he said.

Meredith said that he complained to the desegregation work-

Thursday, and that the next morning he was told the situation would be corrected.

On Monday, he said, "Negro soldiers were ordered again among the soldiers. The ones I saw, however, were on a parking detail truck and unarmed. The white members of the detail were armed. This condition constitutes a dishonor and a disgrace to the hundreds of thousands of Negroes who wear the uniforms of our military services."

He said his conscience would not allow him to go on without at least letting the Negro soldiers know that I did not like them being dishonored.

Asked whether he thinks the university has failed to discipline students who heckled him, Meredith replied:

"I don't know if the university is disciplining hecklers or not, and I am not seeking to find out."

Meredith said he wanted to thank the faculty, marshals and the Justice Department for what he called "the fine way" they handled his entering and remaining in the university.

Meredith sent out word early this morning through the Justice Department that he wanted to give an interview through a pool arrangement in order to reach newsmen here without assembling a large number of them.

Joseph Stern of the Baltimore Star was selected by him to have the conference with Meredith in his campus apartment and report to other newsmen. Meredith gave Stern a long handwritten statement and then replied to questions.

**IMMEDIATE CUE-BID
FORCES RESPONSE**
By Alfred Sheinwold

We continue today in our week-long discussion of cue-bids in the enemy's suit. The immediate cue-bid, right after an opponent's opening bid, is used as a gigantic takeout double.

After West's opening bid of one heart North wants to force to game. He bids two hearts to show his tremendous strength.

A takeout double might not do the trick. East might put in an interference bid, or South might make a cowardly pass, or some other accident might happen.

North's immediate cue-bid of two hearts says: "I want to reach game. Let's have no nonance."

It would be an exaggeration to say that South has a good hand; he might have a better one. This is the kind of hand we usually hold at rubber bridge, but we still manage to win, don't we?

South shows his best suit, such as it is, by bidding two spades. North raises to four spades and South should keep a poker face to conceal his joy.

Lead Help
The opening lead of the king of hearts is very natural, but it helps West shift the lead to a trump and South must decline to raise. He should cash the ace and king of spades and then lead top diamonds until West takes the ace.

South still has two trumps and can therefore take care of dummy's last diamond and last club.

The defenders get the king of hearts, the ace of diamonds and the queen of spades.

If South played the hand carelessly East might get two trump tricks or might get a chance to lead a third round of trumps. For example, suppose South foolishly tries finessing with dummy's jack of spades. East would later run a

Bennet Teachers Attend Workshop

Idle Claims Up To 683 in Town

The number of unemployment claims filed in the state for the week ending Oct. 6 declined to 23,500 from 23,715 the preceding week, the State Labor Department announced today.

There were about 350 more new claims applied for than the previous week. A year ago there was an increase of almost 2,000 new claims for the first week in October.

An increase in initial claims indicates either a new spell of unemployment or the beginning of a new unemployment wave, when workers whose benefits have run out may reapply.

The number of claims in Manchester increased by about 12 per cent from the previous week to a total of 683 claims. Women applicants account for 294 of the total. Claims from Rockville accounted for 126.

Manchester ranked 12th in the state for number of unemployed, with its 683. First was Bridgeport, with 4,055 claims, followed by New Haven with 3,112 and Hartford with 2,825.

Total payments made to claimants throughout the state was \$1,561,145, compared with \$1,241,328 during Aug. For the first three quarters of 1962, total payments were \$38,138,465, compared with \$37,920,821 for the same period last year.

Nurses Urged to Fight To Improve Conditions

HARTFORD (AP)—Improved hospital nursing care won't come if nurses "continue to follow the highly structured, hierarchically organized, traditionally sclerotic systems under which hospital management insist on functioning."

Hitting out today at the long-standing problems of hospital nursing starting at the annual convention of the Connecticut Nurses Association was Barbara G. Schmitt, editor of the American Journal of Nursing.

The 6th annual meeting of the 62-member association also took up the major problem of higher wages to support greater organizational efforts in the future.

Miss Eleanor Landblad, association executive director, said before the meeting that a big effort would be made to top annual dues from the present \$16.50 to \$48.

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The major convention address will be made tomorrow morning by Mrs. Willetta B. Jones, associate executive director for sections of the American Nurses Association.

Frank Starzel to Retire As AP Chief Executive

NEW YORK (AP)—Frank J. Starzel, general manager of The Associated Press, is retiring after 14 years as chief executive officer of the worldwide news service.

