

Kennedy, Wary of Congress, May Accept Gradual Tax Cut

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—President Kennedy, deeply worried about the fate of his legislative program in the new Congress, is ready to settle for a gradual \$5 billion to \$10 billion tax cut.
In order to compromise with powerful critics, the President has ordered the Treasury to prepare a tax bill that would bring about the reductions in several carefully spaced steps.
The aim is to lessen the immediate adverse impact on the federal budget deficit.

Sen. Kerr's Death Blow to White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D-Okla., a power among powerful men, is dead and his death is expected to have wide-ranging repercussions in the White House, the Senate and his home state.
The 66-year-old multimillionaire oilman senator topped over Tuesday morning as he was telling a story to his physician at Doctors Hospital. He died minutes later. Death was attributed to a coronary occlusion.
He entered the hospital Dec. 16 for treatment of a respiratory infection. Doctors found evidence of a heart ailment, but had said he was making good progress.
President Kennedy, who got word of Kerr's death while flying to the Orange Bowl in Miami to see the Oklahoma-Alabama football game, issued a statement calling Kerr's legislative career as "exceptional."

State Deaths Total 7 for Weekend

Four violent deaths on New Year's Day in Connecticut caused a sharp increase in the total for the long weekend, raising it to seven.
Fires, always a threat in cold weather, claimed one life Sunday, another Monday, and two yesterday. There were three deaths involving motor vehicles—one Saturday and two yesterday.
The deputy chief of the Norwalk Police Department was among the victims on New Year's Day.
Deputy Chief David P. Campbell was leaving a dinner party at a home in Norwalk and offered a ride to one of the other guests, Mrs. Dorothy Graham, 46, of Wilton.
To get from the home at which the dinner was held to the nearest road required backing down a private drive that crosses the tracks of the New Haven Railroad. State Police said Campbell's car was hit squarely by a train that appeared unexpectedly. Both occupants died instantly.
Earlier in the day, two youngsters died in a fire that broke out in a two-story tenement at 13 Walter St. in Bridgeport. Edward Santos, 14, and his sister, 11, died, but three other youngsters in the family escaped.
Victims of other accidents earlier in the four-day weekend were: Lillian N. Field, 61, of Wallingford, who had stepped out of her car after it slid into a roadside embankment on Route 15—The Wilbur Cross Highway—Saturday night in Wallingford. She was fatally injured when hit by another car.
Mrs. James L. Hooper, 45, who died when she struck her home in Greenwich Sunday. Fire officials said the blaze might have been started by a cigarette dropped by Mrs. Hooper.
James Wojcik, 59, a dishwasher who worked at the Black Swan Restaurant in Guilford and had living quarters on the second floor. He was killed when a fire destroyed the structure Monday. Victims 3:pec omme

Romney Takes Advice

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Sharp little winds blew across the platform prepared at the state Capitol in Michigan for the inauguration of George Romney as governor.
"Put on your long johns," Mrs. Romney reminded her husband minutes before the ceremony.
"I'm going to put some woollies on," said Romney as he ducked into a cloak room.
In a few minutes he emerged and walked, in a dark, heavy coat, onto the chilly platform, for the inauguration. It was 18 degrees above zero.

