Legislators Offer Closed Hearing in Insurance Probe

HARTFORD (AP)—The Republican-controlled House Insurance Committee requested state comptroller Raymond Thatcher and the John P. Kelly Co. to appear before a public hearing of the committee April 4 to provide information on how commissions on state insurance are distributed.

Thatcher, as comptroller, designates the agent of record for the state. The present agent of record is the John P. Kelly Co.

Rep. Nicholas E. Eddy, R-New Hartford, who has been designated counsel for the House committee, said that if Thatcher and the Kelly company wished they would be heard by the committee privately.

In a letter to the committee, the House committee said: "We have every desire to protect anyone whom you feel would be embarrassed by any disclosure that they have received a payment reasonable in amount for services rendered and will be glad to receive all or part of your testimony in executive session if you so desire."

A similar offer was made in letters to the Kelly company. The letters were signed by Rep. James J. Byrne, R-Pomfret, House chairman of the Insurance Committee.

Eddy said that Thatcher and the Kelly Co. would first have to appear at the public hearing on the bills to make a request to testify privately if they wished.

In response to questions, he denied that the House committee was implying in its letters to the comptroller and the Kelly company that they might have information that would be embarrassing to them.

U.S. Opposes Allies' Selling Pipe to USSR

WASHINGTON (AP)—Under Secretary of State George W. Ball goes to London today to try to convince the British that large-diameter steel pipes are strategically important commodities which should not be shipped to the Soviet Union.

The British presumably will disagree. This will hardly surprise Ball. He was told the same thing last Monday when he summoned Sir David Ormsby Gore, the British ambassador, to discuss the controversial pipe issue.

Ball's mission likely will arouse the ire of Soviet Premier Khrushchev. The Soviet leader already has accused the United States of having "extorted" goods "pressure" upon its allies persuading them to refuse Soviet pipe orders.

By doing so, Khrushchev said in a Moscow radio speech last month, the United States was interfering in Soviet relations with third countries and this, he said, was a manifestation of the senseless policy of cold war.

The controversy started when the Russians began dreaming about a gigantic 2,000-mile pipeline to deliver Soviet oil to European satellites and, perhaps, across the Iron Curtain to Western Europe.

To realize this dream the Soviets needed 40-inch pipes. These were the factors involved:

1. Only a few industrialized countries—the United States, Britain, West Germany, Italy, Sweden and Japan—produce such large pipes.

Dam at Eagleville Threatens to Break

MANSFIELD (AP)—The water rising behind the Eagleville dam here, increasing the possibility of a break.

Charles Pelletier, engineer from the state water resources commission had labeled the situation an emergency. He said the dam has a good chance of breaking through entirely.

He said the only hope in this instance would be for the dam to give way gradually, stone by stone, thus lessening the chance for a mass rush of water to do some damage.

Walter E. Bottoroff, district engineer for the State Highway Department has ordered closed the road and bridge crossing the Willamantic River, just south of the dam, (a couple hundred feet).

Eagleville officials have ordered an evacuation of some eight to 10 families in the area south of the dam.

The American Thread Company in Willimantic reports water pressure building up along its riverside location.

According to CD officials, sandbagging next to the thread company has been suggested.

Officials are attempting to determine what attributed to the increased water flow. Recent rains and indications of snow and ice melting in the Willamantic River watershed were listed as possible contributors to the recent rise. Some officials felt the recent warm spell resulted in more runoff.

Officials have been checking contour maps of the region seeking to determine sources of the additional flow.

In the wake of the recent Norwiche Dam disaster, local and state officials took quick precautionary measures.

They notified residents along the river below the dam in Mansfield, Coventry and Willimantic of the potential danger.

Heavy rains up north last night caused officials to worry that additional water could weaken the dam.

State Police Captain Robert Rundle, commander of the Eastern Division, was on the scene assisted by both state police and Civil Defense personnel.

Families living downstream were notified of the danger by resident trustees Levi Cornell, Coventry and Kenneth Hayden of Mansfield.

Alert to the danger of the dam going out because of the disaster at Norwich where the weakened Spaulding dam caused a flood killing six people on March 6, brought fast reaction by officials to head off any similar disaster here.

