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The surprise has come from two
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between China and India has been
ad back to a position of neutrality
after a brief interval during which
it seemed Russia had decided it
must stay with its own ally.
Given these two developments,
what is now happening, from a
third direction, comes as a sur-
prise. From Communist China
there is a new stridency and vio-
lence in the denunciations of
Khrushchev. He is now a "traitor."
Meanwhile, the two great Com-
munist allies-or rivals-continue
their semi-showdown maneuvers,
each seeking to bind its own satel-
lites more securely to itself, each
trying to purge the other out of
every minority position in the
territory, and the Chinese Commu-
nists, at least, even playing an ob-
scure game of trying to upset and
undermine Khrushchev in his
own country.

When such things are going on,
it sometimes becomes hard to be-
lieve that the crucial test of the
world power position game of the
moment lies in Cuba, or in Berlin,
or the recognized crisis centers. The
temptation is to begin to think that
the real big showdown will come
in this phase of the world's affairs, of its
continuing power politics game. Is
between Russia and China. It is a
temptation to become fascinated
by the possibility that one resolu-
tion of this showdown could find
Russia and the United States col-
liging force and influence to try to
halt the expansion of China.
But while we cannot keep our
fancy and our imaginations roam-
ing, we cannot afford to let our
action and policy depart from
caution and from principle. We
have to maintain our own stance
on issues between Russia and our-
selves exactly as if what goes on
between Russia and China might
prove to be nothing more than a
temporary charade.
And we ought to remember that
our real enemy should and must
remain an enemy to war itself, no
matter what coalition or align-
ments it happens to feature. The
great unanswered question in the
world today is the question of why,
with obvious aggression being com-
mitted by one sovereign state
against another, there has not even
been a move to call this situation
to the attention of the United Na-
tions, the world organization dedi-
cated to the promotion of peace
to be a law, and a law enforced
against aggression.
In principle, it would seem
propaganda for the future, there
isn't much more assurance about
the United States and Russia com-
bining momentarily to stop China
than there would be in what could
easily happen with the next turn
of the power politics game, which
would be Russia and China back-
logging again against the United
States. Even if present surface
peace between China and Russia
seems to make the game more
obscure, even if these surface
aspects reflect fundamental and in-
evitable clashes underneath, the
game is still the wrong game to
play. We should somehow try to do
in the world what we would do if

### Democrats Kill Funds Appropriated by GOP

The last minute approval by the Republican board of directors in October of \$115,000 for capital improvements was reversed last night by the new Democratic board.

On a motion by Democratic Director Ted Powell, the new board rejected the lumping together of such projects as \$40,000 for improvements to the Municipal Building heating and electrical systems and plans for an annex, \$15,000 for an aerial survey of the town, \$10,000 for storm drains on Dover Rd., Westley St. and Henry St., and \$10,000 for plans for renovating the old trade school.

The projects were to be financed from surplus of the 1961-62 budget.

"My objection," said Powell, "is not to the projects themselves... but I thought that the action of the board was precipitous, to say the least."

Other projects are needed, he said, and there is not so much surplus as the \$115,000 anticipated.

In order to reopen the matter, Mayor Francis Mahoney made Powell acting chairman. Mahoney was the only Democrat on the new board who, as a member of the old board, had voted against the appropriation. Parliamentary procedure requires that a matter be reopened by a board member who opposed an issue. Powell had voted in favor of it.

Republican Director Harlan Taylor asked whether any of the money had been expended or committed.

General Manager Richard Martin said none had been committed, at least in any third party, such as an architect or contractor.

Taylor said he opposed the Democratic action in rescinding the former Republican board's vote.

Another Republican Director, Francis DellaPera, who missed the vote because he had to attend Army Reserve training, told newsmen later in the evening that he thought the action of the Democrats was "regrettable."

The Republicans did not reverse the Democrats' last minute appropriation of some \$45,000, he said, when they (GOP) returned to power in 1960. The Democrats had voted the money for construction of Salter's Swimming Pool.

The projects approved by the Republicans in October were not frivolous ones, he said, "but bread and butter items."

### Skinny Dippin'?

Republican Director Francis DellaPera, calling to the attention of the new Democratic controlled board of directors the excellent construction job done on Globe Hollow park, asked the directors last night if they had seen it recently.

Democratic Mayor Francis Mahoney, admitting that he had not been down to the pool since the resurfacing of the bottom was finished, said, "Some of us were up there, saw it in the raw."

General Manager Richard Martin interjected, pretending to be startled, "You saw it in the raw?"

