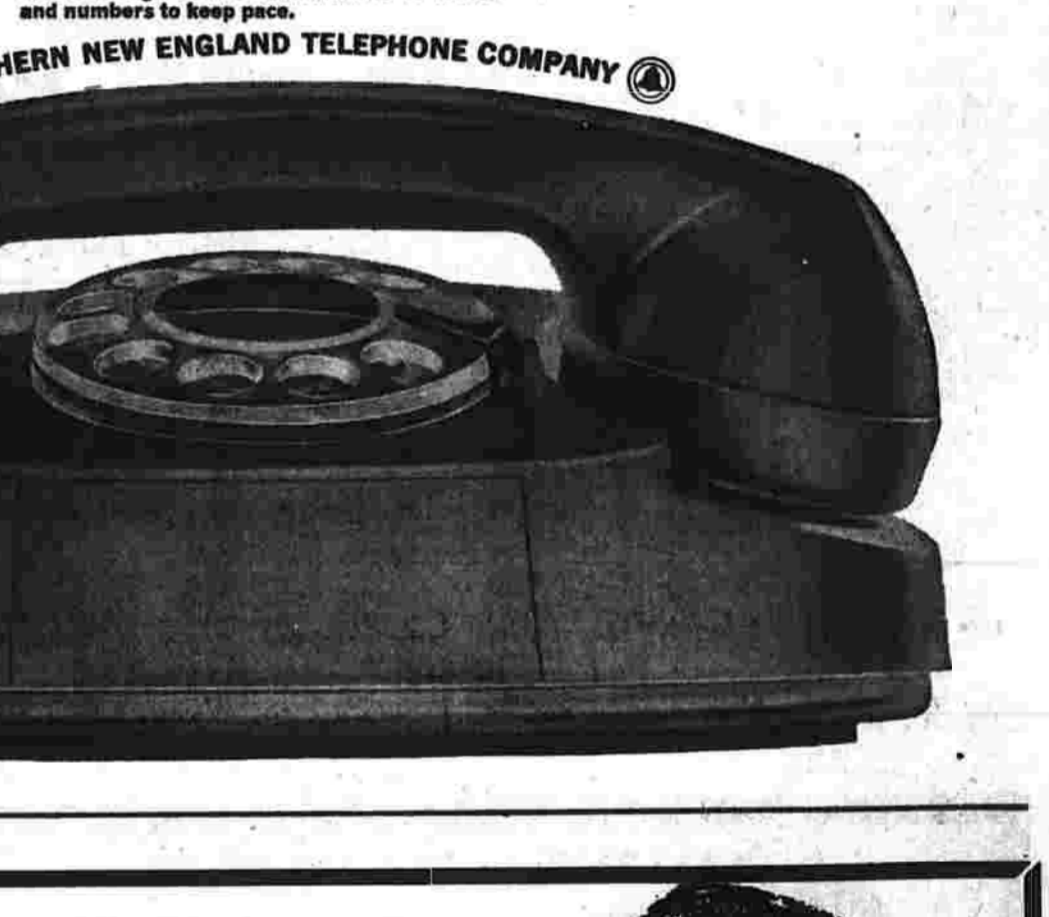

Bolton Double Sessions Voted For Grades 5 and 7

The board of education voted last night to place Grades 5 and 7 on double sessions next year.

Grades 7 and 8 are on double sessions this year. The decision followed Superintendent G. Liguori's report that a delegation of present Grade 7 parents and visited him to request that their children be spared from double sessions two years in a row.

Liguori said there were four possible combinations: Grades 7 and 8; Grades 7 and 8; Grades 5 and 7; and Grades 5 and 7. Since six rooms are needed to make up the classroom shortage, only grades which require three classrooms each could be considered. Grades 5 and 7 are both two classroom grades.

Asked his evaluation of the effect of double sessions, Liguori said he feels the academic program has increased in scope, although it has some weaknesses; that the children have more minutes of classroom instruction; that they have library science classes which they never have had in the past; that special projects have been arranged, and that voluntary French and Latin classes are being held outside of school hours.

Among the bad effects, he said that the junior high problems which the town has never seen before are probably due to double sessions; that the pupils have lost study habits; that for all years, that they have leisure time problems; and that some and social disciplinary problems have developed.

He said he has Grade 1 and a combination, Grade 1 would be as good as well as on regular sessions, least in the first half of the year, since they are accustomed to a regular session for all years, that they have leisure time problems; and that some and social disciplinary problems have developed.