The dam holds back a body of water which feeds the Willamantic River.

Red Delegates Chased Out of Rio de Janeiro

By ROBERT BERTELLEZ NITEROI, Brazil (AP)—A subdued "Cuban solidarity conference" offered muted support to Fidel Castro today, cooled off by militant anti-Communist pressure and a five-mile ferryboat ride.

Gov. Carlos Sacerda of Guanabara State, a fiery foe of communism, blocked the pro-Castro Brazilians from meeting in Rio de Janeiro and chased them across Rio's Guanabara Bay Tuesday night.

Sacerda denounced the conference as subversive. Rio police arrested 55 delegates before they could make it out of Guanabara State, which includes Rio, and take the five-mile ferry ride to Niteroi.

Gov. Badger Silveira of Rio de Janeiro State said he would permit the congress to meet in Niteroi, the state capital, because the "Brazilian constitution guarantees freedom of assembly and thinking."

Less than 400 Castroite diehards finally opened the conference here, 90 minutes behind schedule, in a sparkling new naval workers union hall.

It was more like a capitalist stockholders' meeting than a revolutionary reunion. There were no Cuban flags or symbols and no Havana-style hachugas as the weeklong congress opened.

Only delegate of national importance present was Francisco Justo, boss of Brazil's northeast peasant leagues.

Diminutive, mustachioed Gen. Luis Gonzaga Leite presided at

Times, Trib Up Cost to Ten Cents

NEW YORK (AP)—Union leaders agreed today to allow machinists and electricians through picket lines so eight newspapers shut down for 110 days could resume publication tomorrow morning.

The workmen will get the plants ready for operation.

The union leaders instructed their other members to gather near the newspaper plants at 5 p.m. in expectation that the last step to end the shutdown would be taken by that time.

That step is a 4 p.m. ratification meeting by photogravers.

Negotiators for the photogravers reached agreement with the publishers earlier today and expressed confidence the rank and file would ratify.

The agreement was announced by Mayor Robert F. Wagner.

The photogravers were the last of four striking unions to reach new work agreements in the longest and costliest newspaper shutdown in the city's history.

Estimates of the loss run in excess of \$200 million.

Frank McGowan, president of the photogravers local, said he expects the rank-and-file to ratify an amended contract proposal put forth by the mayor and accepted by the union's negotiating committee.

Walter N. Thayer, president of the Herald Tribune and a spokesman for the publishers, said that if ratification comes quickly, "We will publish all papers and stop morning dailies would get their first editions on the streets."

Wagner announced tentative settlement of the photogravers' strike at a news conference at 2:17 a.m.

The announcement came almost exactly 100 days after the newspaper shutdown was precipitated at 2 a.m. last Dec. 8 by a strike of the printers union against four of the city's nine major dailies.

The other five papers closed down voluntarily but one, the Post, resumed publication March 4.

Wagner said his photograver settlement formula contained "certain amendments" to the proposal.

Bulletins Culled from AP Wires

U.S. BLAMED MOSCOW (AP)—In a strong protest, the Soviet Union today held the United States responsible for the attack on the Soviet freighter Lory by Cuban exiles March 17 off the coast of Cuba. The note asserted that "without material support from the U.S. government and without the supply of American arms and weapons the group of traitors to the Cuban people could not engage in this kind of provocation."

TYPHOID DEATH LONDON (AP)—Health authorities reported the first death in Britain as a result of the typhoid outbreak at the Swiss resort of Zermatt. The victim was Frederick Smith, 25, a draftsman working for the admiralty underarms establishment at Weymouth. He died in a hospital at Weymouth, Smith returned from Zermatt a month ago and was admitted to a hospital two weeks later. So far, 45 typhoid cases have been recorded in Britain as a result of the Zermatt outbreak.

HEADS U.S. CHAMBER WASHINGTON (AP)—Edwin P. Neelan, Wilmington, Del. bank executive who earned his first dollar as a carpenter's apprentice, was named president of the United States Chamber of Commerce today. The chamber's board of directors announced Neelan's election to a one-year term beginning May 1. Neelan, 57, is chairman of the board of the Bank of Delaware, an institution he joined as associate trust officer in 1949.

