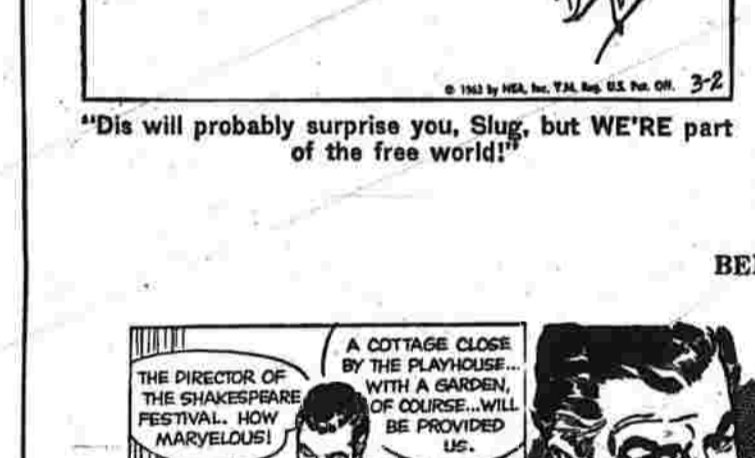
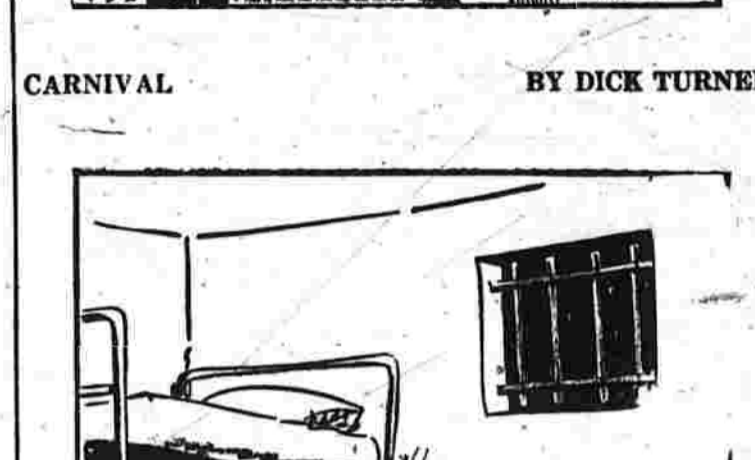

Ron Cochran Stars On ABC News Show

 Circa Valentine's Day, 1968, Ron Cochran — latest of the big-time television commentators to have a prime time network program wear his name — issued some of the costliest air to "issue a challenge to my friendly competitors, Walter Cronkite, David Brinkley and Chet Huntley."
 Though he's challenging them in more ways than this, his last month's "invitation" to his CBS and NBC counterparts referred specifically to one of these fifty-mile hikes that White House approval abruptly made as fashionable for adults as the "laundromat" crews had earlier become for the college set. He followed up his telecast gauntlet with telegrams . . . a mighty wise procedure considering they're all on the air on their respective networks at pretty much the same time.
 Unlike Julius Caesar, Cochran finds the idea of March just fine — for on the fifteenth he rounds out his first year on the "new ABC News Staff."

James Hagerty, former Eisenhower press secretary who is now vice president in charge of news for ABC, tossed a hefty bouquet at the outset saying, "Cochran has proved himself one of the best reporters in television and radio. His appointment is another important step in our long range plan to build the ABC News Department to the foremost position among the networks." Cochran had, indeed, long since proved himself a champion with a record of taking on nightly newscast "slips" in Washington and New York and turning them into top rated shows in town.

As a sort of "advance anniversary present" you might say, Cochran several weeks ago saw his name go up in lights. What used to be "ABC Evening Report" is now "Ron Cochran With The News." Further, the network also treated him to a new set and a new production team.

Though he himself gets to the studio at 10:30 a.m. every day and stays until about 7:30 on a normal day and "perhaps as late as 8:30 if a big story is breaking that might mean major updating for the West Coast," he's quick to point out, it takes a lot of people to put this program together.

"I haven't figured it out exactly but off-the-cuff I'd guess that at least 10 man hours a day go in-

to this 15-minute show. You know you can present 100 facts in 15 minutes and do it very dully, which is not what we're out to do. They want to hear — as well as the I believe in giving people the news they should hear but don't want to — in a way that will make them tune in. Remember," he said, "a television audience is strictly voluntary." He indicated they're using everything short of magic to attract that tune-in.

One of Cochran's first actions was to utilize the commentary and reporting of ABC newsmen based in key areas around the country because "regional stories often take on national implications."

Cochran is well acquainted with both country and city living. He was born on the then-pioneer-edge of Saskatchewan, Canada, because that's where his American wheat farmer parents were living at the time. The family returned to Fairfield, Iowa, when Ron was 6 and he stayed in Iowa until his graduation from Parsons College. Then he moved on to Illinois.

"It's hard to believe now," he says, "but prior to World War II about the only job my degree in physics would get was as a teacher." That didn't appeal to him so he followed the advice customarily showered on him after an appearance with the college drama group or debating society, "Why don't you go into radio?" He got an announcer's job in Rock Island. He moved next to Des Moines and got "rather carefully supervised news training" from the "Des Moines Register and News which owned the station. This, he adds, was a lucky break, for news reporting had become the "special province, otherwise on radio, of a group of rather flamboyant newsmen."

"And have you specialized in news and broadcasting ever since?"

"Oh yes," replied Cochran, "except for my wartime years with the FBI."

What did he do? "Well," he said dryly, "I learned a lot that few newsmen are privileged to find out about espionage and subversion and about which I still cannot talk." He added that when some of the cases he had worked on later became publicly known "it was just like reading the old files." He did say that as an FBI insider he started worrying about the Communist menace a lot sooner than the general public and had already developed calmness and judgment in the time interval before the information was released and the public began to be alarmed.

