President Held Wary of Asking New Labor Laws

The government's representative in the dock strike negotiations, Assistant Secretary of Labor James J. Reynolds, said that the White House probably would step in if today's session proved fruitless. He apparently means Kennedy is ready to lower the boom on a Congressional message.

Reynolds, familiar with both the docks and New York newspaper strikes, considers that ambitions of the union leaders of both strikes are an important feature of the disputes.

Thomas Gleason, vice-president and chief negotiator of the AFL-CIO International Longshoremen's Association, is an announced candidate to unseat Gov. William Bradley as the dock union's president. This information, report, has created a union divide that has seriously interfered with settlement efforts.

In addition, union sources say the president of the striking AFL-CIO printers local union in New York, Bertram Powers, is leaving his union's national presidency. Another reason the administration may be holding off on recommendations on strike legislation is an unbroken record of what to recommend.

The administration for some time has favored use of more public boards to get informed on labor disputes. But for some months there has been a growing tendency of labor disputes to ignore settlement terms proposed by such groups.

NEW YORK (AP)—Negotiations for 2,000 striking printers and nine closed New York dailies returns to the bargaining table today for another effort at ending the longest newspaper blackout in this city's history.

The resumption of peace talks first joint negotiations since last weekend—falls on the 40th day of the newspaper families.

The city's nine major newspapers with a combined circulation of 2 1/2 million copies a day have been out of print since Dec. 8 when local 6 of the AFL-CIO International Typographical Union went on strike against their closed down voluntarily.

The other five have been closed down voluntarily. They are: The New York Journal, The New York Daily Mirror, The New York Daily Worker, The New York Daily News, and The New York Daily Sun.

Bertram A. Powers, president of the printers' local, was given a big ovation by the demonstrators. "Look at that support," he told newsmen. "Union labor in this city is solidly behind the printers."

Columbia Brand Foundation Offers Town Recreation Acreage

The William Brand Foundation has offered the town a gift of 80 acres of land for recreational use. Alfred Brand, vice president of the foundation, made the offer to a group of town officials and civic leaders last night.

The offer, which must be submitted to a town meeting for approval, has limitations attached. Brand said. The deed the foundation intends to give the town stipulates that the land must be used only for "charitable, recreational, educational, community" and similar purposes and will specifically state the land must never be used for business, residential, mercantile, commercial manufacturing or any other purpose not within the scope as set forth.

The acreage, Brand revealed, is the Joseph Park property on Rt. 6A, a mile west of the center, which extends east to Pine St. It has a 220-foot frontage on Rt. 6A. The foundation's offer of land will fill a need long felt in town for town-owned recreation facilities. It will be an outright gift, if accepted under the foundation's terms. Cost of development and maintenance will be the responsibility of the town.

The meeting last night, at which Dr. Ralph E. Wolner of the recreation council presided, appointed a committee of five to study the proposal and report to the March town meeting. Named to the committee were Dr. Wolner, John H. Pringle, State Rep. LaVerne Williams, Paul Merrick and Mrs. Herbert Engler Sr.

5-3-7, And We're In It

In these bright, encouraging days when it is orthodox to proclaim that five minutes after the Kennedy seven—that, we think, is the formula involved in the justification for the handsome pay cut...

And sure enough, that rebellious voice of the off-beat, out-of-step theories often just what one would expect. It greets the President's tax cut proposals with an opening salute to all the pleasures involved in the tax returns we would be making out and all the additional money that we would all be spending...

There, for the second half of the editorial comment on the President's proposal, the Journal turns to heresy. In its revolutionary, iconoclastic style, it even suggests taking a look at the "other side of the ledger." There it professes to find that the reason taxes are high is that governmental spending is high.

There it professes to discover that, if taxes were to be adjusted to our fiscal situation, they would have to be raised, not lowered. And then, of course, the Journal slips in its own pet heresy—the idea that the way to cut taxes soundly and beneficially is to be gained by cutting expenses first.

In our radical youth, we must confess, we used to have some respect for such revolutionary ideas. We even used to believe that everything in life, money or any thing else, had to be paid for, sooner or later.

