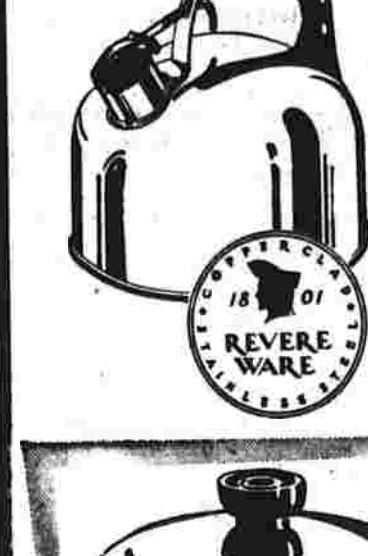

Connecticut Yankee

In our last attempt to look at the arrangements at the State Capitol we almost, but not quite, found our way to the particular room, or suite, which may be the most expensive in the Capitol...

In the fiscal year of 1964, according to the budget estimates submitted to Congress by the President, our bill for just the item of interest on our national debt will amount to \$10,100,000,000.

No body, of whatever political persuasion, ever reduces the national debt, a process which might eventually lessen the most productive of all governmental expenditures.

Everybody, whatever the politics of the administration involved, finds it necessary to keep increasing the yearly amount that will have to be found and paid out just to keep the debt service.

But, even though the special session of Senator Humphrey may make all this sound partisan again, it is not so. Some of the soundest Republican businessmen in the country participate in the same-sounding formulations of the same essential philosophy.

It is strictly a bipartisan thing, the debt, and the huge interest burden it imposes annually, and if we do dissent, and seem to hold to some quaint suspicion that it is all unearned and foolish and perhaps inevitably disastrous, that we, in fact, are a bipartisan old-fashionedness, too.

We have our own feelings, but we will not protest or interfere if everybody else feels like holding some kind of celebration for the approaching triumphant moment when the federal budget figure just for interest alone gets paid to the million dollar...

And, if one stops to notice such things, the sun has come out quite bit, back we should say, to the strength it is relinquishing in mid-November, back to the length of day it had just before Thanksgiving, back toward inevitability for human beings.

The day is now just about half as long longer than it used to be, just before Christmas. The solar cycle scheme of things is amiable too, in the way it adjusts, for the early part of the new year, the lengthening of its days. They had begun to be longer at night while they were still growing shorter in the morning...

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'White Paper' Shows Tell Story of Russia

