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Blunt Note May Spur Vote Call

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Killed Projects Back On Directors' Agenda

General Manager Richard Martin Tuesday night will ask the Democratic-controlled board of directors to change their minds and now approve several capital improvements which they killed at the first meeting after they took office in November.

The projects were among a list totaling \$119,000 which the Republican-controlled board approved before going out of office in October. One of the first acts of the Democrats was to rescind the approval of \$50,000 for projects on that list, plus \$20,000 for a storm drain in Litchfield St.

The projects on the list are \$10,000 for an annex to the Municipal Building, \$7,000 for vault doors in the Hall of Records, \$10,000 for heating and electrical systems for the Municipal Building, \$10,000 for renovating the former technical school on School St. and \$8,000 for a Parker St. storm drain.

In November, Democrats said they wanted a longer plan of spending for capital improvements with an eye to bonding for all of them. The Republicans had proposed financing the \$119,000 from capital improvement reserves.

Directors will consider the general manager's recommendations.

Bolton Teacher Pay Meeting Set On Monday

A second meeting on teachers' salaries for 1968-69 will be held by the school board and Bolton Education Association Monday at 8 p.m. at the school.

At the Jan. 23 board meeting, the teachers presented a proposal for a salary schedule of \$4,700 to \$6,000 in 12 steps with 15 days sick leave, accumulative to 90 days the next year. The school building committee was disappointed in the proposal.

Officers elected at the meeting include Robert Simmer, moderator; Alvan Russell Jr., vice moderator; Miss Ruth Porter, church clerk; Robert McMillan, treasurer; Ernest Strong, assistant treasurer; and Mrs. Mark Hill, secretary.

The present salary scale is \$2,500 to \$7,250 in 12 steps, with \$200 increments on each step. The board asked the teachers to give consideration to a 1203 step on the proposed scale and to allowing higher increments at the beginning of the scale. Under the proposed scale there is a \$200 increase from the first to the second step, and \$300 increments thereafter.

The salary schedule is the only item on the agenda for the special meeting Monday night.

In contrast, there are 26 items on the agenda for the regular board meeting Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the school library. Proceeding the meeting, there will be an executive session at 7:30 p.m. to hear the recommendations of the superintendent on teaching personnel.

Under unfinished business, the board will take up: adoption as policy of the report of the Commission on the school library; consideration of the policies recommended by the superintendent; evaluation of educational TV; modification of policies concerning the school activity accounts; discussion and possible adoption of the teacher's salary schedule; tuition rates and water-proofing.

In his report, School Supt. Philip Liggett will review the recommended course of study for grades 7 to 8 and 9; recommended textbooks; in-service training expenses; and the school's participation in the Pub. 15 workshop; recommendations for housing pupils in 1968-69; a review of proposed legislation; review of the policy on free lunch; and review of the changes in plans for the administrative staff.

Minister in Hawaii Accepts Center Church Associate Post

The Rev. Joseph Dudley of Honolulu, Hawaii, has been called to serve as associate minister of Center Congregational Church. The appointment was recommended at the annual meeting of the church recently. The Rev. Mr. Dudley was minister of membership at Central Union Church, Honolulu. He plans to begin his duties within the next two weeks.

A budget of \$72,891 was presented by Frank Morano, chairman of the budget committee, and accepted by the congregation. Plans to remodel the sanctuary and rebuild the steeple were tabled until next year. The church building committee was disappointed in the proposal.

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From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

 Special celebrations and holidays are made more festive for friends and relatives of Roger M. Negro, 205 Oak St., who often makes an Italian Friccino Cake for their dining pleasure. He obtained the recipe from a famous New York City restaurateur, and says that a slice three inches long and two and one-half inches wide costs \$1.50 in the bakery.

Italian Friccino Cake
 1-8-inch round sponge cake layer
 2 pint vanilla ice cream
 2 pint raspberry sherbert
 1 cup ground pistachio nuts
 1 pint whipping cream
 1 pint cherry wine

Split sponge cake into three layers. Place one section in bottom of round mold pan. Sprinkle with one-eighth cup cherry wine. Spread with three-eighths cup currant jelly, one pint vanilla ice cream and one pint raspberry sherbert. Place second and third layers on cake, repeating the method for covering the first layer. Remember to sprinkle inside of layers with cherry wine. Place cake in freezer for at least two hours, or for best results, freeze overnight. Whip the cream to spreading consistency just prior to removing cake from freezer. Unmold cake onto a plate. Cover with cream, spread on sides and top with pistachio. Dust with ground pistachio nuts. Return to freezer until about 30 minutes before serving.