But just about everybody, except the Wall Street Journal, Senator Byrd, and a few other relics, has grown up into the new orthodoxy. This says that if you are spending seven and taking in five and then cut down three in what you are taking in you will come out with seven. This says that nobody, but nobody, ever cut taxes by trying to cut spending first. This says, the new orthodoxy, that the way to get more is to take less. And, for a final clincher beyond theory, the plain emotional fact now is that if you cut down three and take in five, you are getting tax relief, or similar stimulus for the economy. We know no other way, either of trying to get some out in our spending. We think, in fact, that the only way to cut spending, or even keep it down, is to keep the money out of the hands of government in the first place.

Of Filibusters We suspect that any show-down legislation might find that this page has favored almost the general purpose of almost all the legislation which has, in the generation of our national life, been blocked by use or threat to use the institution of the filibuster in the United States Senate.

But get it of the Senate, and we have favored every single measure the filibuster has ever obstructed, and we will probably obstruct extremely important legislation in the future.

It is still, we think, vastly more important than the success of any particular measure, or of any whole list of measures, that there should be in the law-making process some rather formidable doubt to which the rights and views of a minority may return if they feel desperate enough to do so. We would not quite procure that any law which would make anybody feel that desperate should not be considered ready for passage. But, in most instances of national legislation, it is not made.

This year's annual session-opening battle against the filibuster may fade off before it has really begun. It is said, at least, that some of the Senate liberals who currently regard the filibuster as the great barrier to progress in civil rights legislation have begun to realize, lately, that there have been times, and must be times again, when the filibuster could be considered the last-ditch defense for some liberal cause.

The truth is that although democracy is the rule of the majority, that majority should endeavor to rule more by a consensus or at least a tolerance expanded beyond itself than by a tyranny of its own votes.

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Drive Pushes on In Sub-Zero Cold

HOQUENORE, S.D. (AP)—A team of hardy drivers, hawking a page from Western folklore, continued to push today in sub-zero cold with 800 head of cattle overland to market.

It was the second leg of a 30-mile trail for 100-year-old cowboy rancher and his crew of riders, including his twin daughters, Betty and Bonnie, 15, two sons, John, 18, and Bud, 8, and his father, John, 72, who owns a ranch near Bethel.

There is only a thin snow cover on the trail, but there is little cold. The drive started Tuesday in 2-below temperatures.

When the crew halted Tuesday night at the Orville Peterson ranch after covering more than 20 miles, the temperature had risen to a still frigid 18.

Fuel, formerly of Alva, Okla., is but 200 acres of his 3,000 to the rising waters. The Army Corps of Engineers already has condemned much of his neighbors' acreage.

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Cuban Exile Groups Divided by Rivalry

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The "battles" in Miami focus on various exile groups. Cuban exile groups despite President Kennedy's plea for unity.

About 80,000 Cubans assembled in the Orange Bowl last night to hear the President's plea for unity. The Cuban exile groups, however, were divided into two camps. One group, the Cuban Revolutionary Council, formed with U.S. cooperation in April 19, 1961, Cuba's invasion, is tacitly recognized by the government and some other organizations.

The council has bitter foes as well as staunch supporters among the 300,000 exiles, many of whom live in Miami.

Rival groups ask such things as why Council President Jose Marti Cardona, a Castro's first prime minister, permitted the Cuban exiles to invade Castro's island.

Friends reply that whatever decisions Dr. Marti Cardona had about Castro's revolution, he was caught such an enemy of it later that he was even trying to lead an expedition to invade Castro's island.

Dr. Marti Cardona urged anti-Castro groups to unite by joining the council coalition of 11 organizations. But along West Flagler Street, it was business as usual in exile party offices. In general, exiles expressed themselves in favor of unity, as long as the others join their group.

Several formal, such as general balloting, a convention with all organizations represented, and gradual mergers have been suggested for unification. Unanswered is the question of who would supervise such proceedings in the improbable case that rival factions agreed to them.

Over Some Objections Two Sewer Projects Approved by Board

The board of directors last night approved a \$67,000 sanitary sewer project for eight West Side streets, and a \$25,000 sewer for Hackmatack St., and levied the costs on benefiting property owners.

During the public hearings that preceded the directors' actions, the Hackmatack St. residents on their own declared themselves in favor of the project, and the money they would have to pay.

But of the 41 West Side residents who spoke at the public hearing, 15 favored and 23 opposed the sewer and the costs they would have to bear.

