## Dodd Refuted On N-Treaty

WASHINGTON (AP) — The administration has fired a point-by-point rebuttal at Sen. Thomas Dodd and other congressional critics of its proposed nuclear test ban treaty with the Soviet Union.

Adrian S. Fisher, deputy director of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, said the United States can retain its present nuclear superiority better under a treaty prohibiting tests than it can through an uncontrolled arms race.

His views, outlined in a letter to the Washington Post and published today, were aimed at expressions of alarm by Dodd, a Connecticut Democrat, and others that the United States has trimmed too drastically the safeguards it wants written into a test ban pact to prevent cheating.

The principal one is a reduction from 25 to seven on-site inspections within the Soviet Union annually to prevent secret underground tests, providing the Soviets meet other safeguards.

Russia has rejected the plan and Fisher's chief, Director William C. Foster, of the disarmament agency, returned to Washington Saturday from the 17-nation talks at Geneva.

Fisher's counterattack made these points:

—Dodd was not correct in claiming in a letter to the Post last week that secret Russian testing under the protection of such a treaty would present the United States with a choice between a "right-to-work" law, the influence of risk of detection would discourage secret testing and underground tests could not make a major change in the strategic balance.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Labor Department looked back on a half century today to celebrate the astonishing change time has brought to the lot of the American working man.

This is the department's 50th anniversary. President Kennedy will help mark the occasion at a banquet tonight attended by some 3,000 department employees and representatives of labor and management.

It was on March 4, 1913, just before riding to the Capitol on his last day in the White House, that William Howard Taft, a Republican, signed a law creating the department. His successor, Woodrow Wilson, a Democrat, immediately named William Wilson, no relation, as the first labor secretary.

## Snowslide Buries Minister, Children

OURAY, Colo. (AP) — An avalanche of snow, slithering down a hill at racing car speed, swept over a high mountain road Sunday, burying a Congregational minister, his two daughters and their car.

Rescuers, endangered by other slides, searched the snow mass in canyon alongside U.S. 569 on Red Mountain Pass for the Rev. Marvin Hudson, 39, and daughters, Amelia, 17, and Pauline, 12.

"I don't feel there's any chance they're alive," said Sheriff Albert Brown. "I've been in snowslides. The concussion is terrific. It could have knocked them unconscious. There's also a tremendous amount of mist. It's almost impossible to breathe in it."

A snowplow operator, Leo H. James, said he saw the slide whisk down East Riverside Gulch and over the mountain. He was crouched by his stuck car, apparently putting on tire chains. The girls were inside the car.

## Navajo Voters Tune In On First Hot Campaign

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. (AP) — A unique election opened in the United States today as the Navajo Indians—a sovereign nation by treaty—elected a tribal chairman and the 76-member tribal council, their highest governing body.

An estimated 25,000 Navajos, representing about 80 per cent of the total registered, were expected to vote.

Voting spread far beyond the Navajo reservation, which covers parts of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah and is about the size of West Virginia.

Ballots have been sent to Chicago, Los Angeles, the San Francisco Bay Area, Cleveland and Cincinnati, Ohio, Dallas, Tex., Albuquerque, N.M., and other areas with sizable Navajo communities.

The ballots will be flown back to Window Rock, tribal headquarters, to be tabulated. Results may be known late Tuesday or early Wednesday.

All day Sunday, radios on the reservation crackled with the political statements in the Navajo language.

"Shin-a-hata-bay-ah-shi. — I stand on my record. — We need a change." — "We need a change."

Speeches were broadcast by stations in Gallup and Farmington, N.M.; Page, Holbrook and Flagstaff, Ariz.; Cortez, Colo., and Blanding, Utah.

The office of tribal chairman, a \$30,000-a-year job, is held by Paul Jones, 55. He is running for his third four-year term.

## Miners Fight Draft Orders By DeGaulle

MERLEBACH, France (AP) — Striking coal miners of eastern France's Lorraine region defied President Charles de Gaulle's draft orders today and refused to work.

Riot police were on duty to guard against violence.

Mine officials said at mid-morning that more than 96 per cent of the miners in the Lorraine basin were continuing their strike beyond the government deadline.

De Gaulle signed an order drafting the striking miners Saturday. Union leaders in the Lorraine basin, retaliating by issuing handbills telling miners to set up picket lines and stay away from their jobs. French coal mines are government-owned.

The presidential decree meant that any miner who failed to show up at the pits could be fined or sent to jail.

Leaders of the Socialist Union said the "regulation will have no effect on the miners except to increase their discontent and crystallize the will to battle in various ways."

The Christian Workers Confederation said "the miners are in the process of deciding the forms of their resistance."

About 200,000 miners throughout France walked out last Friday, pledging to stay out until they got higher wages and shorter hours.

## Williams, 79, Poet, Doctor, Dead in N.J.

RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Dr. William Carlos Williams, a leading American poet for four decades, died of a cerebral hemorrhage at his home here today. He was 79.

Dr. Williams, perhaps best known for his long poem "Paterson," lived in Rutherford all his life and combined a literary and medical career.

Although the early efforts were considered imitative, the poet-physician in time developed a strong personal style brought to fruition in "Paterson."

Dr. Williams was a physician here from 1910 to 1950. He was forced to retire because of illness. He specialized in pediatrics.

He had about 40 books of poetry published and several prose works as well, including a collection of short stories and four novels.

A 1906 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, where a classmate and

## Saving Banks FDR's 1st Job 30 Years Ago

EDITORS NOTE—Thirty years ago today, as Franklin Delano Roosevelt was taking the presidential oath of office, the nation's banking system was near collapse. The following article recalls how the new president dealt with that aspect of the great depression.