POLICE DOG USED GREENWOOD, Miss. (AP)—City police used a police dog today to disperse demonstrators in this delta town, the scene of recent racial troubles including shootings. Witnesses said the dog was never let loose but the crowd broke up. There was no immediate reason given for the dog's use. Greenwood has been the center of voter registration activity by integrationists.

Pair's Spirits High After Yukon Rescue

WHITEHORSE, Yukon Territory (AP)—Helen Klaben, informed by her doctor she will lose her five right toes, had at least one bit of good news for her mother in Brooklyn—she should be home in about eight days.

Dr. Nestle James said the Yukon's 21-year-old heroine will be able to leave the Whitehorse Hospital next Wednesday.

Dr. James is treating Miss Klaben and Ralph Flores, the pilot of the plane that crashed Feb. 4 on a mountainside in the frozen wilderness 75 miles south of the Yukon-British Columbia border.

The doctor gave this report: Miss Klaben suffered a broken left arm, which apparently has healed in good position. She also suffered frostbite on the toes of her right foot and on both heels. The toes will have to be removed but the heels seem to be improving nicely.

Flores suffered a broken nose, a broken jaw and frostbite on two toes. He appears to be recovering from all his injuries.

Miss Klaben was full of laughs Tuesday as she chatted by telephone with her family and close friends from a wheelchair at the nurses' station in the hospital.

"I'm a celebrity," she told her mother. "You'd never believe the attention I'm getting."

Flores also was considerably braver than he has been since Indian trappers found him Sunday

night near his distress signal that a passing bush pilot spotted. "I feel like a million dollars," said the 42-year-old electrician and flier after a good night's sleep.

"I talked with my wife and she might be able to come visit me," Flores wife and six children live in San Bruno, Calif. Flores was on his way home from a job in Canada, taking Miss Klaben as a passenger, when their plane crashed.

Bush pilot Jack McCallum said he had been reprimanded for making the risky landing which resulted in Miss Klaben's rescue.

McCallum said he landed his light plane in a narrow, tree-lined clearing about three miles from Miss Klaben's campsite. The pilot who had spotted the pair, Chuck Hamilton, had been cautioned earlier by Indians not to try to land in the hazardous thicket. After McCallum landed safely, Hamilton followed in his plane.

McCallum, a pilot for the Canadian Department of Transport— which corresponds to the U.S. Civil Aviation Agency—said he had been docked a half-day's pay—\$15—for making the landing.

His superior, W. L. Martel, denied McCallum had been fined but refused to say whether he had been reprimanded.

U.S. Suspends War Refugees' Bill for Relief

ONARGA, Ill. (AP)—A Bataan death march survivor and his family expressed happiness today after the State Department said it has temporarily suspended attempts to collect payments of World War II emergency relief.

The State Department maintains that the family of Noble Frank Smith owes \$1,421 for relief provided to Viola Smith and her son, Carl, while they were interned in the Far East by the Japanese during World War II.

Smith, 47, an ex-Marine told The Associated Press Tuesday night: "I'm real happy about it. I'm not only happy for myself, but for others in similar circumstances."

His wife said: "This is the best news I've had in a long time." Smith said that the State Department has told him there are some 2,000 persons in the nation who owe it money for various reasons, including war relief.

In Washington, Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., who asked the State Department to delay its demands for payment, has introduced a bill which would cancel the debt. A spokesman for Douglas said the department did not agree to put off attempting to collect the payments pending the outcome of the Douglas bill but agreed to waive the Thursday deadline it had set for payment.

Smith said the State Department has dunned the family for payment since the 1950s, adding that each bill was larger because of accrued interest. He maintains that the government has nothing coming, adding: "They are not going to get the money."

Rep. Leslie C. Arends, R-Ill., said he would attempt to have the State Department cancel Smith's bill.

Citizens Air Dump Problems, Direct Continuation of Study

The citizens committee on Vernon's trash disposal problem was directed last night at a public hearing to wrestle with the problem in particular, the problem of whether the town should buy a site for a future use.