The AP's board of directors, holding its regular fall meeting here, announced that it "reluctantly accepts" his own carefully considered decision. The board is expected to name his successor today.

Starzel, 56, joined the AP in 1929. He plans to retire to his farm near South Londenbury, Vt.

His announcement followed two weeks that of Executive Editor Alan S. Gould, after 21 years in the AP's top news post. Gould, who joined the AP in 1922, will retire next Feb. 1st.

Starzel reminded the board at its meeting Tuesday that his decision was "based on reasons of the president of The Associated Press was to be effective upon the completion of several major projects then being undertaken."

"I am convinced this is the appropriate time for a successor to carry forward," he said.

"It is in the organization's best interests that it have the benefit of a change in direction with a new approach and philosophy now, well in advance of my mandatory retirement date in 1965."

He will remain as a consultant to the AP. He said he plans to undertake no other employment.

Benjamin M. McKelway, editor of the Washington Star and president of the AP, said in a statement that the board "has had an opportunity to express for itself and for the membership of The Associated Press our recognition and appreciation of Mr. Starzel's outstanding services."

"During the past concluding decade of his distinguished AP career of 31 years, his performance as an executive and for the past 14 years as chief executive demonstrated a high order of leadership in constructive planning and administration of expansion of AP operations in this country and abroad," McKelway said.

"The directors are gratified that Mr. Starzel continues after retirement to be available in a consultative capacity."

Frank H. Bartholomew, heard chairman of the Press International, who was in San Francisco, commented: "Frank J. Starzel was a wire service professional in his fingertips, and the industry will miss his presence."

Starzel, after attending Notre Dame and the University of Iowa, worked on the Iowa City Press-Citizen, Des Moines Register and Tribune, Bloomington (Ill.) Post-Tribune and Chicago Journal before joining the AP in New York in February 1929.

He worked successfully in the feature service, as night city editor, and as a general news supervisor until his appointment in 1955 as chief of bureau for Ohio, with headquarters in Columbus.

In 1942 he returned to New York as traffic executive, became assistant general manager of the following year, acting general manager in May 1948, and general manager in October of that year. He succeeded Kent Cooper, who had been general manager since 1925.

During Starzel's administration, the AP's world-wide services have undergone a record expansion. The AP serves 1947 newspaper members and other publications in the United States, 2374 domestic radio and television stations, and more than 4500 subscribers abroad, including both publications and broadcasters. The total, exceeding \$620, represents an increase of more than 20 per cent since 1948.

The growth of the AP's news, photo feature and enterprise services under Starzel's direction has been accompanied by notable technological expansions.

These include photofax, a method of facsimile picture transmission; teletypewriter, a device for transmitting news on perforated tape fed directly into typesetting machines in newspaper offices;

Snakes Exhibited At Junior Museum

A live 12-inch eastern timber rattlesnake is being exhibited at Junior Museum for one week.

It was brought to Manchester Memorial Hospital Sunday for identification after having bitten Harry K. Carr, 40 Coburn Rd., who was released after treatment.

Carr and his daughter, Patricia, 7, were walking on the Salpica Trail, Glastonbury, when the snake was discovered. The family has been taught to handle snakes properly and Patricia picked it up. Her father took it from her and was bitten when he released his hold on the snake.

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of 1962 doesn't make it any more forgivable.
 But the parallel with 1966 and 1967 still obtains. In the present situation, we are the only ones who can start any really serious riot; it is what we may do that is the cause for fear.

A Necessary Riot?
 Days before the real violence occurred at the University of Mississippi, former Major General Edwin A. Walker went on Texas radio stations calling for volunteers to follow him into action in Mississippi. Later he himself appeared on the scene and there have been varying accounts of what he did there. In the end, he was arrested and a court ordered him held under bail for psychiatric examination, later reducing his bail and releasing him on condition that he take psychiatric examination back in Texas, where he now is.

In such a course of conduct, General Walker has only two possible sources of support of any kind, and the second possible source deserves real notation. The first area of support or sympathy for General Walker would be his own army, and the second would be the thousands of Negroes who are in the area of his support or sympathy for General Walker. It is concerning with the law, not the man.

What matters to the American Civil Liberties Union, in its protest letter to Attorney General Robert Kennedy is not what kind of a man General Walker obviously is, nor what kind of poison he would like to lead inside among us, but exactly what happened after the federal government took him into custody. The federal government went into court, with General Walker himself not present, offered the testimony of a psychiatrist who had not even seen him, and General Walker, and by this procedure, without giving Walker himself any chance to participate in the proceedings, or to have his lawyer argue on his behalf, obtained its order requiring him to submit to psychiatric examination.

