N.J. Negroes Push Imbalance Ruling

ENGLEWOOD, N. J. (AP)—In the light of a precedent-setting state decision against racial imbalance in New Jersey schools, integration leaders in Englewood called off their planned school sit-in at two predominantly white elementary school today.

Instead, Negro leaders will ask that the Board of Education take immediate action on the decision laid down Thursday by State Education Commissioner Frederick S. Raubinger.

In a case involving the Oakwood Elementary School of Orange, N.J., which has a 90 per cent Negro enrollment, Lincoln school here, which has been boycotted by a group of Negro parents and their children since Feb. 28, has an enrollment that is 98 per cent Negro.

In his decision in the Orange case, Raubinger held that "such extreme racial imbalance is obtainable in the Oakwood school, at least where means exist to obtain it, constitutes under New Jersey law a violation of the public educational opportunity for the pupils compelled to attend the school."

A ruling on the Englewood case, where Negroes have accused the city of maintaining a policy of racial imbalance, is expected from Raubinger in mid-June.

However, Negro leaders here said today that the Englewood Board of Education does not have the authority to take any action to wait for a separate decision.

Three States Still Hold Out On 1954 Segregation Ruling

dered to change his attitudes, habits, customs and deeply rooted traditions—which, moreover, had been supported by law for more than 100 years.

In 1964, a Massachusetts case upheld the legality of "separate but equal" in the Boston schools (the legislature promptly desegregated them). In San Francisco, in the early 1960's, children of oriental parentage were sent to separate schools for a brief period.

But the towering landmark litigation on which the Southern states have based their case for segregation was Plessy vs. Ferguson in 1896. Here, the United States Supreme Court upheld a Louisiana statute requiring separate accommodations for Negroes and whites on the railroad. The court pointed to segregation of the schools as a precedent for the railroad ruling. Then, in 1954, another Supreme Court reversed this position.

Like an echo of the reconstruction era, Southerners angrily charged that "the North is trying to jam integration down our throats."

In the nine years since the court decision, there have been many ramifications in the broad and difficult field of race relations.

The Birmingham struggle, for example, is over Negro demands for desegregation of lunch counters and sitting rooms in the stores, for improved conditions of employment, etc.

In some Southern cities, Negroes dropped "Jim Crow" the rule that required him to sit in the back of the buses.

In others, they demonstrated for the right to use swimming pools, libraries, museums. They boycotted the power of the economic boycott. They used non-violent methods, "sit-ins" and "march-ins" to dramatize and enforce their demands.

With the help of federal courts, they are fighting the rule that prohibits voting and registration for voting, another Supreme Court decision in the South.

All this has had repercussions in the North.

In Englewood, N.J., there have been two years of sit-ins, demonstrations and controversy over Lincoln Elementary School. It has a 90 per cent Negro enrollment.

Peru Missionary Speaks at Church

The missionary is studying anthropology at Harvard Seminary. They are based at Yarinacocha, a town where a medical clinic with two doctors and three nurses is maintained, an airbase for nine planes, their only mode of travel except for rivers and a radio center which broadcasts weather and keeps a daily check on teams working in the jungle.

Each team spends about half the year living in jungle villages of people with whom they work. The Snells have three jungle homes in addition to a home on the base. During their 12 years of educating the illiterate the Snells have seen the change that comes when individuals can read and

Jobless Claims Decrease by 10%

The number of unemployment claims filed in Manchester for the week ending May 11 dropped more than 10 per cent, from 509 to 454, compared with figures for the previous week.

Claims filed in the state as a whole dropped a lesser percentage, from 33,200 to 31,854, for the same period. Unemployment is running at about the same level as this time last year.

Manchester - Rockville ranked 13th in the state this week for total claims filed. Hartford remains the front runner, with 4,773 out of work, while Bridgeport and Waterbury 2,710.

New Britain ranked fifth in the state with 2,268 on the unemployment rolls.

In Manchester, about 47.8 per cent of the total 894 claims were filed by women. Rockville residents accounted for 203 of the total.
