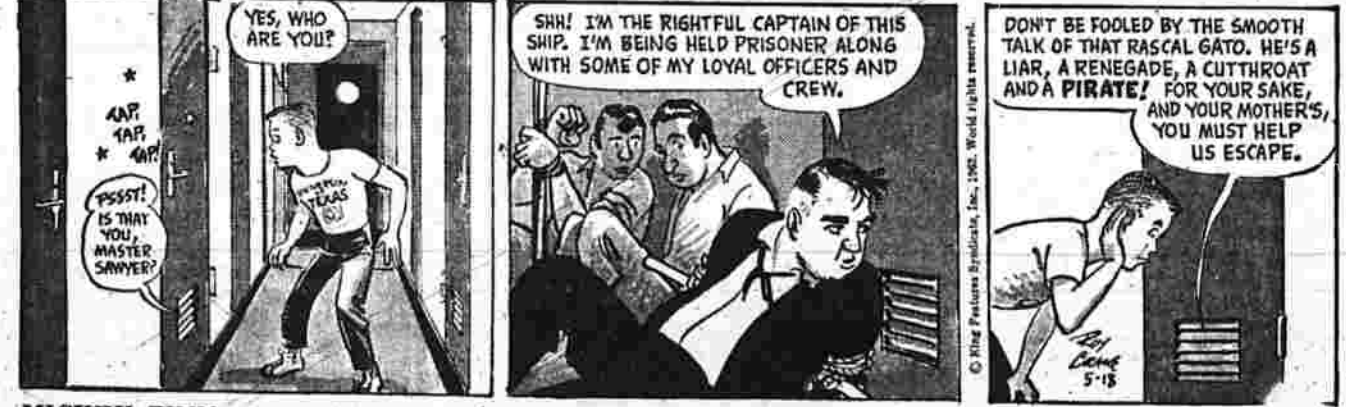

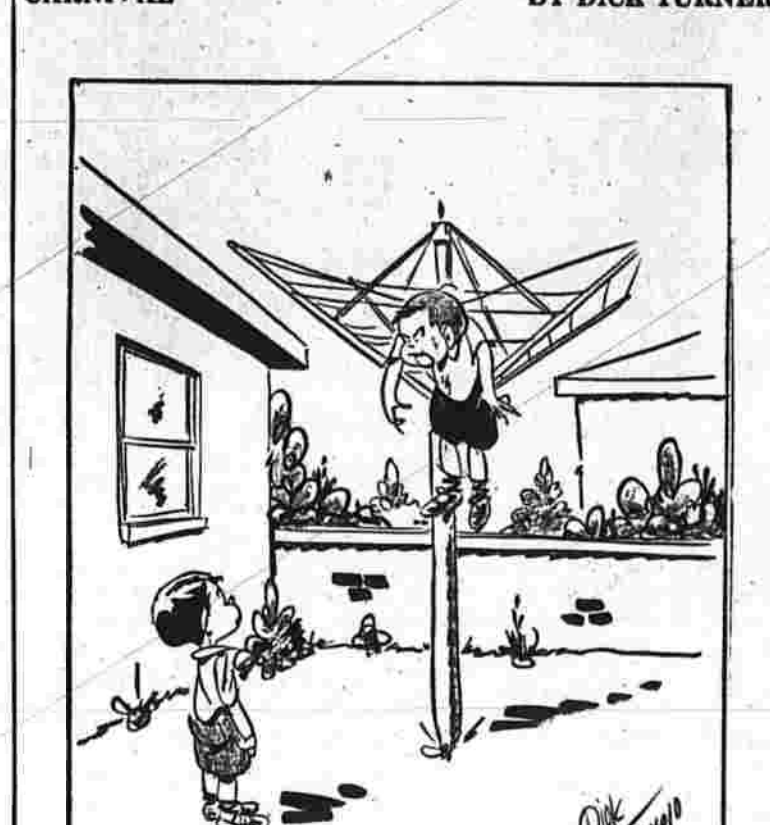

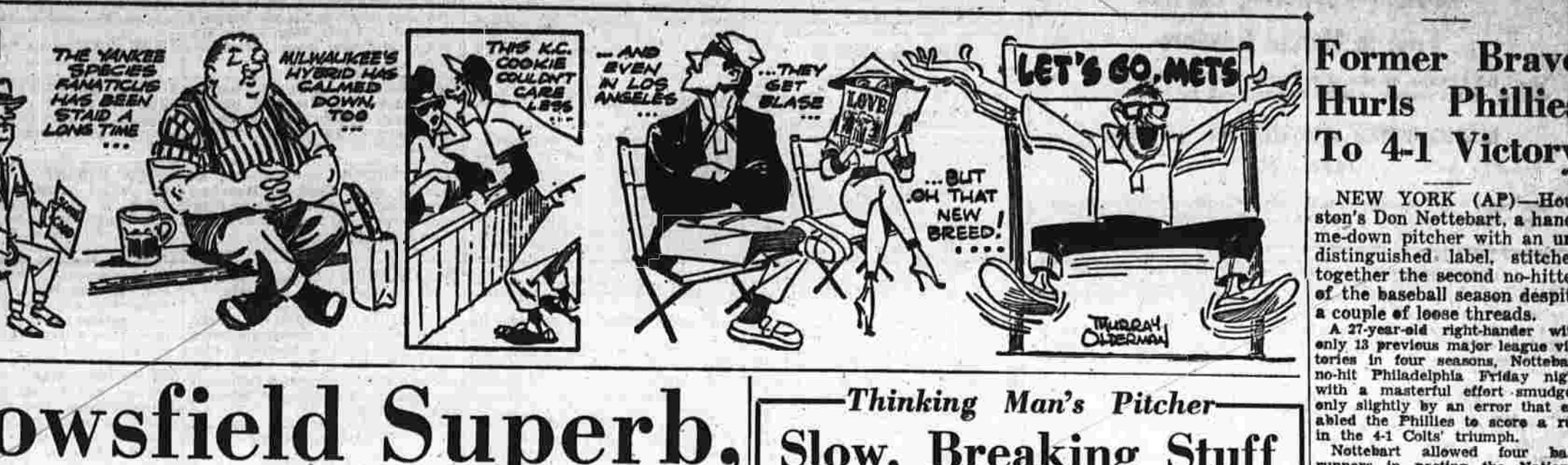

Television Cameras Get Inside Kremlin

On Tuesday, May 21 (at 9:30 p.m.) you can see NBC newsman Frank Bourgholzer walk confidently up to the Spasski Gate of the Kremlin, open the door and walk right past the guards into the Kremlin. And no, the footage doesn't stop there . . . it starts there!

Of all the recent "inside" visits this surely takes the cake as the most astounding . . . for never before have foreign camera crews been permitted inside the Kremlin; in fact, it wasn't even open to the Russian public until 1957. Furthermore, NBC got to many places that are still off-limits to the Russians.

What were the magic words that open-cessed this impregnable fortress and kept up Soviet co-operation for the "Kremlin" filming even as Soviet grumbling was rising over other NBC documentaries? Well, the magic words seem to be "Lucy Jarvis." The good looking brunette, with a never-but-never-take-no-for-an-answer outlook is NBC coordinator for special programs. She developed the idea, then spent months in Moscow negotiating for final permission, then took on the role of associate producer when clearance came through.

"The Kremlin," says Mrs. Jarvis, "is the symbol of the land of Communism, but the basic symbolism runs far deeper. It was here that all the Czars were crowned and it was to the Kremlin (a 40-block long complex of palaces, churches and museums) that Lenin returned the seat of government." The NBC documentary will recreate in the actual settings historical events from the Kremlin's beginning as a stockade through the period of the Czars to its modern role as part museum and part Soviet government headquarters.

No dry little room-to-room tour this. The Napoleonic invasion (still a touchy subject in present-day Russia) has been simulated in the actual setting. NBC was even permitted to fire an ancient cannon (in Red Square, in the middle of the night, no less).