When the cause of decency, freedom, and civil liberties, all of which are surely directly involved in this Mississippi business, takes an explicit note of late potential danger, and denial of liberties and handles him by shutting him in normal legal guarantees and privileges—then the fine cause is betraying itself to some inevitable degree. Sometimes such flaw extends undue comfort and later argument to the wrong side of the big argument involved. And one always has to ask whether it was really necessary. There is seldom any compelling proof that it was.

Where The Danger Lies
 The British, who may quite conceivably be just as right in matters which concern vestiges of American imperialism as we have been, right in matters concerning the privileges of British imperialism, have their own view of what is really dangerous about Cuba. It is roughly a parallel to what was our idea of what was dangerous in the Suez situation of 1956. They were not in the least afraid of what Nasser of Egypt might be doing, or threatening to do. We were afraid, with good reason, of what Britain and France might do. They came pretty close to blowing up our world, just because they found the behavior of some former colonies becoming quite intolerable, and thought a little quick, overwhelming use of force would set the world back in order. Nasser had not only imported arms from the Communists; he had nationalized Egypt's Suez Canal, and had nationalized Egyptian foreign investment, the Suez Canal. He was, therefore, to be punished and destroyed.

The rest of the civilized world, strangely enough, saved the villain Nasser. He is still in power. The Canal is still nationalized. Nasser is by no means in the vest pocket of the Communists. Britain and France are still secure and free. In other words, the world was not saved by the destruction of Nasser, but it has preserved itself, for all its present and future troubles, just the same. In the whole situation, nothing Nasser did or threatened to do was half as dangerous as what Britain and France did, when they launched their aggressive attack on him.

If that was the way we saw the Suez crisis in 1956, it is now the way the British look at us and our crisis over Cuba.

They think the prime danger lies not in anything Castro may do or threaten to do, but in what the United States may do.

The London columnist with the appropriate pen name of Casan, writes that "the White House seems to be getting, in its own mind, about the arrival of Russian technicians and the possibility of a hostile Communist base so near American shores. For about 15 years the United States has ringed the Soviet Union with nuclear bases in places like Turkey, Pakistan, North Africa, and Britain."

The "Economist" of London finds that "the most disturbing thing about recent developments in Cuba is the effect they have had on the American state of mind."

It is not simply that there are undertones of snapping nerves which make one wonder how American public opinion is going to stand up to the inevitably prolonged strain of an East-West contest that may go on, as Mr. Kennedy has pointed out, for a generation or more... there is also the immediate danger that the President may be pushed against his will into doing the wrong thing about Cuba.

If it is any consolation to our British cousins, what worries them also worries a good many Americans, too, and particularly during this "super-super-crisis" of the year ago, at this very season of the year, a prominent candidate for office, one John F. Kennedy, was charging publicly that the national administration then in office wasn't being tough enough on Castro, and that was unfortunate campaign recklessness, in which the safety of the world was being risked for the sake of a campaign issue and a few potential, hotbed votes.

This year, in another national election campaign, there are candidates for office who are specialising in charges that the national administration in office hasn't been tough enough on Castro—and the fact that, this time, this recklessness is being displayed by Republican looking for the hot-head votes

The Doctor Says

Every cough is not pneumonia although some persons like to think it is. By the same token every cold is not influenza. Whereas the common cold may run its course with little or no fever, influenza is accompanied by a fever and, in general, the symptoms—headache, generalized aching, and weakness—are more severe. Influenza is much more likely to lead to pneumonia and that is what makes it a disease to be dreaded in spite of the many drugs now available to combat such complications.

There are several strains of influenza virus. Unfortunately, the vaccine that protects against one strain will not protect against the others. In order to overcome this difficulty several strains are sometimes combined in one vaccine, but this does not always solve the problem.

Influenza has the habit of spreading rapidly from city to city, state to state and now with our greatly accelerated means of travel, from continent to continent. A person who is exposed to influenza in Paris may feel fine, board a plane, land in the United States still feeling fine, and have a sudden onset of the disease that night or the next morning.

When an epidemic got started our federal, state, and local health services got busy, track down the virus, and determine which strain is responsible.

