Katanga Troops Fight Back, Tshombe Reported on Scene

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (AP)—President Moise Tshombe's troops battled U.N. Congo command units in north Katanga today, challenging a U.N. claim of military victory in this third lighting campaign against the secessionist province.

The United Nations claimed full control of the area of Elisabethville, the capital, the south. But incidents of pillage and terror prompted unrest. The U.N. command ordered looters shot on sight.

Consolidating gains, the United Nations ordered Katanga pilots to surrender by noon Tuesday and give up all their planes which had survived U.N. strafing attacks. Tshombe himself, who has vowed to fight to the end against forced reunification of the Congo, was reported to have returned to Katanga. He took off in a Rhodesian air force transport from Salisbury after an unannounced visit to the capital of the Central African Federation.

Worst Snow In Decade Hits Maine

Winter unleashed its fury on the eastern section of the nation in the last hours of the year. Below-zero temperatures were reported today in many spots. High velocity winds tore down power lines, may have swept a youth off a ferryboat to apparent death, and overturned a motorboat whose operator drowned.

The power gusts also ripped off a movie house roof, toppled a huge construction crane and literally blew a river from its bed, stranding numerous boats. The winter blast also brought fresh accumulations of snow in some places.

Bangor, Maine, had at least 21 inches of new snow on top of the 15 inches previously fallen. Howling winds piled up drifts as high as 20 feet. The state's third largest city, Portland, 50,000, was "just about paralyzed," according to one newsmen.

The Bangor Daily News failed to publish its morning paper today for the first time since 1892. The Maine blizzard, termed the worst in a decade, also forced closing of Bangor movie houses for the first time in memory and stranded some 2,000 persons in buses and cars throughout the state.

Maine's Gov. John H. Reed appealed to citizens to take in the "blizzards."

The 4,500 persons in Lincoln, Maine, some 40 miles north of Bangor, were reported isolated with no power and all roads blocked.

Maryland recorded three deaths in sledding accidents—a boy and a girl whose sleds were struck by cars and a boy whose sled careened into a tree.

Six Boy Scouts were trapped several hours in a car stuck in a snow drift in Washington County, Pa., before highway crews freed them.

Tense Year Ends, Shaky One Starts

The end of an internationally tense 1952 and the start of an uncertain 1953 arrive tonight for countless millions around the globe.

Some will die around the stroke of twelve. Others will be spanked into life.

Particular emphasis has been put on highway safety with restaurants, coffee shops, hotels, and clubs, and on the moment of rest for those whose celebration might leave them incapable of safe driving.

The Pennsylvania and New Jersey turnpike commissions will offer free hot coffee to any person traveling the super highways.

The Travelers Hotel near La Guardia Airport in New York has offered free overnight lodging to any celebrant who feels the need of it.

Members of the Adman group will usher in the New Year by an assault on the 14,110-foot Pike's Peak in Colorado. From the summit, the group hopes to set off a fireworks display at midnight.

An estimated 1,000 men, women and children will go through last-minute dress rehearsals for the annual Mummers parade in Philadelphia on New Year's Day.

Wrightman is a wealthy oil man and art collector. His wife, Jan, who collects antique furnishings, is a member of Mrs. Kennedy's White House Fine Arts Committee.

Their party is one of the major social events of the holiday season in this resort city.

Eight Siblings Start New Life In Orphanage

KANNAPOLIS, N.C. (AP)—Eight brothers and sisters begin a new life together today at the Church of God orphanage due to the efforts of a welfare worker, Miss Andrea Erickson.

Another brother, now 10 months old, will join them when he is 2. On Oct. 7, Abner Avery Bentley, 67, a retired carpenter, and his wife, 40, packed their children into the family truck for a trip over a winding road near Morganton.

Bentley lost control of the vehicle and it rolled down a steep incline. When officers arrived, they found Bentley and his wife dead. The children—escaped serious injury.

The children were moved out of their four-room home to the home of an uncle. He was unable to carry the heavy burden and they were scattered to six foster homes in mid-November.

