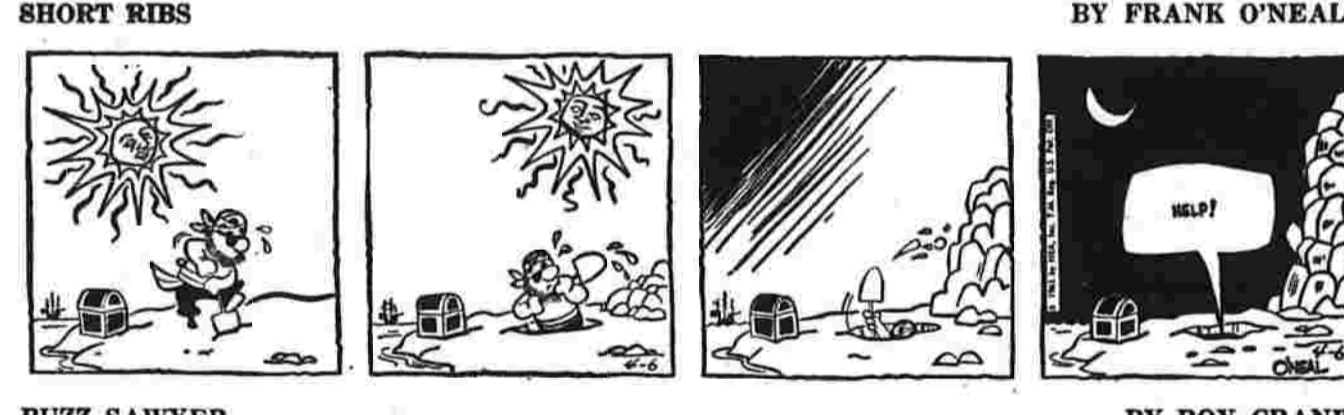

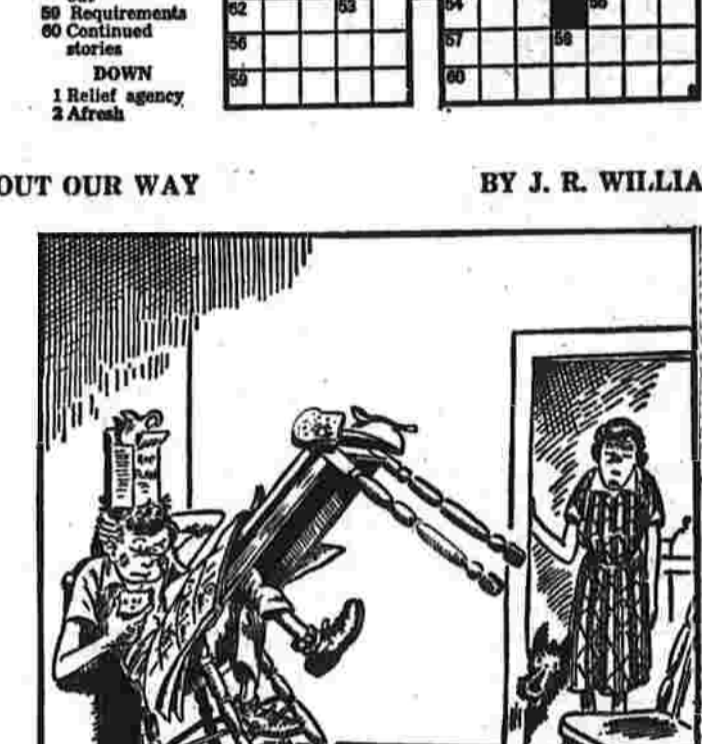

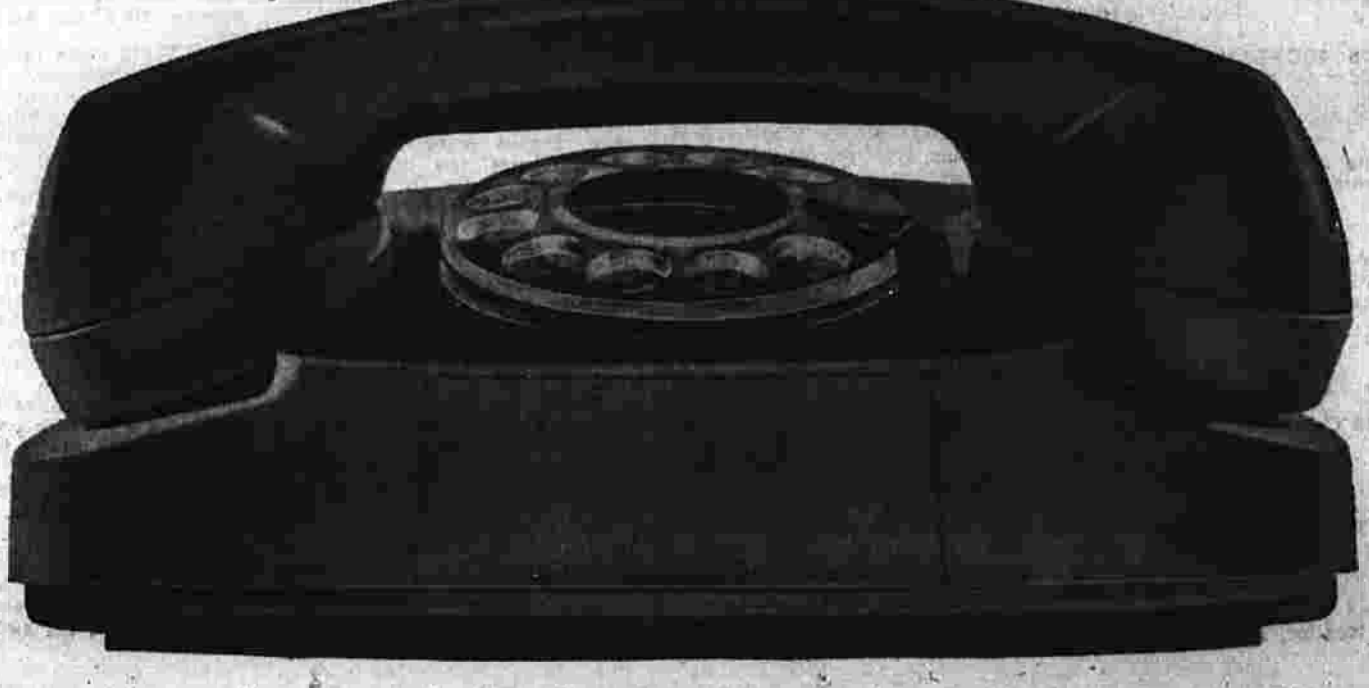

## Networks Plan Special Religious Programs

Two oratorios are among the special fare scheduled for the week of April 7 honoring religious observances of the Christian and Jewish faiths. NBC will also telecast the Palm Sunday Mass at 11 a.m. from the Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago with Albert Cardinal Meyer, Archbishop of the Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago, officiating.

The April 7 offering of the "Directions '63" Series on ABC-TV will be George Frederick Handel's oratorio "Israel in Egypt," called "the Passover oratorio." Written in 1738, it is considered by many on a par with the composer's "Messiah." Performing will be a 32-voice chorus under the direction of Earl Wild. William Lewis of the Metropolitan Opera and Elaine Bonazzi, also star of the Santa Fe Opera Co., are the soloists. The hour-long presentation commences at 2 p.m. EST.

The second and concluding part of the "St. Matthew Passion" by Johann Sebastian Bach will be telecast in color also on Sunday afternoon (3:30 to 5:30 EST). Performed by the NBC Opera Co. with Alfred Wallenstein conducting, the production will have a 40-member chorus and a 40-piece orchestra, said to be approximately the number taking part when the work was first presented in the year 1729.

Also on its Palm Sunday schedule, NBC is presenting for the fourth time its award-winning "Way of the Cross," (2:30-3:30 p.m. EST).

First presented in 1960, it has been seen every year since in this country and has also been shown in England, Switzerland, Spain, Mexico, Argentina, Holland, Hong Kong, Norway, Colombia, Australia, Manila, Island, Finland and New Zealand. It will also be seen this year in Germany.

Without the use of actors, the documentary retraces the steps of Jesus as He walked toward Golgotha. Alexander Scourby and Norman Rose are heard as narrators.

Jack Paar on his April 12 program (which is Good Friday) will present color films he himself took during a visit to the Holy Land last summer—most of the footage having been shot from a helicopter loaned to Paar by King Hussein of Jordan. Jim Bishop, author-columnist, will help with the narration, and Mahalia Jackson will sing gospel selections.

In an interesting footnote to the religious observances, Wendell Corey, president of the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences (and himself the son of a Congregational minister) made known that both the Academy and the American Broadcasting Co. had tried to change the date for the Hollywood Oscar presentation since April 8 is the date this year of the Jewish Passover Seder. The change was not possible, however, and the presentation will take place Monday from the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium and will be carried over the combined television and radio facilities of ABC.