This would help your doctor to know which vaccine to give you except for the fact that by then it is usually too late, because it takes at least four weeks to develop an immunity in this way. For this reason the United States Public Health Service, by studying worldwide patterns of the spread of influenza, tries to predict which strain is most likely to trouble some well in advance of an epidemic.

This year they are putting their money on the Asian influenza that swept this country a few years ago. They are urging vaccination early in the fall, especially for all persons over 45, for all who suffer from chronic debilitating diseases, for pregnant women, and persons who have close contact with the public such as doctors, dentists, nurses, ushers in movies, clerks in stores, bus drivers, school children, and teachers.

They also urge vaccination in industries where absenteeism presents a serious problem. Since the protection from influenza vaccine lasts only a few months the fact that you had it last year will not protect you this year.

Having had the shots myself I can assure you that the process is simple, the discomfort trivial and the expected benefit great.

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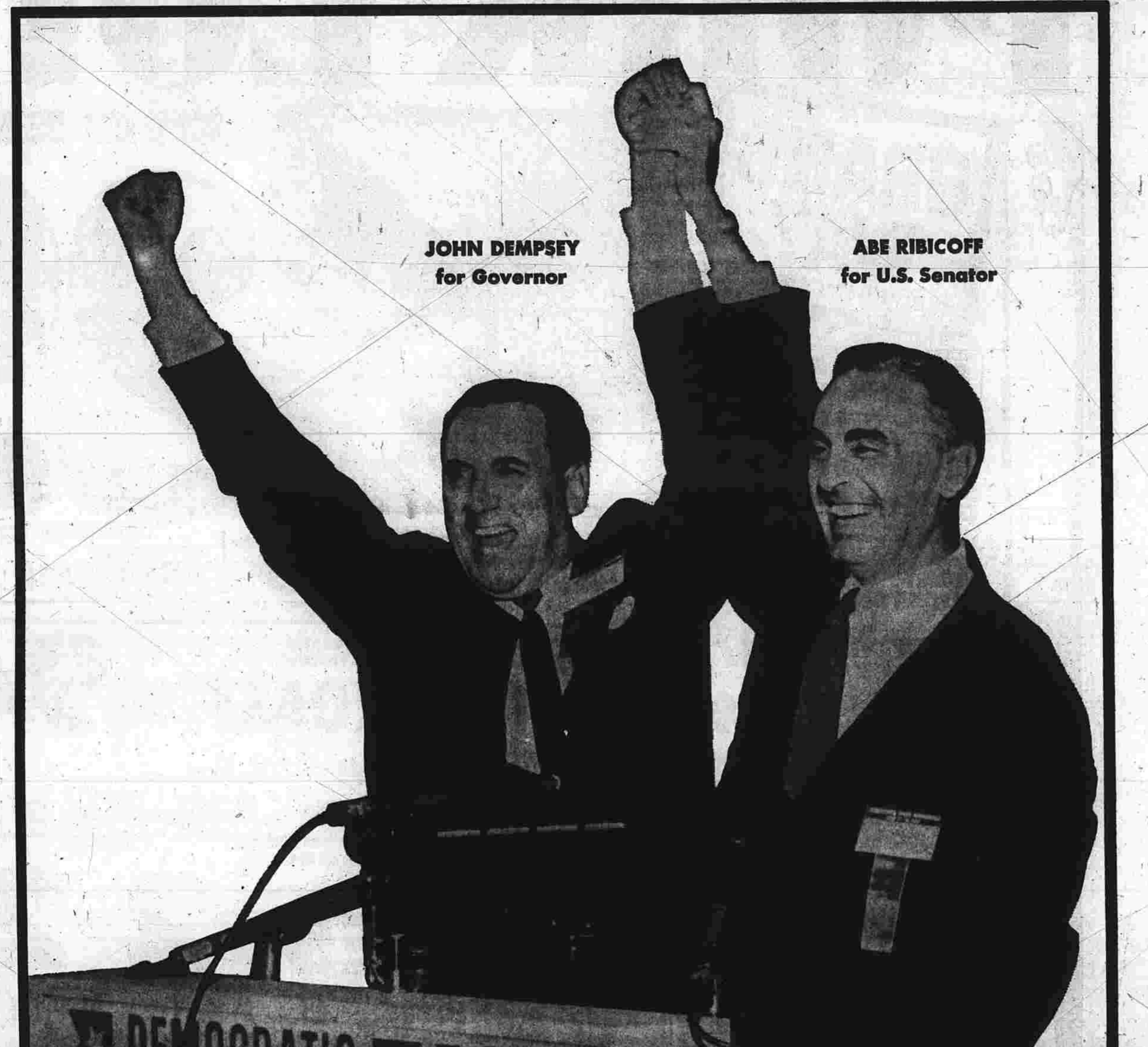