Frank DeTolla, a civil engineer, said to the assembly, "What's going to happen in five years?"

Donald Richardson, another member of the citizens committee, said the towns could be compelled to cart their ashes away, after Vernon barred the trash.

Several persons in the audience were derisive of what they called "a college campus that burns garbage."

DeTolla said he himself has his trash collected by a private contractor for \$3 a month. He gets good service for little money, he said, but how long can it last?

DeTolla said that, if the 27 towns in the capital area, continue to use only the present dumping and disposal areas, by 1965 the area will be 285 acres short, and by the year 2000 the area will be 28,000 acres short.

Beria House Haunted, Say Some Soviets

MOSCOW (AP)—If Moscow has a haunted house, it's the former home of Lavrenty P. Beria, chief of Joseph Stalin's secret police.

Whether Beria was arrested then at home or at a meeting in the Kremlin is still uncertain. Soviet leaders have related several versions.

One old Russian woman walks past the house with head erect. She wasn't afraid of it when Beria was alive, and she's not afraid of one dead because.

Beria's bodyguard roughly hustled her away. She ended up with a three-year sentence for what they called anti-state behavior.

Movedaya she is back in her old room, across from the Beria house where he lived. "Do you think the house is haunted?"

"I don't know because I've never been inside it and I don't want to, but if any house in Russia is haunted, then it's this one. It has reason to be."

some supposedly efficient organization which loses its own genuine zeal and effectiveness in the pursuit of a bureaucratic immensity that one cherishes, whenever one can see a shadow of it, the good work which is indeed not yet professional, not yet staffed with management and overhead, but still in possession of its own impulsive aims and spontaneous methods.

One hesitates between adding further publicity to such a movement, to give it credit when it's due, and attracting to it that notice which will no longer allow it to stay small and genuine.

But we'll take our chance. What we like is a relatively modest, spontaneous thing, done in Panama, which is called Operation Friendship, and which happens to have been fostered, shortly after the rough riots of 1956, by General Theodore F. Wright, United States Army commander in chief, Caribbean. General Bogart set up the philosophical guidelines for such an activity by quoting two old adages—"You can catch more flies with honey than with vinegar" and "He that falls in love with himself will have no rivals."

Since then, this Operation Friendship has been doing all kinds of things, mainly in the people to people classification. It has been helping hospitals, helping build schools, helping teach English classes, giving out school breakfasts, running sports contests between the Americans and the people of Panama. None of this has, of course, been the giant kind of help some official foreign aid program might have channeled toward Panama. Nor has Operation Friendship yet become the tool of some ambitious statesman, as the Cuban crisis has been, and the United States and Russia stopped talking to each other about Berlin. But there has been so much urgency at all in the intervening months and weeks.

All this time, things have been as they were. We have been in and on one side of Berlin. Russia has been in and on the other side of Berlin. The city and people of Berlin have been there. The wall which divides city and people into two artificial halves has been there. All this has been so, during these months since October, and nothing terrible or fateful has happened. The world hasn't come to an end, or to blow, over the issue of Berlin. Just leaving things alone, just letting them stay the way they are, has been a process which has worked.

Now, however, we are about to put the issue of Berlin back into its old context. Primarily, one must guess, because we now have time to talk about it—primarily, again, because we have diminished our mutual noise about other issues between us—the United States and Russia, by putting Berlin back on the table and beginning to talk about it. Now, once again, it will edge its way back toward the status where it may be the thing that explodes the world.

Now it is not quite true, of course, that if we kept the issue of Berlin locked up in a dark closet it would never bother us very much, or excite us, or bring us death—over us. It is actually the mutual realization that the issue is a danger which does have to be removed from the relationship between us—this realization, and not merely the fact that we haven't anything else more urgent to be talking about—which now brings the United States and Russia back to formal meeting on topic Berlin.

Yet there still is, in any study of this situation, proof of the large role the mental and the psychological play in the affairs of nations. In some measure, we thought our way into the cold war. We have repeatedly been capable of alternate complacency and anxiety about the cold war—moods not in any way related to anything really fundamental. Some day, perhaps, we are going to be psychologically ready to start thinking and feeling our way out of the cold war context for world living.