When making cake, soften the ice cream sherbert for easy spreading, and put currant jelly in small bowl and mix with a spoon and it will spread easily.

Larger cakes may be made by making the sponge cake in an angle cake pan, and using the pan instead of a mold. Increase ice cream and sherbert to one-half gallon, use two 10-ounce jars of currant jelly, one and one-half pints of cream, mix and increase the amount of cherry wine. Use the method as described for smaller cake. Not quite three-quarters of the ice cream and sherbert will be needed.

The smaller cake may also be made in a loaf pan.

Negro said that the cake should be served in small portions to preserve the flavor, a hint that he follows with all cakes made with liquor or wine.

Negro was born and educated in Manchester. He is owner of the B and N general insurance and real estate agency, which he conducts at his home. He lives with his mother, Mrs. Theresa Negro. Negro is a member of the Italian American Society and its past vice president; a member of the Manchester Lodge of Elks, a member and past president of the Manchester Fine Arts Association, and has been active with the Manchester Community Players since 1961.

Rockville-Vernon Finance Unit Refuses Funds for Wing Plan

Revision of plans for the proposed high school wing appears in the offing today after a "wing clipping" session last night by the board of finance on the high school building committee's present plan. The building committee presented the finance board for approval of a \$25,000 appropriation to obtain final plans for all aspects of the project—both the retaining wall and the wing itself.

The finance board said the town couldn't afford the school project as presented by the building committee and then stated that it might approve funds for final plans if the total project cost was estimated to amount \$900,000 or \$1,000,000. A motion was made to set the figure at \$900,000, but failed to draw a second.

Last week, the building committee approved plans for the wing and the pool estimated to cost \$1.1 million, of which \$1.3 million was estimated for the wing and \$977,000 for the pool.

Last night, Arthur Cook, architect, ended the pool estimates down to \$860,000 to \$730,000. The finance board voted twice but rejecting funds for the pool plans. It also rejected the wing plans by a 2-1 vote. Voting for approval of funds for the wing plans was Herbert Hennesbury, voting against were Robert Deane, Almer Brown and Joseph McManis.

Deane said he understood the original report by the board of education (which had also approved the plans presented last night) was for 20 additional classrooms. He said the school board had felt the additional rooms would be enough to house 1,000 pupils, how he said, "I understand the board is now saying that 'it just isn't right.'"

Superintendent of Schools Raymond Deane repeatedly had said the swimming pool and the music room are the only additional facilities beyond those originally asked by the board of education.

Almer Brown said the finance board's rejection will delay progress on the school building, but that the building committee in all likelihood will press forward with the plans with the idea of getting the wing built by the end of September 1968 for use of the wing.

Deane said that if plans for the gymnasium, the pool and music room are eliminated, the project probably can be done for under \$1 million.

An Executive order by the board of education will have to study the finance board's action, and then come up with a new recommendation and set of instructions to the building committee. The committee would then work with the architect on any revisions suggested, and then go back to the board of finance for approval of the revised plan.

Approval by the finance board of planning funds will require the vote of a special town meeting. It had been anticipated that funds for the present plans (if approved by the finance board) would have been considered at the town meeting tentatively set for Feb. 20.

Coventry Audit Report On File with Town Clerk

The town audit for the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1967 has been filed with Town Clerk...

In the report, Stevens commented that the financial books of the town in general are those prescribed by the State Tax Commission...

Stevens said "We are pleased to note that our review year's recommendations regarding the following were instituted."

(a) Treasurer—destruction of bonds and coupons after payment; and (b) Tax Collector—tax roll corrections on all lists approximating 100 per cent of the current year tax levy.

Stevens recommended that the selection and the Town Treasurer, request permission of the Commissioner of Agriculture that at least \$2,500 in the Dog License Fund be transferred to the general fund.

This recommendation is based on the fact that "Restrictions placed upon this money by State Statute restrict its use to compensation of dog wardens, license certificates, tags and the construction and maintenance of dog pounds, unless written approval is obtained from the Commissioner of Agriculture."

Further recommendations include that a system of pre-numbered, carbon copy receipts be used for all licenses and permits issued by the building department to provide proper audit verification and accounting.

He noted that invoices filed for services of the health director "did not contain approval for payment by the chairman of the board of health or its secretary, and the recording in minutes of the board authorizing such payment."

"We do not question the amount paid to the town director of health. However, in our opinion, the provisions of the statutes have not been complied with."

Stevens again recommended that the board of health establish a salary for the health director's post.

The auditor recommended that a system to record receipt of trailer license fees be instituted in the building department and that records of all town boards and departments be placed under fireproof protection, as previously urged.

The complete audit report may be examined at the Town Clerk's office.
