Austrians Lower Tax on Incomes

VIENNA—Austria has reduced its rates of personal taxation in the first reform of its kind since 1952. The tax saving for an individual in the lower \$5,000 income bracket will be about \$55 a year. In the lower middle income groups a 40 per cent rise was granted in basic allowances.



Rejection Costs Shadew

By ROGER LANE

NEW YORK (AP)—Presidential government rejection of plans for a merger of American and Eastern airlines cast a shadow today over similar ideas of other financially ailing transportation companies.

It may set back prospects for a long-discussed get-together of Trans World Airlines and Pan American World Airways, a proposal yet to be formally hatched.

The adverse recommendation Tuesday by a Civil Aeronautics Board examiner in the American-Eastern case could also have an effect by strengthening the hands of opponents of such consolidation.

However, a different agency—the Interstate Commerce Commission—in judgment on railroad merger petitions.

In recent years, the ICC has looked kindly on railroad union and has given preliminary or final blessing to a long series of them since 1907.

One important point: The American-Eastern case is not finally decided. The next step is to file arguments before the full CAB, but submission of briefs and after that a decisive ruling.

There has been a ferment of merger talk lately within the industry, at one time or another involving almost all the 11 trunk carriers. No specific plans have been made.

Presumably, smooth sailing for American and Eastern would have signaled a raft of other formal proposals for defensive reasons, if for no other.

In his recommendation, examiner Ralph L. Wiser laid heavy stress on what he saw as monopolistic tendencies of the American-Eastern plan, which would create the world's biggest airline.

American now ranks 2nd and Eastern 4th in size among domestic trunk airlines. United Air Lines merged last year with near-bankrupt Capital Airlines, is the biggest.

Between them, American and Eastern haul about 38 per cent of the nation's long distance air traffic.

Wiser's monopoly findings are likely to be injected by opponents of rail mergers into several major proceedings pending before the ICC.

Wiser gave short shrift to contentions of American and Eastern that merger would be the only way to avert industry financial distress—evidenced by trunkline deficits that totaled \$64 million in 1967.

The examiner said deficits were due to excessive competition, rather than to a switch since 1962 to speedy and costly jet liners, and failure of traffic to build up anywhere near to their greatly enlarged passenger carrying capacity.

American and Eastern witnesses had estimated savings from merger at \$50 million a year through elimination of equipment and other duplications.