Even when that time comes, there will be no certain determination which came first in the creation of the cold war—the way men thought and then acted, or the way men acted and then felt and reacted. But it will have to be at least a blend of mood and action, with each inspiring and reinforcing the other, which does eventually dispel these wasteful decades of human madness.

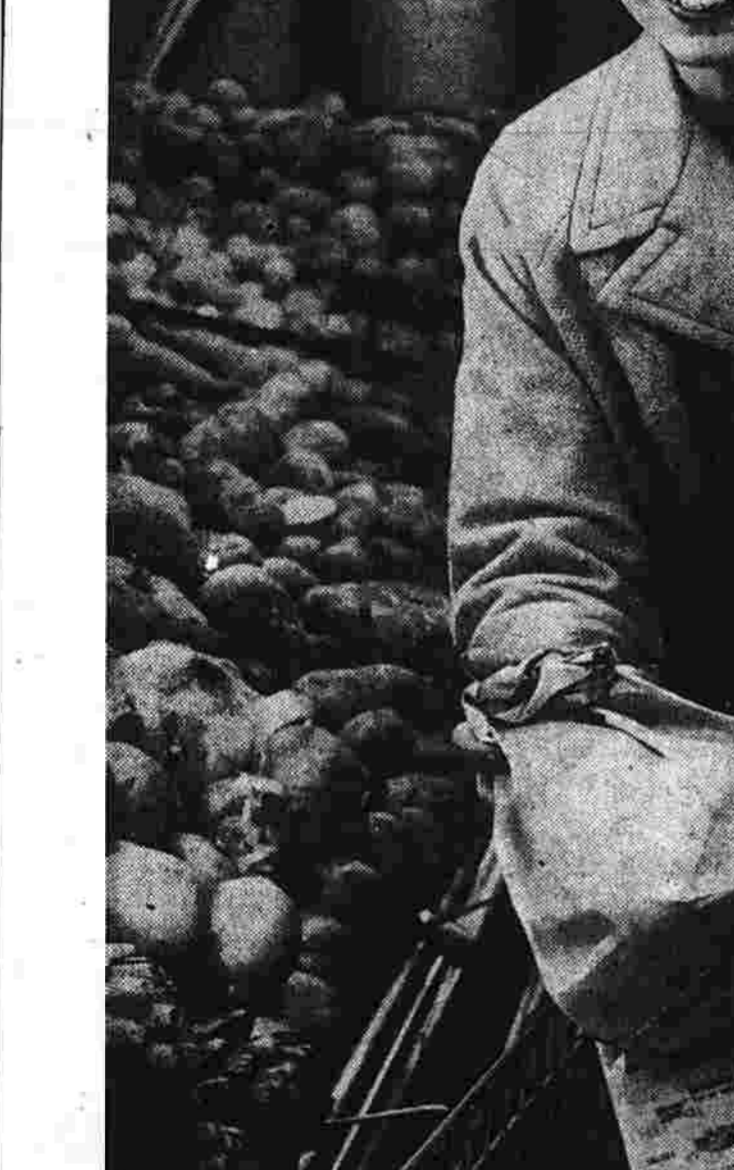
There are inventions which, by some revolutionary improvement of process, or elimination of procedure, speed up and modernize and often make more economical the operation of our industries. 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Rockville-Vernon Town Decides To File Appeal On Rosedale

The town of Vernon is going to fight the residents of the Rosedale residential area to the Connecticut Supreme Court of Errors to avoid calling a town meeting to consider accepting the streets in Rosedale.

First Selectman George Risley said last night he had received a letter from Corporation Counsel Robert Kahen advising the town to appeal a decision made last week by Police Judge Court Judge Alex F. Lohelle in favor of the Rosedale residents.

Judge Lohelle ruled that the selectmen should call the meeting because the Rosedale residents were within their rights to demand that the acceptance of the streets be put to the townpeople.

He cited a state statute, 13-3,

which says any highway or street may be accepted by a duly called town meeting.

