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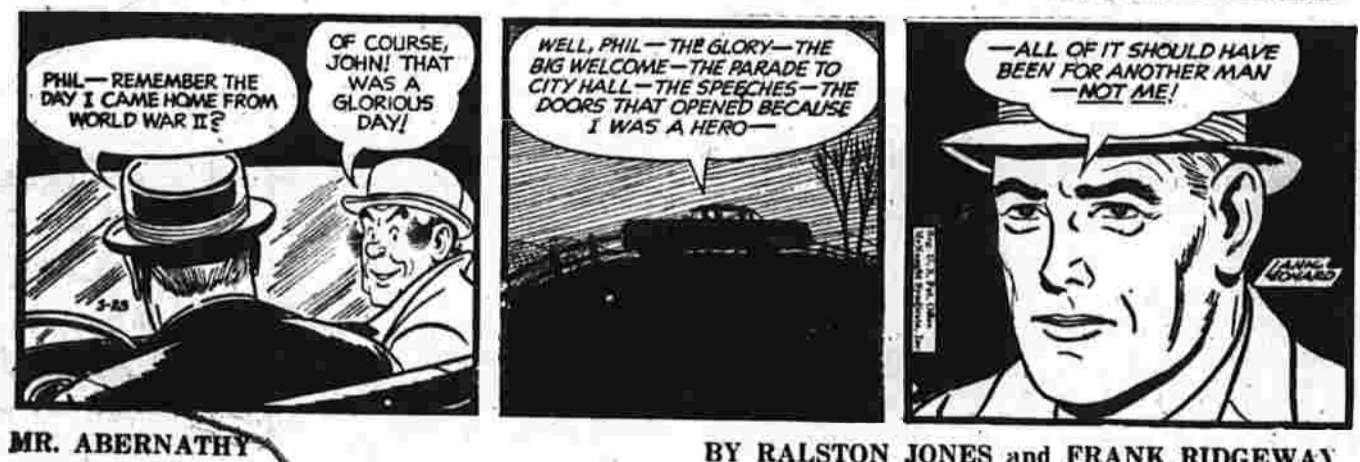
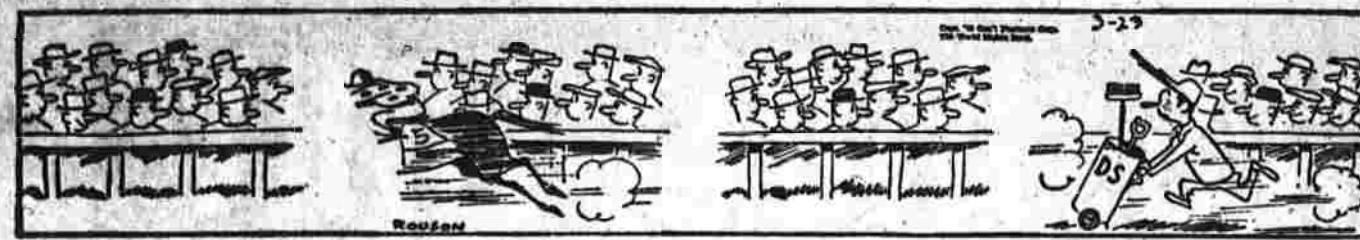

Union Seeks Election at Chute Firm

Henry Becker, representative for the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, AFL-CIO, has petitioned the National Labor Relations Board for a representation election at the Manchester Pioneer Parachute Co. plant.

According to Becker, the petition was filed yesterday afternoon with the Boston office of the NLRB, the federal agency that handles labor-management relations. The election would determine whether Pioneer's production employees, numbering about 230, wish the ACWA to represent them in collective bargaining.

There are some engineers working at the Manchester plant, however, a firm might see to include these in the representative package, Becker said.

The company has said that it wants an election to see if the employees really want the union, said Becker, "so if they really do, here is their opportunity to prove it."

Becker asserts that only production workers are included in the union membership at the other Pioneer plant in Mississippi, unionized since the 1950s.

However, the firm's engineering and development work is primarily done at the Manchester plant. The only other stumbling block which could delay election is the charges filed by the union against Pioneer Parachute, claiming unfair labor practices.

No election can be held until such charges are satisfied or withdrawn. According to Becker, the NLRB has been investigating the charges "for the past few weeks, and should be ready to act on them soon."

The union has charged that the parachute firm has interfered with attempts to organize the employees, refused to bargain with a delegation of employees, and illegally discharged three employees. The first two charges were submitted and later withdrawn, then resubmitted with a new charge.

Pioneer's president Michael Kagan said at the time that the charges were withdrawn because the NLRB had found no substance to them. Becker asserted they were withdrawn so that they could be resubmitted and grouped with the third.

The NLRB would not comment on the reasons for withdrawal. Neither Kagan nor William Bell, vice president of the parachute company, could be reached today for comment on the union's election petition.

Board Adopts CD Policies For Schools

The board of education has adopted a six-point policy for Civil Defense procedures for town schools.

The board favors sending the children to their homes, in case of atomic attack. However, if there were an extreme emergency in which travel outdoors would be dangerous, the Manchester High and Wadsett Schools would be used as fallout shelters.

