"Those at the interment service in addition to family will include representatives from the U.S. government, the United Nations, and the state of New York, as well as close friends of Mrs. Roosevelt," the announcement continues. "The service will be held at 11 o'clock Monday morning at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. A memorial service at the cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City is being planned for sometime within the next two weeks."

The family gave permission for an autopsy, but its purpose was not made clear. Eight years ago Mrs. Roosevelt yielded her eyes to an eye bank.

Mrs. Roosevelt fought her illness with the same vigor with which she had pursued a career which took her to the far corners of the world.

"The Changing Heart of America" was one of the great writings around the world on one subject or another, both public and private. She lectured far and wide and was known to the public in many lands.

Her travels were often the result of good natured humor. She also brought barbed criticism from many who disliked her or her husband—or both of them.

Only after her death did the family disclose that her illness was discovered two and a half years ago. Initially, treatment permitted her to continue writing, speaking, and battling the illness for which she had become famous.

But July, the anemia worsened and she entered the hospital for a series of tests. She left the hospital and went to Hyde Park for a rest, then to Campobello Island, where she had three lengthy hospitalizations. Her condition improved but she was unable to resume her career despite the rest.

She re-entered the hospital Sept. 11 and was moved to her apartment three weeks later, at her request.

The contentment which she experienced in being among her own surroundings and with her family was of great importance during the last days of her life.

Mrs. Roosevelt died exactly 20 years after the first election of her husband to the presidency. She campaigned with him

Two-Early Marriage
Ottawa Husband Reshades
Anthropologist Margaret Mead has pointed out one of the results of early marriage that hasn't been given enough attention—its effect on the young husband. She says:

"These young couples have too many children too soon, and the young father has to pitch in to help the mother. Pretty soon he is so domesticated and spending so much time in housework that he has no chance to be a real father, or a real man."

She is right of course. But few women can see that in anything that is actually a disadvantage as long as a young man can get his young wife quickly and thoroughly domesticated the marriage is a happy one.

Perhaps it is — for the wife. But if the young man dreams of a better job one that perhaps requires a great deal more schooling than he has had, if he grows restless with too much domesticity too soon, if he secretly envies the young man who goes out to work and on their own while he is completely tied down and submerged in "housework," it can't be an every good marriage.

Furthermore, because the young man has been muddled with responsibilities before he has had a chance to adequately prepare himself for a life's work, he hasn't much chance of improving his lot. He quickly reaches the limit of how far he can go and how much he can earn.

And then what happens when the young wife realizes that her husband is never going to be able to give her all the things she feels she has a right to?

Usually, she looks around for a job and becomes a wage earner. Too. And then the young man knows that he isn't quite up to the job of providing his family, but he will always have to have help from his wife.

That's the pattern that all too frequently emerges when early marriage forces a boy to assume a man's responsibilities.

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State Proposal Poses Snag In Negotiations on Salaries

The board of education approved a state proposal for working relations between boards of education and teachers' organizations in Connecticut. It could presumably complicate teachers' salary discussions for the 1969-70 school year.

Board members last night received copies of the report from Supt. of Schools William H. Curtis, a member of the state committee of nine which is headed by Dr. Theodore Powell of Manchester. A member of the State Department of Education.

The report, approved yesterday by the state board of education, is optional for local boards' acceptance.

Among its recommendations is one which limits school board teachers' negotiations on salaries to "representatives of the group" which includes teachers and professional staff which determines the majority of the professional staff.

With a membership of almost 95 per cent of the town's nearly 460 teachers, the Manchester Education Association would be the negotiating agent for the teachers.

That would mean that the minority teachers' organization, the six-month-old Manchester Federation of Teachers, would be eliminated from negotiations.

The report allows, however, a school board to recognize a committee agreed upon by "more than one teachers' organization," which in Manchester would be the two groups.

The question is whether the MFEA, which was intensely opposed to the formation of the AFL-CIO federation local last spring, would agree to minority representation from the MFT group.

If it did not, the report says that the board would call a referendum to determine the negotiating group, upon written request of at least 20 per cent of the professional staff.

A member of the MFT said today that the minority group would not hesitate to seek a referendum, open to all teachers and professional staff, if it were denied representation on the committee.

Although the local represents only a small number of town teachers and for that reason keeps its membership secret, it was learned that the MFEA's membership includes teachers who also belong to the local. The MFEA also includes teachers who sympathize with the local, although do not belong, according to sources.

Thomas Kelley Jr., membership chairman for the MFEA, said that there is less than one per cent of teachers in town who are not affiliated with either group.

For those reasons, the MFT members said the local could rally

Other point which may bear upon Khrushchev's present tilt was toward a personal conference with Kennedy in that he is now also psychological disengagement not unlike that of President Kennedy when he met Khrushchev at Vienna in the summer of 1959.

That was about two months after the ill-fated Cuban retrenching, and which was allowed to fall rather than involve the United States in direct military action against Prime Minister Fidel Castro.

At Vienna, Kennedy was in a difficult position because of Khrushchev's point of view he had not followed through on an operation started with U.S. encouragement and support. Similarly, Khrushchev could consider himself in a somewhat difficult position now because he decided to retreat rather than fight in the Cuban episode.

U.S. Attacked By Bulgaria In Cuba Fray

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP)—U.S. Minister Eugene Anderson walked out of a Soviet reception Wednesday night after Bulgarian President Dimitar Ganev accused the United States of practical action against Cuba.