The average assessment each property owner would pay ranges from \$47 to \$500, with a number of assessments going over \$500, depending on the property size.

Least Cost Assessed
The most bitter complaint was that the assessments voted by the directors last night were only a part of the cost the property owners will pay before they can use the sewer.

Automatically, each property owner must also pay \$125 to go, according to an estimate by General Manager Richard Martin, to install a lateral pipe from the sewer line to the middle of the property, the edge of the private property, a distance in most cases of not more than 25 feet.

Then the property owner will have to pay for an additional lateral from the street lateral to his house. Martin said the average cost per foot of such an installation is \$4, so that a property owner can expect an additional bill of \$80 to put in a 20-foot line.

Also, as soon as the sewer project is completed in the eight streets, Dover Rd., Edson Rd., Pullen Rd., Hendes Rd., Whitney Rd., Wedgewood Dr., Englewood Dr. and a portion of Adams St., and of W. Middle Tpke., the property owners will become liable to pay their share of the assessments levied in past years for the force main, pumping station and the line which pass the sewage to the treatment plant on Olcott St.

However, no one who opposed the project claimed it wasn't needed, or that it would be a disfavor of it and a few of those who opposed it tried to express their "favor" project.

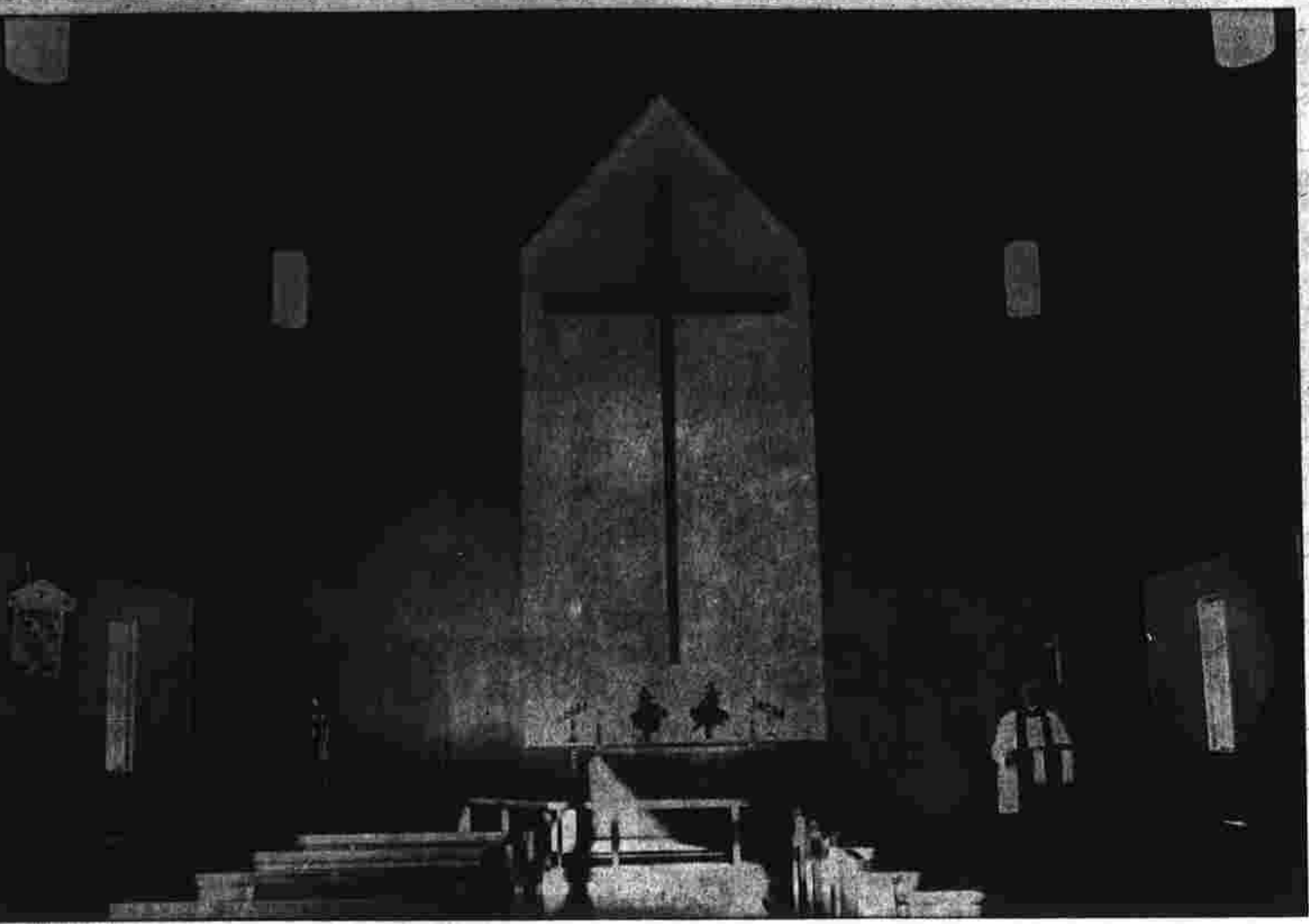
Most Residents Approve
Because so many property owners opposed the assessments, Republican Director Harold A. Turkington abstained from voting on the matter to leave the assessments to the voters.