How did Stalin die?
What would have happened to Stalin—and for that matter to us—had he lived longer?
How did Khrushchev (just among Stalin's possible heirs as they filed in front of Lenin's tomb for the Stalin funeral session) rise to power?
What does a grandmothers' lit. the lady have to do with killing off the Stalin legend?
We'll have a rare opportunity to untangle some of the Kremlin's tangled skein of information, misinformation and mystery this week and next in an extraordinarily well-documented "White Paper" produced by NBC and narrated by Chet Huntley.
Part One, "The Death of Stalin," is being aired Sunday, Jan. 27, on the NBC-TV Network from 10 to 11 p.m. (EST). Part two, "The Rise of Khrushchev," will be shown a week later, Sunday, Feb. 3. Much of the story is being told via actual film footage. Some of it so rare it was not previously even known to have existed.
"White Paper" is an apt term in that the dictionary tells me it means "official government report," for certainly the research is both painstaking and impartial, we learn. But "white" seems a coolish term for a program we've promised is going to be a real stunner.
Some of the stories we'll be hearing have not been heard before. Some of the "testimony" is contradictory.
Special interviews have been filmed with former high ranking Communists who have now turned to the West, as well as a few who haven't! Government officials appear as well as international newsmen with long familiarity on Russian matters, like Joseph C. Hirsch and Harrison Salisbury.
How was the late Lavrenti Beria "eliminated"? The dreaded head of Stalin's secret police, and who is reported literally to have jumped with joy when Stalin suffered the stroke that was to kill him, seemed the top contender for the "living god's" mantle. He was the only man permitted to carry a gun into the Kremlin, the secret police were under his control.
You'll hear evidence from many quarters: From a former Italian Communist who gives one set of facts, two currently high ranking Communists who give another version and finally the statement of a French official who heard Khrushchev himself discuss the subject. In fact, by the time the evidence has been heard we'll know as much about this real-life cloak and dagger story as anybody—anybody outside the Kremlin, that is.
The NBC team, headed by Irving Gittlin, executive producer, and Fred Freed, producer-writer, has done a thorough job.
It was my privilege to talk with Len Giovannitti, director and associate producer who spent four months traveling back and forth and around Europe to the very hem of the Iron Curtain tracking down facts, checking rumors and talking to people-in-the-know.
I asked about his interview with K. T. (not Krishna) Menon, Indian Ambassador to Moscow who was summoned to a rare audience by Stalin in February 1953 and who was the last non-Russian to speak with him before he suffered the stroke that silenced him only a week later.
Stalin, it seems, was exercising the old Russian prerogative of throwing in old Russian sayings. He was to the effect that a Russian peasant doesn't preach morals to a wolf, he shoots it. Then, Mr. Menon reports, he looked over at the paper on which Stalin was doodling. It was full of wolves!
Who was Stalin gunning for? Harrison Salisbury, Moscow-based reporter for the New York Times, tells how he first detected the signs that new purges were being set for 1953. Others noted an ominous deepening of his anti-West feeling.
We are to see the faces of the brass at Stalin's final rites, the faces of the people in Red Square and the faces of railroad workmen frozen motionless by the two-minute stoppage ordered throughout Russia that morning.
And then... the jolly scramble for power begins with the leadership group sharing authority, appearing in public together, and socializing together until one night one of them is missing from a performance of the Bolshoi Ballet. That's all, no comment. He just wasn't there with his buddies. Nor was he—Beria—ever seen again. The sun which had set on one "one-man rule" was about to rise on another.
Having gotten wind of the fact that NBC had material saying the destruction of the Stalin myth was not publicly started by Khrushchev actually, but by a woman, I wanted to know more. I visualized somebody like "Madame De-Farge" screaming for more executions during the French Revolution. I picked the wrong example it seems.
"D. A. Lasurkina," Mr. Giovannitti explained, "is elderly." They found, he went on to say, that she had been a member of the Russian Communist Party since 1902.

U.S. Waits New Note On N-Ban

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States expects to know within the next week or so whether there is any serious possibility of getting an agreement with the Soviet Union on a nuclear weapons test ban.
Further clues on the chances for a treaty and on Soviet Premier Khrushchev's objectives may be forthcoming with the return from Moscow of U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler. He is due in Washington Wednesday.
Kohler is bringing with him a new message for President Kennedy from the Soviet leader, presumably concerning the current test ban talks. They resume Tuesday in New York, with U.S., Soviet and British negotiators participating.
Khrushchev already has removed a major barrier to serious bargaining by telling Kennedy in an exchange of letters that he would accept two or three on-site inspections a year in the Soviet Union as part of a system to prevent cheating.

CLEMSON, S. C. (AP)—Negro Harvey B. Gantt was enrolled in Clemson College today, the first break in public school segregation in South Carolina.
Strict security measures were imposed as the 20-year-old architectural student was admitted as transfer student from Iowa State University.
Uniformed highway patrolmen manned all entrances to the campus and admitted only those persons with credentials.
Earlier, Clemson President Robert C. Edwards said this would be a historic day for South Carolina.
"Whether it's a great day, we'll let the historians say later," Dr. Robert C. Edwards told a news conference crowd of about 150 a few hours before Negro Harvey Gantt was to be enrolled.

Man Claims Guns Were for Rebels

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—A New York City man was under arrest here today on a charge of procuring guns from pawn shops for resale, he said, to anti-Castro Cubans in New York City.
Transilio Lopez, 32, was charged with 15 counts of giving false information to authorities and for procuring guns.
He was ordered held in bail of \$5,000 pending further investigation.
Police said he had purchased 15 weapons during a five-month period and had taken them to New York.

