can give to nuclear armaments, or both simultaneously," it said.

The protest was coupled with a warning that the Soviet government would take necessary countermeasures.

"With the realization of the plans of the NATO leaders, nuclear weapons with their inevitable collateral—the war danger—would spread over our planet as oil spreads over water.

"The extension of the area from which a nuclear attack could be launched would naturally extend the sphere of application of retaliatory measures inevitable in such circumstances. May no one seek a threat from the statements of the Soviet government. All this is nearly copy book simple acknowledgment of what can be precisely assessed today.

The charges that the Western powers were preventing progress at the Geneva disarmament conference while drawing up plans for a NATO nuclear force. The obvious aim, it charged, is to win time and confront the peace-loving states with the implementation of the NATO plan to spread nuclear war.

Speaking of the American plan to speak of nuclear weapons, the note said the ships would be disguised as merchantmen and called this piracy.

"NATO warships were to begin poking about the seas disguised by flags of commerce. It said this would be practically equivalent to an undeclared state of war."

It appealed to the Western powers to halt the building of nuclear weapons, to a German peace treaty and the Warsaw pact, to a nonaggression pact between NATO and the Warsaw powers.

It was not a belittled note, but blamed the West for the arms race, and for the failure of a disarmament program. It blamed them as well for the outbreak of World War II, omitting any reference to Moscow's relations with Hitlerite Germany.

The United States and France were accused of rearming nuclear missiles in the hands of the United Nations. The note omitted any reference to the Soviet Union's own repeat tests.

might to avoid a collision at 23,000 feet, an F-100 spokesman said today.

The air force went into a sudden climb. The jet shook the craft and injured five passengers, none seriously, an air force spokesman said.

The airliner, on the Boston-to-Detroit flight 403, was piloted by Capt. Mel T. Blederman, a 30-year-old pilot. He said the plane employees called "evasive action" to avoid the all-weather F-100.

The Air Force spokesman said the jet was on a training mission at the Air Force Base, Rome, N.Y.

The Air Force spokesman could give no estimate of how close the planes were.

"They were close," he said.

Four of the five injured passengers were taken to a hospital after the plane landed at Detroit Metropolitan Airport near Wayne, Mich. The fifth injured passenger, a 22-year-old man, was identified as W.L. Cronin of Long Meadow, Mass.

The other four were treated and released at Annapolis Hospital at Annapolis, Md.

They were Louise W. Blederman, Mrs. Framingham, Mass.; Vernon Johnson, Woburn, Mass.; William M. Johnson, Boston, and Frederick Keller, Boston.

Blederman said in Ann Arbor, Mich., the incident was "worse than you like to have it," but declined to estimate how close the planes were to each other. He said he could not go deeply into details without authorization from his superiors.

Blederman, 41, father of three children and an American, had been pilot for 20 years, said he had had other close calls in the air during his career but "not like this one."

He said he was forced to put his plane into evasive action to avoid collision. He called it a ticklish situation, but said he was not apprehensive at the time of the emergency.

"I'm operating strictly by the book" in such crises, he said. He said a pilot's reaction in such instances is almost automatic.

The pilot, commented at his own trial, said he was interested in flying safety, without elaborating. He said "There are some people in this world who kind of bypass safety."

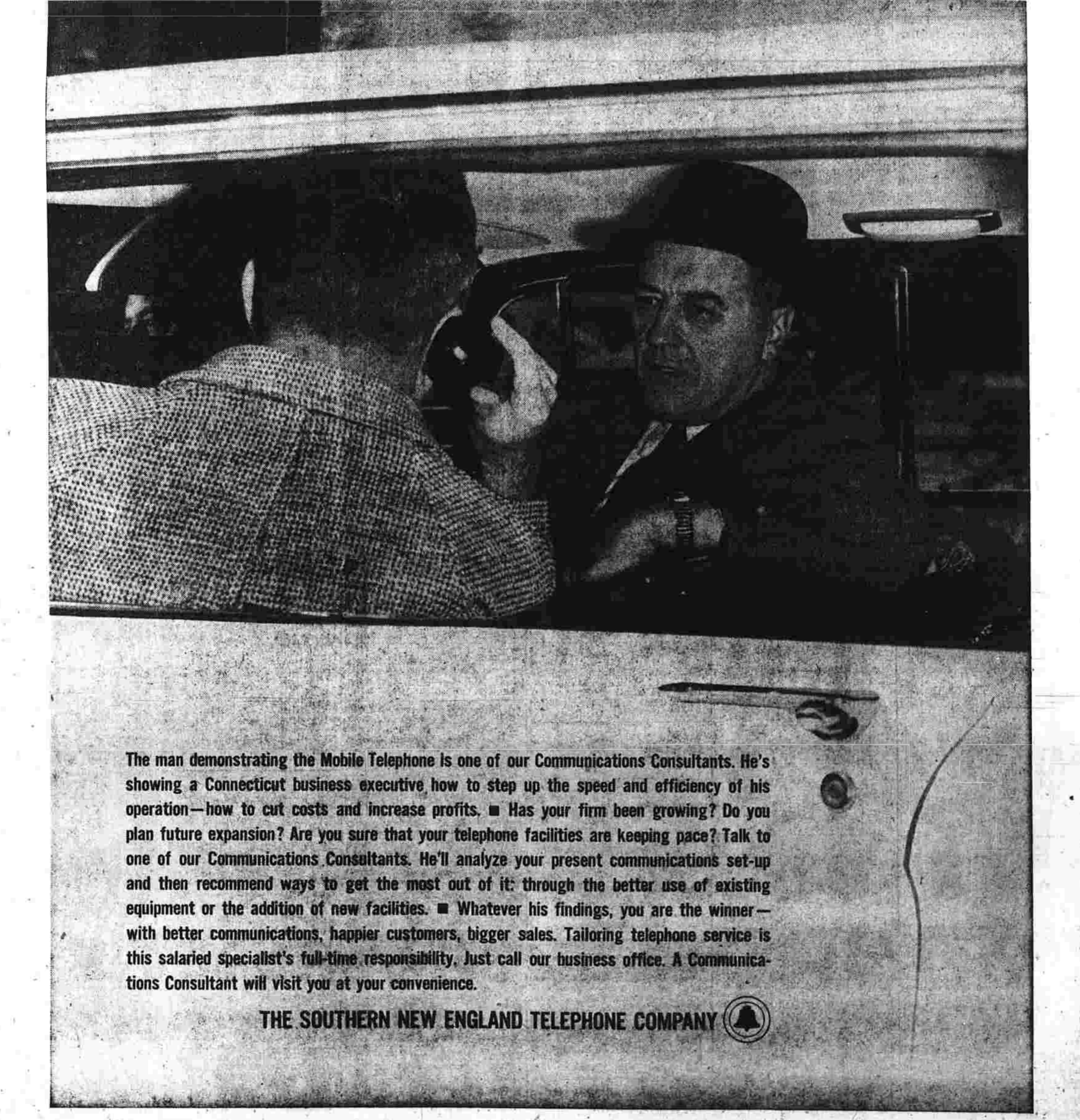