However, he voted with the seven other directors who were present to allocate \$97,000 from the sewer department reserve fund for the project. Republican Director Francis DellaPera was absent.

The directors voted unanimously in favor of the Hackmatack St. project, after hearing 10 residents voice approval of one of two plans to sewer the street. Two residents opposed both plans.

The plan approved by the majority requires the average property owner on the street to pay between \$70 and \$1,000, partly on a front foot basis and partly on an average basis.

Property on which objection was voiced was that of Catherine Shaw, assessed for \$1,078 plus \$204, and that of Margaret E. Leary, assessed for \$917 plus \$24. A couple of residents questioned the recommendation of the Water and Sewer Department to postpone collection of assessments on two large properties, one owned by Andrew Analdi in the name of

Removal of Meters Okayed by Directors

"Off with their heads" said the board of directors last night of the parking meters on Main St. And off they will come, said Police Chief James Reardon today, as soon as he receives formal notice of the directors' action.

It will be a great day for the Central Business District, said the directors themselves, who had wanted meters at first to increase the turnover of traffic downtown, decided last month that the invention had turned on them.

And so they approached the directors with a plan to do away with the meter-monsters.

Other means can be found, said the merchants, to multiply that most delicate and delightful species, the cash bearing customer.

Bruce Watkins, manager of Watkins Bros. and chairman of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce Parking and Traffic Committee, gave the directors three examples of other ways at the directors' meeting in Wardell School last night.

The permissive legislation before the present State Legislature will let the Main St. merchants set up a taxing district to raise money for off-street parking, he said.

If the directors backed the idea collected from the Central Business District on non-moving violations, that would add to the coffee, he said.

Night Set Example
And if the directors took out of the \$50,000 they've been hanging onto since 1956 in the hope that the New Haven Railroad would sell the North End depot, then the parking authority would be \$35,500 richer. The sale option has expired, said Watkins; and besides, the depot might be acquired by the town through utility renewal.

But in any event, the merchants are delighted with the directors' enthusiasm to discontinue the parking meters, he said. Already, towns like Rockville and Bethelham, Pa. are looking to Manchester as a model of such behavior.

Dr. King Asks Churches Lead In Integration

(Continued From Page One)

which ends Thursday, every church and synagogue should display a sign of action.

"If the churches and synagogues take a forthright stand," he said, "there will be integration."

He said they should "go out of their way to integrate their congregations even though their neighborhoods have not been desegregated."

He also proposed that they withdraw investments from companies that practice discrimination in hiring.

Dr. King approved of President Kennedy's recent executive order banning discrimination in federally assisted housing. But he said it is not strong enough and should be broadened.

Sargent Shriver Jr., director of the Peace Corps, addressed the conferees Tuesday night and suggested that church members could use their time and form volunteer religious units to work to eliminate racial barriers in the United States.

Shriver, brother-in-law of President Kennedy, raised a question of why clergymen cannot map out specific programs for their congregations.

"Suppose 5,000 congregations in America were to set up volunteer groups to combat racial prejudice and eliminate racial tension in 5,000 precincts throughout America," Shriver said.

Such religious volunteers, he would invite Negro families to social functions and would obtain entry for Negroes into previously all-white neighborhoods.
