U.S. Asks Injunction To Head Off Wallace

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—The federal government today invoked its sovereignty today in a move to block Gov. George Wallace from preventing the enrollment of Negro at the University of Alabama.

The Justice Department today filed a lawsuit against the governor who has pledged to bar personally any Negro who attempts to enroll at the state institution.

The U.S. District Court Judge Seymour H. Lurie ordered Wallace to appear before him June 3 in Birmingham to show cause why a preliminary injunction should not be issued.

This action is brought by the United States against Wallace to prevent him from preventing the enrollment of Negro at the University of Alabama.

Wallace's intention, if carried out, would cause immediate and irreparable injury to the United States consisting of the impairment of the integrity of the judicial process and the obstruction of the administration of justice.

Lehnert Plays Brahms Work

Oswald Lehnert scored a personal triumph last evening with his performance of the Brahms Violin Concerto during a concert by the Hartford Civic Orchestra.

Lehnert, at one time concertmaster of the Manchester Civic Orchestra, is the only violinist to have won the Tchaikovsky competition in Russia, played in a truly masterful manner, offering about as excellent a performance as you are likely to hear.

This is a concerto noted for its many difficulties, but Mr. Lehnert surmounted them with consummate ease. It requires a very large tone, properly to balance the overly-thick orchestration, and the soloist managed it without the scraping and squawking so commonly encountered in less expert performances of the work. It was impressive.

Four numbers from Handel's "Water Music" opened the program under the direction of Valera performer Eddie Albert and James Franciosa, talented young stars of "The Night Garter" and "The Investigators," co-star in this exciting film, which was shown through Tuesday. Stamp collectors who have been issued by approximately 90% of the world's postal administrations have created an enthusiasm among stamp collectors. To satisfy these collectors, Minicup Publications has issued a new album especially for them.

A supplement will be released early in the fall to cover the balance of the issues not entered. This three ring album is priced at \$4.95 - the pages alone priced at \$2.95. They can be purchased at your local dealer or store.

Portugal has announced that it has issued a set of stamps honoring the Paris Postal Conference. Values are 1 Escudo, 1.50 Escudos and 3 Escudos. Also issued by this country are stamps honoring St. Vincent De Paul and the 5th centenary of the Military Order of Avia.

The first printing of the 1968 Specialized Catalog on First Day Covers was completely sold out less than two months after it went on sale, reported the Washington Press.

Design of the stamp is George Olden of New York City. It is the first Negro ever to design a U.S. postage stamp.

Collectors desiring first day cancellations of this commemorative may send addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Chicago, Illinois. The outside envelope to be marked "Emancipation Proclamation" and the inside "1968-1968" and "2 cents" at the bottom.