Mrs. Jarvis landed in Moscow in June 1962 to a gala welcome by Russian news officials. It was a case of bread cast upon the water returning many-fold; for a year

earlier she had invited Russian radio and television representatives to appear in the United States on a program she was producing, and it was then that she had first broached the idea of a Kremlin visit.

"I arrived on a 10-day visa," she recalls and it was renewed and renewed for exactly five months. "Though everything was courteous the wait between steps seemed interminable. Two months had gone by and then "I got an invitation to a party I knew Khrushchev would be attending and I rushed off to buttonhole him. I'd gone all the way up through the line of authority until he was the only one left. For the first few minutes he corrected my Russian grammar (she'd wisely had the forethought to study the language) then he listened to my request for getting on with our Kremlin filming." After hearing out the pretty brunette he smiled and with a wave of the hand assured her, "Yes, yes, the permission is yours." Two days later she was invited to the crucial committee meeting. "Permission had indeed been granted," she said, "and we signed the contracts."

The cameras and crews came from NBC's Paris base with producer-director George Vicas, and shooting commenced.

"Once inside what impressed you most?" Lucy Jarvis, looking a little like a fuller-faced Rosalind Russell, didn't hesitate a second. "The lavishness, the absolute lavishness. Versailles seems simplicity itself against the gold and jewels of the Czars, gold walls, gold and more gold. Unbelievably rich icons and jeweled altars. The richness is astounding."

Something else impressed her, too. For the Soviet era, she explained, the pageant treatment focused on Lenin's apartment. "While I was there," she said, "I sneaked a look at Lenin's telephone pad. Everything is left exactly as it was when he was alive. He had Trotsky's number listed . . . but not Stalin's."