The state statute cited by the selectmen in their refusal to call the meeting, 13-3, must, however, to statute 13-3, he said. Statute 13-3 says that a highway must be 50 feet wide and must meet certain layout requirements before it can be approved by the selectmen.

The three roads are Lynnwood Dr., Juniper Lane and Summitdale Lane.

Residents want the town to accept the roads so the town will have to plow and maintain them.

Counsel Kahen said in his letter to Selectman Risley that to bow to Judge Lohelle's ruling without submitting it to a higher court would have far reaching and serious consequences, not only for Vernon, but for the state.

Kahen said he had prepared remedial legislation to be submitted to the General Assembly.

Merchants Ask Board To Table Parking Plan

A committee of merchants pulled an unexpected reversal last night by asking the town directors to table a proposed \$18,000 appropriation for a new Main St. parking lot that they had previously encouraged.

Atty. Herbert Phelan, chairman of the town's parking authority and the man responsible for establishing new parking areas, expressed surprise at the turn of events.

"I had been led to believe that everybody was in accord up to this week."

The latest plan was to have been arranged between the three owners of an undeveloped tract between Oak and Maple Sts., and the parking authority.

The terms included a \$1 per year rental fee to be paid by the town, and a \$1 per front foot assessment to be collected from the property holders to pay for improvements to the land.

The \$18,000 appropriation would have covered the cost of the improvements.

Philip Harrison, speaking for the merchants, said that "in the light of some very late developments we felt it would be to the advantage of both town and merchants to review the situation."

"We would now recommend that the motion be tabled because of the apparent necessity for re-

negotiation of the arrangement which was suggested a year ago."

The town directors, who had been called into special session to consider the \$18,000 of Parking Meter Fund money currently in arrears and the appropriation of the \$ 3,000, conferred with Harrison's suggestion.

Although they tabled the expenditure until the property holders came up with a new proposal, they went ahead with the transfer of the \$8,000 into the parking authority's operating funds.

The money had been put in escrow in 1966, to pay the New Haven Railroad for the old depot plot in the North End.

The railroad has not cleared the title to the property yet, however, and the town purchase option has expired.

General manager Richard Martin urged the directors to transfer the obligation to the redevelopment agency, which is preparing a redevelopment project that would include the depot tract.

Philip Harrison said today that the possibility of a special taxing district, that would provide for parking areas, and changes within the town itself were responsible for the reversal.

The conditions under which the town would have leased the Oak-Maple St. lot were negotiated a year ago, he said, and there has been no communication between him and the town since, despite recent developments.

He was optimistic that last night's motion would be approved and an immediate agreement on the lease might be discovered, and the lease renegotiated within a few weeks.

Rockville-Vernon School Board Fills Out Laws Questionnaire

The Vernon Board of Education favors an equalized grant list as the basis of state grants supporting education throughout the state.

The board checked off its support of proposed legislation on the subject of a questionnaire blank which has been sent to all boards of education in the state by the Connecticut Association of Boards of Education.

State aid should be increased by \$30 million, or more, the Vernon board said.

Other items favored by the board are consideration by the state of a questionnaire blank, federal aid to schools, provided such aid is without strings and is distributed by the state; a written policy on working relations between boards of education and teacher organizations; the proposed accreditation program of the State Department of Education.

The Vernon school system would not qualify completely for accreditation, the board said, but would do so with some minor changes.

Unpaid sick leave for teachers should be allowed to accumulate to 90 days rather than 60 days, the board voted, and the right of teachers to have duty-free lunch periods should be established by law.

The board voted against extending sick leave with full pay from 10 to 15 days.

Other items opposed by the board are mandatory arbitration of disputes, either by the State Education Department or the State Labor Department.

The board opposed a bill to amend existing laws and permit a high school student to qualify for his driver's license by passing the classroom instruction in driver education in school, and then receiving behind the wheel training from a parent.

