### 16 States Vote Amendments Aimed to Cut Federal Power

It is possible for certain decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court to be overturned by a "Court of the Union" comprising the chief justices of the 50 states. This has been proposed by four states. The drive for these amendments became like a knee-jerk reflex to the Supreme Court's historic ruling of March 1962 that federal courts have the power to step into disputes about the reapportionment of state legislatures. This angered many state officials, particularly of course, legislators. Some representing sparsely settled rural districts, feared loss of their seats if the legislatures were redivided on the basis of population. For the first time, southern states had been crying themselves hoarse about the Supreme Court because of its desegregation decisions, found new northern allies to about just as loud. This anger billowed into the General Assembly of States held in Chicago last December by the Council of State Governments. "We believe that grave imbalances now exist," Assemblyman Lloyd W. Gray of California said. "Some federal judicial decisions... are bringing about a

(Continued from Page One) son navy outfitted a confiscated Confederate steamer, Red Rover, as a floating hospital. Nurses of the nursing sisterhood went aboard to care for the patients. The Union had its Dr. Mary Walker, a New York surgeon who worked in field hospitals under contract. She wore pants, vest, frock coat and a tall silk hat. Dr. Walker was given the Medal of Honor for her tireless service. But this was rescinded, along with many others, when congressional review and re-statement of standards for the medal in 1916. The Confederacy had its Sally Tompkins, matron of a hospital in Richmond who was given the Union's commission for her services. There also was Mary Minerva O'Leary, who founded the Ladies Relief Hospital in Lynchburg, Va., and also was given a captain's commission. Many are the stories and the legends about women who dressed as men and went out to fight in the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Deborah Sampson (or Gannett, one version says) is supposed to have fought and died in the Revolutionary War. Her husband, it is said, received a widow's pension after her death on the battlefield. Molly Pitcher, who lived beyond the Revolution, was really Mary Ludwig, who, like many other wives of that day, saved her husband in camp, cooked and washed. The carried part of her husband to the man on the firing line and that got her name. At the battle of Monmouth, in 1776, one version goes, when her husband fell from his horse, she took his place at his gun and thus shared death and triumph at her country's demise.

### Sugar Rising; Other Foods Holding Price

NEW YORK (AP)—You're going to spend more this year. You might as well get used to the idea now.

Part of this will be because prices will be higher, all the way from sugar to steel. You'll notice the sugar price increase first, because very few steel as such. And there's a long road indeed between the price rise at the steel mill and the increase, if any, in the gadget at the store or the dealer's.

And on most other things you buy the price will change little, if at all. But you'll be shelling out extra money this year, producers feel sure now, because you want more expensive things—from food to autos.

Much of this increased spending, the government expects, will be because many American families will have higher incomes—along with the fact there'll be more families. The Agriculture Department expects Americans to spend \$77 billion for food this year, or a per cent more than last year. But it quickly adds that this will be just about 18 per cent of personal incomes after taxes, while last year 19.2 per cent for food.

Most food prices will be stable, it thinks. Some will fluctuate with the fluctuations of the weather. Sugar is different. Refined sugar prices have gone up again—the 12th increase this year. This may surprise most businessmen, used to government controls that have held the price fairly steady.

Rising prices of refined sugar may soon spread beyond the supermarket shelves. Producers of soft drinks, ice cream, candy and cakes have to pay more for their sugar, too. And as competition permits they may raise prices.

Changing patterns in food spending in general are traced by the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond. The average consumer spent \$297.15 food last year, about one-fourth more than in the 1947-48 period, as figured in current dollars. But average incomes rose nearly two-thirds in that period. So the percentage spent on food would have dropped below the 19 per cent rate if eating habits hadn't changed.

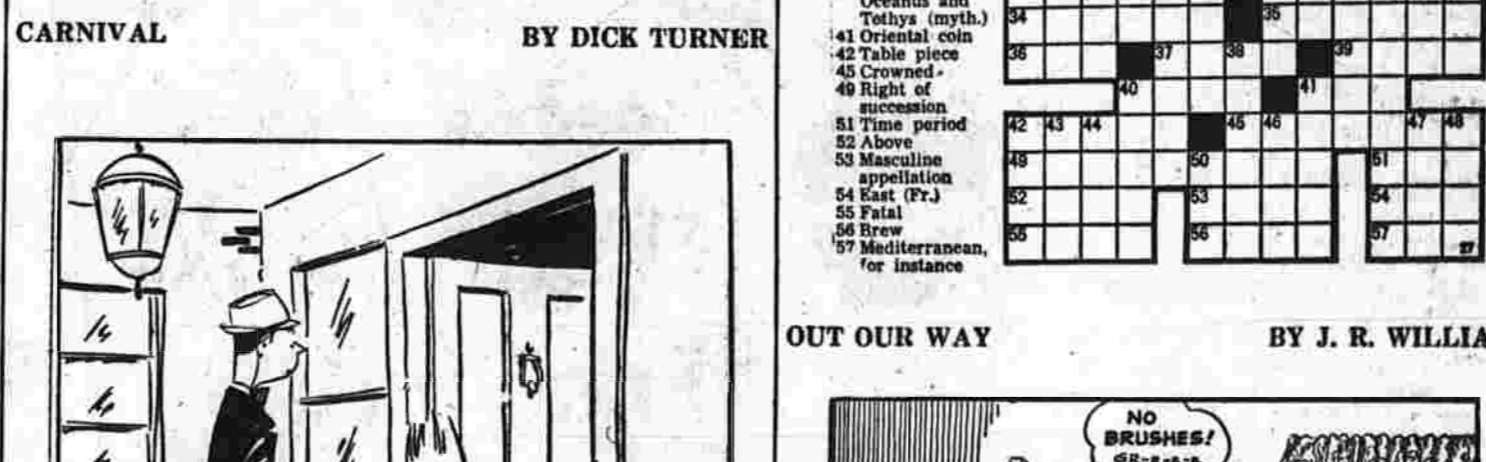
