STAMFORD (AP) - William H. Brennan, prominent figure in Republican politics and a former GOP National Committeeman, died in St. Joseph's Hospital today. He had been in ill health in re-

cent months. Brennan, ousted in 1952 as national committeeman, had retired from active politics in 1958 for

He was GOP leader of Fairfield County for many years.

Brennan, 65, was named national committeeman in 1950 with the approval of the then Gov. John D. Lodge. Two years later he was replaced, and he said it was on Lodge's order.

At the time, Brennan, a Stam ford resident, said he was recon-ciled to his ouster because "There is no chance to battle it when the Governor is sole boss."

Brennan became Fairfield County Republican chairman in 1942. He managed the two successful congressional campaigns of Clare Boothe Luce, and directed the election campaigns of Gov. James L. McConnaughty in 1946 and of Gov. James C. Shannon in 1948.

He served for several years as an assistant state party chairman under Harold E. Mitchell. In 1950 he was field agent for the GOP Senatorial Campaign Committee in several eastern states.

OTTAWA (AP)—The Canadian Cabinet fell apart today. Defense Minister Douglas Harkness, an advocate of nuclear weapons for Canada, resigned and indicated that dissolution of Parliament is

near. Such dissolution would bring April elections, with Prime Min-ister John G. Diefenbaker seekparty to a clear-cut majority in Parliament.

Harkness in resigning said his and Diefenbaker's views were irreconcilable.

"For over two years you have been aware that I believed war-heads should be supplied to the four weapons systems we have acquired which are adapted to their use," Harkness told Diefenbaker. "Throughout this period I believed that they would be authorized at the appropriate time.
"During the last two weeks
particularly, I have made absolutely clear what I considered the minimum position I could accept, and several times have offered to resign unless it was agreed to.
"It has become quite obvious during the last few days that your views and mine as to the