WASHINGTON (AP) — First of all let me assert my firm belief that the only thing we have to fear is fear itself—nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyses needed efforts to convert retreat into advance.

Franklin D. Roosevelt said this to an anxious nation 30 years ago today as he was inaugurated president Saturday, March 4, 1933.

Banks were closing all across the nation. Accounts of the financial panic vied with those on the inauguration for front page attention.

On Feb. 1, 1933, withdrawals in the nation's banks exceeded deposits by \$5.8 million. By Feb. 28, the figure had climbed to \$207 million and it had reached \$454 million the day before inauguration.

### Brass Firms Ask Court's Leniency

HARTFORD (AP) — A spokesman for the brass industry asked for leniency in U.S. District Court here today in the sentencing of eight companies and five individuals associated with them on charges of price fixing.

Atty. Walter Mansfield, representing Bridgeport Brass Company of Bridgeport, told Judge M. Joseph Blumenfeld, that bid-rigging and intentional violation was not involved in the case before the court.

The eight companies, representing a major segment of the brass and copper industry, and the five individuals were found guilty automatically Feb. 11 following a nolo contendere (no contest) plea. Each faces a maximum penalty of \$50,000 fine and one year in prison.

Speaking for more than an hour, Atty. Mansfield told generally of the industry's problems with import and foreign manufacturers and only occasionally referred specifically to Bridgeport Brass.

He followed John Gilguy, chief of the New York Division of the U.S. Department of Justice antitrust section, who summarized the government's complaint against the firms.

Mansfield said he could not give precise detail because of government charges against three Waterbury firms who are standing by their innocent plea.

As for the individuals involved, Atty. Mansfield said, "you are not dealing with criminals but with reputable businessmen."

If the alleged conspiracy took place the assumption would be that prices would go higher, Atty. Mansfield said, or at least be maintained, but the opposite was true.

As for Bridgeport Brass, on sales of \$142 million in 1953, it showed a \$19 million profit before taxes. However, in 1960, on only slightly lower volume of sales, there was a \$5 million profit.

Several other attorneys spoke briefly, reiterating Atty. Mansfield's request for leniency.

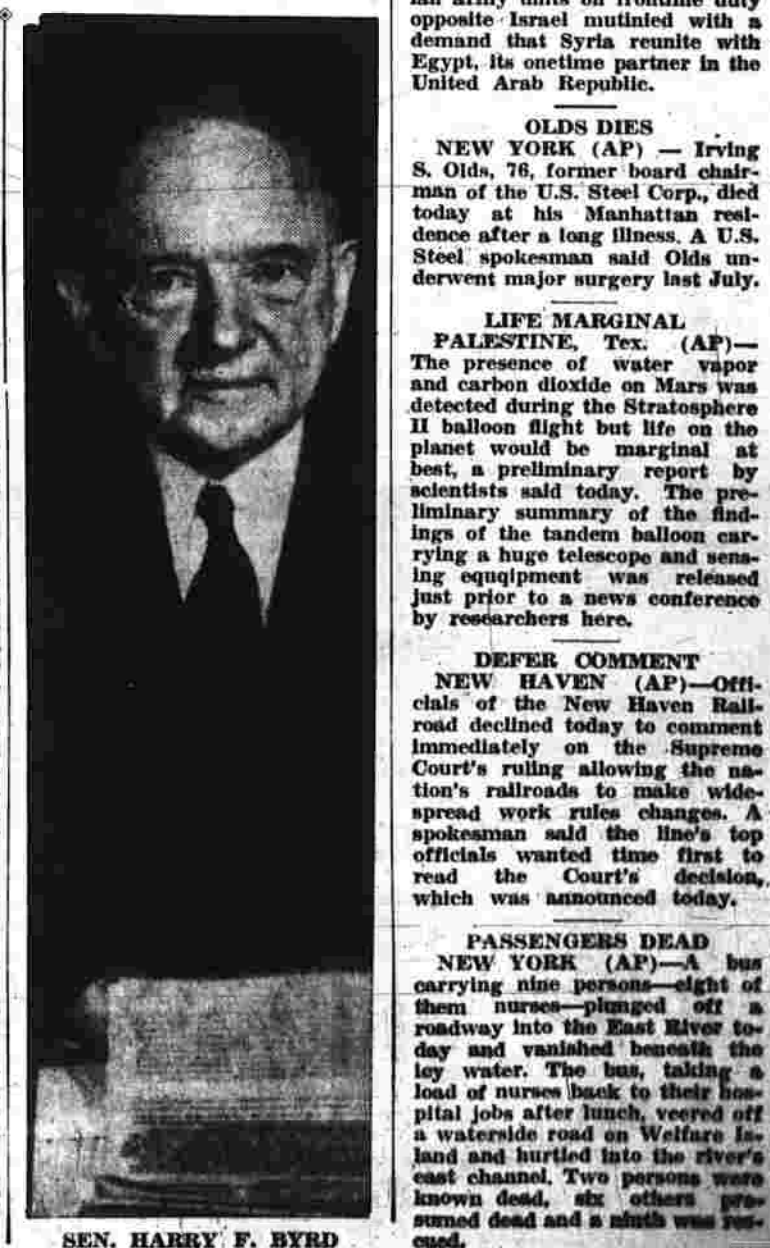

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Official sources here denied today a Cairo report that some Syrian troops on the Israeli frontier have mutinied. They called the report a sheer fabrication.
