The stamp is particularly attractive to the ladies, who—over the years—have asked for a "stamp to go with Christmas cards." The new issue features traditional colors and designs in red, white and green, with a Christmas wreath and candles.

The Herald highlighted the stamp in its "Stamps in the News" column on Oct. 19.

The initial sale of the stamp was made in Pittsburgh, Pa., on Nov. 1, 1962, at the annual convention of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States. A nationwide sale started Nov. 2 and will continue until through Dec. 31.

While the Shop and Mail Early theme is good for the Post Office, it is also good for business, providing an early stimulus to the local economy for the holiday season.

NEW THROTTLE The world's first known practical system for wide range thrust control of liquid rocket engines was unveiled earlier this month by United Technology Corp., a subsidiary of United Aircraft Corp., located at Sunnyside, Calif.

The firm, a pioneer in the field of big solid propellant rocket boosters, reports that landings on the moon, as well as various delicate maneuvers in space, are greatly simplified by the new seration throttling technique.

The new throttle is highly versatile, UTC says, noting, "In addition to being able to stop and restart the engine, we can for example throttle an engine of 10,000 pounds thrust down to as low as 100 pounds... or any point between."

Continuing development puts within sight a throttle with twice the range of the one announced, and predictions are that it may someday be possible to develop engines with infinite thrust variations, scientists at the firm say.

'McHale's Navy' Borgnine Views Role With New Enthusiasm

The new television season has brought us a number of new series based on experiences in the Armed Forces—"Gallant Men," "Combat," "Don't Call Me Charlie," "Mission O'Toole," "McHale's Navy"—to name a few. Some are realistic; some, in the lighter vein. "McHale's Navy" falls in the latter category.

Ernest Borgnine, who stars as the gutsy but comedic Lt. Comdr. Quinton McHale, is a veteran of ten years in the Navy (he started out as an apprentice seaman and was discharged in 1945 as a chief petty officer gunner's mate.)

"It's been 17 years now since the end of the war, and memories of the bad moments have faded for most of us who were in the thick of it. Now it's the pleasant things that are recalled, the fun, the laughs that cropped up even during the worst times. At least that's the way it is with me, and I think that goes for most of the World War II vets," Borgnine points out.

"Many veterans will get a charge out of the series because they'll see things that were once as familiar to them as their FPO—or APO number. This doesn't mean that only ex-Navy men will see the humor of the show.

"Believe me, the only difference between the Army, the Air Force and the Navy is being on land, in the air or at sea. The funny incidents, the serious ones, the way we lived . . .

Ernie interrupted himself: "I bet the jokes about the chow were no different in the different branches. And at times it took a terrific sense of humor to see anything funny about the food, believe me."

As Lt. Comdr. Quinton McHale, Borgnine skips PT 78 with what is probably the roughest crew ever assembled on a deck since the privatizing days of the American Revolution.

"But remember, McHale and his crew get things done," Borgnine adds. "Sure, he might use up \$300 worth of high octane fuel for water sking. But the day before, he destroyed a Jap battleship, so no one is going to call him on 'misuse of government property.'"

The way Ernie sees it, he and his

TV counterpart, McHale, were poured from the same mold.

"I get a lot of pleasure out of playing this guy," says Ernie. "Quite not only threw the book away—he obviously didn't even bother to read it first.

"Everything that McHale is, I like to think I am," adds Borgnine. "He's happy-go-lucky and his bubbling good nature is infectious. The only one who fails to enjoy having McHale around is Capt. Binghamton—that's Joe Flynn's role—who still hopes medic come up with a serum that will keep McHale-itis from spreading throughout the Navy."

As far as Ernest Borgnine is concerned, the days he spends working in his new ABC-TV series aren't really work. "They're the most enjoyable hours I've ever had in the business.

"Everyone is happy on the set," he adds. "In fact, there's a laughter problem on the set. It's a happy woe that's been with us since the cameras started rolling on the series.