Mayor Mahoney picked up his meaning immediately and said, "That was a long time ago."

people from any further privations.

In his talk, Eisenhower called the economy "fundamentally strong, needing only a reasonable encouragement by government and a renewed confidence in the future of the country."

The present tax structure, he said, "was substantially devised in the depression and shaped thereafter in war" and "is not suited to the 1960's." He said it "stifles incentives, impedes investments and has weakened us economically at a time when we should be gaining strength."

Eisenhower said he believes a tax modification "should improve the ability of industry to modernize and keep modern plants, machinery and techniques."

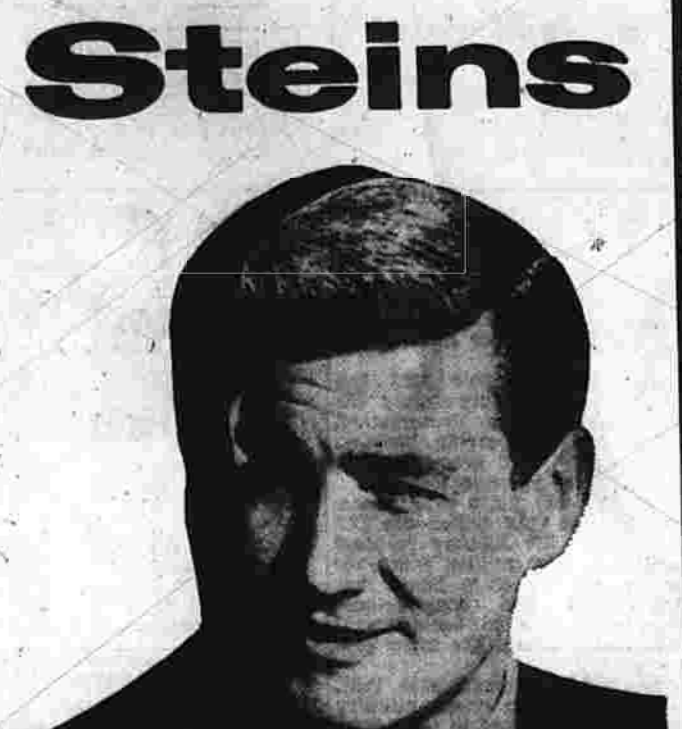

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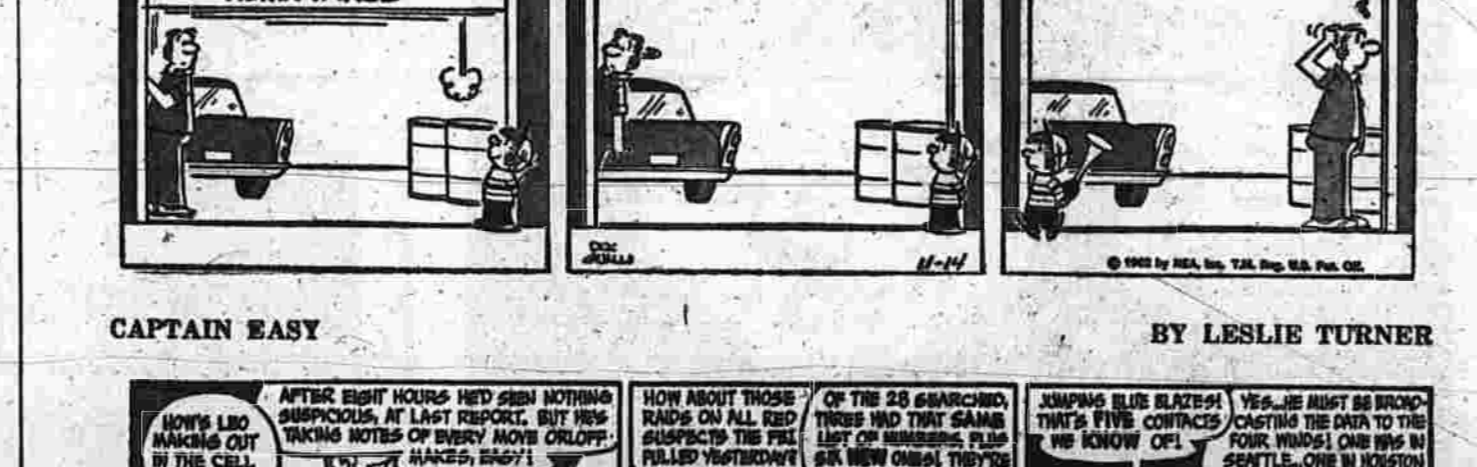