Atlantic Crisis Under Scrutiny By Russians

PARIS (AP)—The Kremlin was an interested and probably highly delighted spectator today as Western statesmen wrestled with the threat of a deep Atlantic crisis.
At worst, the European Economic Community—Europe's hope for a start toward broad political and economic integration—could be split by the bitter dispute over British membership in the EEC and its common market and France's chair in the North Atlantic Alliance could in effect be vacated, at least for a time.
That would be a major triumph for which Nikita Khrushchev would not even have to lift a finger.
At best, the EEC ministers meeting in Brussels will come forward with some formula to prevent a final slamming of the door in Britain's face because of France's opposition to her membership in the Common Market.
The heart of the crisis is in France, where the lofty figure of President Charles de Gaulle represents a key to Europe's future. Haunting fears of disaster, with which the EEC leaders have lived ever since De Gaulle dropped a bomb in their midst, seem to be making close to reality.
The gloom over De Gaulle's concept of Europe's future has deepened so much that many diplomats are taking quite seriously the possibility that the French president might make some overture of his own toward the Soviet Union.
Khrushchev, hoping for heavy profits, is not likely to commit Stalin's mistakes while the West struggles with its own home-grown crisis. He probably will be careful to avoid any Soviet action which could push the Europeans together again. He is not likely to threaten West Berlin or apply pressures elsewhere at this moment, but rather to be discreetly quiet, waiting for the masonry of mediation efforts led by Mayor Robert F. Wagner, recessed until mid-afternoon after three sessions totaling 12½ hours. It followed a 13-hour City Hall negotiation meeting Saturday, also with no progress reported in attempts to end a printers' strike.

Fear Shift Setting Up Third Force

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP)—Ministers of the six Common Market nations met tonight for a battle over Britain's membership application, with France seemingly alone in opposition.
Continental friends of the British sought to keep the application alive and thereby prevent French domination of Western Europe. French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville strode into the conference chamber of Belgium's new Foreign Ministry Building half an hour late after private consultations with the West Germans.
The British were not represented in the conference chamber. Diplomatic sources said the outcome of the membership issue will have a tremendous impact on future political, economic and defense arrangements in the entire North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
Shortly before the conference got under way, the West Germans, in a series of private meetings, made it clear they wanted to avoid a knock-down argument with the French.
The ministers of West Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg said privately they knew they were playing for tremendous stakes.
They felt the future of the Common Market, the solidarity of the Western Alliance and the place of the United States and Britain in Continental affairs rested on their efforts. The five gave first priority to maintaining a solid front against French pressure, informants said.
At a meeting with French ministers later today they planned to push forward a compromise proposal—largely the work of the West Germans—to delay a showdown on the British membership issue for at least two or three weeks.
With time, the five thought they could head off radical realignments inside the Western camp which they felt could only give comfort to Soviet Premier Khrushchev in the long run.
The representatives of the five shared the same fear. They are convinced that French President Charles de Gaulle envisaged a Western Europe permeated with sour mistrust of the English-speaking peoples and organized as a third force capable of reach-

Borneo Claims Shadow Asian Defense Talks

LONDON (AP)—Britain and the Philippines opened talks on Southeast Asia defense problems today against the dark backdrop of a new threat to British North Borneo by Indonesian volunteers.
Britain sent a unit trained as paratroopers into the protectorate of Brunel, a small territory in North Borneo where an uprising was put down last month, said a military spokesman in Singapore.
Reports here said another 2,000 British troops were placed on alert, ready to fly to North Borneo to meet any action by Indonesia. About 3,000 seasoned British troops are there now.
While Indonesia denied that its so-called volunteers are massing on the border area of North Borneo, it sent its army commander on a tour of the frontier of adjoining Indonesian Borneo. He is Maj. Gen. Achmad Yani. North Borneo is composed of the sultanate of Brunel and the territories of Sarawak and North Borneo.
The London talks were complicated by the Philippine claim to North Borneo, and its opposition to the plan for a Southeast Asian federation to be called Malaysia. This would like the three parts of