Airline Cool to Idea Of Flights to Cuba

HAVANA (AP)—A cool reception greeted today the Castro government's offer to let more Cubans go to the United States if Pan American Airways resumed flights between Havana and Miami.

A Pan American spokesman in New York said the line had little desire to resume normal service to Cuba. He said the company had lost heavily on its flights to Cuba in recent years because of cancellations and limited travel to the island.

The State Department banned private and commercial flights to Cuba during the Cuban crisis. The ban was lifted temporarily when the Cuban invasion prisoners were returned and flown out.

The Cuban communists also denied a report by Donovan that the United States might go to the United Nations to negotiate the release of the prisoners and near 1,000 of their relatives, said Saturday in Lake Placid, N.Y., that Castro had agreed to let an additional 2,000 Cuban prisoners go.

Donovan said the release of the \$53 million worth of ransom food and drugs for the prisoners was delivered, another group of relatives would be released.

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U.S.-Polish Relationship May Face Strained Year

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Relations between the United States and Poland could take a turn for the worse in 1953. The next few days or weeks may set the course.

One indication will be whether Poland pays its annual \$2 million installment on \$40 million in compensation for American private property nationalized in the Communist takeover.

The third annual payment is due the first week of January. Comment sources say Poland recently warned the United States it may default on the payments because of congressional action last fall affecting Polish exports to America.

The Poles have accused the United States of bad faith because Congress included in the new foreign trade act a clause calling on the President to cancel tariff concessions, known as "most favored nation treatment" now granted Poland and Yugoslavia.

Polish authorities contend U.S. negotiators morally obligated their government to grant Poland "most favored nation" treatment at the time the property claims agreement was worked out in 1949. There is no legal connection, however.

Several congressmen who visited Warsaw recently expressed surprise at hearing U.S. officials talk of such a moral obligation. They said that while the Kennedy administration had opposed canceling the trade concession for Poland and Yugoslavia, they had not been informed in Washington of any connection with the claims agreement.

Science Group Criticized by Dr. Van Allen

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The President's Science Advisory Committee has drawn sharp criticism from Dr. James Van Allen, discoverer of the radiation effects of a nuclear test last July.

David Becker, executive secretary of the committee, answered that "the committee is a highly competent scientific group with a good reputation for hearing all views."

Van Allen's remarks were made Sunday at the closing sessions of the 19th meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

In other developments at the meeting: A space agency official announced the United States plans to land an expeditionary force of robot detectives on Mars in 1956 to search for life there.

Space doctors weighing the risks stresses and safety factors for the Apollo moon flights expected by 1970 reported there will be an arbitrary retirement age for astronauts.

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Bitter Cold Holds State In Its Grip

NEW YORK (AP)—A 100-foot tugboat, the Gwendolyn Steers, which radioed that she was taking on water, is missing today with 16 men aboard.

The Coast Guard said it was checking a report that the tug's lifeboat had been sighted with one body in it.

The lifesaver report came from the superintendent of the Steers.

HARTFORD (AP)—Severe cold and strong winds are producing extreme dangers of frostbite and frostburn, the U.S. Weather Bureau said today.

In an advisory message, the weathermen warned anyone who must venture outdoors to avoid prolonged exposure and to wear adequate clothing.

The warning carried special import for motorists who might find themselves in emergency situations, equipped with flat tires, or others who might be walking.

Frostbite is freezing of exposed parts of the body, resulting in a nuclear test last July 25 miles above Johnston Island in the Pacific.

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Thaw Peril Follows Britain's Blizzards

LONDON (AP)—More snow fell in parts of the British Isles today while in other sections thawing brought a threat of icy floods in the wake of the worst cold wave in 15 years.

At least six persons had died in the weekend blizzards which swept the United Kingdom. Villages by the dozens were still cut off from the outside world.

A naval helicopter made a series of trips to rescue 70 bus passengers stranded since Saturday in a small cove at Evershot.