Romney Sticks To State Issues At Inaugural

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—George Romney, 58, began his first working day as governor of Michigan today amid signs that his plea for bipartisan harmony in state government may have struck a responsive chord.
In colorful ceremonies at the state Capitol, the former American Motors Corp. president was sworn into office shortly after noon New Year's Day as the state's first Republican governor in 14 years.
Romney called for an end to partisanship in a 2,500-word inaugural address that did not once mention the word Republican.
A crowd of about 3,500 gathered in sub-freezing temperatures, cheered Romney as he urged cooperation from all citizens of Michigan regardless of their separate interests.
The new governor, who has tried to dispel speculation that he will be a candidate for the GOP presidential nomination in 1964, again made an apparent attempt to discourage such talk.
One of his guides as governor, he said, would be "concentration on the job at hand, not campaigning constantly for re-election, and dedication to that job—without an eye to greener pastures somewhere else."
The job at hand, Romney indicated, would include revamping of the state's tax structure and adoption of the proposed new state constitution.
Although Romney did not spell out the specifics of his programs, he said during the campaign that any new fiscal policy probably would include a state income tax.
Romney's Democratic opponent, Gov. John Swainson, also had suggested complete fiscal reform—including an income tax.
Michigan's financial troubles reached a peak in 1959 when the state was forced to have a "payless payday" for state employees.
Although the state deficit has declined to the vicinity of \$70 million, most Democrats and Republicans have agreed that the tax structure should be changed.
In bidding for bipartisan support, Romney pleaded for an end to what he called the "cold war" of partisanship which has pitted one group against another.
Democrats, who retained every state office except that of governor.

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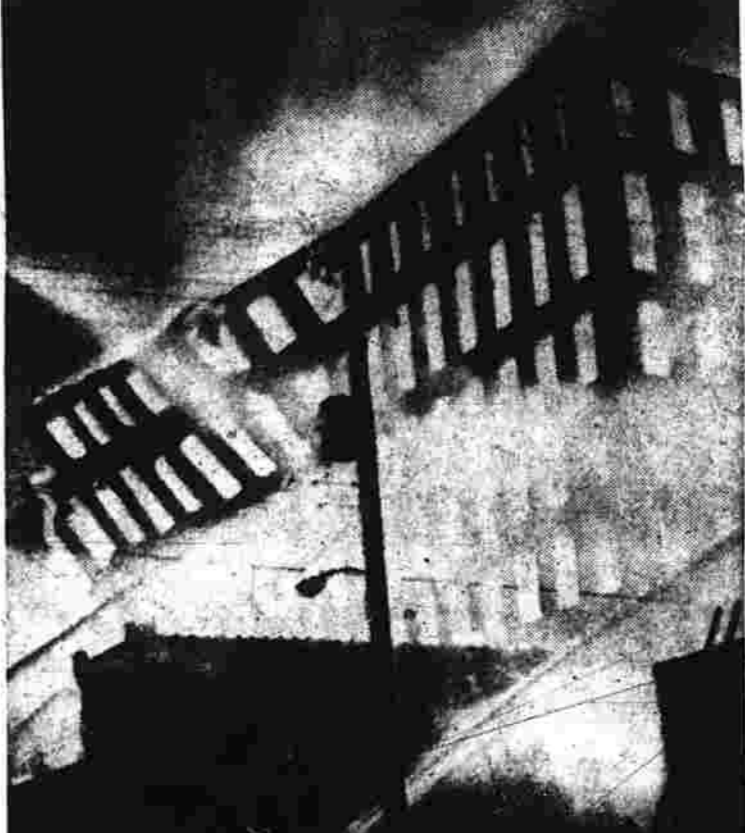

Explosion Rips Packing Plant, Death Toll 12

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (AP)—An explosion ripped through a meat packing plant today, leaving 12 feared dead and 47 injured.
Flames, steam and falling debris hampered rescue operations at the Home Packing Co. shattered by the explosion.
Indiana State Police said 10 bodies were recovered from the wreckage.
Two other bodies were in the debris and could not be reached immediately.
George Obenchain, secretary-treasurer of the demolished plant, said 14 workers were still unaccounted for.
Twenty-nine injured workers were taken to Union Hospital, 18 to St. Anthony's Hospital.
Some 200 of a total of 275 workers were in the plant when the explosion of an undetermined nature, shattered the brick building. The plant had been closed over the holidays.
Firemen theorized a gas seepage may have been the cause.
Bodies of some of the dead and injured were blown from the plant into a parking area, others were covered with tons of brick.
Damages were estimated by company officials at close to \$2 million.
Bill Jewell, company engineer, discounted reports that the explosion occurred in a boiler or in ammonia gas.
"Ammonia can never cause an explosion like this," he said. "And the boiler is in another part of the building."
He ventured no guess on the cause of the blast.
Rescued workers said the blast came from below and raised them—then everything crumbled.
The explosion cut through the slaughter, cutting, curing and