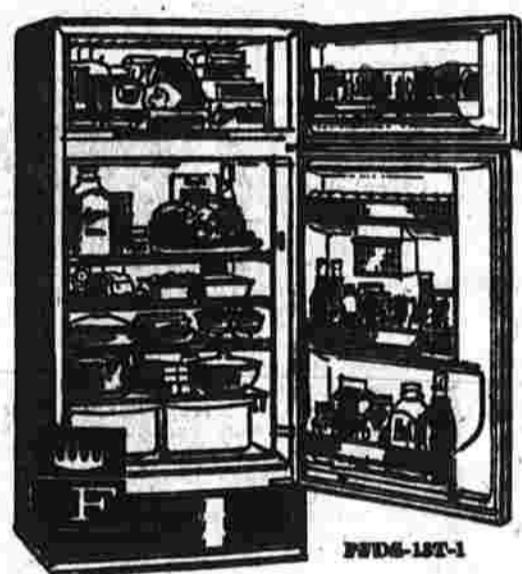

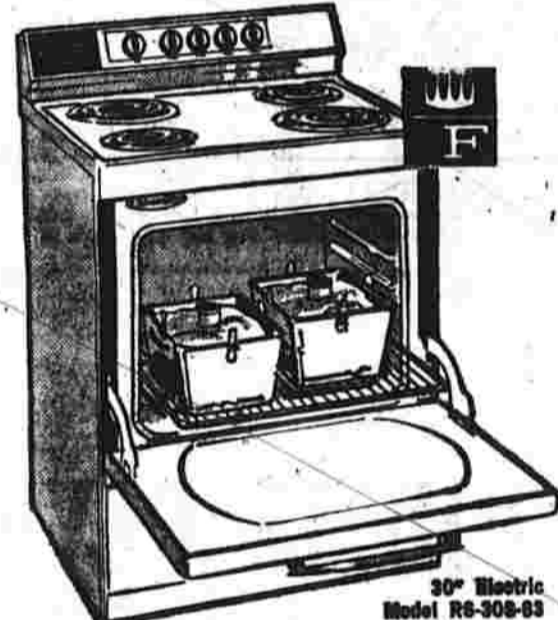

Spring Hints Good Outlook For Business

NEW YORK (AP)—Springing at the trough, many businessmen are cautiously deciding they may be better off than they were admitting.

Federal slide-rule artists, after a new look at the employment figures, find some improvements scattered amidst the bad news. The steel industry is enjoying a mild sort of boom. Auto makers can reel off both figures and sales—all on the same side.

On this basis, factory jobs increased in February for the first time in seven months. While the factory work week actually dropped a bit, it wasn't as much as usual for the time of year.

Steel production's seven straight weeks of expansion plus 10 per cent higher than early February. Some of the gains came from the possibility of a strike late in the summer. Some credit to rebuilding of stocks allowed to dwindle during the steel industry's private little recession.

Consumer spending continues high in most regions. This is reflected in retail sales figures, and the increase in installment debt, and the intentions. Confidence in the business situation still holds high.