## TV Personalities

### Robert MacNeil

NBC News' London correspondent Robert MacNeil normally covers the British Isles. Last November, he was sent to cover a story several thousand miles to the southwest—the communizing of Cuba.

Arriving in Havana with several other newsmen, MacNeil was promptly arrested and held captive for eight days. When they were released, they were permitted to work and MacNeil found himself the first newsmen from a U.S. news organization in Cuba since the Oct. 22, 1962, crisis.

For four days, MacNeil was permitted to move about freely. Then, he was trailed by young men in windbreakers "who sort of lounge around everywhere and follow you."

In addition to Cuba, MacNeil has covered several top assignments outside London for NBC News, including Algerian civil war, the erection of the Berlin Wall, the Congo fighting and the funeral of Dag Hammarskjöld.

MacNeil was born Jan. 19, 1931 in Montreal, Canada. He grew up in Nova Scotia and Ottawa, attended Dalhousie University at Halifax for two years, then received his degree in English at Carleton University at Ottawa.

His first job was as announcer in the summer of 1951 with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's radio station at Halifax. The following summer, MacNeil became a stock company actor with the Frisilla Beach Theatre near Plymouth, Mass.

After spending the next two years as an announcer and news writer at radio station CFRA in Ottawa, MacNeil joined CBC's Ottawa TV station where he had his own half-hour TV show dealing with science for children.

In 1955, MacNeil went to England to work for Independent Television News as a writer-reporter. In December of that year, he joined Reuters, working on the central news desk in London, and by 1960 was night editor. From 1957 to 1960, MacNeil also did free lance assignments for CBS-TV and CBS Radio.

It was in May 1960 that MacNeil joined NBC News. After covering stories in and around London, he was sent to the Congo in September 1960, and spent the next two months covering that area for NBC News. Subsequent assignments have taken him to

# Hollywood on TV

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Television can put you to sleep, baby sit, keep you awake and entertain visiting relatives. It also can send a gal to heaven—show business heaven.

That's where Irene Ryan is. "How do I feel about all this?" she said. "It's like I had gone to heaven."

She's "Grannie" of the "Beverly Hillbillies." Since the age of 11, when she won an amateur kiddie singing contest, she had pursued big time fame. Then—wham!—she's costarring with Buddy Ebsen in the nation's top television show.

Suddenly, after all those years, Irene Ryan has discovered the real meaning of those words, "There's no business like show business."

"Honestly," she said, "It's so funny I sit and just laugh. Six months ago no one cared whether I was alive or dead. Now every-one I meet asks,

"How old are you, really, Grannie?"

"Well," I ask, "how old are you?"

"So you'll never know," she said. "Let's just say I'm older than Shirley Temple but younger than Sophie Tucker."

She was sitting in a booth at the Brown Derby. In a high fashion gown, silk scarf over her head and a diamond ring glittering on a finger, Irene looked about as much like Grannie as Sophie Loren looks like Ma Kettle.

But she dropped a clue about her age.

"Honey," she said, "I'm getting letters from people who remember me when I acted with a stock company at the Empress Theater in Omaha in 1925."

She kept repeating, "It's so funny."

Funny, that is, in a great big wonderful way.

A year ago she was doing a night club act in a Seattle spot when word came from Hollywood that the "Hillbillies" had been sold to television.

Suddenly, as we talked, a part of what was funny made Irene wince.

"Now, at my age," she said, "all of a sudden I have income tax problems."

The big time can take time in

show business. Irene served in vaudeville, stock companies, radio, movies, and in television roles. In radio there was some success in "The Tim and Irene Ryan Show." Tim was her husband, gone now.

She was always on her toes, always giving slick performances. But never a big, big star.

"But I loved show business," she said. "Every minute of it. Why? To really love show business you have to be of it, not just in it. That's me, honey, I'm of it."

A \$500 wig and those duds she wears are about all Irene needs to transform herself into Grannie. There's make-up, sure, but it is 90 per cent talent that transforms chic Irene into the role. Out of character, and wearing slacks, a silk blouse, high heels, people who work on the show sometimes fail to recognize her.

About her talent, director Richard Whorf comments: "She's fantastic. She puts facial takes on top of facial takes."

She's been a regular on television before with Buddy Hackett in "Bringing Up Buddy," with Ray Bolger in "Where's Raymond?" But as Grannie, Irene finally has it made. She predicted the show would click even before air time.

"It's so simple—just good old-fashioned comedy," she explains. "No one is neurotic; we solve no world problems, and there's no message about anything."

Except, for Irene Ryan, that "there's no business like . . ."