After the war he directed and appeared on news programs in Boston, then Washington and finally New York. He met the real-life nightmare of all television newsmen one night when the film projectors set up in a makeshift studio all burned out and he had to do the whole program with himself on camera the whole time. He says that in order to compensate for the time usually given over to pictures he kept

stretching and elaborating so much on each item he tackled that "I had material left over when the time was up." And he allows as how after that, no TV crisis is apt to faze him so he just doesn't worry about possible mechanical or electronic slip-ups.

He left his WCBS newscast after it had been rated "most watched program in New York City." Why? Because CBS had issued an "either-or" to newsmen (they could no longer do both news and such commercial chores as emceeing, hosting or announcing.) The "news strip" had become routine so "I chose Armstrong Theater and the free-lance route instead." It was his old CBS boss, Bob Lange, who had since trekked to ABC, who lured him into the ABC-Hagerty realm. "I guess," Cochran commented, "I

have more of a mania, you might say, to 'keep building the house' than to 'settle down in it.'" At ABC, they assure him its going to be work, work, work — just the stuff that makes him happy.

Does this mania for "building" mean he's a real-life do-it-yourself type around home? Well, inside the house . . . no. He once read too many books on gardening and started telling Mrs. Cochran why things that grow only in the sun wouldn't thrive in the shade. She promptly turned over her rake to him and he reigned pretty much as king of near-outdoors ever since, or at least until now. What with the ABC schedule, Mrs. C. has relented (started hitting the gardening books herself, in fact) and is putting her newly green thumb to work. "Just helping, I guess," Cochran commented, "I

Hollywood on TV

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — "What Ever Happened to Baby Jane?" was a Hollywood story answered in the movie.

What ever happened to Frank McGrath? That's a Hollywood story, too. He hasn't been "seen," you might say, since one day back in 1957 when he showed up "scared to death" at a telefilm studio.

For 35 years before that day Frank feared neither man, beast falling off a roof or stopping a team of runaway horses. He was a movie stunt man and the best in the business.

What he was scared about that day in 1957 was a one-shot chance at a permanent role in the television series, "Wagon Train." He had "starred" in a hundred movie scenes as a stunt man, doubling for stars, but never in his life had he appeared in front of a camera as himself or as an actor with lines to speak.

"And I wasn't about to that day in 1957, either," he laughed. "I was scared to death. I thought I'd grow a beard so people wouldn't recognize me, and it was a funny thing. Behind that beard I stopped being scared."

As things turned out, that beard gave McGrath the courage of Samson as an actor, and the role of Charley Wooster he plays on "Wagon Train" is one of television's beloved characters.

Under safe cover of the snow white brush on what he calls his "horseplayer's chin," he moved up from a few lines to recently polishing off an hour-long love episode with guest star Thelma Ritter.

He takes a lot of good-natured kidding about his bristly trademark and he's not slow in kidding back in his staccato way of talking.

When people ask whether his wife objects to him for not shaving year after year, he grins:

"She's become so accustomed to spending money she doesn't say much about it any more."

His big ambition is to shave some day and appear as himself on "What's My Line?" Early in the show's history, he did shave as a prelude to a love scene with Agnes Moorhead. "But," he laughs, "the incident healed, and I re-

TV Notebook

Actor William Redfield, now featured in the long-run dramatic hit, "A Man For All Seasons," was a child actor. From the time he was 9, when he appeared in "Swing You, Partner" with Hope Emerson (who taught him risqué songs), he worked in dozens of plays. He now has two sons of his own, and he fervently hopes they choose some other career.

"Acting," Redfield says, "is no longer a profession which leads to an abundant life. I'm not talking about material things—if you're successful, you can have a good life, financially, as an actor. I'm talking about artistic satisfaction. That's what makes life truly abundant, and that's almost impossible for an actor today."

Redfield says that acting—he defines it as "creating another human being and making him live"—is seldom demanded today.

He draws a distinction between stage actors and "businessmen"—the Hollywood actors.

"They don't really act in movies," he says. "Spencer Tracy is a possible exception. But all the others may be great at their profession, but it isn't acting. It is impossible to act in bits and pieces, which is what they do when they make a movie or a filmed television show. That may take some skill and be hard work, but you can't call it acting."

Redfield insists that even Broadway offers little opportunity for the abundant acting life. "Take the actor that I consider the man with the most skill and talent," he says. "That's Marlon Brando. He couldn't find enough challenging acting roles on the stage, so he went to the movies. He's wasting his talent now. The talent has to have a place to go, so it comes out in odd ways—like playing Fletcher Christian with a lisp."

As a movie stunt man who broke into the movie business in 1921 after running away from his home in Mound City, Mo., Frank's only real claim to Hollywood's idea of "fame" was being able to tell how he "killed" himself.

In an early western he played the dual roles of an Indian (courtesy of the make-up department) and one of John Wayne's ranch hands. One morning he led the Indians in an attack on the white settlers. In the afternoon he crouched behind a wagon wheel and, as the ranch hand, shot himself as the Indian. It can be done in the movies, you know, with film cutting.

Because of his diminutive size, Frank worked as a stunt double for heroines as well as heroes. As early as 1923, he wore a blonde wig and doubled for Laura LaPlante and Joan Crawford.

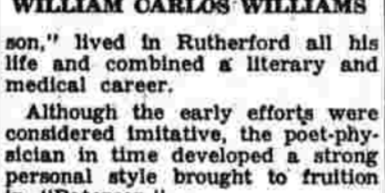