Asked for his recommendation, the superintendent recommended that Grades 7 and 8 be put on double sessions, and the board voted to accept the recommendation.

The Doctor Says SPECIALISTS GANG UP ON ARTHRITIS BY WALTER G. BRANSTADT, M. D. Written for Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Medical science has made important advances on many fronts but there is not now and probably never will be a neat solution for every problem. In spite of the fact that there is no specific cure for arthritis some advances in this field are being made through research. Much of the support for these advances comes from the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation (10 Columbus Circle, New York 30, N.Y.).

Because arthritis affects the victim in many ways, best results are obtained by using teamwork. A typical arthritis team may consist of a specialist in arthritis (rheumatologist), an orthopedic surgeon, a physical therapist, a psychiatrist, an occupational therapist, a social worker and a vocational counselor. Sometimes relieving a victim's business fears about his future will cause a marked improvement in his arthritis. In every case the patient should be the most important member of the team because, unless he is persuaded that he can be helped, his full co-operation cannot be achieved. Because arthritis is not one, but a group of diseases, a correct diagnosis is the first requirement. What is effective treatment for one form of arthritis may be harmful for another. The next most important factor is early treatment because once structural changes in a joint occur, a complete return to normal cannot be achieved. On the other hand many patients who have been crippled or even bedridden for many years have been helped by the team approach to the point of getting a job and becoming self-supporting again.

There are now over 300 outpatient clinics in this country that specialize in arthritis. Working as a member of the team the rheumatologist determines what type of arthritis a victim has and how severe it is apt to become. He treats the underlying cause while the orthopedist applies measures for preventing damage to the joints or in advanced cases reconstructing a joint with some metal such as titanium that will be tolerated by the body and not corrode. The psychiatrist may be called on to treat an emotional problem that would interfere with maximal improvement and the physical therapist applies recommended measures to help the patient maintain or regain self-sufficiency. This may include a warm whirlpool bath for an aching limb, a hot paraffin bath, a heat lamp, an electric heater, diathermy or ultrasound, but exercise is the most important measure. At first this may be passive with the therapist moving the sufferer's joints but as soon as possible, the patient must be made to move them himself. If it is here that the determination of the patient plays a decisive role.

