Legends Tell About Hymn

Stories and legends surround most of the modern ways of celebrating Christmas and sometimes there is more than one version of a story—such as the story of "Silent Night" and how the song came to be written.

Joseph Mohr, village priest of Heiligen, Austria, wrote the words, and his organist wrote the music, probably adapted for a melody by Michael Haydn. On this point, most versions seem to be agreed.

What inspired Father Mohr to write the words is another story—or another two stories.

One version, say researchers for The Book of Knowledge, is that Father Mohr was called out into the snow on Christmas Eve of 1818, to bless a newly born baby in the home of one of his parishioners.

He was so filled with the spirit of the season and the simple beauty of the mother and infant that when he returned to his study he wrote the poem, "Silent Night." Before Christmas Day was over his organist had written the music. Other versions have it that the church organ had broken down (impaired by mice, one story says), and the people were saddened because there would be no music for Christmas Day. Shortly before Christmas, Father Mohr wrote his poem and Organist Gruber the music.

At midnight Mass, the people sang "Silent Night"—with a grateful accompaniment.

The high school addition building committee took steps last night which seem to point toward a larger high school than the 1,600 student limit recommended by school administrators.

The administrators at the last committee meeting said they would have preferred a school with a capacity of 1,500 to 1,600, for "educational" reasons. With this consideration in mind, the committee instructed Arthur H. Cook, of the architectural firm of Lester and Cook, to plan for a stronger foundation and a reinforcement for one or two additional second floor classrooms could be added in the future, if desired.