The policy was prepared by a Civil Defense committee headed by A. Raymond Rogers Jr., principal of Manchester High. It provides the following:

- 1. That some school personnel be granted by police the authority to supervise traffic and street-crossing by pupils during an emergency or drill.
2. That each school be equipped with a battery-operated transmitter radio which can be tuned to Conelrad, the Civil Defense alert stations.
3. That investigation be made of the feasibility of installing some direct alert signal tied in with the Manchester Civil Defense program. The committee says the town's warning system is not audible at all town schools, and telephone communication in emergency situations is impractical.
4. That each parent be sent a letter from the superintendent's office listing the procedures, and a letter from the school principal outlining other procedures particular to a school.
5. That each school develop its own Civil Defense instruction program for personnel and that the instructions be reviewed by the Civil Defense committee.
6. That a committee be set up to work with the town's Civil Defense authorities to determine what emergency equipment should be stored in each school.

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'Password' Moving To Monday Nights

March swung in like a lion in the world of television. Drastic spring changes in network program lineups are under way, and to give you an idea of what's going on, CBS is moving Allen Ludden and "Password" away from Sundays and up to bat against the mighty Casey ("Ben") that is beginning Monday, March 25 (10 p.m. EST).

What does it all mean? Well, for one thing it's a break with the still too prevalent tradition of pitting like against like (drama against drama in the old Monday night lineup with "The Loretta Young Show"—now existing as the former CBS contender). In giving its vote of confidence to "Password" the CBS brass are not dabbling with an unknown quantity. The word-association game show, with panels comprised of show business "big names" and non-professionals, has proven its appeal since it started as a daytime two years ago.

And how does Allen Ludden feel about the move? "Well, it's a challenge," grinned the crew-cut emcee who's never been a man to duck one.

He's mighty fond of the show himself. "After all, I gave up my executive job at CBS in 1961 in favor of performing, and I chose 'Password' when I had to decide between it and 'College Bowl.'" An observer would surmise neither could have been easy decisions; he did seem to have the best of both worlds with the executive-performer combination, and as for "College Bowl" it had been his baby since its radio days.

I recalled talking to a college student visiting New York who said he thought his folks would get a kick out of seeing him on television, watched likely shows for a week found "Password" to his taste and applied. He passed the required tests, got on the show, look great and then—bright led though he was—washed out before any big prizes came his way. "Not as easy as you think," he said, "but certainly fun."

Allen does have one misgiving about the move to Monday night, though, he explained over lunch last week. "The program is used as a teaching aid in many schools. The new time may be too late for some of the kids... and I hate to lose them."

The mutual admiration between Allen and "the kids" has been going on for some time. Father of three, he's an interesting combination of boyish appearance, authoritative reserve and quick mind. He's written four books for budding adults—the latest of which is due off the presses any minute and is titled "Plain Talk for Young Marrieds." The earlier volumes were "Plain Talk for Women Under 21," "Plain Talk for Men Under 21," and "Plain Talk About College."

He's also published a novel, but that has a show business background, with which he's also very much at home.

In 1947 he was personal manager for Maurice Evans then appearing in the "G. I. Hamlet." Because of its cultural nature Evans made occasional lecture commitments. After agreeing to address a speech teachers' group he found he couldn't make it. Allen was rushed in to substitute and was such a hit the producer revamped things and booked Allen for an entire lecture tour in advance of the show.

"I sometimes spoke to five groups a day: Colleges, Women's club, civic groups..." he said adding, "best thing that ever happened to me."

Like so many overnight successes this competence didn't just come from out of the blue. Allen had been an educator himself for several years (taught in both high school and college) and he'd also cut his teeth in theater well before meeting up with Evans. During his vacation from the University of Texas (where he earned two degrees and a Phi Beta Kappa Key) Allen worked at Theatre Guild sponsored summer stock in Westport, Conn. and Princeton, N.J.

When "Hamlet" finally folded, Allen got a job as publicity man for the Ivoryton, (Conn.) Playhouse and arranged for visiting theatrical stars to be interviewed on WITC in Hartford... then the station hit on the idea of having Allen himself do the interviewing. It all went so well that the station hired him as continuity editor and it was just another hop and skip before he was camera with a program he produced, wrote and moderated—"Mind Your Manners" with teenage panelists.

"Manners" made such a splash it wound up with the two top TV awards ("The Peabody" and the Ohio State University Award) and Ludden wound up with bigger job offers.

NBC's was particularly juicy but the contract was for only 26 weeks. He would develop concepts, he would be on the air—but it meant giving up security. "Margaret," he says fondly of his wife who died last year, "was all for it. She was with me every step of the way."

Then, the contract was not renewed. "Same thing as being

fired," he says. In the meantime he'd moderated the radio forerunner of College Bowl. He'd also developed the sound that's still used to identify NBC News. "I'd created 10 discs out of which I especially liked the fourth. But you know it takes a while to get used to listening," recalled Allen. "The producer rejected all ten but I kept going and put the fourth on again and came up with a winner. No, he didn't realize he'd heard it before... and as a matter of

fact, I've never told anyone about it before!"

There was no job lag for Allen, though. He moved quickly to CBS and onward and upward in the double life that found him eventually both director of program services for the network and featured personality until he made his decision to concentrate on performing.

He carried the performing straight through summer vacation last year and went back into sum-

mer stock co-starring with Betty White in "Critic's Choice," (and incidentally broke the all-time attendance record at the 65-year old Skowhegan Playhouse in Maine). He had another reason, too. "We'd always taken our vacations as a family. For our first summer without Margaret, this helped. My 14-year-old son, David, portrayed my son in the play, Martha (13) and Sarah (10) seemed content with the watching... and anyhow we were all together."