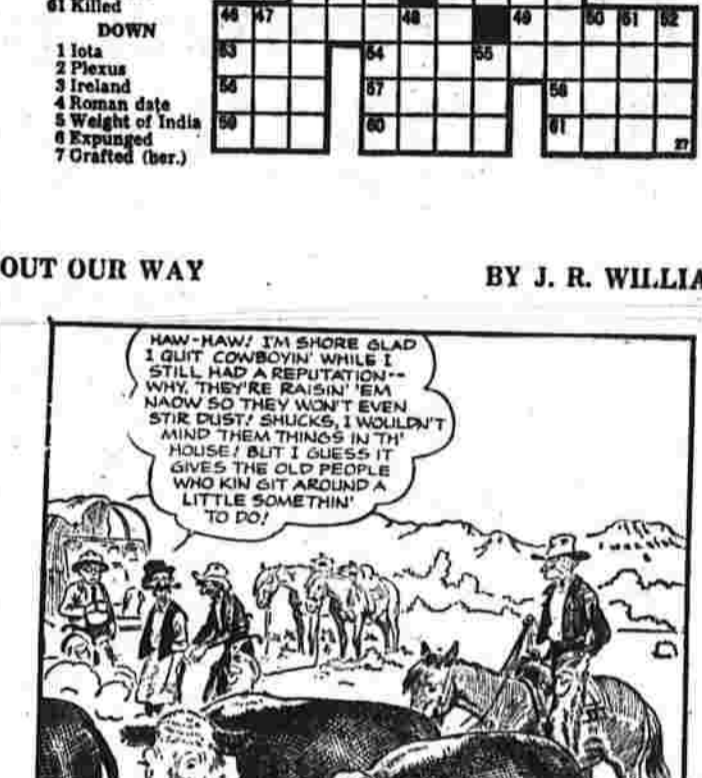

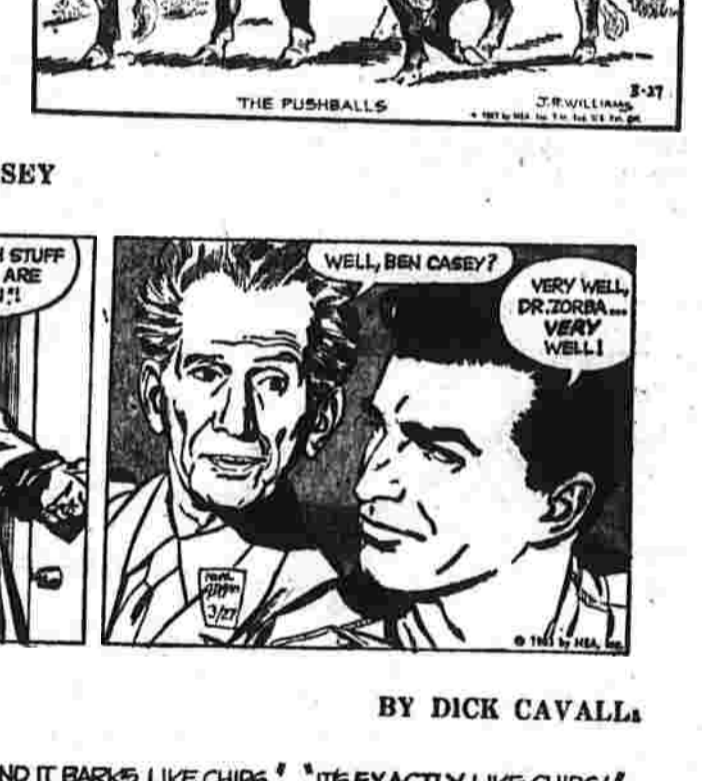

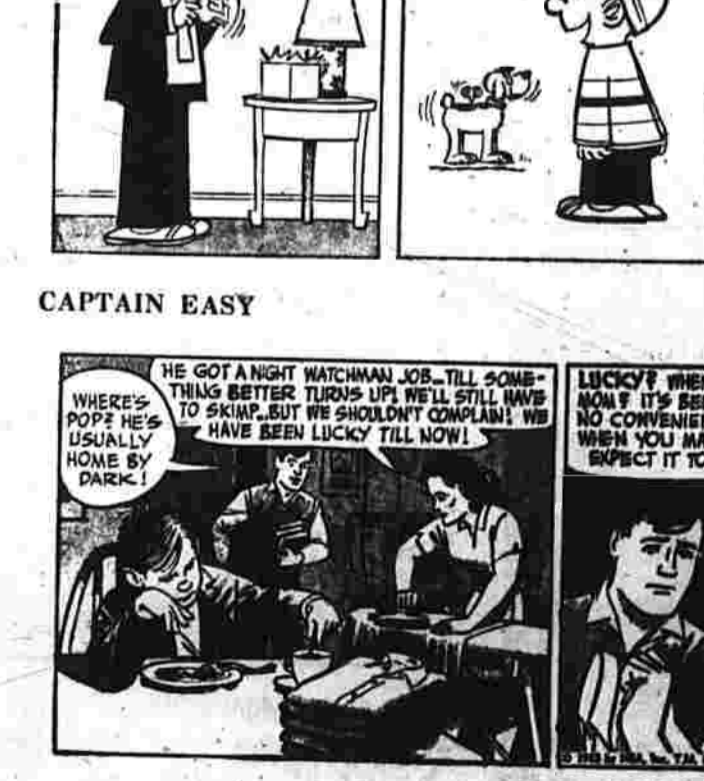