Aides Sent To Devise Tax Split

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (AP)—The giant Union Miniere copper mining combine fell in line today with United Nations plans for quick reunification of the Congo, even while sporadic fighting persisted within Katanga, the secessionist province.
The company—with Belgians, Britons and Americans among its backers—announced in Brussels its experts will leave tonight for Leopoldville.
Their mission, as defined in a company communique: "To assist representatives of the Congolese central government and of Katanga in the drawing and drafting of a project for repatriation of the currency resulting from the sale of Union Miniere products."
The announcement came less than 24 hours after Katanga President Moise Tshombe, leader of a cause that seemed militarily doomed, agreed conditionally to return to Elisabethville for renewed dickerings on unification.
U.N. Secretary-General U Thant's unity plan, which he wants put into effect by Jan. 24, calls for a 50-50 split of Katanga's revenue with the impoverished central government of Premier Cyrille Adoula. Most of the revenues come from Union Miniere.
Tshombe's government has been getting about \$60 million a year from taxes, royalties and dividends.
Tshombe made a direct appeal to Thant for "an immediate meeting between myself and one of your representatives not engaged in the operation now in progress," but drew a quick rebuff from U.N. headquarters in New York. The secretary-general wanted "actions, not words" from Tshombe, a spokesman for Thant said. The statement took no notice of a declaration in Tshombe's message, relayed by diplomatic channels in Katanga, that he confirms adherence to the U Thant plan.

UN Uses Congo Gains To Press Unification

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—U.N. officials urged in the new year firmly resolved to convert lightning-fast military support in the Congo into a workable unification plan and end the chaotic 2½-year struggle threatening to bankrupt the world organization.
They described Thant's two-week deadline as the maximum grace period for Tshombe to demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with the United Nations. They said the United States would back proposed economic sanctions among other measures, if Tshombe fails to comply.

Rocky's Talk Eyes Nation, Skirts N. Y.

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller was embarked today on a new term as chief executive of New York State but his inaugural address indicated his top political concern was the Republican nomination for president in 1964.
The inaugural speech, delivered to a New Year's Day crowd of 1,000 invited guests in the state Capitol, paid scant attention to New York affairs.
His emphasis on national concerns and a middle-of-the-road political philosophy underscored Rockefeller's role as a top possibility for the GOP nomination to challenge President Kennedy in the next national election.
The governor utilized the address to portray himself as a conservative in fiscal affairs but a liberal in such matters as civil rights. It contained strong evidence his horizons are national, rather than limited to New York's borders.
Rockefeller, 54, has declined to say whether he will seek the nomination in 1964.
But he has aroused speculation by refusing to pledge to serve out his new, four-year term, by referendum.

Hartford Banks Tie In Congress Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Wright Patman, D-Tex., says a committee will look into what he described as "a hole network of links" in the ownership of some of the nation's biggest banks.
Patman said Tuesday the house banking committee, which he will head in the new Congress, will consider legislation "to correct any abuses that may be shown."
He said the network of links—through common stockholders and loans secured by bank stocks—raises questions of curtailed competition, possible effects on interest rates, and the possibility that in some instances state laws against branch banking may be circumvented.
Patman's findings came in a lengthy report to the House Small Business Committee, of which he is now chairman. He elaborated on them in an interview.
Sections of the report dealing with Hartford, Conn., said insurance companies hold large blocks of stock in the banks there. The report said the Travelers Insurance Co. was the biggest single stockholder in each of the city's two largest banks.
"Banking concentration in the Hartford metropolitan area," the report said, "is quite high. As of June 30, 1962, the largest bank held nearly 39 per cent of the deposits of all banks in the area."

Smokestack Tilted, Top Will Be Replaced

High winds on New Year's Eve were apparently responsible for a dangerous tilt that affected the top 20 feet of a 90-foot smokestack behind the Central Business District.