"Surely you encountered a little difficulty in this shrine of the modern Soviet, the Lenin apartments?" I double-checked. "No. Once negotiations were completed there were absolutely no restrictions whatever. We were even using a new kind of Ektochrome color film for which there were no developing facilities in the Soviet Union, and they let us ship out our unexposed negative for developing."

How did this goodwill work outside of working hours? By now, one must realize Lucy Jarvis knows how to get along and make people like it. It seems she re-did the elevator schedule at the 20-floor Hotel Ukraine to speed it up. How? "Well, they were running all six of their elevators as locals. I suggested running three local to the 11th floor and the other three express. At first they weren't going to try it, though I was joking because I lived on the 11th floor. By finally they were con-

vinced and it worked like a charm. Wonder if they're still doing it?" She also won some friends with brownies. "They had lots of delicacies of their own, but brownies

were different. Curiosity was so great I practically rationed every batch I baked." Why did it take two months to get that permission? Well as a

Russian general told her, "If we photograph everything in your White House don't you think it would raise some questions that would take some time resolving."

Gerald Green

Gerald Green, NBC News producer, who also has been a novelist, motion picture writer and newspaperman, says his "toughest assignment" was making a series of diplomatic decisions involving a chimpanzee and a fair

sampling of the 100 most distinguished people in the world.

Green, producer of "Chat Huntley Reporting" on NBC-TV, recalls the time he produced NBC-TV's "Today" show. A regular performer on the program then was a chimpanzee, J. Fred Muggs.

"I was required to be a kind of early morning maitre de, greeting and putting at ease the guests who daily were interviewed by Dave Garroway or one of the other panel members," Green says. "And here is where the recurrent problem confronted me: at what point does one inform a world-famous scientist, a leading statesman or a brilliant educator that he is to share the television air with a chimpanzee? Or should he be informed at all? If he is informed, do you lie to him about the chimpanzee's importance? Are there guests for whom the chimpanzee must be hidden? Are there guests for whom the chimpanzee must be left at home?"

"It is with pardonable pride that I report that in my tenure as producer, not a single guest ever walked off the program in indignation at the sight of Muggs. I imagine, however, that this record is less a tribute to my diplomatic gifts than it is testimony to the vanity of famous persons.

Green first joined NBC News as a writer in 1950, later that year becoming a news editor. From 1951-56 he was successively news editor, managing editor and producer of the "Today" show. He was a producer for "Wide World of Sports" in 1956-57.

After leaving NBC in 1957 he devoted his time to writing and traveling. He is the author of five novels, "His Majesty O'Keefe," "The Sword and the Sun," "The Last Angry Man," "The Lotus Eaters" and "The Heartless Light." He also wrote the screenplay of "The Last Angry Man," which was a best-selling book. His latest book was "The Portofino PTA," a non-fiction account of a hilarious summer with his family on the Italian Riviera.

Green returned to NBC News in 1961 and produced three full-hour specials: "The Uncommitted," a "JFK Report" and "The Peace Corps in Tanganyika." He became producer of "Chat Huntley Reporting" Aug. 10, 1962. In the 1962-63 season he also produced two full-hour specials: "California . . . The Most" and "Report on Mississippi." Born in Brooklyn, Green was educated at Columbia University. He worked for International News Service from 1947 to 1950. He is married to the former Marie Pomposelli of New York. The Greens, who live in Stamford, Conn., have three children, Nancy, 11; Ted, 9, and David, 7.

By DICK KLEINER. Newspaper Enterprise Assoc. NEW YORK (NEA) — Bonita Granville Wrather, associate producer of Lassie, was terrified of dogs as a child. "When I was 5," she says, "I was living on Long Island. One day I was playing in the back yard when a little fox terrier came in. He was snarling and snapping. My grandfather chased him off but the dog bit him. My grandfather died of rabies." From then on — and the reaction is quite natural — she was afraid of dogs, although she loved to read dog stories and see dog movies. But she never had a dog as a pet; the very idea petrified her. After her long and honorable career as an actress — she started as a child star — she married industrialist producer Jack Wrather. What does Wrather go out and buy? Lassie, that's what. "I'm the type who must keep busy," Bonita says. "After my children outgrew their need of me every hour, I started doing women's club work. But that wasn't enough to keep me happy. I started working on Jack's projects — when he built his Dismeyland Hotel, I decorated it. When he bought the Lassie show, I started working on that." It worked out well so she took over officially as associate producer. And she found herself working with dogs every day. Eventually, she got one herself — it is Lassie's uncle — and, after a few anxious months, she came to love the animal. Now there are two dogs around the Wrather house, the collie and a toy poodle. So even if Lassie never does another thing, he's accomplished one feat in his television career — cured Bonita of her fear of dogs.