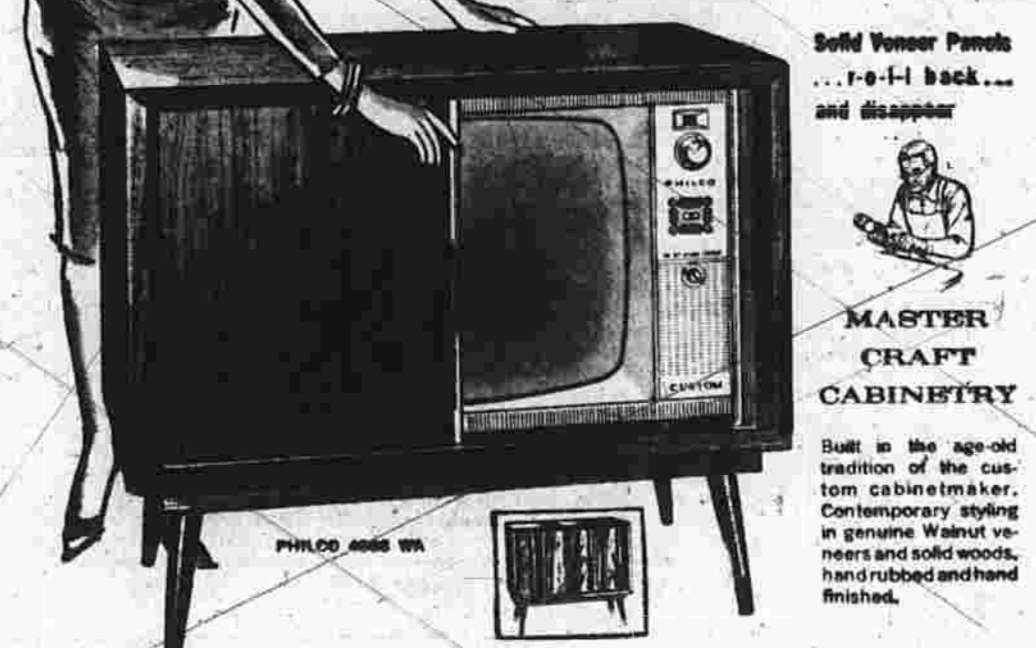

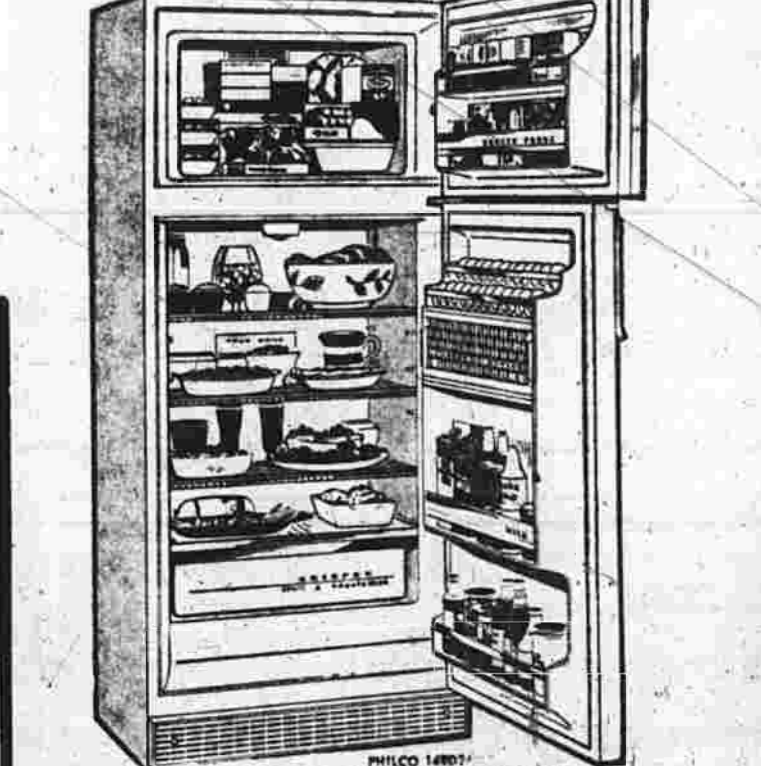