Rusk Concerned About Cuba Arms

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Soviet Union has placed four heavily armed combat groups in Cuba and Soviet pilots there are flying MIG fighters capable of carrying nuclear weapons, says Secretary of State Dean Rusk.
The continued presence of Soviet armed forces on the island is a "matter of real concern" to the United States, Rusk said Sunday night. But he bowed to the administration line that the Red forces essentially are defensive in nature.
The best U.S. intelligence guess, Rusk said in a radio and television interview is that there are no nuclear warheads in Cuba. He added, "We have had some indication from the Soviet Union" that at least portions of the combat forces and missiles "will be removed in due course."
Rusk gave no hint that there is any U.S. deadline for Soviet troop removal from Cuba. He said there has been some "out-traffic" in recent weeks and declared: "It must be our policy that penetration of this hemisphere by a Communist regime from outside is unacceptable to this hemisphere."
MIG fighters have been entering Cuba for many months, Rusk said. He also mentioned reports that Soviet pilots are training Cubans to fly them.
Commenting on the Soviet combat groups on the island, Rusk described them as "relatively small" but, nonetheless, "a matter of some real concern."

Several Congress members, primarily Republicans, contend Soviet military power in Cuba is increasing dangerously. The situation was the subject of a Senate inquiry last week and another Senate probe will be held shortly.
Rusk is to testify today on Soviet military activity in Cuba before the House Foreign Affairs Committee.
Over the weekend an intelligence summary circulated among top U.S. officials reported that since last fall's crisis only one Soviet ship has put in at a Cuban port with a "significant amount" on military equipment.
The summary left little doubt that the Soviet Union has assembled very heavy conventional firepower in Cuba, but maintained the buildup was achieved between July and October.
Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois found Sunday that his plans for a one-man investigation of the Bay of Pigs disaster may not all well with New York's two Republican senators.
Sen. Jacob K. Javits said he does not believe any inquiry should be pertinaciously conducted. He said in a taped television interview that the survey should be conducted by a bipartisan Senate-Roosevelt committee.
Javits' colleague, Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, said in an interview "this matter should be taken up by a properly constituted committee of Congress," and "should be entirely divorced from political partisanship."

Domestic Peace Corps Settles in Small Office

WASHINGTON (AP)—A few top story rooms in an old house on Jackson Square, just a stone's throw from the White House, are the nursery for the newest baby on the New Frontier.
The baby doesn't even have a name yet. Some call it the Domestic Peace Corps. In his budget message, President Kennedy called it the National Service Corps.

The storm swept into the lower Great Lakes region and along the western slopes of the Appalachians. Heavy snow fell in some areas and strong westerly winds caused considerable blowing and drifting.
No immediate break in the prolonged spell of cold weather was in sight. The number of weather-related deaths since last midweek rose to 12.
It was below zero again this morning in most of the upper Great Lakes region, the Ohio Valley and westward across the northern plains. The core of the arctic air was over the Mississippi Valley from St. Louis to Duluth, Minn.
Among the coldest spots were Moline, Ill., and Lone Rock, Wis., with 24 below zero. It was the lowest temperature in Moline since Feb. 13, 1956.
Rochester, Minn., reported its 17th consecutive day of below zero readings, a record. Dea Moines has had 16 straight days of subzero cold. It was 9 in Louisville, Ky., and the -12 in Chicago beat the record low of -11 for Jan. 28 set in 1885. Evansville, in southern Indiana, reported -15, a record for the date.
The icy air dipped deep into the South. It was near zero in parts of Tennessee and readings in the teens chilled central sections of Alabama and Georgia.
Near freezing was reported in northern Florida, with the low 30s reported along the Gulf Coast and

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