In the northeast of England another six inches of snow fell during the night and high winds piled drifts 20 feet high. The weather also worsened in Scotland and five major roads were blocked.

It is misery Monday on the roads, said a spokesman for the Royal Automobile Club. "Conditions are still impossible in many areas and in Scotland the situation is deteriorating."

Hundreds of men worked through the night to knock the ice off railway and London subway system switches. Rail transportation was spotty, but most travelers were able to reach their destinations.

London Airport was reopened at midnight after men with shovels had cleared the runways.

New York Central and New Haven railroads said the snows had knocked out signal systems at many points along their main lines in the Northeast. Trains were delayed up to three hours.

New York City experienced 4-degree temperatures today, equalling the year's lowest reading.

The mercury fell below zero elsewhere, including low readings Sunday night of -11 at Massena, N.Y.; -13 at Montpelier, Vt.; -4 at Hartford, Conn.; -4 at Worcester, Mass.; -1 at Newburgh, N.Y.

Washington (AP)—Walter Heller, chairman of President Kennedy's Council of Economic Advisors, has indicated the tax cut administration will request of the new Congress will total more than \$4 billion.

"What is required is not a small cut of \$1 billion or \$2 billion, but a substantial cut. A \$3 billion or \$4 billion cut won't do the job," Heller said in an interview Sunday on ABC-TV's "Issues and Answers."

Heller described the still-unveiled administration tax plan as a big balanced program. "Including what I have said, and the economy is basically sound. But, he added, the rate of forward movement in recent months was slowing down."

The pace of progress next year will be slower than in 1952, Hodges said, "and at a level well below full employment of the nation's economic resources."

A tax cut is imperative, Hodges said, to expand consumer buying power still further and to increase the incentive for business to invest in new and more modern plant and equipment, and in inventories.

Washington (AP)—Senate investigators are reported assembling evidence for a massive examination of the illicit drug traffic touching "more or less every major city in the United States."

The Senate Investigations subcommittee has worked with Interpol, the international police agency, and various foreign governments in preparing for the investigation.

Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark., plans an early meeting of the subcommittee to request an official go-ahead for the start of hearings, and to chart a tentative schedule for other major investigations in the works.

One of these, still in preliminary stages, will deal with gambling on college and professional sports events and alleged efforts by gamblers to corrupt athletes.

Jerome Alderman, subcommittee counsel, told reporters the drug hearings would explore the adequacy of existing law to deal with the traffic in narcotic drugs.

BASTIA, Corsica (AP)—Mountain climbers reached the wreckage of a French airliner today, and reported none of the 25 persons aboard survived. Heavy snow delayed the rescue team. The four-engine plane crashed Saturday on a flight from Bastia to Ajaccio. It was carrying Bastia football players and their fans.

SIX DIE IN RIVERS
SUPERIOR, Minn. (AP)—A bus and a truck collided in western Montana before dawn today and the bus plunged into the frozen Clark River, killing at least six persons. A report said the bus was a Greyhound and was eastbound.