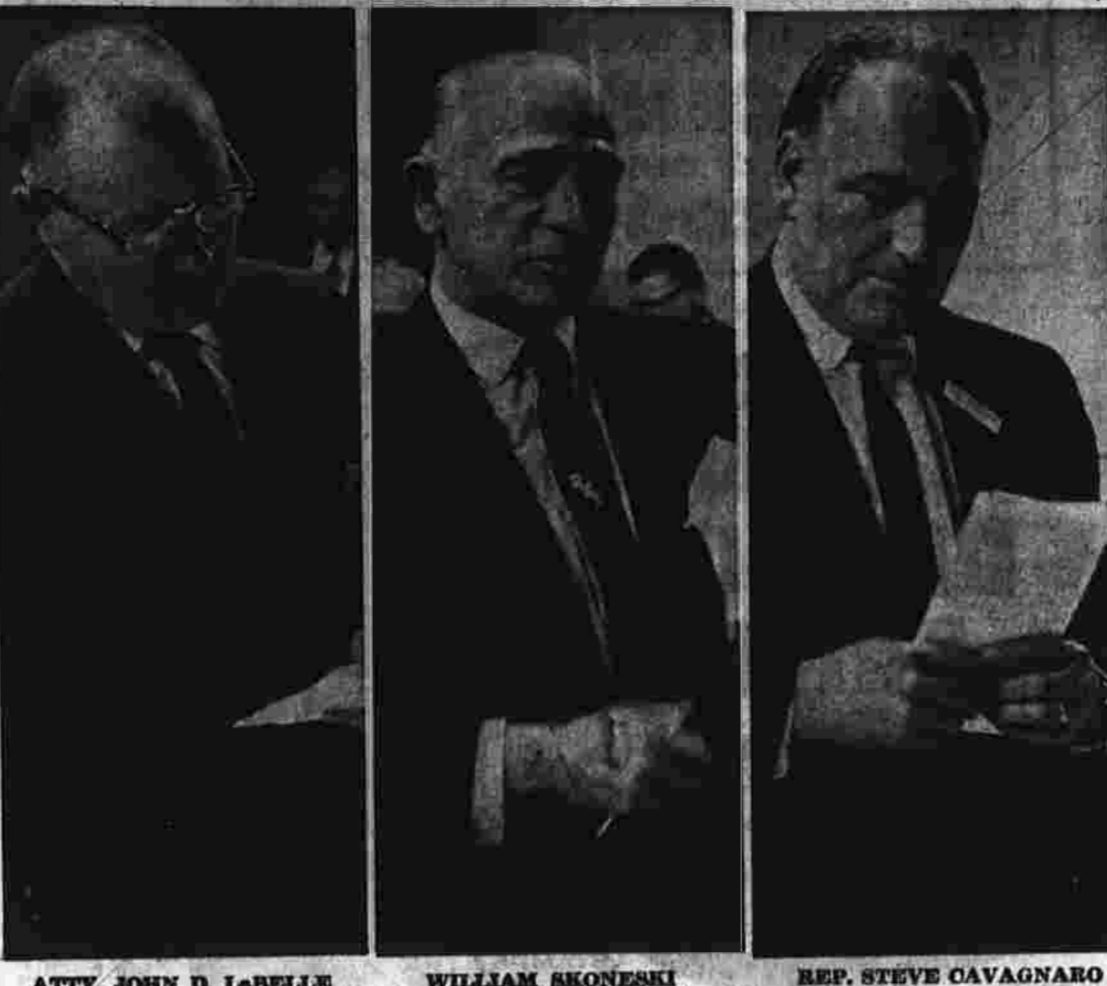

9,000 Reds Leave
WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy said today that 9,000 to 10,000 Soviet citizens remain in Cuba.

Expressing hope of further withdrawal, Kennedy told his news conference Wednesday that a rough calculation indicates about 12,000 to 13,000 Soviet citizens remain in Cuba.

Kennedy also reiterated a previously expressed fear that his aid and arms shipments to Cuba would result in a new phase of the Cuban revolution.

In the domestic area, the president obviously was primed for a question about former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's recent suggestion that Kennedy's request for \$8.1-billion budget could be cut by about \$1 billion.

Noting that Eisenhower "referred to me as Maurice Stans, his budget director for guidance," Kennedy said that during Stans' tenure the country had its largest postwar deficit.

As for the space program, Kennedy suggested that Eisenhower had opposed an effective effort to put the United States ahead of the Soviet Union in space.

At the start of the session, Kennedy was asked about the abrupt by abandonment of the program to send key officials to take the detector tests.

"I think it was a mistake to suggest a polygraph," Kennedy replied, "but I think we need concern ourselves in the future about it."

DATE SET BY STATE FOR DIPLOMA TEST

To qualify for the tests, applicants must be at least 19 years old, must have been out of high school at least one year, a Connecticut resident for at least six months preceding the date of application, and the class with which the applicant entered high school must have graduated.

There is a \$3.00 fee for first applicants. The fee for retake tests is \$2.00. No fee is required of veterans or members of the armed forces or their auxiliaries.

In general, the fields covered by the tests include English, mathematics, natural sciences and social studies.

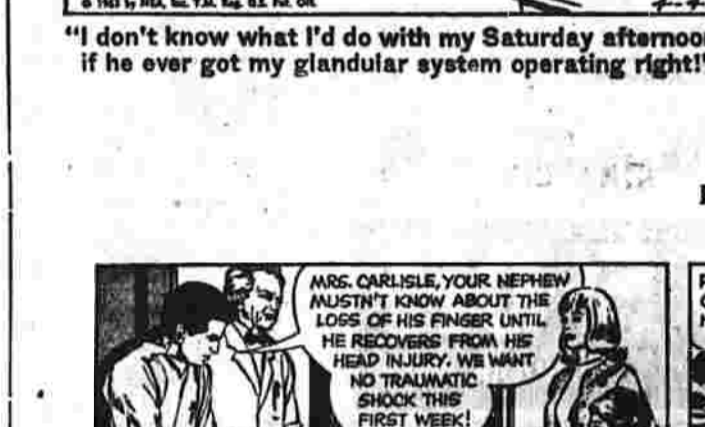

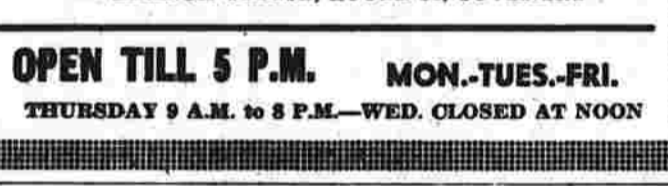