The tilted stack top was first noticed about 4 p.m. of New Year's Eve, according to Bruce Watkins of Watkins Bros. The chimney is part of a heating plant behind House & Hale's, that provides heat for most of the Main St. stores from Maple St. to the Blinn. Stationing Store near Birch St.

Had the top of the stack fallen, it would have gone through the roof of the heating plant, a potential cause of much damage and a needless Main St. closure.

Although the bottom 40 feet of smokestack are supported by guy wires, the top section was not.

To prevent any possible danger, Watkins, who is president of the corporation that owns the heating plant, called in a 100-foot crane from East Hartford.

Workers from the Roger Sherman Co. which supplied the mobile crane, worked in subfreezing temperatures to attach the tilted stack to the top of the crane.

The rig will remain as it now stands until a new stack top is delivered. Watkins says that a stack is on order from New Haven; he hopes that it will be delivered by Friday.

The governor's inaugural address is certain to be widely interpreted, as from evidence. Rockefeller turned to state matters only in the closing passages of the 22-minute address and those references were general.

He pledged to improve higher education, modernize facilities for training workers to meet challenges of automation, accelerate further the state's economic growth and improve research and development activities as a means of attracting new industry.

Rockefeller's oath of office for a second, four-year term was administered by Chief Judge Charles E. Desmond of the State Court of Appeals.

Front-row spectators included his two oldest children, Rockman and Ann, present with their respective spouses.

Rockefeller and his wife were divorced early last year, and some GOP leaders feared the marital breakup would hurt the governor's political career. He went on to win re-election by 629,000 votes, compared with 570,000 in 1964.

As he did in 1964, Rockefeller advised against being deluged by "logans and labels, such as conservative, liberal and progressive."

He has been considered a leader of the liberal wing of the GOP and, as such, suspect among the more conservative leaders, including the Midwestern bloc that will have a major voice in selecting the nominee in 1964.

Neither liberals nor conservatives would find much to quarrel with in the governor's declaration of his political philosophy.

He called for "the old-fashioned virtues" in politics and said these included sincerity, honesty, candor and integrity, including the fiscal integrity of government.