"Actually," says Borgnine, "it's something all of us connected with the show rather enjoy. As soon as word gets around that we're ready to shoot, activity stops and we've suddenly got an audience from all over the giant Revue Productions lot. That's not too bad. But on the 'McHale's Navy' set, a good part of our cast also turns into an audience."

There's always someone breaking up, over the antics of Joe Flynn, the buffoonery of Carl Ballantine or the flustered fun from Tim Conway.

"McHale's Navy" is Academy-Award winning Ernest Borgnine's first television series. We asked him what made him take the TV

Miss De Gore moved to New York with her mother and continued her radio career. Her acting interest turned to the stage after she won an understudy's job in "Foolish Notion," a Broadway play starring Tallulah Bankhead. She regards her best stage performance as that of the 12-year-old Frankie when she toured with Ethel Waters in "The Member of the Wedding," some five years later.

HOLLYWOOD—(NEA)— Old
"Doc" has a problem, I regret to
report today, that even Mr. Mil-
burn's guns, Kitty's smile and Ches-
ter's coffee can't help solve.
Now maybe you think it has
something to do with those John-
ny-come-lately named Casey and
Kildare and Gillespie. You think
Doc is jealous perhaps of their an-
tiseptic ways, their high-falutin'
words and their fancy titles like
neurosurgeon and that stuff there.
Well, that isn't it at all. The

amazed. "The show has created the
image of 'Doc' to some fans as a
drunken old coot. He takes a drink
now and then, sure, but the aus-
terity of Doc who really believes
in the oath of Hippocrates is his
real character. In all those shows
I was drunk in only one show—
the story about the people of Dodge
refusing to co-operate with me to
stop an epidemic—but that did it,
I guess. Must have been quite a
show to create an image that won't

The new man in charge of Col-
lege Bowl, replacing Allen Ludden,
used to be a communications spe-
cialist at the Advanced Electronic
Center at Cornell University in
Ithaca, N. Y., working for the Ad-
vanced Engineering Component of
General Electric's Light Military
Electronics Department. His ac-
tual title was considerably longer,
but that gives you a rough idea.
If that hardly seems like a nor-
mal background for a quiz show
host, you underestimate Robert
Earle.

Earle is a Long Island native
who grew up wanting to be an an-
nouncer. As a boy, he was un-
doubtedly the only kid on the block
who knew the name of Amos 'n'
Andy's announcer (Will Hay) and
admired him more than Amos 'n'
Andy.
He started his career as a CBS
usher and then worked as an an-
nouncer on several upstate New
York stations.

His wife suggested that life
would be better in a college town.
So Earle, who had visions of sum-
mer-long vacations, took a job as
head of the Radio and Television
Department at Ithaca College.
"But I never got those summers
off," he says. "We had three boys
by then and I needed more money.
So I had to hold down two jobs
and work summers, too. I did some
announcing on the local station,
the bank's commercials and even
was a commentator at fashion
shows."

From there he switched to the
job with the 64-dollar title. But
when he read of Ludden's depar-
ture and the need for a replace-
ment, he took his courage (and his
telephone) in hand and called Col-
lege Bowl's producer, Jim Cleary.
Cleary asked to see a film of Earle
in action. Earle had none, but said
he'd get one.

He taped the sound portion of
a College Bowl show, edited out
Ludden's part. And he went to a
movie studio at Ithaca College and
had himself filmed at a makeshift
podium. With his foot he con-
trolled the tape recorder, doing the
Ludden part and then switching
the lever so the students' answers
were heard.

He got the job, perhaps on the
strength of that imaginative film.
Rin Tin Tin, canine star, has a
family heritage dating back to the
silent movie days of 1923.

Walker, 64, a busy author and magazine writer, returned in 1946 to the central Texas ranch near Lampasas where he was born.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A black and tan German shepherd named Clipper has moved into the White House and from all signs he's going to be top dog. For one thing, he's big enough—larger by a considerable margin than the two other canines who live in the executive mansion.