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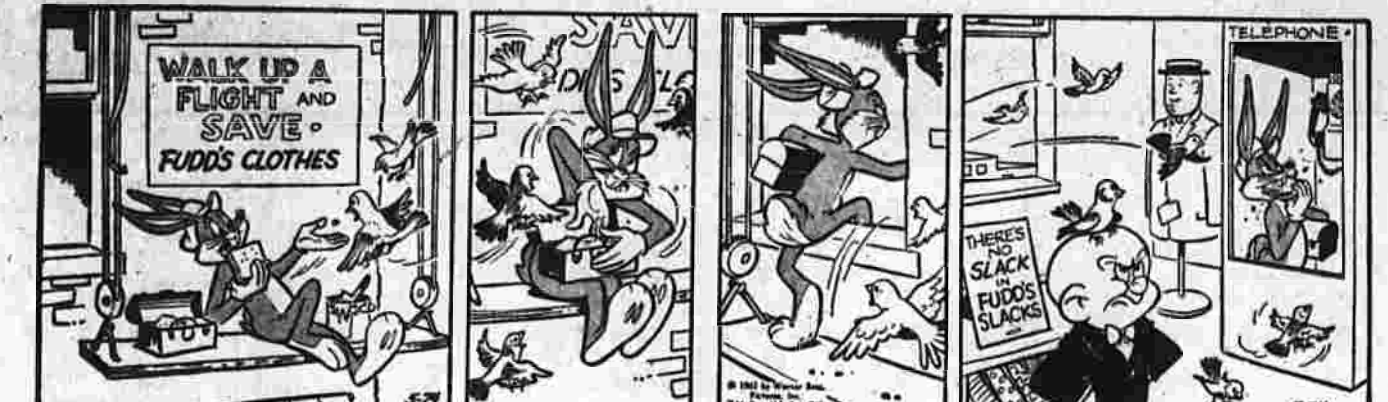
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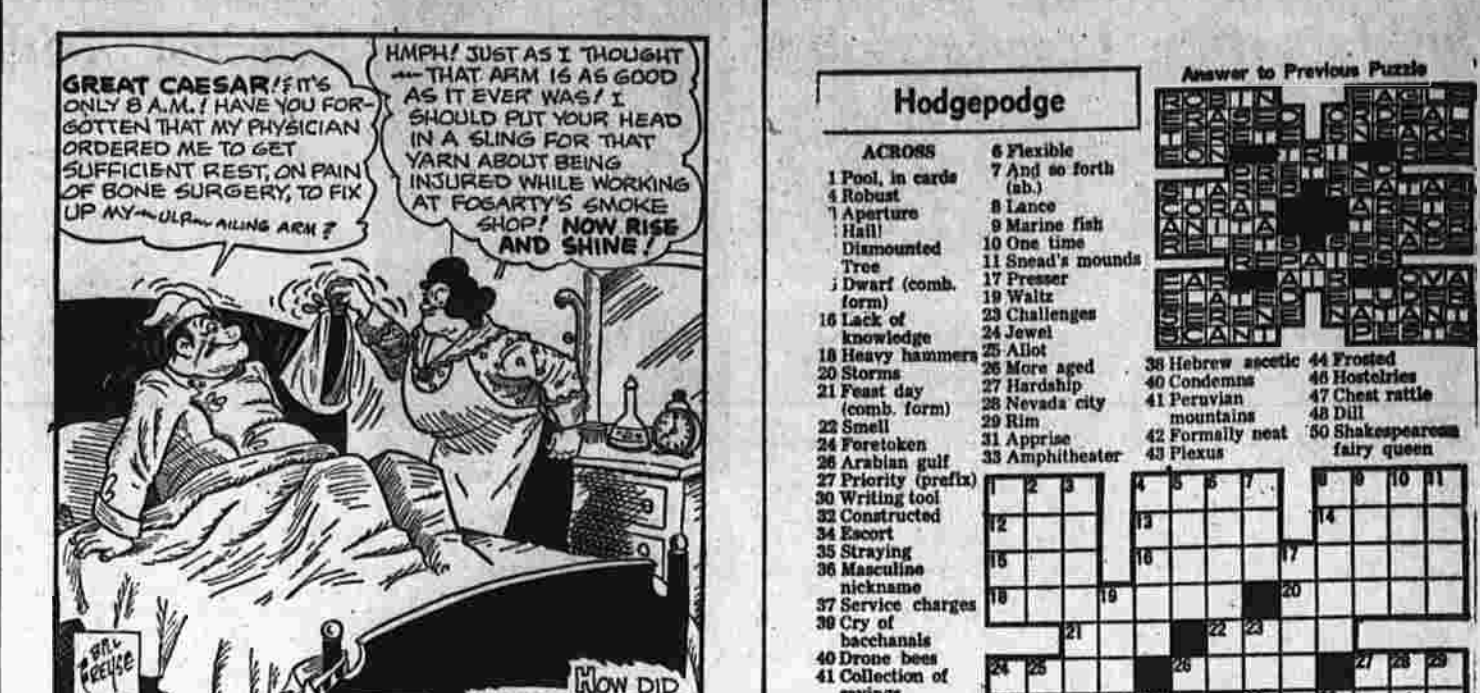