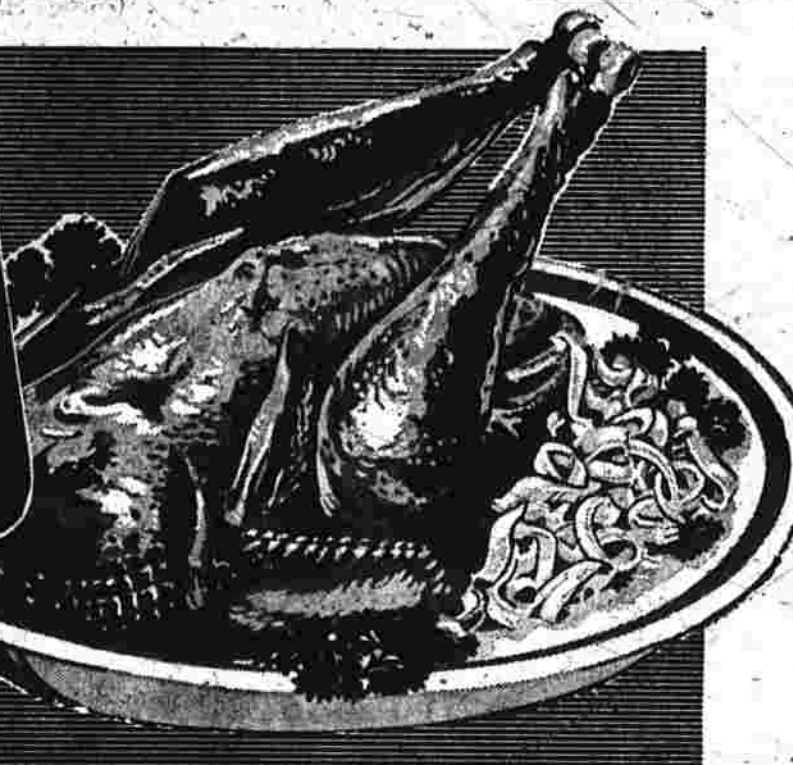

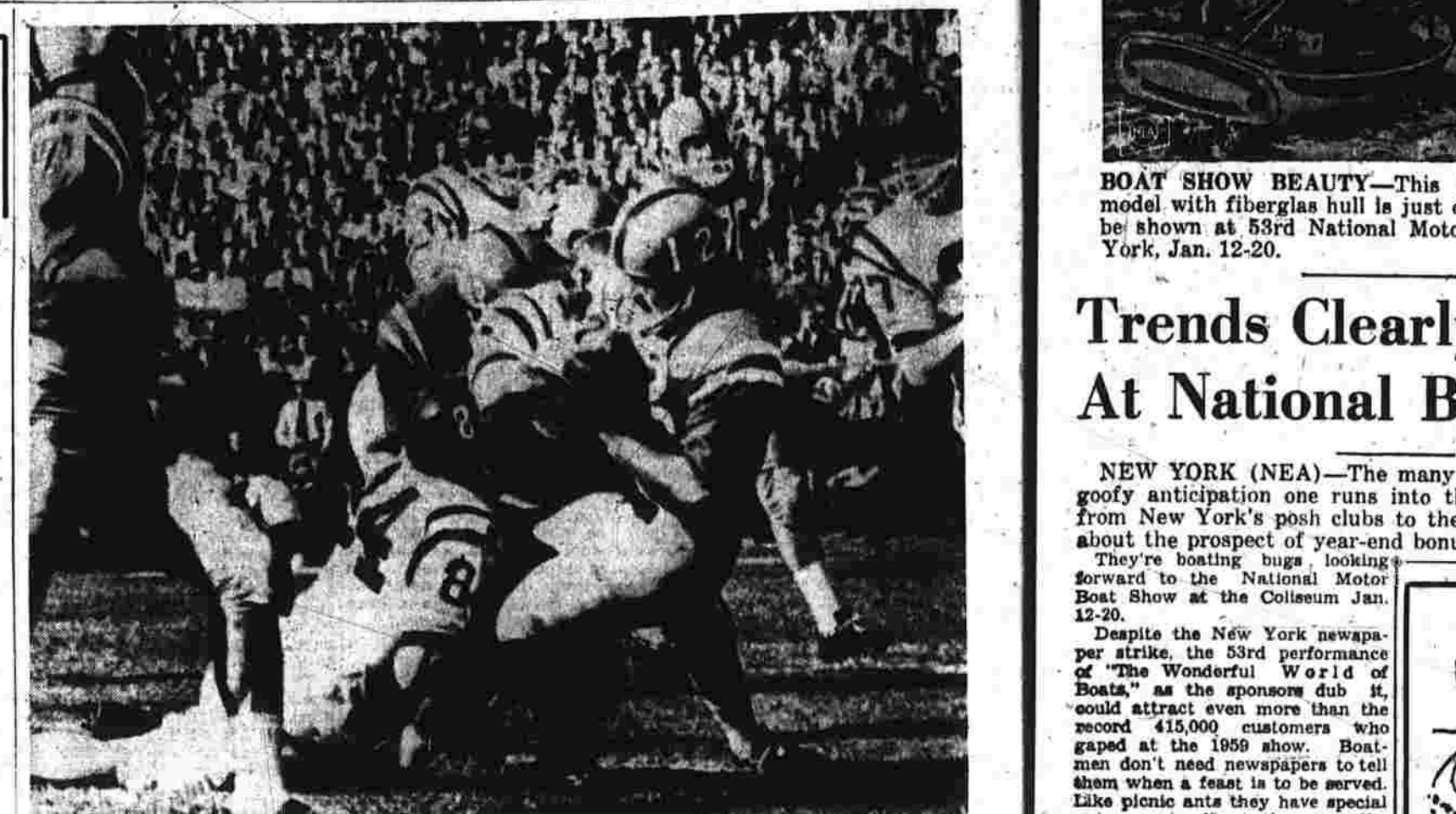