Ganev made the accusation in an address during the Soviet Revolution. It was attended by Sofia's diplomatic corps and chief delegates to the Bulgarian Communist party congress now being held here.

The guests also included Soviet chief ideologist Mikhail Solov, and Buzhikov, former secretary general of the Cuban Communist party.

General spoke after Soviet Ambassador Georgi A. Denslov addressed the guests. Denslov made a passing reference to American imperialism before launching into the familiar Soviet line that Premier Khrushchev saved the world from war by withdrawing Soviet missiles from Cuba.

Ganev said the United States had violated all international law in trying to put up the blockade around small but heroic Cuba, in beginning piratical action and in openly preparing an armed attack on revolutionary Cuba.

"I think we had better leave," said Mrs. Anderson to her American interpreter. They started out. Bulgarian press did not mention the incident today.

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Columbia Hits Lag In Help by Alliance

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)—President Guillermo Leon Valencia expressed deep concern today about lack of progress in President Kennedy's \$200-million Alliance for Progress program.

"Hungry people are expected and waiting," he said. "It would be very dangerous to keep them waiting too long."

Government statistics give a gloomy picture of the plight of Colombia's 15 million:

Most are underfed.

Per capita income is \$138 a year; in the United States it is more than \$2,200.

Nearly 700,000 children do not attend school because of a lack of facilities.

The nation needs 280,000 housing units for improved living conditions.

"When I visited the United States last year, I was told Colombia would be a showcase for Alliance for Progress," Valencia told an interviewer. "The showcase is ready and waiting but there is very little to put into it. The program is a good one, but it could transform Latin America into a magnificent world of advantage of the United States and all countries concerned, but that the Alliance for Progress must make more progress if our hopes are to be achieved."

Colombia with former President Alberto Lleras Camargo at the helm, was the first country in Latin America to submit a long-range plan for the program a year ago.

It proposed 25,000 new classrooms, 43,000 housing units, irrigation projects, agricultural development and industrial programs to create thousands of new jobs in 10 years.

The total investment would amount to \$4.4 billion, of which \$1.7 billion would come from abroad, mostly from the United States.

But Valencia said "all too little" has come Colombia's way so far.

About \$40 million was spent in the first year of President Kennedy's program. Another \$100 million was committed but has not been disbursed.

Valencia says Fidel Castro's Communist Cuban regime is trying to gain a foothold in his nation by arming and financing bandits in remote mountain areas.

The bandits have been killing an estimated 100 persons a month in isolated northern and western provinces.

Widespread banditry has been an outgrowth of political instability that raged for 20 years until 1958, when a coalition government was organized.

subtracted slightly from the already too slim ranks of its house supporters. The fiscal year 1963 budget, which was passed in August, contained a health care program financed under Social Security. The election outcome convinced them that their prospects were rosy next year.

Former Rhode Island congressman Alvin J. Forward, president of the National Council of Senior Citizens, said the organization had outstanding success in backing 18 successful Senate candidates who support a Social Security health care plan and in concentrating on 20 key House races.

The President's health care proposal was rejected 42-49 in the Senate this year. Forward said he was certain the votes now were in hand for passage there.

But such legislation must originate in the House since it involves taxation, and that is where it faces its most serious problem. The Senate vote last summer was an attempt to add the plan to the new House votes for the program is correct, the health care plan must first win Ways and Means Committee approval to get to the floor.

And it was that group which bottled up Kennedy's bill through-out the 87th Congress.

But legislators backing a Social Security health care plan have said that it was inevitable in time and they plan to continue their efforts.

Senators and congressmen who have struggled even longer to win passage of general federal aid to education measures also take the view that success is certain some time.

The Senate passed both of Kennedy's basic education bills by large margins in the outgoing Congress—a \$2.65 billion proposal to aid states with teacher salaries and construction of public grade and high schools and a \$1.7 billion college measure.

Both bills were watered down and eventually killed in the House.

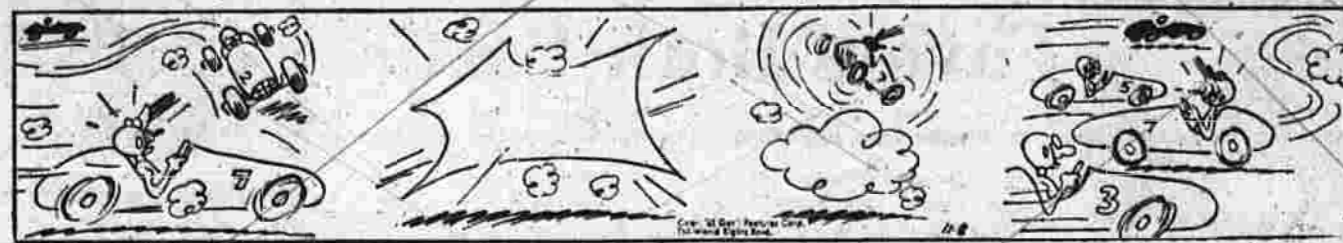

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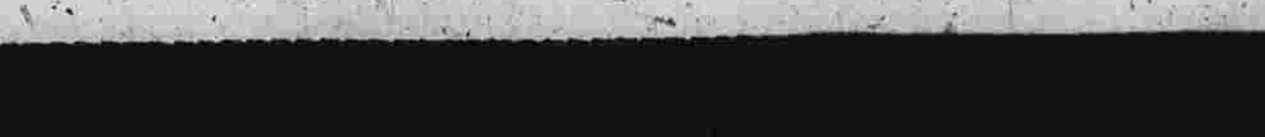
