

## 3 Quakes Rock Libya, Hundreds Dead, Hurt

**BENHAZI, Libya (AP)**—A series of three shattering earthquakes left more than four-fifths of the coastal town of Beni Mazar in ruins today and hundreds were believed dead or injured.

Radio Libya put casualties at 80 dead and 100 injured. A U.S. Air Force spokesman said unconfirmed reports indicated 500 were killed and 1,000 injured. The Air Force sent 11 air transports loaded with relief supplies from its base near Tripoli.

Most of the casualties apparently came in the first shock Thursday afternoon. Two more quakes struck this morning as rescue work was in full swing.

Benha, Beni Mazar and Beni Mazar, 65 miles to the southwest, were killed in an area of 30 square miles in and around Beni Mazar, which has a population of 50,000.

The first shock struck at sundown Thursday as most persons were sitting down to their evening meals.

People fled into the streets. Buildings and houses toppled, trapping many in the ruins.

A second shock came at 7:30 a.m. as relief workers toiled in the ruins. The third came an hour and a half later.

British troops took charge of rescue operations after an appeal for help from local Libyan authorities.

British aid was flown from the Benghazi area and from Cyprus.

A British-American control center was established in Beni Mazar. U.S. relief supplies were flown in from the Air Force's Wheelus base near Tripoli, 800 miles west of the quake area.

The Libyan government declared an emergency throughout the country.

U.S. planes rushed medical personnel and supplies from the Air Force's Wheelus base near Tripoli, 800 miles west of the quake area.

The first plane carried a field hospital, two surgeons, three other doctors and medical corpsmen able to parachute into the quake area.

British troops hurried to the scene with aid from their station at Benghazi, one of Libya's twin capitals 85 miles southwest of Beni Mazar. Libyan officials flew from Tripoli to supervise rescue operations.

It was North Africa's worst earthquake since the March 1964 quake which killed an estimated 15,000 in Agadir, Morocco.

Al Mazar, a town of 10,000 also known as Barce, is near the top of the hump of Cyrenaica thrusting northward to the Mediterranean Sea.

It is a resort, agricultural center and road and rail junction. About 27,000 persons live in the area around the town.

## Labor Assails President on Tax, Economy

**MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)**—Top labor union leaders, it was learned today, have decided after much soul-searching to file a bitter protest direct with President Kennedy on his domestic economic policies.

The Negro development yet at AFL-CIO winter meetings here is a secret session held on the Kennedy economic program. The labor leaders feel the President's proposals, including his tax reduction plan, are too feeble even if enacted by Congress to effectively curb unemployment.

The question was how far labor wanted to go, as a political ally of the President and the Democratic party, in voicing criticism of Kennedy policies.

The decision—after thorough debate, the details of which are yet unknown—is that the AFL-CIO has prepared statements for weekly release that will hit Kennedy's economic policy.

The statements will not mention, however, that George Meany, AFL-CIO president, and other labor leaders, including Walter Reuther, United Auto Workers president, have agreed to convey personally much stronger objections to the White House.

From talking with union chiefs, it is obvious that they are disappointed at the domestic economic results during the first half of Kennedy's administration.

They are angry that Congress, they nevertheless feel that he could have done more.

## Red Grafters Shot to Death In Crackdown

**MOSCOW (AP)**—Soviet firing squads are being kept busy executing local officials and others convicted of taking bribes, graft and illegal currency deals.

Soviet newspapers in the past week reported at least eight death sentences in widely scattered localities for crimes of corruption.

The surge of newspaper accounts is intended to warn government officials and others that a general crackdown on such activity. The Soviet press ordinarily does not publish crime news with such a motive.

In addition to the death sentences, more than 20 other persons were handed prison terms ranging up to 25 years.

In the latest case, the head of a group of black marketeers and currency operators at Alma Ata in Kazakhstan was sentenced to be shot.

A Kazakhstan newspaper reported that shop manager Yachun Vaituyev amassed 100,000 rubles (\$11,000) at the official exchange rate.

He was accused of importing gold coins and scarce goods from foreign countries and trading in them.

## Assault Shows Castro Can Be Troublemaker

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The United States may be facing a period of virtual guerrilla warfare in the Caribbean area around Cuba.

Whether this dangerous possibility develops appears to depend primarily on how Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro decides to use the extensive arms including jet fighters planes, supplied to him by the Soviet Union.

President Kennedy, as he made clear at a news conference Thursday, is watching the situation closely and with several unanswered questions in his mind about the fighter plane attack late Wednesday on a U.S. shrimp boat in the Florida Straits about 100 nautical miles off the Cuban coast.

Kennedy and his military and diplomatic advisers are not sure what was behind this assault on a small, unarmed vessel in international waters.

"We thought it was an ordinary plane," said Benjamin M. Spilhaus, Kennedy's top aide, said he was watching to see whether a pattern of attacks against surface and aircraft traveling in the region around Castro's stronghold.

If it turns out that the strike at the shrimp boat was an isolated incident without Cuban government sanction, concern for the top levels of the administration here will ease off somewhat.