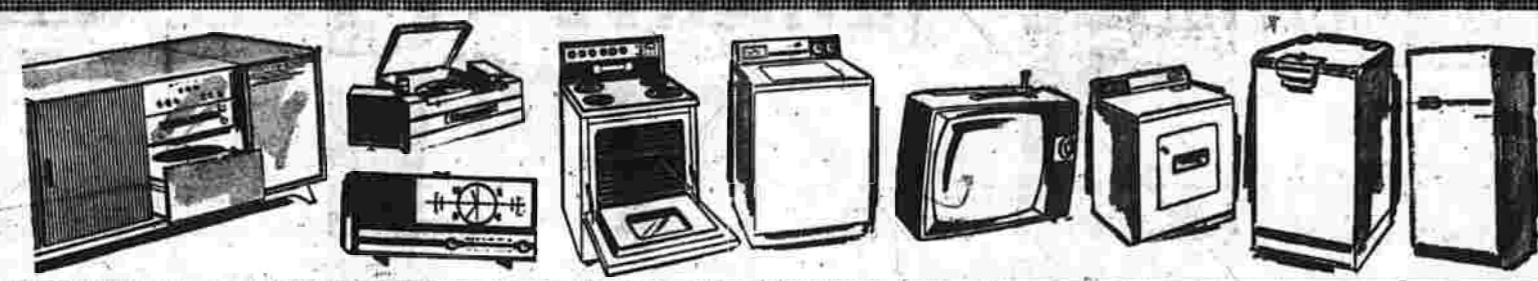

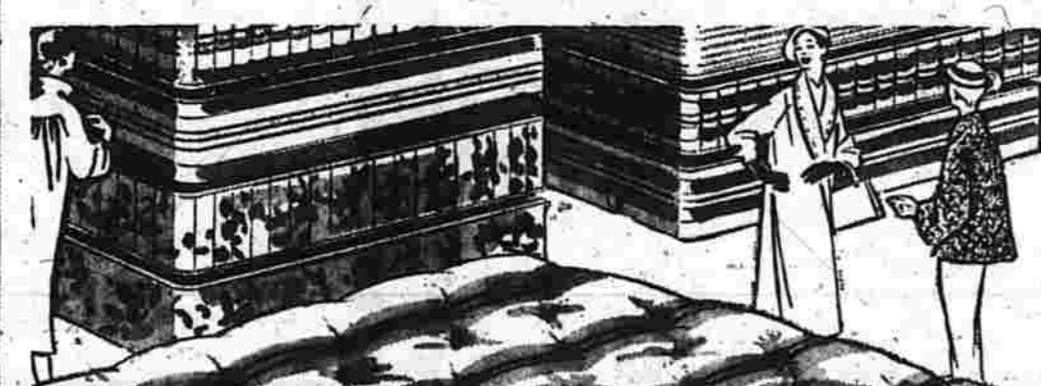

Green Bay Wins Title Aggain!

NEW YORK (AP)—Green Bay did it again. Only this time it was closer.

Vince Lombardi's Packers did not humiliate the New York Giants Sunday in their 167 victory at frigid Yankee Stadium as they had done in their 57-0 rout last New Year's Eve in Green Bay.

The net result was the same, though. The Packers still are champions of the National Football League.

The story of the game is told best by the voting for the most valuable player. No Jim Taylor. No Paul Hornung. No Y. A. Little. The award went to Ray Nitschke, the Packers' 6-foot-2, 220-pound half-back who may be the middle-inbacker of all-time fame for the next 10 years.

Nitschke recovered a Pile King punt on the Giants' 28 yard line in the second period with the Packers holding a period 3-0 lead. Two minutes after a 21-yard pass from Horning to Boyd Dowler, Taylor charged heading into 69-yard line. It was the most recent-

print seen in New York since the strike started.

"The Giants are much, much better," said Lombardi, comparing the 1952 team with the 1951 club. "You just can't compare the two games."

Sam Huff, the Giants' middle-inbacker who, like all members of both defensive units, played a fine game, had this comment: "They are a good ball club but they can be beaten. They only scored one touchdown. Hell, the defense has to have someone on its side. You don't win the World Championship without scoring some points."

"You couldn't throw the long one on day like this," said Coach Alie Sherman of the Giants who was club with Hank Stram on the passing of Little. "Of course, it was the same for them."

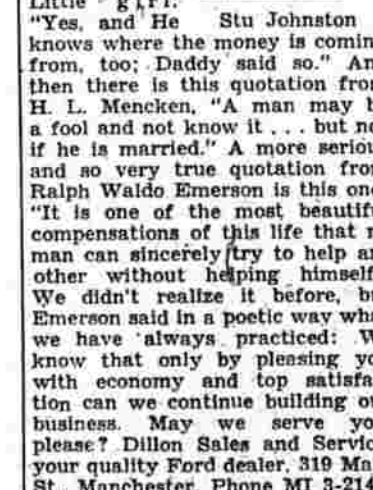