The Cuban government said Thursday night it was not responsible for the attack.

What the shrimp boat affair has dramatized for the moment is Castro's ability to make trouble if he wants to.

## Sections May Collapse In Six-Story Structure

**HARTFORD (AP)**—A three-alarm fire at Ann and Asylum Sts., which began just after midnight in near-zero cold, destroyed a six-story building housing Frank's Restaurant and still raged at mid-morning. Danger mounted that parts of the building would collapse.

Four firemen suffering from smoke inhalation and other injuries were treated at St. Francis Hospital and reported in "good condition" this morning.

Late this morning, it appeared that losses in the blaze may total \$500,000 or more.

Samuel Siegal, a member of Lincoln Building Associates, the firm which owns the building, estimated the structure's value at \$300,000.

Frank Parselti, co-owner of Frank's Restaurant, said the restaurant loss will be about \$100,000.

Destruction of valuable dental and other equipment in various offices could take the total damage over a half-million dollars.

## Kennedy Calls Conference on News Policy

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The White House is inviting representatives of all news-gathering media to an unprecedented April conference that could turn into a showdown over the Kennedy administration's public information policies.

The session will be held at a private retreat near Warrenton, Ore., April 14-15, it was learned today. Arrangements are being made by Pierre Salinger, White House press secretary.

Informed sources said the conference was prompted in part by the fact that several associations of news-gathering media are expressing deep concern over the administration's public information policies.

Police officials, who reported that the intersection of Ann and Asylum Sts. were blocked several days, said traffic problems were said this morning because of the holiday.

Gray, acrid smoke poured from the cracks of cornices on the building, now judged to be a total loss. Chief Lee explained that the building's tarred roof and heavy beams were causing most of the trouble.

He said that while firemen were restricted to fighting the blaze from the outside, it appeared they were able to contain damage to the structure on the northeast corner.

Mayor William E. Glynn arrived at the scene of the fire at 1 a.m., straight from a budget meeting of the City Council where the fire department budget had been discussed.

Budget Bids Expected To Top \$9 Million

General fund budget requests for 1968-69 will probably amount to \$9 million, by the time they are turned in by all departments. This is an increase of \$1 million over the current fiscal year, and does not include a \$1.5 million capital improvement program...

Another \$2 million was expected, including the miscellaneous budget for such items as insurance premiums, bond payments on capital improvements of past years, and capital improvements for the coming year. The request for miscellaneous expenditures this year was \$1,740,000, and on the basis of increases in past years, the request is expected to be \$1.9 million. Another \$100,000 is requested as a reserve from the board of directors, general manager, controller and civil defense department, on the basis of their previous requests.

If the general manager and the board of directors were to pass along these budget requests, the amount would be \$3,870,000. This would mean a mill rate of 41 mills for the general fund. It has been the custom for both the general manager and the board of directors to cut budget requests, some of them extensively.

Another budget request which affects some Manchester taxpayers is that of the Town of Deerpark, which is now asking for a mill rate of 2.5 mills. This mill rate might go to 3 mills to meet the new taxes.

Other budgets submitted for other funds are the board of directors' request for \$278,000, an increase from the current budget of \$274,654; the water department budget of \$401,700, an increase from the current \$388,700; and the fire department budget of \$9,000, an increase from the current \$7,000.

Revenue for these funds is raised through fees for services and assessments for installations rather than through taxes. One fund dropped out of existence this year, the parking meter fund which the board of directors voted last month to turn into the general fund reserve fund.

At the end of next week, General Manager Richard Marle will have in his hands the revised grand list of property on which taxes will be levied. The board of tax review must submit the list by Feb. 28.

A public hearing on his final recommendation will be held some time before April 7. The board of directors will begin budget work before April 8, and adopt a final budget and set the tax rate by May 4.

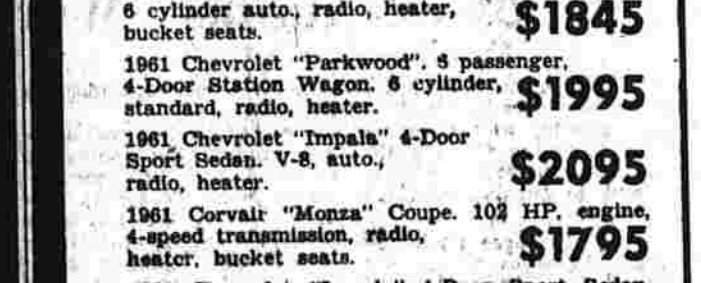

More than a dozen accomplices were sentenced to 15 years or less in prison. At Gorky, 400 miles east of Moscow, a supply depot chief was sentenced to death for demanding kickbacks from state drivers he hired to haul supplies.

The former mayor of Dushanbe, capital of the small southern Soviet republic of Tadzhikistan, received the death sentence for taking graft in the distribution of state-administered apartments and property lots. He also received a sentence of 10 years for the allocation of priorities for purchase of automobiles. These penalties received prison terms of from 4 to 8 years.
